As of December 30, 2014 District 18-I has reported 308 activities, with a total of 6,030 Lions hours and 23,169 people served. Twenty one clubs have participated by engaging our youth, nine clubs have helped by protecting our environment, seventeen clubs have assisted with relieving the hunger campaign and twenty one clubs have helped with vision services. Let's make these numbers grow bigger in the months to come.

As we come to the half way point of our Lions year, let me recognize a few clubs that have a Net gain in their membership. The Lawrenceville Lions Club leads the way with 7 members, Towns County Lions Club with 6 members, Atlanta Chinese American Lions club and Covington Lions Club both tied with 5 members, North Decatur Lions Club and Gainesville both with 4 members, Conyers, Hartwell, Martin and Winder Noon all with a net gain of 2 members. 



Leader Dogs for the Blind December Canine Development Center Update

Though there has been little visible progress on the construction of the building, we've made great strides in the planning and approval of the construction process and drawings. By the second week in December the storm and interior sanitary drains will be installed.

Exterior walls will begin going up as soon as the steel is delivered. The holdup is partially due to the fact that all door frames and exposed steel must be galvanized to keep from rusting where they meet concrete. This was an issue we had in the portion of the building that was demolished. Soon after the steel arrives, masonry work will begin and the construction process will move quickly.

Fundraising activity is currently concentrated on the Major Gift, and the Corporate and Foundation Giving phases. The Major Gift goal has been exceeded and we are at 86% of goal for the Corporate and Foundation phase. The Lions component of the campaign is currently focused on top giving clubs throughout the U.S. Lions Regional Coordinators are at work within their geographic areas arranging club visits and presentations.

Audrey and Sophie a Perfect Team

Audrey has a degenerative eye disease called Retinitis Pigmentosa that has destroyed her vision. In 2011, she received her Leader Dog, Sophie . . .

Q: What are the greatest challenges of losing your vision?

A: Ive run into doors, tables, windows, trees and other things in my path. I have walked off curbs and fallen down stairs, and sustained a variety of injuries, including cuts and bruises to my legs and face, broken ankles and a dislocated shoulder . . . As my vision receded, so did my confidence, my outgoing spirit, my freedom and my independence.

Q: How did your Leader Dog, Sophie, change your life?

A: Sophie is amazing. I adore her, she adores me. She leads me, I follow her. I feed and brush her and she repays me with warm snuggles and wet kisses . . . She's given me back a sense of confidence, freedom and safety which I had gradually lost. Now I can walk with my head up and enjoy the surrounding environment. The world does not seem as dangerous.

Leos: The Future of Lions

Here's a glimpse into the future of Lions from Sussex Lions Club (District 27-A-2) President and Leo Advisor Greg Meers and high school senior Alyssa Molinski, president of Sussex Leo Club (the Leo club that provides the most support to Leader Dog). The club raised an additional \$251 for Leader Dog this year by giving a paw print sticker to any MD 27-A-2 convention attendee that made a contribution.

What are some of your club goals?

Leo Alyssa: Our main goal as an entire club was to increase our membership numbers. We accomplished this goal in only a few years! We are now over 100 members strong and still growing. We met this goal by encouraging members to spread the word to their friends by inviting them to our meetings. I think it's safe to say that after attending a meeting or two, most people start filling out an application.

Lion Greg: My primary goal is stewardship of our clubs. A healthy, active club can do more for their community today and in the future. The more helping hands available, the more work we can do. Our Lions club recently celebrated our 75th anniversary and it is important that it is still serving 75 years from now too! Most prospective members state "to give back to their community" as their main reason for joining and Lions are very prominent in our community.

How do you choose the services you support?

Leo Alyssa: Every year a donation to LDB is included in our budget. I feel even closer to Leader Dog since last year's district convention when our fundraiser was centered around the cause, helping us raise additional money. I also like how it fits the theme of supporting people with low vision that the Lions Club is so focused on supporting.

Where do you envision the Sussex Leo Club and yourself to be in ten years?

Leo Alyssa: In ten years, I envision the Sussex Leo Club to have almost twice as many members as we do today, with lots of the members joining the club at a younger age to increase our amount of experienced, committed members. I also envision us having even more events. After I graduate, I hope to become part of a Lioness Club and maybe even become a Leo Advisor!

What singular moment (big or small) has impressed you the most since becoming a Lion/Leo?

Leo Alyssa: The most memorable moment I've experienced with the club was one Saturday morning when I signed up to move tables at the Sussex/Lisbon Historical Society. It was a simple job that didn't require much help so my dad and I volunteered to do it ourselves. After a quick hour of helping move tables, Fred Keller (the owner) repeatedly thanked us, mentioning how much the Sussex Leo Club does for the community. About a week later, he sent me a thank you card noting the same thing. It made me feel very proud of us as a club.

All releases are formatted in a Word document. Be sure to delete the bold and (parenthesis) and then copy the final text onto your club's letterhead and e-mail to the newspaper. Be sure to include a local club contact name, phone number, e-mail address, website and social media links so the newspaper and readers can contact you to follow-up for more information. It's that easy!

