

Dear Lion,

I once heard an African proverb that I will forever remember: the best way to help someone in need is to wipe their tears. Lions, we ao ms every minute of every day! Our hands are helping those in need, and the compassion in our hearts is wiping their tears. One way we are doing this is by improving the health and education of children worldwide.

Just last month, Margit and I were in Ethiopia and Madagascar to help launch our Lions-Measles Initiative pilot programs. In these countries Lions helped vaccinate nearly 10 million children. This is truly sensational!

Did you know that measles is the leading cause of vaccinepreventable deaths in children? Over the next three years, 1.7 million children will likely die from this disease, which also causes blindness. Lions, we can and we must stop this!

At a health center in Imersituska, a rural village in Madagascar, I met Marie Louise Razafindrazanana, who brought her nine-month old son, Patrick, to be vaccinated. She knew all too well the dangers of measles, as she lost her daughter to the disease. I truly felt I was wiping her tears, but she gave me something in return – a smile of hope and gratitude. Her story echoes those that I heard in Ethiopia. But these mothers know that we Lions are giving their children hope for a long, healthy life.

Lions have long been committed to improving quality of life for children. Another way we do this is by improving their education and providing them with vital life skills. In meeting with government officials in both countries, they pledged their full support to the measles program. But they were also very interested in starting Lions Quest in their country.

Like so many other leaders worldwide are realizing, Lions Quest can and should be a key component to improving the general well being of our youth. Government can't do this alone. It takes all of us working together to really make an impact.

Distribution of Contributing Membership Pins

Contributing Membership

100% of every donation to LCIF goes to help those in desperate need worldwide. Since only US\$6 is needed to save someone's sight, every dollar raised is precious. You do not need to be a major donor to be a hero. The Contributing Membership program is a great way to acknowledge and thank almost any undesignated donation to LCIF.

Contributing Membership and the Melvin Jones Fellowship are both recognition programs for unrestricted donations to LCIF. The Contributing Member program is for those donors making smaller, but not less significant, donations. If a donor is planning to give larger donations to LCIF (at least US\$1,000 over the next five years) the Lion donor should be acknowledged through the MJF program.

To clarify, contributing member donations do not receive MJF credit and vice versa. If the donor is unsure of the level of funds they will donate, the recognition can be applied at a later date.

There are three types of Contributing Member donation Pins (see picture to the right):

- ✓ Gold for a US\$100 donation
- ✓ Silver for a US\$50 donation
- ✓ Bronze for a US\$20 donation

Thank you to those coordinators that have zipped

through their 25 Contributing Member pins and already asked for more. Great job! In addition, clubs can receive banner patches if every member in the club is a Contributing Member. In 2009-2010, there were 581 100% Contributing Member clubs worldwide.

LCIF Public Relations

Public relations is a great way for your Lions club to garner media coverage for the service that is being done in your own community and worldwide. LCIF offers numerous resources to assist in contacting all types of media outlets that could potentially cover a story about what your club is doing in the community.

All forms of communication — written, verbal and non-verbal—are incorporated in public relations. It includes writing news releases and distributing promotional flyers. Equally important are actions often taken for granted, such as wearing a Lions lapel pin or marching in a parade. Good public relations—informing the community that your club built the park, conducted the vision screening or collected the eyeglasses—will help foster community support.

Having good public relations can even advance your club's membership efforts. People want to belong to a successful and reliable organization. By actively promoting your club and its worthwhile activities, you'll be projecting a positive image in the community and showing that your club is worth joining. It is important to tell people about the good work your club is doing in the community.

Steps for Successful Public Relations for Lions

- 1 Visit the PR Tools section on Lions Clubs International's Web site at www.lionsclubs.org for resources and assistance.
- 2 Make a list of your programs and how they serve others.
- 3 Draw up a PR plan for the year outlining how you are going to promote these programs.
- 4 Develop a fact sheet and distribute it widely throughout the community.
- 5 Plan a calendar of events and distribute to the media and community groups.
- 6 Set up a Web site and link to other community groups.
- 7 Sponsor a sight-related program that corresponds with a special event, day or month (Example: World Sight Day in October or Diabetes Awareness Month in November).
- 8 Send a public service announcement at least two times a year. (There are some general vision PSAs available from LCI.)
- 9 Tell one person each day about the work of Lions' programs and how you serve your community.

What is news?

News is information about recent or upcoming events or happenings that are relevant to the public.

What is newsworthy?

A story should be timely, relevant, original and have an impact on the community.

- Deliver news releases and letters to local newspaper editors
- Provide basic information to local media calendar editors
- Relay story ideas and send photographs to general or feature reporters at local newspapers

Always include: who, what, when and where, along with a local contact name and phone number.





