Dear Lion,

Thanks to your generous support, 10 million more children now have the chance at a healthy life. Mothers and fathers in Nepal no longer have to fear that their child will suffer from measles. These children are among those in nearly 30 other countries who will receive measles vaccinations this year through Lions' efforts.



In Nepal, I met Punya Lahke, who shared with me the burden she faced when her 23-month-old son, Bipul, had measles. Red spots covered his tiny body and she did not know what was wrong. He was

fortunate to receive timely medical care and treatment.

Yet, too many other children are not as fortunate as Bipul. In fact, 450 children die each day from this disease. Even one death is too many. Lions, we have the power to ensure no other families suffer this fate. That is why we have launched One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative.

By joining with other leading non-governmental organizational partners, we are giving life to 157 million children this year. The Gates Foundation has issued a challenge to us, Lions. I am confident we can meet and exceed this challenge. The Gates Foundation will match every US\$2 we raise with US\$1, to help us meet our goal of providing US\$15 million this year.

I invite you to hear directly from William H. Gates, Sr. on

importance of our partnership program. You will also see some the impact we are having on the babies and families we have already



helped. I know after viewing this heartwarming video, it will inspire you to want to help even more children. It certainly had that effect on Judy and me.

To those of you who have already accepted this challenge and made a contribution, thank you. We have received several generous donations from individuals, clubs and districts, helping us to surpass US\$1 million raised.

Lions, please give what you can. Families around the world are counting on us. Every donation will have a great impact. Donating is easy and can be done directly on our Web site. Like many Americans this past weekend, Judy and I were saddened to see the news stories unfolding within the central region of the United States. Having visited Joplin, Mississippi just a few short months ago, we understand the level of destruction associated with such a powerful storm system. Our thoughts and prayers are with you and your neighbors during this difficult period.

As chairperson of Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), I wish to ensure you of our support. In anticipation of potentially dangerous storms taking place over the weekend, LCIF staff provided emergency grant information to the council chairperson of each multiple-district within the affected states. I have already approved three emergency grants and several others will be authorized in the coming days.

Our foundation is here to support you during this time of need. Your fellow Lions' members, both near and far, stand firmly with you. The opening sentence of our foundation motto states, "To support the efforts of Lions Clubs worldwide in serving their local community...." As Chairperson, I will ensure we live this motto. As the Lions of Joplin told Judy and me, there was no greater time than following a disaster.

LCIF staff members are here to guide you through the grant process if needed. You may contact KaSondra Byrd or Michelle Morales in the LCIF Humanitarian Programs Department at 630.468.3819. They have been providing me updates and information on a frequent basis and I have asked for this level of communication to continue in the coming days.

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Dear LCIF Coordinators,

This week marks the **1 year anniversary** of the destructive **Japan earthquake and tsunami**. On the 11th of March 2011, the most powerful known earthquake to ever hit Japan caused more than 15,000 deaths, 26,000 injuries and extensive structural damage in north-eastern Japan. Japan's Emperor Akihito said in a memorial ceremony at Tokyo's National Theatre, "We shall not let our memory of the disasters fade...I hope all the people will keep the victims in their hearts."

Thanks to your work and the generosity of thousands, more than **US\$21 million** was raised by Lions. Nearly half of the funds raised were used to support immediate needs such as food, clean drinking water, temporary shelter, and clothing. Currently, the Japanese Lions have transitioned into mid- and long-term rebuilding efforts. Recently, the Lions initiated a project to reduce radiation levels in buildings and homes through the use of 2,000 high pressure cleaners. This project will impact an estimated **20,000 people** and is just one of the many ways Lions are helping community members rebuild their lives.

This story dominated the headlines for months, while another quiet disaster was taking place every day –children dying from measles. Not only do **450 children die every day from** measles, but many more who contract measles have serious side effects, such as pneumonia, that cause lifelong adverse health conditions. The real tragedy is that this is so easy to prevent. It costs just **US\$1 to save a child** from measles.

LCIF Chairperson Sid Scruggs visited **Nepal** in February where he kicked off a vaccination campaign to vaccinate **9.9 million children** this year in Nepal against measles. To help vaccinate 157 million children worldwide, Lions have committed to raising more than US\$10 million as a match to the Gates Foundation's challenge grant of US\$5 million. More than **US\$1.2 million has been raised for measles** vaccinations to date.

