As 2011 comes to an end, it is a time to reflect on our many successes during this year. Last year our Foundation was able to help millions of people around the world. Our Lions Quest program has grown to six more countries, now totaling



69 countries, and is reaching more than 12 million children around the world. Our <u>SightFirst</u> program has expanded to include new program areas, such as education, rehabilitation and research. Our partnerships

have increased, including a record donation from the Gates Foundation to help us fight measles. We have helped rebuild lives following some of the worst natural disasters in recent history. These are just a few of the numerous highlights in the past year.



It is because of your generosity that LCIF is able to expand to meet even more needs worldwide. Last fiscal year, donations were up by 40 percent. I am excited to tell you that through the first four months of this fiscal year, our donations are up an additional 62 percent, from US\$15.1 million to US\$24.1 million. As a result, many more people worldwide are benefiting from your kindness and humanitarian service. Nearly 1 million people will benefit from the grants awarded at the October board meeting alone.

This coming year promises to be another remarkable year. I look forward to sharing with you additional successes in the new year and thank you for your continued support.

### One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative Update

Every day a quiet storm needlessly takes the lives of 450 children. Yet for less than US\$1, we can provide life-long immunity and the chance at life. Lions, we can save 157



million children through One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative, a partnership with the Measles Initiative. The Gates Foundation is challenging Lions to mobilize US\$10 million with a matching grant of US\$1 for every US\$2 raised by Lions. Last month

LCIF received two large donations to help meet this challenge: US\$250,000 from Multiple District 300, Taiwan, and US\$10,000 from International Director Seiki Yamaura from Japan. All Lions are encouraged to support this program and help meet the challenge. <a href="Donations">Donations</a> are eligible for MJF recognition. Many others around the world are also expressing their support. Last month International President Tam met with the President of Nepal and Vice President of Kenya, both of whom pledged their support to vaccination campaigns planned in their countries.

### **Disaster Relief Update**

Nearly two years following the earthquake, <u>Lions in Haiti</u> remain committed to rebuilding lives and the economy. The nursing school is now complete in Haiti and students will move into the facility this month. The school includes four classrooms, a practice laboratory and a resource library. The homes being built in collaboration with the organization HELP are nearly complete. In addition to the 620 families who are benefiting from a new home, 102 Haitian construction workers are benefiting through employment from this project. <u>Read more online</u> about additional projects completed or underway in Haiti.

### **Relieving Hunger**

During December and January, Lions are encouraged to participate in the Relieving the Hunger Global Service Action Campaign. There are a number of resources available to assist in planning and promotion of activities that address local and global hunger. LCIF has awarded a number of grants for large-scale projects that fight hunger, including delivering food supplies in the Horn of Africa during a massive famine, a feeding program for 65,000 people daily in South Africa and re-establishing kitchens and food facilities following the disaster in Japan.

"The first nine years of my life were in a communist country. For the past year I have lived in America. I know what it means not to have freedom.

Living in Russia was very hard. Our parents always had to do what the government said. We could not celebrate when we wanted. Many times we could not got where we wanted to. Here, we go anywhere and nobody questions us.

My mother and everybody else worked for the government. This is communism. Nobody can make money because the government took it. In America, I have a savings account and I keep the money I get for birthdays and Christmas. My brother Oleg made \$5.00 for a tooth and put it in his savings account.

In Russia people do not go to church. Some people did but they only go to Russia Orthodox. If you wanted another religion you could not do it. In America, my mom and dad have taken us to different churches. It's fun and interesting.

Many years ago we had a Czar ruling Russia. If we said something bad about him we could get killed, The leaders who came after him were the same. I told my dad I don't like President Clinton. In America I can say that and not get arrested. Having freedom of speech is something special.

In Russia, many people are angry and sad. They could not get excited because they had little freedom. Last week we met a lady from China and she said women in China could only have one child. If I lived in China I would not have my brother Oleg and my sister Irina.

Maybe one day other countries will have freedom like America. Maybe they will have religion they want. Maybe one day all countries will be friends. Maybe one day all the countries will have enough stuff to eat and drink. May one day other countries will not be run by one person. Maybe one day the earth will be a happy place"!

FAQ: (Frequently Asked Questions)

Q: Am I required to change the manner in which regular payments are sent?

A: No, it is not mandatory to pay online. This is an option offered to all club officers.

Q: Can I view payments not issued online?

A: Yes, non-online payments can be viewed on the end of month statements once they are available.

Q: When can I view my online statement?

