In my 32 years as a Lion, I have long been involved with efforts to save sight around the world. It is important work. Did you know that globally, 80 percent of all visual impairment can be prevented or cured? We have already helped millions of people through our



<u>sight-saving efforts</u> and Foundation, and I know we can reach millions more.

I recently attended the 13th International Congress of Ophthalmology and Optometry in China. There, I had the

honor of speaking about our Lions and our work. Our efforts to provide vision care for all, including vulnerable populations like children, people in developing countries and people with intellectual disabilities,



are making a lasting impact. We are able to accomplish so much with our partners and with our clubs around the world.

According to the World Health Organization, visual impairment has decreased in the last twenty years. This is largely a result of combating infectious diseases, such as river blindness and trachoma. LCIF's <u>SightFirst</u> program addresses these diseases, and also screens vision, provides cataract surgeries, researches ways to make our efforts more efficient, and so much more, helping us realize our dream of vision for all.

Melvin Jones once said that "dreams are the simple ideas of yesterday that become the important miracles of today." Through our work to save sight and prevent blindness, we are helping the dream of vision for all to become an important miracle, every day, everywhere. Thank you, Lions. We would not be able to save sight around the world without your service and contributions.

#### Pediatric Cataract Initiative Changes Lives

"For the last year, Pradip's study was affected, he was unable to see properly," said the mother of seven-year-old Pradip Tigga. She and her family live in West Bengal,



India. "My husband works in the tea gardens as a daily



wage worker, so it was really hard to take Pradip to private hospital because of the financial problems. But now, he is back to school and now he can play, read and walk without anybody's support. It's our wish that he is a good student and literate,

successful person."

In 2012, Pradip received a pediatric-cataract surgery and free treatment as a result of LCIF and Bausch + Lomb's Pediatric Cataract Initiative (PCI) grant to Siliguri Greater Lions Eye Hospital in West Bengal. Through the PCI, the hospital is the recipient of one of six projects awarded around the world since 2010 to improve their local capacities to detect, treat and follow-up with the often complex pediatric cataract cases.

#### **Lions Quest Expands**

Lions Quest has expanded to reach a new total of 80 countries, thanks to the recent program implementation in St. Maarten. Working with the Ministry of Education, the St. Maarten Lions Club held a two day Lions Quest



workshop in February that trained 72 teachers. At this time last year, LCIF's positive youth development program was present in just 72 countries. Lions Quest is also working with local Ministries of Education in the Dominican Republic, Malawi, Peru and Uganda to expand the program further in those countries.

It's April. That means we are now three quarters of the way through this Lions year. Only three more months to go. Are you going to save enough fuel to finish the race, or are you going to accelerate toward the finish line? How you answer that question will really define your year.

I want you all to accelerate!!! With three months to go, there is still so much we can accomplish – like chartering new clubs and inviting new members.

As we approach our 4<sup>th</sup> and final pit stop, district governors should be encouraging clubs to participate in our global action campaign "Protecting our Environment," and striving for at least 50% club participation in our Reading Action Program. This is also the time to end the year on a high note by chartering a new club and a net increase in membership (a requirement for the District Governor Team Excellence Award)

Club presidents should ensure that their club is in good standing and has a net growth at the close of the year (a requirement for the <u>Club Excellence Award</u>). Currently, more than one-third of our clubs have not invited a new member this year. That represents an opportunity to add at least 15,000 additional members by the end of the year.

I'm very pleased to report as of the end of March, we have surpassed 60,000 Reading Action Program activities, serving over 6 million people worldwide. That's an amazing accomplishment, and indicative of the Lions spirit to serve the underserved. For clubs that have not yet participated in the program, there is still time. It's easy, and a great way to make a real difference in your community.

#### **Global Membership Team**

The following article was a part of a Leadership presentation at a recent USA Canada Lions Leadership Forum

Reasons members leave Lions: The top three reasons members resign are due to club cliques and politics, lack of meaningful involvement and lengthy/boring meetings. With effective meetings all three of these can be eliminated.

