I recently had the pleasure of meeting Lions Olive and Manuel Holland of the Hilton Head Lions Club in South Carolina. In addition to being Lions for almost 40 years, this couple keeps the history of the <u>Peace Poster Contest</u> alive by collecting every winning poster.



Their collection started at our international convention in Birmingham, England, where we celebrated the 10th anniversary of the Peace Poster Contest. They purchased the first 10 posters, eight of which were signed by the original artists. Since then, even if they were not able to attend the convention, friends ensured the Hollands received a signed copy of that year's winning poster. "I think we need to give youngsters every opportunity we can to express their deep thoughts and it can't be any deeper than thoughts about peace," Olive told me.

When the posters aren't on display at the Hollands' office, they lend them to art galleries, libraries, schools and local conventions. "Peace is fundamental to Lions. This is one way of expressing it," Manuel said.



are working with the Gates Foundation and other Measles Initiative partners to provide needed vaccinations to 41 million children. The moment when a mother said to me, "Thank you for saving my child," was one of those touching moments in life. It is when you say to yourself, "This is why I am a Lion." Please come and witness the results of this partnership during the Second Plenary Session at the Lions Clubs International Convention, including a presentation by Mr. Bill Gates Sr.

Providing youth with a bright, healthy future is a priority of Lions and our Foundation. We place great emphasis on building strong, successful partnerships for all of our programs. But we recognize we



can't do it alone. Working with select partners that share our ideals we can improve lives and give hope for a brighter future to even more people around the world.

Our Lions Quest program is also benefiting from partnership support. NoVo Foundation has awarded US\$100,000 to help expand Lions Quest across one entire United States school district by 2013. Expansion of our successful worldwide program will ensure even more students learn valuable life skills. For the last year we have been partnering with Bausch + Lomb on the Pediatric Cataract Initative to combat childhood blindness. But I'm happy to say that for the first time this partnership has led to additional support for other programs. Bausch +



Lomb has given US\$100,000 to support relief efforts in Japan, and they're encouraging their employees to do the same by matching donations. Isn't this wonderful?

These are only a few examples of valuable partnerships and collaborative programs. We will continue to seek out valuable partners. But we also, and especially, need your support. It is Lions' generosity, active participation and personal involvement in projects that enables us to attract these valuable partners. I strongly count on you to continue to support our Foundation, - and you can count on me and my service team to support you wherever you need us.

Lions have a special dedication to providing relief and rebuilding lives in their communities for as long as it takes. In Japan, Lions are shifting their focus to mid-term relief efforts, including helping find jobs and providing 100 tents to shelter relief workers. In New Zealand, Lions are providing needed services and weekend escapes from the city to give families a needed break. And in Haiti, we are rebuilding homes and the National Nurse's School to help rebuild the health care system. All of these projects would not be possible without the generous support of our international family of Lions but also valuable partnerships with other organizations to further leverage our funds in order to have a greater long-term impact.

The second important item I wanted to communicate is about the Contributing Member pins. The Contributing Member program is for smaller donations that are undesignated. If a Lion is donating money to Japan Relief, Lions Quest, or another program, these are designated donations and they would not receive a Contributing member pin. If a Lion is donating to the Melvin Jones Fellowship program, they would also not receive a Contributing Member pin. The Contributing Member program and the Melvin Jones Fellowship programs are similar in that they are both for undesignated donations (donations that are not to a specific program or event). If a donor is planning to make undesignated donations of up to \$1,000 in the next five years, they should contribute to the Melvin Jones Fellowship program. If they are making smaller, but not less significant donations, they should donate to the Contributing Member program.

Many of you have asked me if you should also send the Melvin Jones Fellowship applications and Contributing Membership forms to this LCIF PO Box. The answer is yes. Everything can be filtered through the lockbox. Please be assured that the bank will process the checks and send the applications that come in with or without checks, directly to LCIF daily. There should be no delay in receiving the Melvin Jones Fellowship applications. If you have any additional questions, please let me know.

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These past months have brought challenges to areas on a scale they have never experienced. Lives have been forever changed following devastating events that only took moments and gave no warning. Computers and television sets have been filled with stories and pictures of struggle and devastation. However, along with these tragic accounts have come stories of compassion and hope. The Lions of New Zealand and Japan are providing some of those stories though their service and from the financial support provided by LCIF – your Foundation. Japanese Lions are already hard at work, having established four relief depots in the affected areas, as well as a central command center at the Lions office in Tokyo. Lions throughout Japan are transporting goods including baby milk, rice, water and diapers. They are working with the Red Cross to meet the most pressing needs, including holding blood drives. Lions in Kobe are helping lead these relief efforts, utilizing their expertise in earthquake relief and recovery from the 1994 disaster. These are just a few examples of the many stories of Lions' exemplary service.