A: Your online statement can be viewed after the 3rd or 4th business day following month-end close.

Q: Can District and Multiple District Statements be viewed and paid online?

A: District and Multiple District Statements are not yet available online at this time.

The Lions Clubs International (LCI) Annual Service Activity Report is based on information that was collected through an online reporting system that was recently redesigned to not only capture the quantitative impact of Lions service around the world, but also allow us to tell a story behind Lions service.

### Dear Lion Leaders,

First of all, in this season of belief, let me offer best wishes to all my fellow Lions, their loved ones, friends and families. We have come a long way in five months. My belief in the power of what every Lion can do to change the world is as strong as ever.

The early success of our campaign to plant 1 million trees makes me both proud and so humble. Whether it's planting trees in lands scarred by the tsunami in Japan or tornadoes in the United States, or planting trees to restore our planets

critical forests in Africa or South Asia, we have succeeded in unifying Lions all over the world. These acts of service are fun and rewarding to do. They bring clubs together and bring smiles to ourselves and to people in the communities we serve. Through mid-November, together we planted more than 5.7 MILLION trees in more than 60 countries. Isn't that amazing?

Some Lions ask me if I will set another target. I politely say "no" because I believe the target lies in each of our hearts. It is the Lions who determine how far we go and how many trees we plant. Every tree counts, even if you can plant only one. Every member matters, too.

We have strong membership growth this year, exceeding a 16,000 net gain through mid-November. ### Projecting Our Image

# Tree Planting Challenge

After reaching the year's goal of planting one million trees in just two months, Lions around the world have gone on to plant an additional million trees and more!

Working in concert with many local community groups, 3,472 Lions clubs in 82 countries account for a total of 7,016,296 new trees cooling the planet and renewing its atmosphere.

### Club Excellence Process

All Lions clubs strive for excellence, but achieving it takes concrete action. You can launch your club on the road to excellence (or keep it there!) with the four steps of the Club Excellence Process (CEP).

CEP is a four part workshop that is lead by a trained, experienced Lion and can be customized to meet the needs of your club. The process covers community needs, the characteristics of an excellent club, obstacles to excellence, locating resources, goal setting and action plans.

The workshop can be completed in one or four sessions and can be scheduled for club meetings or other gatherings over a period of no more than four months.

### GLOBAL LEADERSHIP TEAM UPDATE

I hope you all have had a wonderful holiday season. Now, we are embarking on a brand new year. 2012 is a great time for all of us to become better Lions. One way to do that is to take advantage of the opportunities for training that are being offered.

During 2011, we had the opportunity to learn how to become Certified Guiding Lions, and we conducted Member Orientation training. Our next focus will be on Club Excellence Process. If our local clubs are not strong, our organization will not be strong. The Club Excellence Process is a way to assess just how your club is doing and also to obtain the needs of your community. I hope this will be the first decision that clubs make in the new year. Hopefully, Zone Chairs will be contacting clubs soon to begin this process.

### **Program Overview**

The Club Excellence Process (CEP) is a workshop program dedicated to club improvement. A club that decides to participate in the CEP will be guided by a facilitator through four steps of approximately an hour each. A participating club will examine their community's needs, analyze their membership experience, use resources and develop action plans.

Each Lion attending a CEP Workshop will be completing several assignments under the guidance of a facilitator. Two of these assignments are the Community Needs Assessment and the How Are Your Ratings? survey. Clubs may be asked by their facilitator to complete these assignments before, during, or after the workshop. The program consists of four steps that are approximately an hour each. The program can be delivered in one, two, or four sessions. Each workshop session can be held at a club meeting, club retreat or other gathering. The entire process should take no longer than 4 months.



### Being a Lion is all about planning ahead! Start your plans now for your Nomination for "Outstanding Blind Award"

The New Year is upon us. Where does time go? While we are starting the 2012 Calendar Year, we are half way through our Lion Year. Now is a good time to take stock of the activities for the second half of this Lion Year.

Many of the awards presented at the Georgia Lions State Convention are due to be submitted in April, just 3 short months from now. You might ask yourself why your Lions Club should submit someone for one of the GA State Convention Awards such as the Outstanding Blind Award. I will give you several reasons why you should submit a candidate.

First, you are recognizing someone for their outstanding contributions to your club or to the community. Some awards, like the Golden Chain Award are for members of your club, but other awards, such as the Outstanding Blind Award and the Outstanding Deaf Award can be awarded to people outside your Lions Club.