- Fundraiser Make your LCIF fundraiser a success by telling your community in advance.
- Club Project A general release that can be used to announce or promote any upcoming LCIF club program or event.
- LCIF Grant Inform the community about the LCIF grant your project has received and the benefit the completed project will provide to the area.
- LCIF Disaster Grants Notify the community how your club is providing relief following disasters with the help of LCIF funding.
- Melvin Jones Fellow Recognize individuals who have reached the prestigious Melvin Jones Fellow status.
- Lions Individual Award Recognize an individual who has received an award from a LCIF.
- Lions Quest Inform the community that your Lions club supports Lions Quest in your local schools.

I hope everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving and exciting Christmas with your family and friends.

I want to share with you our Centennial Service Challenge November results for our four Campaigns:

Our <u>Year-to-Date</u> results show that **24** clubs reported **562 Service Activities**, logging **19,540 Lion hours** and **55,066 people served**. These numbers represent <u>24 clubs out of our 58 clubs</u>, which means <u>38</u> clubs did not complete their Service Activity Report or are doing so, but are not checking the box for these campaigns. Also, District I collected 11,505 eyeglasses. And, we continue to collect hearing aids.

Please remember that our **Lions goal for 2017**, when all Lions celebrate our 100th Anniversary, is to **serve 1,000,000 people**. Your numbers in your Service Activity Report each month are counted towards this goal.

Lion officers, please work together to make sure that you are logging your service activities and especially "check the box" for our 4 Centennial Campaigns. **Engaging our Youth** could mean Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts, class reading, camp, and more. **Protecting our Environment** could mean park and waterway clean-up and planting trees. **Relieving the Hunger** could mean collecting canned goods, feeding and cooking at homeless shelters, and feed the children projects. And, **Sharing the Vision** could mean eye exam applications, eyeglasses for the needy, eyeglass collection for mission trips and more. Even one hour could serve 25 people!

I mailed a letter to 30 U.S. Postmasters throughout our District about our Centennial Service Challenge, talked about our 4 campaigns and the importance of 2017 to request that they consider making our **Centennial Stamp** a reality. This is a U.S. wide campaign by our LCI Centennial Service Committee.

We are at a 3 ½ year Lions commitment, it's actually no different from what we've been doing every year, except that with the **ASK ONE** campaign, the more Lions we have, the more we can do within our communities. And our officers will need to be diligent in reporting their SAR and "check the box" each month! So, officers, be prepared to pass the baton to your incoming officers next March (PU-101) to continue this important function.

Please share my message and extend many THANKS to your club members for all that they do to help the needy in your community. We have a great District; let's continue to persevere!

Mentoring Program

Overview

The objective of the Lions Mentoring Program is to help every member achieve the goal of better serving his or her community. It does so through a program of personal development that helps members realize the potential that their unique skills and knowledge offer. The Lions Mentoring Program prepares them for leadership in clubs, in the association and in their personal lives as well. For Lions Clubs International, this means more hands and better service for the people who need it most.

The Lions Mentoring Program is completed in two parts, basic and advanced. Each part is completed in two levels.

Basic Mentoring Program

- Level One, The Responsibility of Being a Lion: The first level of the Basic Mentoring Program is devoted to developing an understanding of who Lions are, their vision of humanitarian service, the traditions, the organizational structure and the responsibility of being a Lions club member. It should be a goal of every club that all new Lions complete the level one in their first three months of membership.
- **Level Two, Relationships:** The second level of the Basic Mentoring Program is for developing relationships and organizational skills in preparation for leadership at the club level. Level two should be completed in the new Lion's first six months of membership.

Advanced Mentoring Program

- Level One, Results: The emphasis of this level is upon developing accountability for results by focusing on community projects and programs that provide useful and needed humanitarian service. Completion of this level provides a stepping-stone for accepting a leadership role within the club.
- Level Two, Replication: This level concentrates on the mentee's role in developing others for leadership in the association and for humanitarian service. It ensures long-range growth and can serve as a basis for leadership within the district structure. This phase can be augmented with additional training at district level and at area forums.





Slowing the Progression of Huntington's



In October 2007, Bob learned why he had been struggling with reasoning, concentration, fatigue and uncontrollable muscle movements. He was diagnosed with Huntington's disease, a progressive disorder of the brain that inhibits patients physically, emotionally and socially.

Because of his disease, Bob learned he could no longer drive, work or participate in the activities he did growing up in Colorado and Idaho. He was relegated to

the sidelines watching his three sons do the things he loved to share with them, like downhill skiing and water sports.

A neurologist mentioned to Bob's wife, Nila, that an assistance dog could help ease the physical and emotional pain of Bob's illness. And in 2010, Canine Companions for Independence made it possible for Bob to graduate with assistance dog Exeter, free of charge.

Exeter is always there for Bob as his disease progresses; picking up the many things that Bob drops, turning out the lights or helping Bob get a soda from the fridge.

Donations from people like you helped make it possible for Canine Companions to give Exeter to Bob free of charge.

Bob's disability often goes unseen or is misinterpreted. "Huntington's disease robs a person of their motor control and behavioral capabilities," says Nila. "Often, people would see Bob stumbling and assume he was intoxicated. They didn't understand that he was only under the influence of Huntington's."