The Heart of Aslan:

Aslan, the Lion, was a symbol of strength, wisdom, goodness and selflessness. Interestingly, this also reflects the character of the Lions Club and our members.



For each of our members made a Personal COMMITMENT: Personal commitment is an interaction dominated by obligations. These obligations may be mutual, or self-imposed, or explicitly stated, or may not. Distinction is often made between commitments as a member of an organization. We also look at this in adding the extra Commitment (accepting positions within the Club, District and/or State) – this entails the trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose and the act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action.

We also have to look at INTEGRITY which comprises the personal inner sense of "wholeness" deriving from honesty and consistent uprightness of character. The etymology of the word relates it to the Latin adjective *integer* (whole, complete).

Have we made that choice when accepting positions within our organization? Ask yourself:

"Have I really done enough."

"How much more can I do to make a difference."

"Can I still find others that hold the same values?"

We NEED more LIONS to fulfill positions within our District and State levels — have you asked what more can I do?

Can you volunteer to do more? If so – we need you to except positions at the Camp for the Blind and the Lighthouse -- also maybe other positions within the District – JUST ASK to and VOLUNTEER.

Sharing the Vision

More than 500 Lions Clubs in 60 countries have participated in 850 Sharing the Vision projects for a total of 71,917 hours. Reporting clubs have provided vision screening services too nearly 350,000 people and have collected over 250,000 eveglasses during the month of October. As part of the Sharing the Vision campaign, Lions of MD 324 D6 in Bangalore, India began a major vision screening initiative focused on training enough Lions to screen a million children.

The lamp was lit in Sydney last July. Now, almost halfway through the year, the beacon of Lions Clubs International is shining even more brightly. Worldwide membership has increased and now stands at 1,346,725 Lion members-- an increase of nearly 7,000 since July 2010.

Women now make up a larger part of the Lions family than ever before. Today there are more than 300,000 women Lions around the globe. In addition to the growth in Lions members, there is an increase in the number of Leos. This year alone, more than 100 new Leo Clubs have been established.

Clearly, "success through service" is succeeding as Lions Clubs International extends its reach into unserved communities and increases its capacity to provide more and better service to those in need.









On the Horizon

I am so pleased with the response to the Bright Light Award and based on its success I am announcing a second award challenge called the Light Keeper Award.

This two level award will recognize district governors for high club involvement in service campaigns and growth due to service.

Silver level: Harbor Light Master Award

- At least 50% of clubs participating in 2 of the 4 Global Service Action Campaigns either at the assigned time or anytime before the end of April

OR

- Conducting one, new district service campaign that involved at least 50% of the clubs

Gold level: Light Keeper Master Award

-- Achieving the requirements for the Harbor Light Master Award and exceeding net membership growth of 2% or more from July 1 through April 30, 2011, excluding dropped members thru August from clubs canceled for nonpayment.

HAPPY NEW LIONS'RETENTION YEAR!

We are now at the half way point in our Lions' year and it will be a few days before LCI computes and posts our MD-18 retention statistics for the past six months. However, I do want to point out that as of the end of November we are again experiencing better retention than we did last year! Even though we have lost one more club in Georgia than last year at this point in time, we are holding on to more Lions! Why is our retention doing better this year? Until I hear differently, I'm going to suggest that an increasing number of clubs are beginning to implement retention action items.

In the past three District Bulletin retention articles I commented on the Lion retention ideas of PID Patti Hill, PDG Richard "Dick" Silveira and then I indicated that the forthcoming <u>Club Excellence Process</u> (CEP) will provide a means of increasing the number of clubs discussing and handling retention action items. In fact, I encouraged you to have your clubs participate in the Club Excellence Process (CEP) and take the list of retention action items I have provided to your CEP training.

To remind you of what you need to take with you, I am going to repost the list of club membership retention goals:

- 1. Hold new member inductions and orientation training.
- 2. Match club members service desires to your club's activities.
- 3. Make certain that new Lions become closely linked to club mentors and their sponsors.
- 4. Increase the attendance of members at club meetings, fundraising events and service projects.
- 5. Recognize the volunteer actions of all Lions regardless of how much volunteerism a member gave.
- 6. Increase the percentage of club members who know the names of Lions in your clubs.
- 7. Recognize the spouses and friends of club members.
- 8. Equalize the total volunteer labor of club members.
- 9. Decrease negative relationships between club members.

Again, I wish you a Happy New Lions' Retention Year.

