Face in the Mirror – "My wife and I attended an "investiture and Rededication" event for Brownie Girl Scout Troop #48 in Warner Robins, GA. Our daughter is the Troop leader. Her two daughters are Girl Scouts of early ages: one a "Daisy" the other a fledgling "Brownie." The **Investiture**" moved "Daisy" Scouts to the Brownie level while the other "Brownies" were "**rededicated.**"

For elevating a Daisy to a Brownie there is a procedure. The Scout Leader turns the "Daisy" around several times and the girls say "Turn, turn, twist me and turn me and show me the **Elf.** Then I looked in the *water* (a mirror surrounded by autumn leaves) and I saw myself!" Following this the leader would ask them to Make the Girl Scout Promise: "On my honor I will try; To serve God and my country. To help other people at all times, and to live by the Girl Scout Law." These Girl Scouts wanted to join in "helping" others. Adult leaders and assistants pledged to guide them on step by step.

I recommend that each of us **see our own image in a mirror** and then consider a Biblical passage: "But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. For if there are any bearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like." (James 1:22-24)

Looking into a MIRROR, do we Lions discover there one pledged to invite new people to become Lions and offer to guide **them** in their progression?

THE LION magazine (October 2000, page 4) includes a picture of a young man's reflection. 









Dear Lion.

Saving lives – especially the lives of children – will be a key Lions' message for World Immunization Week, April 24-30, 2014. Simple immunizations have been recognized as one of the most successful and cost-effective health interventions ever introduced. Through One Shot, One Life, Lions have been saving children's lives one dollar, one shot, at a time.



LCIF will mark this year's World Immunization Week with a special Million Dollar Challenge. The family of Abhey and Aruna Oswal will match every Lions' donation to One Shot, One Life received by LCIF during the month

of April up to a cumulative total of US\$500,000 for a grand total of US\$1 million dollars.


This means that any One Shot, One Life donation by a club or Lion will be quadrupled during the month of April only: gifts will be matched by the Oswal family and those doubled gifts will be matched in full by the Gates Foundation and the UK's Department for International Development through the GAVI matching fund. This is a unique opportunity that clubs and Lions in your district can use to expand the impact of their donations. Donations are eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowship credit, however credits are not given for the additional funds matched by the Oswal family and the GAVI Alliance matching fund partners.

Because Lions worldwide continue to prioritize disaster relief as one of their most important local service activities, LCIF is now piloting a wider variety of funding options to help enhance and expand these efforts. The LCIF Disaster Relief Grant program can support Lions' participation in different phases of emergency management

based on the needs of their community and the skills, interests, and availability of their local membership.

LOOK AT YOUR CLUB: Taking the time to examine your club and honestly assessing its current status is the key to successfully making changes. Without pinpointing the areas that need attention, you might be fixing a problem that doesn't exist and ignoring a potential trouble spot. It is helpful to write down your observations as you undertake this process. // Begin by observing members during meetings and service activities: What is the general atmosphere of your club? Friendly? Welcoming? Fun? Boring? Tense? Dedicated? Productive?; Are there well-defined, established 'groups' within your club?; Are new members warmly welcomed into your club?; Are new members made to feel a part of the club?; Is you club focused on service goals?

FIX IT FAST // FOCUS ON MEETINGS:

Think Positively—When considering any changes to your club, keep a positive attitude. Your club might be steeped in tradition and used to doing things a certain way, but that doesn't mean you shouldn't try something new. Today's experiment could be tomorrow's new tradition. Try Trimming Time—Do you feel that your agenda is as lean as it can be, but your meetings still running long? Examine the content of your agenda items and try trimming just a little time from a few items. Those small time adjustments will add up. Communicate your shortening of agenda items to all affected, so they can plan.

To be part of the Family Membership Program, your club secretary must complete the <u>Family Unit Certification Form</u> or <u>file</u> <u>online</u>.

Bring the Kids

The new <u>Cub Program</u> helps support family-friendly clubs. Formulated special to encourage families to volunteer together, children under age 12 have the opportunity to build a lifelong dedication to helping others. Cubs are divided into the following age groups:

- Level I: Age 3 and under
- Level II: Age 4-7
- Level III: age 8-12








The Toccoa Lions Club Sight Conservation Eye Glasses Intake Session - March 13th, 2014

As Chairman of the Fundraising Committee for the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind, I would like to inform you of the Committee's decision to encourage each District to hold a District wide Fundraiser to benefit the Camp. Because it was already in place, Lion Brian Donegan, & I chose to continue the Gwinnett Braves/Lions Baseball Fundraiser. This will be the 4th year for this event and I am happy to report that each year it has grown. In the three previous years, we have sold an average of 206 tickets. The cost of the tickets is \$8ea and for each ticket sold over 200, \$3 stays with the Club that sold the tickets, to be sent to the Camp after the Game. That comes out to about \$619 for each of those three years. Every Club that sold tickets would send the revenue from the game to the Camp as per their share.