Thank you again for your support of the people in Japan during a major disaster and thank you in advance for your support of the children of the world receiving life saving measles vaccinations.

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Fellow Lions:

Club Secretaries ---- April, as you know, is Club Elections. (This means it is time for each Lions Club to elect its officers—President, Vice Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer), Directors, and Membership Committee—for the 2012-2013 Lions year!).

It is VERY important that you submit your PU-101 Form AS SOON AS POSSIBLE - the present Secretary should go online and complete the PU-101 Report of Officers for LCI. Please do it now. Make sure the original goes to Lions Clubs International by snail mail or you can go on-line. Make sure you make a copy and send to District Governor Elect Bill Holley. He has the important task of using these copies (PU-101) to make up a portion of the State and District Directory.

Oh, before entering the information on the PU-101, please make sure that the individual Lions information is correct. DGE Bill needs CORRECT names, addresses, phone numbers, and email addresses.

As President elect – you should be ready to appoint members to specific committees. You will find in your current State Directory in the back a copy of 2010-11 Lighthouse / Camp / Learning Ally appointment form (just change the year date) – or you can try to enlarge the one below I will try and put a link on the web site. You should make a copy of and fill out and send to each address indicated with a courtesy copy to the new District Governor.

These three things are very important Mail will be forwarded to those you select as Associate Directors. These members will be responsible in regards to informing your club members of any and all affairs going on with the Lighthouse / Camp / and RFB&D. As President elect, I would advise that you begin NOW to formulate any and all plans for your upcoming year. You should be prepared to assign all members to specific committees.

Make note: Try not to overload you Club

Secretary......Also – encourage the Secretary to go on-line to make out MMR reports, A-1 and PU-101 reports. Going on-line can save time and money. For ALL members check out www.lionsclubs.org

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LEADERSHIP

This time of year, clubs are preparing their slate of officers for 2012-2013. Give each Lion in your club the job descriptions of the elected positions to include the responsibility of becoming a trained leader. All clubs should adopt a simple rule that if the Lion will not fulfill the responsibility of the position, than that Lion should not be elected an officer. The members of a club also have a responsibility, of insisting that their club be lead by trained Lion leaders.

Leadership is defined as guidance and management with the ability to influence others to see a vision of what should and could be accomplished. A leaders has a responsibility to those he or she leads—the responsibility to do the best he or she can for those people.

Each elected officer of a Lions Club is a leader. The problem is that many elected officers are not trained to be leaders and cannot communicate, cannot guide, and therefore, cannot influence others to see what should be accomplished. The training or education of leaders must start with the basics. Each and every officer of a Lions Club must know the basics of Lionism and of the position to which he or she was elected.

This training starts with the officer participating in the leadership training offered by the district. It does not matter if you are elected as the president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, director, or membership committee member. There will be training for each and it is the responsibility of the Lion and the responsibility of the club to see that that Lion attends training as a prerequisite to being installed in that position.

The educational process does not stop there. Each officer has the responsibility to attend all cabinet meetings and all zone meetings. These should be the most important item on the calendar other than family. From the cabinet and zone meetings, the officers receive information on events in the district, the multiple district, and Lions Clubs International, including happenings within the state.

My Club, My Family,



You know that keeping your Lions family strong depends a great deal on inviting new members to join. But it may be even more important for clubs to hold onto those members after they become Lions.

Retaining members, new and old, takes effort but it is not complicated or difficult. Mostly, it requires paying attention to three common-sense ideas:

- Welcome
- Involve
- Nurture

(It's no coincidence that, in English, these initials spell-out "WIN." They can make your club a winner!)

"Welcome" means making new members feel welcome and a part of the group. This begins with something as simple as saying "hello" and learning new members' names quickly. It also means listening respectfully to their ideas and needs. Ask yourself the questions and follow the tips in the My Club, My Family Pocket Guide. "I Believe" these simple steps can endure long-term success.

"Involve" means giving new members meaningful responsibilities from the very beginning. People become Lions because they want to take action. Members who feel that they are making a significant contribution are likely to stay. I encourage you to ask all members what they want to be involved with. Find out how your club's projects can match their skills and meet their needs.