WHITE CANE 2011: White Cane 2011 is just around the corner. It is not to early now to begin making plans to have a successful White Cane Day. I understand that the Dahlonega Lions Club is planning on putting on a Country & Western Concert with a big name entertainer in order to increase their contribution. Last year MD18 raised \$118,346.57 through White Cane 2010 for the Lighthouse. District 18D, with 32 Clubs out of 38 Clubs participating, raised \$44,616.00 for White Cane 2010. The Goal for White Cane 2011 statewide is \$132,470.00. Can District 18D raise \$50,000 for the Lighthouse with White Cane 2011? The answer is YES if all 38 Clubs participate this year.

If your Club needs help or ideas on how to get involved in White Cane 2011, let me encourage you to contact our District White Cane Co-chairs – Lions Gene and Louise Little. FINANCIAL REPORT:

Budget:

The Budget to operate our Lighthouse this year is 2.0 million dollars. During the first third of Lion's Year 2010-2011 our income was \$43,624.08 while our expenses were \$505,877.57.

Contributions: Club contributions and other contributions to the Lighthouse in the first four months of this Lion's Year (2010-2011) continue to be down. MD18 contributions total \$52,576.30 compared to \$63,068.72 for the same period last year. You can see that we are down \$10,492.42 this year compared to the same period last year. For the first third of this Lion's Year 2010-2011, District 18D contributions to the Lighthouse are \$4,350.00 compared to \$17,221.96 for the same period last year. As all Lions know our Vision Clinics are funded through grants. The Hearing Aid Program is funded through a grant with the State of Georgia. The Surgeries are funded through the support of the Clubs with their Regular Club Contributions and by having a successful White Cane.

With this in mind, our Lighthouse needs the support of the individual Lions in MD18. At the recent Board Meeting on December 4th the District Directors made a motion to ask the individual Lions in their respective District to make a personal contribution to the Lighthouse in the amount of \$25.00, \$50.00, or \$100.00. The motion passed. The amount, that you contribute, is your choice. When making your personal contribution to the Lighthouse be sure you put your Club name on the check and also District 18D in order for your club to receive credit too. I am confident that the Lions of 18D who are able to help with a personal contribution will do so. If you smoke or stop off at a local tavern or juke joint after work for a drink, abstain from it for a week and you will be able to make a personal contribution.

For your information as of January 1, 2011, Knights Templar Eye Foundation will no longer be doing eye surgeries. What this means to our Lighthouse is that we will be seeing an increase for request surgeries.

SERVICE REPORTS:

Vision Clinic Report: In the first four months of Lion's Year 2010-2011 we have served 1088 individuals at the Vision Clinics compared to 949 individuals served for the same period last year. Sixty two (62) individuals from 18D have been served at the Vision Clinics during the first four months of this Lion's Year compared to eighty four (84) individuals for the same period last year. The cost to operate the Clinics during the first four months was \$71,007.64.

Surgery Report: In the first four (4) months of Lion's Year 2010-2011, the Lighthouse has completed one hundred and four surgeries compared to eighty nine (89) for the same period last year. Eleven (11) individuals from District 18D had their lives changed in the first months of this Lion's Year compared to thirteen (13) individuals for the same period last year. The cost of surgeries in the first four months of this year was \$670,077.02; after receiving discounts totaling \$527,606.03, the Lighthouse paid \$140,470.99.

Hearing Aid Program: In the first four months of Lion's Year 2010-2011, the Lighthouse has touched the lives of three hundred – thirty six (336) individuals by providing 654 hearing aids compared to three hundred – eleven (311) individuals by providing 564 hearing aids for the same period last year. Forty eight (48) individuals from District 18D have received 89 hearing aids in the first four months of this Lion's Year compared to twenty nine (29) individuals receiving 53 hearing aids covering the same period last year.

CONCLUSION: As you can see from this reports that demands for services has increased. With this in mind we ask you to please be patient as we look at the vision service requests, hearing aid requests, and surgery requests. Once again if you have not had the opportunity to visit our new home; mark your calendars now to make plans to attend the open house on Saturday – January 29th at the Lighthouse Winter Conference.

Still grieving the retirement of her first dog, Dixie, who recently went to live with close friends, Annette Bateman's return to Leader Dog was bittersweet. She missed Dixie with all her heart but was excited to meet her new dog. The grief counseling provided by Leader Dog helped her make the transition from her first dog to her second.

"I tend to try to hide my emotions," admits Annette. "During grief counseling I didn't say much because I knew I'd just open up and fall apart. The best thing they taught us is that we don't all grieve in the same way when we lose someone important to us. At that time, I really just needed to keep moving forward and not dwell on the past."

