Lions Clubs International also had a humble beginning. Our founder, Melvin Jones, and a few of his colleagues, were the first beginning droplets of water that today, 94 years later, have changed the world and touched millions of lives.

LCIF Using US\$21 Million Donated by Lions to Help Japan

Following the devastating earthquake and tsunami in March 2011, we've mobilized more than US\$21 million to provide disaster relief in Japan. This includes generous donations from Lions around the world and LCIF grants.

Japan Earthquake and Tsunami Relief Projects

With more than 100,000 Lions in Japan, relief efforts are well underway.

- US\$1 million is providing 2,000 high pressure cleaners to reduce radiation levels. The cleaners will help remove or clean the surfaces of private buildings and households, which will assist an estimated 20,000 people.
- US\$1.2 million will provide kitchen supplies and equipment for three locations along the coast of Tohoku to help revitalize the seafood industry. The local government will provide the land and buildings for this project, which will help an estimated 20,000 people.
- US\$1.5 million is creating a special victims' assistance fund and Lions command and operation centers. This project will enable Lions in Japan to plan for long-term needs and assist with ongoing earthquake and tsunami relief and recovery efforts.

- US\$397,403 will help construct coin laundries in heavily damaged areas to help thousands of people who do not have access to washers and dryers. Lions are also working with the government to obtain land donations for this project. Each location will also include a community meeting space to help reestablish regular Lion clubs' meetings.
- US\$311,688 will provide emergency radio equipment for temporary housing areas, where radio broadcasts are currently not available. This project will provide thousands of units that will help an estimated 30,000 people.

Lions are also working with the Tasuki Project – an organization that delivers bags of personal care items to disaster victims – to help fund the delivery of these bags. In addition, Lions continue to meet with Japan Red Cross to formulate mid- to long-term joint relief solutions, including blood drives to address the severe shortage of blood.

One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative



Measles is one of the deadliest vaccine-preventable diseases, taking the lives of 450 children each day. In developing countries, nearly one third of children who contract measles suffer complications, including corneal scarring. The Gates Foundation is challenging Lions to raise US\$10 million through LCIF to help save children across the world. LEHP Promotes Healthy Vision

Did you know that vision loss is not a normal part of aging? But, as you get older, you're at higher risk of developing eye diseases and conditions leading to vision loss or blindness. The Lions Eye Health Program (LEHP) can help your club promote healthy vision in your community. The LEHP "Making Vision a Health Priority" and "Age-Related Eye Diseases and Conditions" toolkits are user-friendly resources you can distribute at community events. LEHP also provides PowerPoint presentations and Speaker's Guides you can use to host an educational workshop in your community or at your next Lions club meeting.

Club Excellence Process Feedback Needed

The Club Excellence Process (CEP) is a four step workshop designed to help clubs evaluate the needs of the club and the community. Kate's artistic ability is stunning. It fills me with pride to know that she's just one of 350,000 kids around the globe who participate in the contest each year. Through the Peace Poster Contest, which is now in its 25th year, Lions Clubs International encourages countless children to take a moment and think about what a world of peace would look like. I believe that when we urge children to think about a better world, we help the next generation's leaders develop a pathway to peace.

As a grandparent of 16, it gives me great pride to see what the Lions Quest program is accomplishing. Lions Quest has given over 12 million youth in 72 countries the social and emotional skills to make good decisions and have respect for others.

Through LCIF, Lions Quest continues to <u>partner</u> with well-regarded and recognized organizations, including the U.S. State Department and the NoVo Foundation. During Lions Day with the United Nations, Lions Quest officially partnered with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime. This new partnership provides an opportunity to reach even more students. Supporting Lions Quest, LCIF and Lions are supporting youth by teaching them good values and to be a better citizen.

Even before reaching school age, Lions are ensuring that children have the opportunity to lead a healthy life through the One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative. By vaccinating children against measles for the cost of US\$1 per shot, we are preventing many possible health complications that could occur if a child contracts measles. These complications can include blindness, pneumonia, hearing loss from ear infections and death.

Over 450 children still die each day from measles.