Second, by nominating someone for the Outstanding Blind Award you recognize that the person has excelled and overcome many obstacles. This is great feedback for a person with Visual Challenges to receive. This is also a very positive message for other people with Visual Challenges in your community that they do not have to let visual problems keep them from striving to do their best.

Next, you may well get a new member if the person you nominate is not currently a member of your Lions Club. By nominating a person outside of your club, you also have the opportunity to ask them if they would like to be a Lion.

Finally, nominating a person for the Outstanding Blind Award gives your Lions Club the opportunity to publish an article in your local newspaper. You can let people know that not only do the Lions care about the Prevention of Blindness, we also want to help those who are already blind. Publicity is a great way to increase both membership and fundraising.

# Lions Club offers eye care to the uninsured and needy

Picking the right pair of glasses — comfortable, appropriate and with the right prescription — is a insurmountable task for some uninsured Georgians. But with help from local residents and the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation more than 600 Athensarea people have received the glasses they need.

Once a month, local Lions Club members gather with volunteers and the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation to offer eye exams and glasses to needy Athens-area residents who don't have health insurance at the Mercy Health Center on Oglethorpe Avenue.

"I feel like everyone should have equal access to medical care," said Caren Kaplan, the clinic coordinator for the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation. Kaplan travels across the state, helping provide exams and glasses to people who aren't able to afford that medical care, she said.

"We do everything that you'd do in a doctor's office," Kaplan said. The only difference is that their equipment is portable and travels with them from site to site, Kaplan said.

"We bring the equipment," she said.

Members from the Oconee Lions Club and the Classic City Lions Club help patients fill out paperwork before they're seen by a doctor. Optometrists like Dr. Joel Jenkins of Jenkins Vision Care and Dr. Meg Brya of Five Points Eye Care Center also volunteer time at the monthly clinic.

Patients are referred to the clinic through the Lighthouse Foundation and the Mercy Health Center.



### THE PANCAKE EFFECT

When it comes to meeting challenges, the Lion response is simple: "WE SERVE." Serving is at the core of Lionism and is in the heart of every Lion I've met. Lions carry out this mission in many ways and these selfless acts of caring never cease to amaze me. In a world that seems to have moved away from caring about other people, Lions are a bright light for people whose world may have gone dark.

When I was diagnosed in 1981 with Retinitis Pigmentosa, my world started to go dark both literally and metaphorically. Depressed, I wondered how I would survive and take care of my wife and family. When I started this journey of darkness, I had no idea that back in 1939 three Lions recognized a need and founded Leader Dogs for the Blind.

It isn't just me. In my role as a member of the Leader Dog Board of Trustees and as Chair of the Lions Advisory Committee, I am constantly hearing about the work that Lions do and the impact it has on our clients. LDB is the house that Lions built and your continued support represents a 72 year Lion's legacy of miracles. You have brightened my world along with over 14,000 others and we will forever be grateful for your kindness.

Your acts of kindness take many forms. Fund-raising events, like those that ultimately support Leader Dog, come in all shapes and sizes. # Brief, Intense Exercise Lowers Blood Sugar, Small Study Finds

May help type 2 diabetics use glucose more efficiently many hours after activity, researchers say

THURSDAY, Dec. 15 (HealthDay News) -- Lack of time is a common reason cited for not exercising, but new research suggests that several short intensive workouts a week may help lower blood sugar levels similarly to longer, more regular exercise regimens.



The small, new study found that 30 minutes of high-intensity exercise a week -- a total exercise time of 75 minutes a week with warm-up and cool-down included -- could lower blood sugar levels for 24 hours after exercise, and help prevent postmeal blood sugar spikes in people with type 2 diabetes.

"If people are pressed for time -- and a lot of people say they don't have enough time to exercise -- our study shows that they can get away with a lower volume of exercise that includes short, intense bursts of activity," said the study's senior author, Martin Gibala, professor and chair of the department of kinesiology at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, in Canada.

Results of the study are published in the December issue of the *Journal of Applied Physiology*.

Experts already know that exercise can lower blood sugar levels, according to the U.S. National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases. Muscles use glucose as fuel, so any type of activity can bring blood sugar levels down. Exercise also helps the body use insulin more efficiently, which in turn, helps the body use more glucose.

Current recommendations from the American Diabetes Association suggest that people with diabetes should try to get at least 150 minutes of moderate to vigorous exercise each week. That's about 30 minutes a day, most days of the week.

But, not everyone has time to do that much exercise, Gibala noted. So he and his colleagues wanted to see if high-intensity exercise, done for a shorter time, could also have an impact on blood sugar levels.