"Nurture" includes leading by example but also means giving new members an effective orientation and involving them in the Lions Clubs International Mentoring Program. Support and encouragement from the Lions family is key during the development of new Lions members. Long term care and support keeps members involved and service ongoing. View the My Family brochure for program ideas for your Lions family.

You can also make sure that your club is making its best effort by embracing the Family Club concept and using the <u>four workshop guides</u> provided by Lions Clubs International as part of the <u>President's Retention Campaign</u>.

I believe that you can use your final three months of leadership to finish with strong membership results. To do so, it is vital that district governors continue their efforts to charter new clubs in underserved areas. For club officers, it is important to continue to reach out to the community and invite new members to join. But it is equally important to pay attention to the concepts of welcome, involve and nurture that will make your Lions family even stronger. I believe you can do it!

Thank you for all you do for your fellow Lions, your community and the world.

Partnerships

Individual Lions are usually engaged in the world, have strong relationships with others and value working together toward a common goal. So too, does our international organization.

Ever since our founder, Melvin Jones, and two of our past international presidents helped write the United Nations charter for non-governmental organizations (NGOs) Lions Clubs International has sought out high quality partners to work toward common worldwide goals.

In October 2011, I took part in a special event in Nairobi, Kenya in which Lions and the Aga Khan Development Network (AKDN) together <u>pledged to plant 1.5 million trees in Kenya</u>. The ceremony launched a new global partnership between Lions Clubs International and the AKDN that will focus on disaster relief, health services and environmental sustainability.

The <u>Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation</u> is a strong partner with Lions Clubs International Foundation in the effort to eradicate measles, which still takes the lives of 450 children each day worldwide. The Gates Foundation has challenged Lions to raise US\$10 million to support this effort and will provide US\$1 for every US\$2 mobilized. This US\$5 million challenge grant will be the largest gift ever received

by LCIF.

As part of the expanded collaboration, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) will invest more than US\$3 million dollars to help WHO develop 26 Child Friendly Eye Care Centers in lesser developed countries as part of the "Lions-WHO Project for the Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness."



On March 16, I will be in New York to help commemorate our longstanding relationship with the United Nations at Lions Day With the United Nations. This year we will focus on how we can work together toward the U.N. Millennium Development Goals, especially as they relate to childhood survival and environmental sustainability. I hope that as many Lions as possible will join me at this annual event.

These and other partnerships are crucial to maintaining Lions worldwide impact. Partnerships can also help your district or club magnify its service to the community and offer great opportunities to invite the family. I hope that you will take every opportunity to seek out quality organizations with which to partner and work toward common goals.

A student does **not** need to be enrolled full-time in order to receive the student discount, nor being night students. The Student Member Certification Form (STU-5) states:

1. Student (Through Age 30)

Students are individuals enrolled in an educational institution and between the age of legal majority and through age 30 joining any type of Lions club. Students are eligible to receive a charter/entrance fee waiver and pay only half international dues (US\$19.50), through age 30, upon completion of the Student Member Certification Form.

Students of new Campus Lions clubs, or clubs with a majority of student members, are required to prepay one year of international dues (US\$19.50) and submit with the charter application.

2. Student Over Age 30 (Joining a Campus Club)

Students over age 30 and joining a Campus Lions club or campus club branch pay a reduced entrance/charter fee of US\$10. Regular international dues apply.

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Recipes for Success

Let's get some ideas out there – seems we do the same old thing – now maybe we can do something different.

SERVICE PROJECTS (Don't forget your Lion vests)