This past year, Lions worldwide have responded to the needs of both disaster stricken areas and tranquil communities at an increasing rate. Overall donations to LCIF are ahead of this same period last year. Individuals, clubs, districts and multiple districts have responded in significant ways and Lions are implementing the LCIF supported programs throughout the world - but there is still much more to do.

The LCIF Executive Committee members **approved giving Melvin Jones Fellowship credit for designated Japan Relief donations** received prior to June 30, 2011. This allowance is rarely exercised by the committee and demonstrates the tremendous needs of those in the affected area. If you are planning to make a donation to LCIF for Japan Relief or to the general fund, please send in your donations today. It can take up to four weeks to ship MJF plaques during a busy convention season, so please keep that in mind if you are planning to make an end of fiscal year gift.

A Melvin Jones Fellowship recognizes donations of US\$1,000 to LCIF. This prestigious recognition of humanitarian work is one of several offered by the Foundation. Other programs also recognize individual Lions, as well as clubs and districts. A few examples include:

Ø Melvin Jones Fellowship: US\$1,000 undesignated donation (Japan Relief until June 30, 2011)
Ø Contributing Member: A US\$20, US\$50 or US\$100 undesignated donation by an individual donor and identified for Contributing Member program (does not qualify for MJF credit too)
Ø 100% Contributing Member Patch: Every member of a club is a Contributing Member
Ø 100% MJF Club Banner: Every member of a club is a Melvin Jones Fellow
Ø District Certificate of Appreciation: Every club donates

to LCIF during the fiscal year

At the January Lions Humanitarian of the Year MJF dinner in District 23C, Past International President Jimmy Ross stated that giving is "...one of the most powerful things in the world. When you give unconditionally, it will come back to you ten-fold." If you or your club is close to a US\$1,000 donation, consider using the remaining funds to qualify for a MJF and recognize a worthy recipient. Lions in more than 50 countries mobilized to help feed hungry people in December 2010 and January 2011. Lions provided food directly to more than 7 million people worldwide through 138,000 volunteer hours devoted to nearly 2,000 projects.

Lion leaders can end your year on a high note by ensuring that your district qualifies for a Light Keeper Award. Encourage Lions to complete one additional Global Service Action Campaign and report their activities by April 30 using the **Service Activities Report**. See the Lions Clubs International website for all information about qualifying for the Light Keeper Awards.

Set Your Sights High

Districts in which 50 percent of clubs participate in two of four Global Service Action Campaigns will receive the Silver Level: Harbor Light Master Award. Districts that achieve the requirements for the Harbor Light Master Award and also exceed membership growth of two percent or more from July 1 through April 30 will receive the Gold Level: Harbor Light Master Award.

Now your district has a second chance to achieve those goals. If they have not already done so, clubs in your district may plan and report service projects that meet the goals

of the first three campaigns: Engaging our Youth Sharing the Vision Relieving the Hunger Reports must be received at International Headquarters by April 30, 2011.

Following club elections this month it is crucial that clubs submit the Lions Clubs Officer Reporting Form to international headquarters by May 15. Doing so ensures that your club will continue to receive important news, materials and announcements from Lions Clubs International.

You may choose either of two predesigned templates that coordinate with Lions Clubs International branding efforts. Oconee Lions Club = Lions Club Donates Sensory "Den" to Malcom Bridge Elementary **The addition enables students with multiple disabilities to learn in engaging ways.**

Malcom Bridge Elementary School students with multiple disabilities are benefiting from a new sensory "den" that allows them to explore a variety of objects and textures. Ginger Schmidt, of Northeast Georgia Regional Educational Service Agency and a teacher of the visually impaired, and Wendy Harrison, speech and language pathologist for the Oconee County Schools, recently met with the Oconee Lions Club to discuss needs for students with disabilities, a news release stated.

The teachers explained there was a need for a wheelchair accessible sensory den-- a space large enough to fill with items of varying textures that stimulate tactile learning.

"The items are attached from above with elastic," Schmidt said in an interview with Oconee Patch. "The students can grasp them and release and the items return back to the same spot. This develops mental mapping." She went on to explain how else students may benefit from the new learning tool.

"Because of the level of disabilities, these kids rarely initiate reaching out on their own, and instead usually have a lot of things handed to them," she said. "This offers them an experience to initiate that movement themselves." Research shows that students benefit more from this type of environment rather than hand-over-hand contact, Schmidt said.