What you have to do: Look closely at your club meetings—do the members seem interested, enthusiastic or bored and impatient? Listen to input from your club members. After the meetings, are they inspired and motivated? Learn where problems exist. Good club meetings still have hick-ups—club atmosphere, is it friendly or tense and boring? Respond and implement appropriate changes. Good meetings do not just happen; they are because someone planned a good meeting. How well you prepare will be reflected at your meeting.

Pre-planning: One of the rights of a volunteer is the right to be involved in the planning and evaluation. The President should pre-plan with a brief personal survey, either one on one or by telephone. It should include: What do you like about our meetings? What don't you like about our meetings? What type of guest speakers do you wish to hear? How often do you wish to hear a guest speaker? Are you comfortable in leading the national anthem or invocation? How do you rate the meeting room facilities? How do you rate the food? Summarize and make changes that reflect the majority of the members.

Meeting room and equipment: Is it private – some clubs have meetings in the open space of a restaurant – no privacy. PA system – as we get older, our hearing is not as good. Invest in a basic PA system if your meeting place does not have one and most of all use it! For presentations, are there a screen, overhead and projector for presentations? Paraphernalia – is it displayed properly and prior to the majority of members arriving?

Agenda's: Requires pre-planning. At the meeting, do not prepare the agenda and open the mail. Either the President or Secretary can prepare the agenda but both should have input. Give out a brief agenda to the members so they know what is coming up and if they have to speak, when their turn is. Ensure the mail is picked up a few days prior to the meeting, paraphrase the reading of correspondence and do not read it if it needs to go to the Board of Directors first. There are numerous formats used by clubs and most fit their particular needs. The key is to ensure it is followed. All new business requests should be referred to the Board of Directors prior to being discussed at the regular meeting. Do not do committee work on projects during the meeting; the reports should only be a summary. Please ensure all guests are made welcome, introduced and not left on their own.

Time Management: Start and close on me. Do not hold the start of the meeting for late members. They will soon learn the meetings start at the posted me. Advise the members five minutes prior to the start to allow them to get back to their seats and finish with any conversations they are having.

President/Secretary Communication: The president and secretary need to be a strong team. They need to have very good communication, whether it is one on one or by telephone, email or text messaging. It is important NOT to connect just prior to the meeting to set up the meeting – very unprofessional and it shows. Read out the Thank You letters and highlight invitations and upcoming events from other clubs. Pick one item members might be interested in from the Zone Chair, District Governor and Multiple District bulletins and Lions Clubs International Magazine. Remember most do not read the aforementioned in detail and some might not even see it. The key is that you want to keep your members a en on.

Speaking Mannerisms: Stand up when addressing the membership. Speak clearly and project to the back of the room. Inject enthusiasm into your speaking – better interaction. Remember, when talking only 15-20% of what you said is received by the Lion in words. 80-85% is through body language and voice. Do not hide behind the head table, stand up and talk. Do not lecture the members as they do not have to be there. Do not go off on tangents that do not apply. Do not rattle your change or keys in your pockets, very distracting.

Appearance: How are you and your members dressed? Do you see members with torn jeans, dirty shirts, some unshaven, hair not combed or do you see clean slacks/skirts, nice shirt or blouse, club shirt, uniform? What impression do you wish to leave?

This covers club members, visiting Lions, community guests and potential new Lions. Image is so important and the image you portray has a large impact on the community as well as all visitors and members. How can you change this? Discuss at a board meeting and get the executive onside. Have them improve their image and it will rub off.

Tail twisting: A very important position in the club. This person needs to be enthusiastic, have a positive attitude and be an idea person. They have the ability to create the club atmosphere at a meeting. The tail twister has to be flexible as they may be called upon to change their me due to a late meal or delayed speaker. Depending on the agenda, they may only have a short me to create an atmosphere of fun and fellowship with the Lions. Times have changed, eliminate the concept of fines. You can still collect a dollar or two from the members but do it through a group or small group activities, happy bucks, social mixers or raffle. Some group activities are a Lions quiz, Halloween balloon decorating and individual or group table activity. The key is to have FUN.