- **1. Meals on Wheels:** Club delivers meals to shut-ins. Schedules are prepared in advance and meals are delivered by teams of two. Not a difficult project but members need to be able to walk and climb stairs. Costs: None
- **2. Delta Ponds Restoration:** Club works four times per year helping to eliminate non-native plants, protect desirable plants from predation by nutria and beavers, plant native plants, pick up trash, and participate in habitat studies.
- **3. Pocket Park Maintenance:** Club helps maintain a small corner of a Park called the "Pocket Park", adjacent to a popular biking, running, walking trail. Jobs include weeding, mowing, planting, edging, periodic painting and in general keeping the park attractive and neat. Costs: None
- **4. Flags:** This is a joint project with the Boy Scouts. Businesses subscribe for flag service at \$50/year. Lions drill hole, purchase holders and flags and Boy Scouts install flags up on holidays and special occasions and Boy Scouts receive \$1 per flag per installation. Costs: Outlay for flags, poles drill and liners
- **5.** Tag Sale (Garage Sale): Conduct a garage sale of donated items. Manpower includes storing, pricing, manning sale, and cleanup. Costs: Site rental?, advertisement, pricing supplies
- **6. Wine Raffle:** Club obtains wine from local wine buyer at a discounted price and sells raffle tickets. Costs: Cost of wine and tickets.
- **7. Adopt-a-Christmas Family:** Club contacts School principal at a low income school in area to provide name of a deserving family. Club gets a reasonable wish list from the family and purchases items with budgeted funds and member donations. Costs: Budget \$300/family
- **8. Donate a meal for Homebound Seniors:** Lions volunteer to pass out cards at selected super markets that customers may take to the checkout register and donate one meal for a day, a week, or a month. The cost added to their grocery bill. Costs: None to Lions.
- **9. Stars and Stripes:** Club places in front of participating businesses on 10 patriotic holidays. The flags are 6 feet tall and are placed in hole drilled in the sidewalk. Charge business \$100 per year. Costs: \$20 per flag (flag, pole and hardware).
- **10. Adopt a School:** Each month club takes something to school such as school supplies, coats, socks, etc. Do flags for first graders. Sponsor a read-a-thon with prizes. Do a "Bunny Backpack Program". Costs: \$200-\$500/year.
- 11. State/County Highway Cleanup: Club picks up trash along highway. Costs: None.
- **12.** Christmas Dinner and Toy Drive: Club sponsors dinner and collects toys for local children ages 0-18. Costs: Undetermined.
- **13. Senior Breakfast:** Club prepares and serves a free breakfast for area seniors on New Year's Day in cooperation with the Senior Center. Costs: Undetermined.

Janice has Training & Development Supervisory positions with Georgia Eye Bank and has been with the Eye Bank for 15 years. Janice shared that last year about 8,000 deceased donors made possible nearly 22,000 transplants. In addition, there were more than 6,000 transplants from living donors. Over 42,000 sight-restoring corneal transplants were performed in U.S. last year. Currently more than 100,000 men, women & children await lifesaving organ transplants. Unfortunately, the need for donors is much greater than number of people who actually donate. White Cane: Lion Jack Gross met with local Commissioner & signed Proclamation for White Cane Days for April 20th and 21st. Also passed out sign -up sheet for White Cane & called for volunteers to go by local businesses & ask permission to solicit for White Cane. First reading of proposed 2012-2013 club officers read by Lion Arthur Gurr. 17 March - Officers Training/|District Convention/Cabinet Meeting was attended by 4 members of the Union County Lions Club. 22 March - Lion Mary Arnold introduced our speaker Denny Smith from Christian Love Ministries. Christian Love Ministries is a Drug and Alcohol Recovery Center that was started 25 years ago. They operate 2 Thrift Stores, one in Blairsville, one in Peachtree, NC that provides 75% of the revenue for the organization. They offer a 77 day residential program to assist with recovery from drug and alcohol addiction. They have a total of 50 beds including a men's residence (Father's House), and women's residence (Mary's House), a halfway house, and a duplex. Over the last 16 years over 1850 clients have been served. Nomination Committee Chair Lion Jim Wentworth made the second reading of the 2012-2013 officers. There being no further nominations from the floor, a motion to elect the slate of officers was approved.



Here is an update on a couple of projects that are going on. The two oak trees behind the directors house have been cut down and removed. Some of the drywall in the bunk house has been hang, the rest will be done on Leo weekend by the Moultrie Leo's and anyone else who would like to help. We will need help in taping and mudding the joints

This will allow us to be ready to spray texture on the ceiling and walls. The tile in the bathrooms and showers is being installed and it will be about 85% complete by Leo weekend. The ceilings and the little bit of drywall exposed will need to be taped and mudded so we can have this area ready to spray also.

I am looking forward to Leo weekend and the two work weekends coming up. I believe that with the volunteers that show up to help we can have the Bunk House Dorm ready for summer camp. If you have not sent in your reservation form for the weekends you can come and help us work, please do so. This helps us organize the designated jobs that need to be done and lets us know how many hotdogs to boil. Just kidding, you know we will feed you something better than a hot dog! We had a very good turnout of people last year and we look to have even more this year. You know that help is very much appreciated.