Teacher Ashley Down's classroom was already equipped with a "Little Room" -- a smaller version that students can only access when lying down-- but not all 5 students could use it, she said.

The newly-donated sensory den will encourage exploration and development of early orientation and mobility skills while students remain in their wheelchairs. Lion Bob Davis volunteered his carpentry skills to construct the den, she said. "He did a beautiful job of responding to the space in the classroom," Schmidt remarked. "It was built in 3 pieces with special bolts."

The best part is, she said, the sensory den may be moved, so that students with multiple disabilities who attend other Oconee schools or those in nearby counties may share it.

"We can take it on the road eventually," Schmidt said. "I'm proud that Oconee has made this happen."

January 19, 2011 The Lighthouse brought music back into Sarah's life. After playing the piano for 47 years, she was forced to give up her sheet music when bifocals made it difficult to read from one line to another. Unable to afford a new pair of glasses, for two years, Sarah could only play songs she knew by heart. Then, thankfully, she found the Lighthouse. Receiving a pair of single prescription glasses from the Lighthouse's Brunswick clinic finally allowed Sarah to read her music clearly and return to playing the piano she loves.

When Lakeena, a single mother of three, learned that her 13-year old daughter Shayla was having trouble seeing in school, it upset her. Employed as a cosmetologist, Lakeena had no insurance and could not afford an eye exam and eyeglasses for Shayla. Shayla had been having difficulty for 6 months, but they weren't sure where to turn for help.



Lakeena learned about the Lighthouse Foundation's Savannah eye clinic through a relative. Soon after seeking an appointment, Shayla was seen by volunteer Dr. Henry Croci in July of this year.

Since beginning the school year with her new glasses, Shayla's eyes no longer hurt from strain and her grades have improved. Shayla wants to be either a nurse or follow in her Mom's footsteps as a hair stylist when she grows up. With her improved vision, she can now choose whatever path she'd like.



delivery." This is when an instructor takes a dog to the client's home for training instead of the client coming to Leader Dog. In the days prior to receiving his first Leader Dog, Fernie, Tom Moritz admits to feelings of anxiousness, uncertainty and inadequacy. After just six months of working together, his fears have faded away and the team has become well-seasoned travelers.

Tom Moritz travels quite a bit for his job as a medical research biostatistician. Trains, airports, hotels and restaurants are very much a part of his life. Luckily, Leader Dog Fernie has quickly proven herself to be a polite, competent traveler.

"When we fly," says Tom, "if we enter the plane first, Fernie feels obligated to greet every passenger as they pass by our seat. She sits politely with her tail wagging waiting for a comment regarding how beautiful she is and for a pat on the head. If we enter the plane last, she just lies down and goes to sleep as soon as I take my seat."

Fernie's good behavior does not go unnoticed. Once, in an upscale restaurant, her politeness earned her a silver tray of ice cubes. Yet another time when Tom attended a Great Leaders Training meeting, Fernie was acknowledged during a strength-finding

exercise. "During the final session, the presenters gave Fernie an ID badge that included her top five strengths," Tom recalls proudly. They were: 1. Includer: Being accepting of others; 2. WOO (Winning Others Over): Loving the challenge of meeting new people and winning them over; 3. Adaptability: Going with the flow and taking life one day at a time; 4. Empathy: Sensing the feelings of others; 5. Responsibility: Being committed to stable values such as loyalty.

To date, Tom and Fernie have traveled to Washington DC, Boston, Milwaukee and Omaha. "When we went to Omaha," Tom admits, "we walked over a pedestrian bridge to Iowa—just so Fernie could say she'd been there too."

Dear Leader Dog,

I was reading your newsletter and loved the story about the teacher and her guide dog making such a difference with her students [Issue 3 - 2010]. I have a cool story about Jake, who also works in a school.

There was a kid yesterday who gets upset easily in the middle school. He's still very young and has some learning challenges. He loves Jake and earns special time with us if he behaves and acts his age. I was coming down the hall and he was banging lockers. I said, "Oh, you're scaring Jake. You don't want to

upset him, do you?" This boy ran over, buried his head in Jake's neck and sobbed all over him. Jake just licked him and even though Jake was in harness, we didn't care. I said, "Great job! You are doing the right thing. Now, we're going to call this a tiny disappointment, and you're going to go back to class and sit in an empty seat and be like all the other sixth graders, right?" He mumbled, "Right." I reminded him that if he could do that, he could have lunch with Jake and I, and that's all it took. I feel schools need to hire service animals just to calm the kids down.