This is another great opportunity for Lions to come together and make an impact in the world by helping to save the life of a child. LCIF has already mobilized US\$2 million toward our goal of raising US \$10 million to meet the matching funds challenge provided by the Gates Foundation. Donating is easy, and every dollar counts. I thank you for joining the fight against measles.

Fighting Diabetes through the Core 4 Program



Lions have a long-standing commitment to improving health. Through the LCIF Core 4 diabetes program, multi-year grants are awarded to large-scale Lions' efforts to support diabetes education, prevention and treatment programs. Diabetes is a chronic disease, with the number of people affected expected to almost double in the

next 20 years. Recent successful Core 4 diabetes projects include expanding an education program for young people by the Lions in District 118-U (Turkey), and the development of an early detection and education program for low-income senior citizens by the Lions in District 354-B (Korea).

Measles Donor Recognition Opportunities

LCIF has several ways to recognize your individual or club donations to the One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative. All donations made for measles are Melvin Jones Fellowship eligible. Club banner patches are available for clubs with donations of US\$50 per member, US\$100 per member and US\$250 per member. Clubs with donations of US\$100 per member or higher will be listed on the donor wall at the International Convention in Busan, South Korea this year. Individuals or clubs who have donated US\$10,000 and above will also be listed on the donor wall at the International Convention, along with being recognized on the LCIF Web site.

<u>Friendship City Provides Ongoing Japan</u> Relief

The Japan-America Society of Dallas/Fort Worth (JASDFW) has donated an additional US\$85,500 to LCIF to aid ongoing earthquake and tsunami recovery efforts in Sendai, Japan. The donation marks the one-year anniversary of the disaster, and is the result of ongoing fundraising from the Dallas/Fort Worth community. For the last year, JASDFW has continued to raise funds to support recovery needs in Sendai, which is the city of Dallas's International Friendship City.

Five Facts about Measles

1. Measles is caused by a virus.

The measles virus is a member of the paramyxovirus family, which causes respiratory illnesses. The measles virus typically grows in the cells that line the back of the throat and lungs.

2. Measles is highly contagious.

When a person has measles, 90 percent of the people he or she comes into close contact with will become infected, if those people are not already immune because they have either been vaccinated or had measles previously. The measles virus spreads easily by coughing and sneezing, and remains active and contagious in the air or on infected surfaces for up to two hours.

3. Measles is deadly.

Measles remains one of the leading causes of death among young children globally. An estimated 139,300 people died from measles in 2010 — mostly children under the age of five. That equals nearly 380 deaths a day, or 15 deaths each hour. More than 95 percent of measles deaths happen in low-income countries with weak health infrastructures.

4. Measles can cause serious complications.

About 30 percent of reported measles cases have one or more complications. The most serious complications are blindness, encephalitis (an infection that causes brain swelling), severe diarrhea and dehydration, and severe respiratory infections like pneumonia.

Severe measles is more likely among poorly nourished young children, especially those with insufficient vitamin A, or whose immune systems have been weakened by other diseases.

5. Measles is entirely preventable.

A save, effective and inexpensive measles vaccine has been in use for over 40 years.









Fellow Lions:

DUES ---- To begin - I would HIGHLY suggest that you collect your District/State and LCI dues for the six month period and be able to pay once you get an invoice in January and July. In fact, it would be terrific if you were able to have a credit on file with LCI – in other words pay six months in advance. We do have a few clubs that are in that status.

NEW MEMBERS: International per capita on a new member begins the first of the month in which the member enters your club. It is pro-rated at US \$3.21 per month for the remaining months in the semi-annual period, plus US \$.25 for the International Convention Fund, which is not pro-rated.

Doubling the number of women in your club is not only possible, it is desirable. The women of your club bring a level of talent, dedication and compassion available from no other source. I am strongly encouraged by the infusion of female talent and enthusiasm that women Lions of District 411A, Nairobi, Kenya, are bringing to bear on the needs of their communities. At a ceremony in October, 2011, it was my privilege to personally accept the charter applications from two new Lions clubs to be made up entirely of women and to formally induct 15 new women members into existing Lions clubs, for a total of 65

new, dynamic women members joining our family.