Some of you have asked about the planting of some citrus and fruit trees around the camp. LIONS WORK WEEKENDS APRIL 27th-29th, 2012

- * These projects are the ones that we feel should have highest priority to be completed
 - *1. Hang drywall in the Bunk House Dorms (walls and ceilings) materials are on hand
 - *2. Hang concrete backer board in bathrooms in the Bunk House Dorms
 - *3. Tape and mud walls and ceiling of the Bunk House Dorms
 - *4. Install a cosmetic beam in the ceiling of the bunk house where the separation wall used to be
 - *5. Build a room behind the Bunk House Dorm for the water heater
 - *6. Paint water heater room
 - *7. Hang and secure all entry doors to the Bunk House Dorms
 - *8. Hang all interior doors in the Bunk House after drywall has been hung
 - *9. Sand and finish walls and ceilings in the Bunk House Dorms (at 2nd work weekend)
 - *10. Paint walls, ceilings, and trim work in the Bunk House Dorms (at 2nd work weekend)
 - *11. Stain or paint all doors in the Bunk House (entry and interior) (at 2nd work weekend)
 - *12. Install all the final electrical items, exit lights, ceiling fans, florescent lights, outlet covers, etc...,
 - *13. Install VCT flooring after all the above has been completed
 - *14. Finish painting the area in the bathroom hallway of the dining hall
 - *15. Paint the kitchen walls (paint needed)
 - *16. Paint the serving area in the dining hall (paint needed)
 - *17. Finish painting the foyer in the activities bldg. and also finish painting the restroom doors and the restrooms
 - *18. Repair fishing pier at the pond (dead tree fell across one corner and busted it up) need supplies
- *19. Pressure wash buildings (we will need about 3 or 4 people with pressure washers and you will need to bring your water hose) (NO BLEACH is to be used as a cleaner) (cleaning solvent for vinyl needed)
 - *20. Need to build four more walls in the bunk house for plumbing and privacy to the sleeping quarters.

On all the following items you will need to bring the tools that you will need to work with, axe, rake, wheel barrow, pitch fork, weed eater with a small brush blade attachment, chain saws, etc...,

- *21. Start clearing out an are 15' on each side of the walking trail (just the wild brush not he large trees, clean around the trees)
 - *22. Clear out around the Low Ropes Course 15 to 20 feet of its perimeter and inside its perimeter
 - *23. Clear out around the Adirondack Buildings 15 to 20 feet
 - 24. Clear out over growth and pick up dead limbs along the eastside of the camp near low ropes course
 - 25. Repair weathered wood at the stables (materials needed)
 - 26. Rebuild and put cosmetic window back on the stable storage room
 - 27. Paint stables Barn Red and trim in White (paint needed)
 - 28. Rebuild Horse Shoe game form boards and replace sand

- 29. Paint the pump house at the pond (paint needed hunter green)(I will get it from Lowe's so it matches what we already have)
 - 30. Repair supports for the hinges on the main wells pump house
 - 31. Paint the pump house by the main well (use the same paint as above)(hunter green)
 - 32. Tear down and remove old wagon, put debris on burn pile (only what will burn)
 - 33. Mulch the flower beds at the front office (mulch needed)
 - 34. Clean area around the tree house
- 35. Put Brail nature signs on post at a 45° angle (we need some new 4x4 post about 6' long)(20 would be a good start)(post and signs are to be about 36" in height)
 - 36. Pour a 20'x22' concrete slab under the shelter next to bar-b-que grill
 - 37. Pour a 8'x20' concrete slab where the bar-b-que grill is located
 - 38. Build a shelter over the bar-b-que grill
 - 39. Build a storage building behind the directors house and at the building and grounds residence

Dear Lions and Friends:

Cycling for Leader Dogs A solo cross-country bicycle tour

Welcome to Cycling for Leader Dogs.

Cycling for Leader Dogs is a 3,500 mile trans-America solo bicycle tour from Portland, Oregon to Portland, Maine. The goal of this effort is to increase awareness and raise money in support of Leader Dogs for the Blind.