The study included eight people with type 2 diabetes. Their average age was 63, and their body mass index (BMI) was 32, a level considered obese. BMI is a measurement of body fat that takes into account height and weight.

Over two weeks, the study participants completed six sessions of high-intensity training. For one minute, the study participants would exercise intensely, followed by a minute of rest. This was then repeated until they'd completed 10 minutes of intense exercise. The exercise sessions also included a warm-up and cool-down period for a total of 25 minutes of exercise.

The intense exercise was done at a level to get the heart rate to about 90 percent of their maximal heart rate. Gibala said this means you're exercising *really* hard for that minute. "You're not at an all-out pace, like you're trying to save your child, but you'll definitely be out of breath and have trouble talking after a minute," he said.

The best thing about this type of exercise is that "these intervals can be scaled to your level of fitness so that it's safe and effective for you," he noted.

In addition to testing blood sugar levels throughout the study, the researchers also biopsied thigh muscles from each participant at the start of the study, and after the last bout of exercise.

The investigators found that blood sugar levels dropped from 137 milligrams per deciliter (mg/dL) to 119 mg/dL. In addition, blood sugar levels after meals were also reduced long after training sessions were complete.

The biopsies from the thigh muscles showed increased skeletal mitochondrial capacity, an indicator of improved metabolic health.

Gibala said there are more glucose-transport proteins in the blood after exercise, and these transporters move glucose into the muscles. That's why there's less glucose in the blood. Dr. Joel Zonszein, director of the Clinical Diabetes Center at Montefiore Medical Center in New York City, agreed that short bouts of exercise can help the body better use glucose, but that more exercise is better.

"If you can only do five to 10 minutes of exercise, that's better than nothing, but you really start to see the effects of exercise if you can regularly exercise 20 to 30 minutes at least a few times a week," he said. "Constant training leads to a steady demand for glucose."

# Today's Children Need Lions More Than Ever

Millions of children suffer from poverty, homelessness, hunger, abuse, neglect, disease and disabilities. Tragically, these children often must live without essential health and education services that would alleviate their distress – and give them hope for the future. That's why the **Lions Services for Children Program** continues Lions Clubs International's long tradition of helping the world's future generations.

### Lions Services for Children Projects

The problems children face vary in degree from country to country, but the need for health and education services is constant and universal. Lions clubs help address these needs by developing projects with specific, attainable goals, including:

- Collecting food, clothes or books
- Organizing a vision or hearing screening
- Providing immunizations through a vaccination drive
- Starting a literacy program with a local school, library, community center or Leo club
- Supporting a nutritional program for undernourished children
- · Securing wheelchairs for disabled children

 Sending a child with diabetes or physical challenges to a specialized camp

Lions have also constructed hospitals, schools, orphanages and children's centers throughout the world to serve youth in need.

### **Lions Quest Expansion Pilot**

Lions Quest continues to expand beyond typical school programs. LCIF is beginning to pilot our new Lions Ouest Skills for Adolescence Out-of-School-Time (OST) program in six community schools in the Chicago Public School system, in partnership with the YMCA of Greater Chicago, Illinois, USA. This marks the first step in bringing Lions Quest to community centers, afterschool programs and other organizations -- the very places where Lions help youth every day. Lions Quest is eager to partner with Lions clubs everywhere to expand this new initiative. Lions continue to play a key role in expanding the program worldwide. A training was recently held for Lions leaders from South Asia. In January, meetings will be held in Europe and Africa. The meeting in Africa marks the formal launch of our US\$150,000 project with the U.S. State Department to expand the program in five countries.

### Skills for Adolescence for Out-of-School Time - New!

Skills for Adolescence for Out-of-School Time (SFA for OST) was created to meet the unique demands of afterschool programs and community centers working with middle school youth. SFA for OST is comprised of 33 social and emotional learning lessons, five service-learning lessons, 116 reinforcement activities, and numerous relationship-centered learning community strategies and activities. These selections, from the Skills for Adolescence (SFA) curriculum, combined with newly-created implementation tools, provide OST staff with a positive youth development program that aligns with the six common elements of high-quality OST programming, recognized by researchers and practitioners as having the most influence on positive outcomes for young people. The SFA for OST program manual comes with the Changes and Challenges student book. An SFA for OST program supplement is available for those who already have the full SFA curriculum, and includes just the program guide and implementation tools. On-site, experiential training and a supportive webinar series complete the SFA for OST program options.