Increasing the number of women in our clubs is a part of the larger My Club, My Family effort. When members invite spouses, sons and daughters living in the same household to join their Lions club, those family members will pay no entrance fee and pay only half of the international dues. Clubs can get the youngest family members involved and develop future Lion leaders by sponsoring a Lions Family Cub Program or Leo club.

Thank you for all you do for your fellow Lions, your community and the world.

Measles

Lions Clubs International has established itself as one of the world's leading non-governmental organizations (NGOs) in the ongoing effort to promote health for all and to eradicate preventable diseases. In the past two decades, SightFirst projects have preserved or restored healthy vision for hundreds of millions of people in all parts of the world. Lions diabetes awareness and screening programs have helped keep millions of adults healthy and active.

Now, LCI is engaged in another epic campaign that, this year alone, will safeguard the health of 157 million children by providing vaccines against measles. Measles, nearly eradicated in some parts of the world, remains a serious and widespread threat in places where there are few doctors and little medicine. In fact, 450 children die each day from its effects including pneumonia and encephalitis.

Lions commitment to health for all and especially our traditional concern for the well-being of young people make it imperative that we act. Through the <u>One Shot, One Life:Lions Measles Initiative</u> Lions have joined the worldwide Measles Initiative, a collaborative effort of the World Health Organization (WHO), the United Nations Foundation, UNICEF, American Red Cross and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Lions mission in this powerful alliance is to raise US\$10 million for LCIF to fund vaccinations that cost approximately US\$1 each. We are fortunate to have a powerful partner in this effort. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has pledged US\$1 to Lions Clubs International Foundation for every US\$2 raised by Lions, up to US\$5 million. Therefore success in reaching our US\$10 million goal will result in US\$15 million for this life-saving effort. I cannot think of an effort more consistent with our organization's position as a leader in world health preservation and with our traditional concern for young people. It has my enthusiastic support. With more than US\$1.2 million raised, we are making headway toward our goal and I thank all who have made this possible. I also ask Lions clubs everywhere to make One Shot, One Life a part of your fund raising plans and ask individual Lions to give generously to this important Lions effort.

UGA Lions Club already making a difference

Service groups abound on the University of Georgia's campus, but one of the newest additions has a name that's more often thought of as a civic organization for retirees than college-age students: the Lions Club.

"We just founded the club at the end of last semester," said UGA student Erik Krumins. Krumins helped found the Athens Campus Lions as a way to give back to the community.

Krumins knows a lot about the Lions Club; his grandfather is a past president of the Lions Club International, the umbrella organization for the Lions that has more than 1.3 million members in more than 200 countries.

Athens Campus Lions members helped plant 50 trees throughout UGA's campus last week as a part of the Lions Club International's goal of planting 1 million trees this year. Members already have pledged to plant more than 8 million.

The university's landscape design team picked the best spots to root down new trees, and club members provided the muscle for digging holes and securing the saplings, Krumins said.

"It's definitely taking a lot of work," he said.

Athens Campus Lions planted trees outside of the College of Veterinary Medicine on D.W. Brooks Drive, the new Health Sciences Campus on Prince Avenue, the Animal Health Research Center on Carlton Street and the Hugh Hodgson School of Music on River Road.

The Athens Campus Lions also plan on becoming a part of the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation, a program supported and staffed by volunteers from the Oconee Lions Club and the Classic City Lions Club. The foundation gives eye exams to needy Athens-area residents who don't have health insurance and provides glasses and other eye care through a mobile unit that comes monthly to the Mercy Health Center.

"That's something that we're going to get involved with next semester," Krumins said.

The club already has about 62 members, but club leaders plan to grow larger next semester, said Dhruy Bhaysar, an Athens Campus Lions member.

"We're trying to get up there as a club," Bhavsar said. "We're aiming for 150 members next semester."

The Classic City Lions Club sponsored the campus group when they started a few months ago, said Harold Brown, a member of the Classic City organization and this year's program chairman. "I was surprised when this club formed," Brown said. "It is unusual, too, for a young club to be that large and to form so quickly."

Although the campus club has about 40 more members than Classic City, many students will move from Athens after graduation, and retention could be a problem for the young club, he said. But even if Athens Campus Lions members move, they'll still know the Lions Club's message of charity that speaks to people of all ages, across the world, he said.