Annette took a huge step forward when she met her second Leader Dog, Stanley. As she sat on the edge of her bed waiting for her new companion, Annette's concerns were for more than just herself. She was thinking about how Stanley must feel.

"I don't know if the dogs are necessarily prepared for the person they're getting," Annette says. "They don't know what's coming. They've been here [at Leader Dog] with these people for four months, after they've been raised by their puppy raiser for a year. Can you imagine being with your family and then having someone say, 'Okay, now I want you to go live with this family.' How would you feel?"

But Annette needn't have worried. It was as if Stanley picked her out. When the door to her room opened, Stanley walked straight to Annette and plopped his head in her lap. He was home at last.

"I still miss Dixie very much. She's been a big part of me for the past ten years," Annette reflects. But she and Stanley have forged a new relationship, and she's enjoying the fact that he's a cuddler. "He just likes to lie down and I sit down by him, and he just lays his head on my lap," she says with a smile. "He's just a loveable dog. I love petting him and grooming him. He's so calm."

In addition to Stanley, Annette returns to Texas with a pedestrian GPS unit that narrates her location to her, giving her a whole new ability to navigate in unfamiliar territory. "The GPS lets you know what street you're on and what intersecting street is coming up ahead. If you don't remember where you are, there's a big button in the middle that you push and the GPS tells you where you are. There's also a function that explains what's around the area, like businesses and stuff."

But for Annette, it is Dixie and Stanley—the dogs of Leader Dog—who make the biggest difference. "I think people think that these dogs are just trained like robots. And they're not. When the harness comes off they can be a dog, but their training doesn't leave them." Annette says that the devotion of a Leader Dog is a precious gift. "Leader Dog is helping not only me, but a lot of other individuals that come to get dogs for their independence," she stresses.

Even with Stanley by her side, Annette still has moments when she misses Dixie. "It hit me the other day that she wasn't with me; out loud I said to myself, 'Oh, my Dixie.' Then I remembered that I have Stanley now and I called him over and hugged him."

Leader Dogs for the Blind has an enduring responsibility to provide a lifetime of Leader Dogs to people who are blind, Deaf-blind or visually impaired. Weighty Matters for Youngsters

Weight gain by kids as young as 5 years old—and up through their teen years—can influence their health later in life, according to a recently released study spanning a quarter of a century.

Following kids and teens ages 5 to 19 years old (and up to 30 to 48 years old at the end of a follow-up segment), researchers found that risk factors for diabetes can begin in childhood, and that weight management is important even in those early years.

The first leg of the study was a multistage survey conducted between 1972 and 1978. The follow-up study was conducted between 2000 and 2004. The 814 boys and girls in the study were recruited from one school district in the Cincinnati area.

The main focus of the study, as described by the researchers, was to follow the risk for, and development and progression of, the metabolic syndrome. The researchers aimed to use the data from the two studies to draw a correlation between metabolic syndrome in childhood and in adulthood. They classified kids as having pediatric metabolic syndrome if they exhibited three or more of the following factors:

- A body mass index (BMI) over the 90th percentile
- A large waist
- High blood glucose levels
- Low HDL cholesterol (the "good" cholesterol)
- High triglycerides
- High blood pressure

At the study's start, 18.2 percent of the students were at risk for overweight and 7 percent were already overweight. Thirty-two of them had pediatric metabolic syndrome.

The prevalence of metabolic syndrome in this group rose from 3.9 percent in the initial study to 26.6 percent in the follow-up study. Nearly half of the 814 adults had a large

waist circumference (described as 88 cm or more for females and 102 cm or more for males).

Adult BMI was strongly associated with pediatric BMI. Of the kids who were at risk for becoming overweight, 63 percent were determined obese in the follow-up study.

In addition to pediatric metabolic syndrome, the other factors with the biggest impact on the development of type 2 diabetes in adulthood included age, race, and parental history of diabetes. Black men and women had twice the risk of developing type 2 diabetes as whites did.

Researchers concluded that early weight management is key. The correlation between the increase in BMI and the increased risk of metabolic syndrome demonstrates the link between weight and metabolic syndrome, obesity, and type 2 diabetes later in life. Weight management in early and middle adult years likely plays a significant role in warding off type 2 diabetes and metabolic syndrome, according to the researchers.

This study was published online Nov. 5, 2007, in *The Journal of Pediatrics*.

faster in children and adolescents than it does in adults, a study shows. On average, participants were diagnosed at age 14 and began treatment right away with **metformin** or insulin. Their average blood glucose levels typically began to rise after 18 months, and those who took insulin started to need higher doses after two years. Previous research has shown that type 2 progresses at a slower rate than this in adults. The data suggest that the insulin-producing cells in young people give out faster than those in adults do.