These dogs typically end up doing far more than guiding. I know between the two of us, Jake probably does more social work than I do. I'm a social worker in five schools; three elementary, one middle school and one high school. No matter the age of the student, Jake can always break through to them, every single time.

HOT – NEWS FLASH = I am happy to announce that we will soon be launching our new pedestrian GPS device—the Kapten PLUS. We first heard about the Kapten in December of 2009 and in January 2010 we met with Kapsys, the manufacturer of Kapten, to discuss modifying the device for people who are blind. Just 14 months later, in March 2011, our first guide dog and AMP classes received free Kapten PLUS devices! The PLUS added to the Kapten name designates the modified version of the device and is exclusive to Leader Dogs for the Blind.

As part of our plan, later this month we will ship Kapten PLUS devices to key influencers. These are people who will understand the significance of the technology, be motivated to tell others about the device, our GPS program and be excited about our goal of getting an affordable GPS into the hands of our clients and ultimately making it available to everyone who is visually impaired and blind. "The Kapten is awesome. I put it in free nav mode and go for a walk. Just knowing where I am makes my travel more relaxing. I can focus on what my Leader Dog is telling me, where the traffic is and not worry about figuring out where I am because the Kapten tells me."

The Mission of Mission: D.A.D.:

To raise awareness of diabetes and funding for families in need of diabetic alert service dogs - highly trained to recognize oncoming changes in blood glucose levels of Type 1 diabetics; to pay our blessings forward; to share our struggle transparently.



Our home is like many others. We have a Mom and a Dad, three kids (a teen and 2 pre-teens), a cat and a guinea pig.

We live in the suburbs. We go to church, we go to school, we go to the grocery store. Just like you, our days are measured by moments of joy, yawns of tedious boredom and photographic events like vacations or soccer games. Added to the mix are endless loads of laundry and sometimes hours of homework. We have jobs, we have friends, we have relatives, we have bills.

Sound familiar?

Where we differ - as a family - is that nearly every day we face our own mortality. My husband, our Dad, has Type I Diabetes. And more than once, he has almost died. Every day, whether we talk about it, whether we ignore it, we are living - as a family - with a disease that could change all of our lives in the blink of an eye.

In January of 2010, we stepped out of our "home" with this disease. We never imagined the blessings this journey would bring. Trust me. NEVER.

Although this started as a desire to be transparent about living with diabetes and to secure a Diabetic Alert Dog for Trevor, we have come to believe that there is a larger purpose for Mission: D.A.D. In fact, we believe Trevor's situation, the tremendous response of those around us and continuing affirmation have resulted in a journey that is far bigger than "the Jordan's."

Mission: D.A.D., A Diabetic Alert Dog Fund has grown into a full fledge non-profit. Our purpose? To raise awareness of diabetes, diabetic alert dogs and transparent living.

How do we plan to do that? If it would be pleasing, we'd like to secure educational and testimonial opportunities that would allow us to share our experiences and raise funds so that we can provide financial assistance to families experiencing the hardship of diabetes and for whom a D.A.D. would be life-changing. We also hope to (someday) become involved in legislative measures that will protect families from unscrupulous breeders and/or trainers. How About That?

There are over 20-million diabetics in the United States today. Of those, there are approximately 4-5 million Type 1 diabetics. To date, there are a handful of reputable D.A.D. trainers. Over the long run, creating opportunities to help both families who need a Diabetic Alert Dog AND trainers who can train them just makes sense.



We are excited to see where God will direct us next on this journey. And we want to be transparent with you every step of the way. We don't exactly know what the future will hold. It is our focus, right now, to just keep "walking through open doors." We desire to be available for His purpose and for the first time in our lives, believe that Trevor's 27 years of struggle with diabetes could have been all about This Moment.

LQ has developed a *Skills for Adolescence* (SFA) afterschool guide. Implementation models focus on three approaches -Positive Youth Development, Extended Learning



Opportunities and evidence-based Drug and Alcohol Prevention. Delivery options range from 12-32 weeks. Webinars offer training and support for program facilitators. 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Arkansas Lions bring Lions Quest to Youth across the State

In January the Lions Quest Advisory Committee approved a \$50,000 Core 4 Grant for MD-7 Arkansas. Lead by LQ Chair Toni Shockey, a steering committee was created including members from the Department of



Education and Arkansas Service Commission. Matching funds will be provided by the Arkansas Lions Foundation with clubs seeking additional grants from county drug education funds. Teacher training workshops will begin in June. Fifteen schools and/or school districts have already committed to implement Lions Quest, and Lions are meeting with new schools in the weeks to come.