Most of us probably had a "back to school" assignment as children where we were asked to write about, "What I did over my summer vacation?" This fall, La Center, Washington school superintendent Mark Mansell will have plenty to talk about if he was asked to complete the same assignment.

He is planning on riding his bicycle from Portland, Oregon across the country all the way to Portland, Maine or approximately 3,500 miles. "I enjoy challenges and I love to learn", Mansell said. "Given the chance to attempt something like this is a very special opportunity that is extremely exciting."



Putting in the miles is just part of the challenge Mansell is putting before himself. He is also a member of the La Center Lions Club and has decided to raise money for Leader Dogs for the Blind. "Given the time commitments of my job, I have not really been able to participate in many Lion's functions beyond our local community. When my school board gave me a two month sabbatical, I jumped at the idea of working to support Leader Dogs", Mansell said.

The goal is to raise at least \$35,000 in order to help someone in need to receive a service dog. To achieve this goal, Mansell (with the support of his home club and interested clubs along the trip route) will work to secure nearly 1,000 sponsors as part of a "penny per mile" for Leader Dogs effort. All donations of \$35 or more will receive a *Cycling for Leader Dogs* vest pin commemorating this solo cross-country bicycle trip.

Planning, planning and more planning.

With the trip less than four months away (departure date is June 16th), there is a lot of planning to get accomplished. Trip route planning, club contacts, written communications, fundraising strategies, equipment preparations and of course lots of training to get done.



Here is an update on some of the progress being made. One of the first tasks to work on was coming up with a trip logo and ordering sponsorship pins. My daughter Jessie (a designer by training) helped produce the sponsorship pin. With the help of pinpros.com, we were able to get the initial order of these pins underway. The pins should arrive in the next few weeks. With a 3,500 mile trip, anyone who provides a one cent per mile sponsorship (or at least \$35 donation) will receive a pin. To meet our goal, we will need to secure 1,086 individual "one penny per mile" sponsors to surpass our \$38,000 target.





The next task in the communications department was to design a card (baseball cards size) to hand out to people to explain the trip and what we are raising money for (<u>Leader Dogs for the Blind</u>). Additionally, these cards can be handed out along the journey to quickly communicate to people what we are working to accomplish.

We have also been working on getting this blog up and running so those interested will be able to follow our progress. The web address for this site was also secured (www.CyclingForLeaderDogs.org) so people can easily find the site and join the cause. My wife Debbie will also be working on creating a Cycling for Leader Dogs Facebook page as well, so stay tuned for this addition. She will also be the keeper of the blogs once I am on the road as well as taking care of all the long distance trip logistics.

A bit about Lion Mark

Lion Mark is a proud member of the La Center Lions Club. Lions Clubs are service organizations with more than 1.3 million members worldwide. He makes his home in La Center, Washington with his wife Debbie (also a Lion).

He is an educator by training and an adventurer in spirit. His hobbies include learning, distance running, camping, metal working and of course bicycling.

Lion Mark's "day job" requires 60 or more hours a week, so that never left too much time for Lions activities beyond the local club level. When the chance to take two months off from work came about, the idea of bicycling across America quickly filled the vacant schedule.

Leader Dogs for the Blind began as a Lions Club endeavor and has served thousands of blind and vision impaired individuals over the past three-quarter century. The chance to seize the opportunity to help make a positive difference for this wonderful organization and fulfill a dream adventure created a perfect combination for Lion Mark.

And as they say... "The rest is history."

Jeffrey Adams, Iraq War Veteran, and Service Dog Sharif

In November 2004, Jeffrey was on patrol in Baghdad when a roadside bomb was detonated just 10 feet from him. As a result, 97% of his left leg had to be amputated.

Since then Jeffrey has recovered from his injury and walks with a prosthetic titanium leg. "I didn't think I needed an assistance dog," said Jeffrey. "Then I saw them in action, helping other people with disabilities. I thought it was pretty amazing. I still didn't think I needed one though. But my wife says I'm stubborn and told me to follow up. So, I asked around and applied to Canine Companions for Independence."

"Having a CCI assistance dog has really changed my life," shared First Lieutenant Jeffrey Adams as he graduated from CCI Team Training with his new service dog Sharif.

"When I first heard about CCI, I thought I don't need a canine companion. Now I know how wonderful it will be and there are new possibilities for me that I didn't expect," shares Jeffrey.