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Fundraising Projects (Don't forget your Lion vests)

Let's get some ideas out there – seems we do the same old thing – now maybe we can do something different.

- **1. Community Flags:** Club puts up and takes down American flags on all major holidays. Solicit \$25 or \$50 donation from businesses by letter each September following 9/11 or veterans day. **Manpower Needs** Varies club members and/or LEO's, Scouts. **Potential Revenue:** \$1,000 or more. **Costs:** Cost of flags and holders.
- **2. Christmas Tree recycling:** Christmas trees and wreaths are accepted for recycling on the first weekend following New Year's day. Donations of \$5 per tree and \$3 wreath are accepted for trees drop off at the recycling locations. A donation of \$20/tree is requested if the tree is picked up from a home or business. **Manpower** Varies. **Costs:** Members donate vehicle costs.
- **3.** Coffee and Tea Sales: Five lb. bags of coffee and 2lb. bags of tea are purchased at wholesale prices from Coffee Bean International and then resold for \$1/lb over wholesale costs. Coffee and Tea sales are done all year round. **Manpower** Club members. Costs: Wholesale purchase price. **Minimum order:** 20 lbs per order.
- **4. Run/Walk for Sight:** Club conducts a 5k run/walk each fall. Sell ads to local businesses and publish the ads in a booklet that is distributed 5-6 weeks prior to the event encouraging people to patronize the business. Charge an entrance fee and provide a t-shirt with entry fee. Ribbons and plaques are awarded. In-kind donations are solicited and a drawing is conducted for gifts with a grand prize. **Manpower** varies. **Costs:** \$200. **Potential Revenue:** \$4000 or more.

5. Pancake Breakfast with Santa and Mrs. Claus:

Breakfast with eggs, sausage, pancakes, juice, hot chocolate. Event also includes selling baked goods, holiday wreaths, local arts and crafts, cookie decorating for children and a children's bike raffle. **Manpower** – varies. **Potential Revenue:** \$1,500 or more.

- **6.** Golf Ball Drop: Lions sell 2,500 numbered golf balls for \$25. The balls are released by airplane over a golf course. The winner of the ball that comes closest to the hole receives \$10,000. Manpower varies.
- **7. Supermarket Sweep:** Club and supermarket sells tickets for \$5 quantity 500-1,000 tickets. Winner has 5 minutes to fill grocery cart(s) of food. **Manpower** varies.
- **8. 50/50 Raffle:** This is one of the best cheap fundraising ideas, because the only cost to the club is a roll of raffle tickets. Sell raffle tickets to donors and split the money evenly with the winner. Positive cash flow is immediate.
- **9. Pet pageants:** For a small entry fee, local pet owners can enter their pets in a pet pageant. Don't be afraid to make up your own categories; the "Furriest Pet" or the "Most Unusual Pet" or "Best Dressed Pet". This will certainly add to the entertainment value of this fundraising event.
- **10.** Chili cook-offs: Many families have a favorite chili recipe. By organizing a friendly competition, you can help determine which chili really deserves bragging rights as the best overall. For the cost of a trophy, your club can raise a sizable amount of money.
- 11. Buckets for Donations: EASY- This fundraiser is perfect to collect the change given at countless stores in your town. Gather old coffee cans and cover them with your cover sheet. Approach store manager and have a professional cover sheet that explains your charity and your goals of fundraising. Send a member to the store once a week to empty cans. Make sure to update the store manage on your club's progress.







This is another way of getting Lions in your club, new members and prospective members interested in doing something new and different. Getting involved is another word for **WE SERVE**.



Certain things can happen when your Lions Club gets involved. If we have to find something new – go for it – because the more we raise – the more we can give. Also, the more members who get involved also create a bundle of fun and more money raised. The information that appears may benefit another club – for here is where we get ideas and we might be able to use those ideas within your own club.

The Blessings of Vision - Ruby's story



Ruby has a lot to be grateful for. She lives with her daughter's family and gets the opportunity to watch her grandchildren grow. She's very active in her com-munity and sings in the church choir. Recently, she received the chance to see again.

Ruby's vision deteriorated over a period of a year due to cataracts that resulted from diabetes. She drove from doctor's office to doctor's office looking for help, having to take more caution on the road as her vision deteriorated. "Reading the street signs was really tough," she says.