After being matched with Exeter, that story has changed dramatically. "People see Exeter in his blue Canine Companions vest and instantly understand that Bob has a disability. Now instead of confronting him, they offer their assistance."

While Huntington's disease can cause a loss of interest in many activities, Exeter has captured Bob's heart. They spend hours together snuggling while Bob holds Exeter's paws. The physical and emotional benefits Exeter has provided Bob has even slowed the progression of Huntington's disease.

"Stress hastens the progression of Huntington's disease, but knowing that Exeter will get the phone if Bob falls and letting the public know that he has a disability has reduced stress for Bob," states Nila. "Both the doctors and I can agree that Bob is doing as well as he is because of the presence of Exeter in his life."

Ryan Reed – One Season Down!



Last month Ryan attended the NASCAR Nationwide Banquet and had the privilege of bringing Miss Idaho Sierra Sandison as his date! Sierra also lives with type 1 diabetes and sparked the #showmeyourpump social media movement this summer.

The 2014 season was the best yet for Ryan Reed: It marked his first full year representing Roush Fenway Racing in the NASCAR Nationwide Series, the second-highest level in professional racing.

From Daytona to Miami, Ryan showed the world that you can compete in this grueling sport while living well with diabetes. That's right, Ryan was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes at age 17—but as you can tell, it didn't get in the way of his dreams.

Nor was he content to dismiss or minimize his disease. Instead, Ryan is determined to raise awareness of diabetes, largely through his role as spokesperson for <u>Drive to Stop Diabetes</u> a joint campaign between Lilly Diabetes and the American Diabetes Association.

So how does it feel to complete a full season behind the wheel of the No. 16 American Diabetes Association Drive to Stop Diabetes presented by Lilly Diabetes Ford Mustang? What were some of the highlights? We let Ryan catch his breath after his final race in mid-November, then went to find out.

What does the Drive to Stop Diabetes movement mean to you?

I never get tired of saying it: This movement means so much to me. Nearly four years ago, local doctors told me my racing life was over because of diabetes. I love proving them wrong! Having the ability to do what I love while spreading diabetes awareness is amazing.

What was your favorite moment of the 2014 season?

On the track, definitely the 4th-place finish in Daytona, my best-ever. Off the track, I loved visiting the Diabetes Camps this summer and meeting all the kids there.

How about the most challenging moment?

On track, my first trip to Watkins Glen International was super-challenging. It's a really tough road course! Off the track, I was learning to keep up with diet and exercise while running in a 33-race circuit. I was in a different state each

weekend, and being constantly on-the-go makes managing diabetes fairly difficult.

Speaking of diabetes management, do you have any new tools that helped you maintain control on the track?

This year I started using the Dexcom G4 continuous glucose

This year I started using the Dexcom G4 continuous glucose monitor (CGM). It really helps me watch my blood glucose levels during a race.

What did you learn during the 2014 season that you hope to implement in 2015?

I fine-tuned the way I work with the guys on the Roush Fenway team, so we can perform our very best during each race. We do this through constant communication about how I'm feeling, how the car feels, stuff like that. We're a great team!



FAST FACTS of 2014

Number of NASCAR Nationwide Series races completed: The full schedule included **33** races over a period of 10 months.

Standings: Ryan finished **9th** in the overall NASCAR Nationwide Series standings for 2014. Go, Ryan!

Calories burned: Not sure that racing is a real sport? During a typical three-hour NASCAR race, a driver can burn **between 2,000 and 3,000 calories!** All the more reason to keep blood glucose levels in check.

Help when he needs it: A member of Ryan's pit crew is trained to administer insulin, in case his blood glucose gets too high during the race. (Likewise, they can give him glucagon if he has a low; luckily, this has never happened.) Ryan's track suit even has a bull's eye on the left thigh to indicate the right injection spot.

Number of 21st **birthdays celebrated:** One – Ryan celebrated this personal milestone on Aug. 12, 2014. Happy belated!

Staying on Track During the Holidays!

The arrival of the holidays brings special challenges for people with diabetes because so many celebrations are centered around food. When enjoying time with friends and family, the last thing you or your child want to do is worry about blood glucose



spikes. Planning ahead is the best step you can take to make this season joyous instead of stressful. Here are a few simple tips to get you started.

- Work with your child to map out a plan to stay on track during the holidays. If Grandma's chocolate-covered cherries are your child's favorite, include one or two in the meal plan and make a deal to pass on other sweet treats.
- For pot lucks or parties where everyone brings something, volunteer to bring a healthy appetizer or side dish so you and your child will know what's in it and how much insulin will be needed.
- Instead of sweet treats in advent calendars and holiday stockings, include small toys or a slip of paper with an act of kindness to do each day.
- Plan to include exercise in your holiday celebrations.
 Enjoy a game of soccer or jump rope after a meal or go out for a family walk. Tell guests ahead of time so everyone can bring their walking shoes.
- Take some of the focus off of the food and create new family traditions involving games, crafts, sharing, and fun outings.
- Keep calm and test blood glucose often.