That's not bad, but it is not where we feel it should be, or where we can be. We now have a much larger District with 57 Lions Clubs. Our goal is to have every Lions Club in District I be a part of this fundraiser. Our goal is to also sell 500 tickets, and if we can, the Camp will realize an additional \$1,500. It is a great time to be a Lion and a great time to come together in support of the Camp. The kicker is that tickets don't have to be sold just to Lions. Wouldn't it be great for each Lion to sell tickets to not only their members, their families, but to friends and co workers as well? Wouldn't this be an awesome time to share with friends what Lions do and how service minded we are? Also, some Lions seem to balk at spending money for fundraisers such as the drawing for \$5000 or a Gator, but this is different because the purchaser actually gets something for his/her donation. I believe that we may even be able to bring in a few new Lions.

In order to get the Clubs excited, the Fundraising Committee and the Camp Directors have thrown out a caveat to entice the Clubs to go all out to make this a great competition. The 4 Districts will be competing to see who can raise the most within their District. The club in each district that donates the *highest per capita per member* from their Camp for the Blind fundraiser will receive an engraved brick to be presented at Lions Day for the Camp in July. The donation from the fundraiser(s) must be received by April 30, 2014.

You may think that this is not possible, but it is if we work together as Lions. Our proposal takes into consideration the size of our current District. Having said that, we will need the help and cooperation of not only you 3, but the Zone Chairs as well. Because of the communication that the Zone Chairs have with their Clubs, they can easily keep information flowing from what I send to them and they can pass it along to their Clubs and encourage them to participate.

The Gwinnett Braves game in 2014 is scheduled for Saturday, June 21. The G Braves will be playing the Louisville Bats at 7 PM. This should not be an issue because of the State Convention as the Convention is a week before the game.

I value your opinion on this and hope that each of you will support this endeavor to raise money for the Camp & "Keep the Camp Fires Burning"



Winter Concerns for Your Dog

Colder weather is approaching and there are potential hazards you should be aware of to keep your dog safe.

As people winterize their cars and change or add antifreeze to their vehicles, watch for spills of this toxic liquid. Antifreeze is sweet-tasting, and dogs are attracted to it. Even a few laps of antifreeze can destroy a dog's kidneys and become a life threatening condition.

Salt used to melt ice can also be a hazard to your dog. Salt may get stuck between your dog's toes and cause irritation. If salt is stuck to its feet, your dog may ingest it while cleaning itself after coming inside. After walking outside in the cold and freezing temperatures, make sure your dog's paw pads are clean of any snow, ice or salt, and be on the lookout for wounds on the feet caused by stepping on broken ice.

For minor scrapes or abrasions, wipe with warm water, do not let the dog lick the area. Do not wrap the foot. Any bleeding wounds or limping dogs should be examined by a veterinarian.

Blind IUPUI graduate, 47, wins National Academic



Robin Kyle was 18 when she lost her sight to retinitis pigmentosis, a degenerative hereditary eye disease.

"At that time, I felt my life had come to a complete halt," Kyle said.

Now 47, Kyle is one of 15 students across the country to receive a Learning Ally National Achievement Award. Kyle earned the award through academic work and her tireless advocacy for students like herself — those without the means to learn and read conventionally.

"I decided to use my college classroom as a platform to educate and speak on diversity and inclusion of students who are blind or visually impaired," Kyle said in her application essay.

The journey wasn't easy. Through 29 years of blindness, Kyle raised three children as a single mother and worked multiple jobs. After filling a childcare position at her church, she found her passion for teaching.

Last year Kyle graduated with a B.S. in education and music minor from IUPUI.

Kyle plans to become a kindergarten teacher. She said she believes no learner should be left behind because of forces outside of his or her control. To that end, she said, she believes every published work should be accessible in audio, Braille, digital and large print formats.

"For someone like Robin, who's 47 and has raised kids, to show the determination she's showing is incredible," said Doug Sprei, Learning Ally's national director of communications. "We couldn't ask for a better person to represent our mission."

Kyle's ambitions are matched by her effort to achieve them. She was the oldest student in her class at IUPUI, and the only blind person in any of her classes. She has advocated for blind rights in Washington, D.C., and supplemented her education with professional workshops.

"My blindness...is just one more aspect of the many things that make up who I am," Kyle said. "As a blind individual, I believe that it is my moral responsibility to advocate for the cause, and I would be proud to give my voice for this purpose."