After being denied by Medicaid, she was referred to the Lighthouse Foundation, which worked with the Georgia Eye Institute to provide sight-saving cataract surgeries on both of her eyes. "After you have cataract surgery, the results are miraculous," she beams. Everything felt new. Even the different colors of her kitchen tile jumped out at her.

Ruby received two of the 350 surgeries the Lighthouse provided in 2011. Stories like Ruby's are made possible through partnerships with ophthalmologists, who discount their services up to 75%. Every dollar raised through the April White Cane fundraising month goes directly into the surgery budget. Since the Lighthouse partners with medical providers throughout the state, you might know someone like Ruby in your own town. Your tireless work with White Cane ensures that people like Ruby have a place to turn to in need. Thank you for all of your tireless work for the Lighthouse!

Dear Lions and Friends:

Learning about Leader Dogs for the Blind



It is hard to believe it, but April has arrived. With less than ten weeks until the departure date, it is sometimes hard to imagine how everything is going to get done. All of the preparations have been enjoyable, but one so far has risen above all the rest... Our visit last week to Leader Dog headquarters in Michigan.

In order to be better Ambassadors for LDB, we were asked to fly out to their headquarters in Rochester Hills, Michigan for an up close and personal tour. Quite simply it was a life changing experience for both Debbie (my wife) and me. The complexity of the combined

effort of all the clients, their families, staff and volunteers to support and train the team (the client and the Leader Dog) is both comprehensive and extensive. Some people might think that you simply teach a dog some basic habits, give the blind or visually impaired person a few pointers, connect the two with a harness and call it good. This couldn't be further from the truth.

The effort to breed, whelp, raise and train a healthy and skilled dog is just one half of a complex process, but complicated none-the-less. Teams of dog breeders work with LDB staff to bring the puppies into the world. Once born and ready to leave their mother, the puppies get a full wellness check so they can move on to the next phase of their training.





Teams of volunteer puppy raisers spend about a year raising these future Leader Dogs and work tirelessly to prepare them for their formal training back at Leader Dog headquarters. Twenty percent of all puppies are actually raised by convicts as part of a rehabilitation process. No convict involved in this program has ever been sent back to prison for committing a crime upon release. This says a lot to me about the power of this work and the impact it can have on people. The next stage in the process is where teams of professional trainers on the Leader Dog staff now take the young dogs (around 14 months of age) and begin an intense five month training regimen to teach each future Leader Dog the skills necessary to complete the rigors of being a working dog. This is a challenging process where about half of the dogs show to be incapable of meeting the standards LDB has for a Leader Dog. The dogs judged to not meet expectations often times go back to the volunteer(s) who raised them or given to a good home from a long waiting list. Those dogs who make it through each round of review receives more and more specific training relative to the person they will eventually team up with. The expertise of the instructor and extensive application materials (i.e. written descriptions, video documentation and client specific information) are critical to the Leader Dogs ultimate success in their service. The years of dedicated service and experience by the staff is incredible and we were extremely impressed by their knowledge and passion for their work.





All the while the Leader Dog is going through its process, the client is preparing for their role as a member of the pending team (the Leader Dog and the client). Each person has different needs and unique conditions (i.e. locale, work and travel requirements, etc.) that are all considered in the matching process. This work requires the client to make some adjustments and to learn to take care of the Leader Dog that will work for and with them for many years. As anyone who has raised a dog knows, each dog is different and no matter how well they are trained by the professionals, the knowledge and skill of the human are key to working successfully together. This preparation, whether it is the client's first or one of many Leader Dogs takes a lot of work.

Once the team (client and Leader Dog) come together on what is known as "Issue Day", it takes weeks of hard work and training to help the team grow stronger. It all starts with what is known as a "first walk" where the Leader Dog and client (with the support of their instructor) begins the team building process. These walks become increasingly more challenging and include trips away from campus to expose the team to as many different situations as possible. This effort not only allows the team to learn how to work together, but it is part of the process to build trust between the two.





Once the team leaves campus, the Leader Dogs team continues to provide all the necessary problem solving support necessary and on-going training through instructors who are out in the field working with clients. What results are strong team of Leader Dogs and Clients who are able to travel freely and safely through their K-9, human partnership. We had the chance to experience many aspects of this process first hand over a three day tour and were deeply moved by what we learned. Both Debbie and I believe more than ever that this life-changing experience has allowed us to see Leader Dogs through an entirely new lens. Cycling for Leader Dogs has become much more to us than a one-time effort in support this incredibly important work, but rather it is the first of many efforts we plan on working on to support Leader Dogs for the Blind and all those this wonderful organization

Each Leader Dog gets a unique tag back at the beginning of its formal training at around the age of fourteen months. The tag is worn until it dies, whereby it is returned to Leader Dogs for the Blind. This tag was worn by a Leader Dog named Lacey (a yellow lab) who served her owner nine days short of twelve years (average working life of a Leader Dog is seven to ten years). Lacey lived with her owner for another six months after retirement before her health sharply declined. She lived a productive and dedicated life as a working dog. Leader Dogs for the Blind has asked that I carry Lacey's tag with me while I prepare for and during this trip and I accepted this request with great honor. I feel that even though Lacey is no longer with us, she will be with me in spirit and serving as my Leader Dog. I hope that I get to meet all those who read this blog post at some point in this trip so I can share with you my Leader Dog named Lacey. Please don't be shy to ask me about her.

All Canine Companions assistance dogs go through an intensive training process where they learn to master more than forty commands, such as:

- Retrieve dropped or out of reach items
- Open and close doors and drawers
- Pull a lightweight manual wheelchair
- Turn lights on and off
- Alert the hard of hearing to environmental sounds
- Show partners the source of the sounds

Dogs and people are matched to form a team, and together they attend a two-week training program at one of five training centers where they learn how to work together.

SERVICE LEARNING for LEOs and YOU'TH (and

SERVICE LEARNING for LEOs and YOUTH (and these will help adults as well) *** What are the characteristics of Service-Learning?

Service-learning combines experiential learning and community service opportunities. It can be distinguished in the following way:

Curricular Connections—Integrating learning into a service project is key to successful service-learning.

Academic ties should be clear and build upon existing disciplinary skills.

Skills for Adolescence

Skills for Adolescence (SFA) is based on highly targeted research of students in grades 6-8. Included are "Making Healthy Choices" units covering drug, alcohol and tobacco use; interactive, student-focused lessons; sessions on anger, conflict and stress management; and cross-curricular activities to encourage team-teaching. This extensive curriculum has been expanded to help students manage conflict and anger and to help teachers and administrators deal with the critical issue of bullying. Supplemental bullying prevention lessons, developed in 2009, can be found in the Curriculum Updates section of this Web site.

Our 40-session "Introduction to Skills" implementation model was proven effective by a rigorous evaluation study conducted by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA). However, we recommend the school-wide model as the optimum implementation model because the entire school community creates and sustains a shared vision for positive youth development. Similarly, we recommend the three-year models as our ideal models because they provide "booster lessons" and continuous practice that reinforce the skill-building potential throughout the middle school experience. When the three-year model is not possible, we have seen much success with the two-and one-year models as well.

All options, from one to three years, include one lesson per week taught as a 45-minute class or split into two 20-30 minutes classes. Three lessons per month are scheduled for a total of 30 lessons per school year. Unit coverage varies according to time frame. Visit Program Resources to view a

Skills for Adolescence for Out-of-School Time - New!

Skills for Adolescence for Out-of-School Time (SFA for OST) was created to meet the unique demands of afterschool programs and community centers working with middle school youth. SFA for OST is comprised of 33 social and emotional learning lessons, five service-learning lessons, three online bullying prevention lessons, 116 reinforcement activities, and numerous relationship-centered learning community strategies and activities. These selections, from the Skills for Adolescence (SFA) curriculum, combined with newly-created implementation tools, provide OST staff with a positive youth development program that aligns with six common elements of high-quality OST programming, recognized by researchers and practitioners as having the most influence on positive outcomes for young people. The SFA for OST program manual comes with the Changes and Challenges student book. An SFA for OST program supplement is available for those who already have the full SFA curriculum, and includes just the program guide and implementation tools. On-site, experiential training and a supportive webinar series complete the SFA for OST program options.