Guest Speaker/Programs: Why have a program? It can be an informative learning experience, an enjoyable way to fill the agenda. Have a group you donated to speak on their use of funds. It is a good way to find out if your club would like to sup-port a specific organization. It should be held minimum once a month. How to choose a program? It should be interesting to the majority of members and if the President did his pre-planning survey, they already know what the members are interested in. It should fit the allotted time frame – maximum 20 minutes including the question period. It should be applicable to the local community or current Lions interests. Some examples of Lions Based programs: Lions Clubs International Foundation, District and Multiple District Foundations, youth and special needs camps, Lions Quest, Lions Youth Exchange, Diabetes Awareness, Leader Dogs, Hearing Awareness and the list goes on. Some examples of non-Lion based programs: Parks and Recreation, local Search and Rescue, community policing, wild life rescue organization or a local current event.

Lions Orientation: It should be once a month and on the same meeting date each month. The President should know the topics through the pre-planning surveys. Suggest after the meal for no more than 5/10 minutes. Choose a good club speaker. There are lots of topics through LCI programs. It is great for new members as well as the longer tenured members.

Control of Meeting: How to make or break the meeting! The President is the control person. When people are talking out of turn, don't be afraid to stop talking and wait until you have their afternoon or use the gong to say: quiet please. If they continue to talk out of turn, say something after the meeting. If that fails, talk to them again. Sometimes one person overshadows a meeting. A suggestion is to say —Peter we appreciate your comments, however, we would like to get the opinion of a few others prior to the vote or discussion ends or —Peter, we would like some other Lions comments then we will come back to you for one more if you wish to speak again. Not a Committee meeting!! Do not allow the meeting to be used to put the specifics of a project together. If a chairperson needs volunteers, obtain the names after the meeting is adjourned or by phoning/email/text messaging. Do not spring items on members just before the meeting. If you wish them to speak, request prior to the meeting. Give speakers a time frame prior to arriving at a meeting. Give out recognition throughout the year. It is one of the Rights of a Volunteer.

Cliques: Definition: a small exclusive group of people within a large group. Good cliques are fellow Lions who have common interests, fellow Lions of a certain age/era and fellow Lions working a specific project/activity. Bad cliques are Lions unwilling to mix with members, talking throughout the meeting amongst each other, ignoring the meeting or always sitting at the back of the meeting room. Some suggestions to overcome: give a table number when all Lions arrive, occasionally sit at their table and join in, ask them if they would not mind mixing once a month or give out raffle ticket with a duplicate number, find a match and exchange three points of interest about each other.

The Change Curve: It is very important to remember that not all people adapt to change at the same rate. Some are called quick starts that jump at change as a positive development; some are analyzers who require a lot of information prior to giving a commitment and some think everything should be left just as is. Remember, when you bring in a new idea or concept, you have already bought into the idea. You now have the members buy into your idea and be ready to adapt your concept with their input. The first reactions to a new idea/change are shock, denial then anger or fear. With sufficient information and input from the group, it will lead to acceptance and finally commitment or buy-in. Without buy-in, the changes you wish to make to ensure an effective meeting will not be successful.

S.W.O.T Analysis: is used to analyze the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats to having an effective meeting. As you progress through change in your meeting structure, you should sit down and write down the specifics under the four categories mentioned above. You can build on strengths and opportunities. You can work with the club on weaknesses and threats to eventually make these strengths and opportunities. Remember to revaluate and adjust as necessary. To succeed, you need pre-planning, open communication and follow-up.

I always leave the Forum refreshed and with leadership ideas that I can use in my professional work, with my co-workers, with my fellow Lions, and with my family. 



#### What is Learning Ally?

- Learning Ally is a national nonprofit founded in 1948, originally called Recording for the Blind, initially established to help blinded soldiers returning from World War II go to school and re-enter society.
- Since then, the organization has expanded its mission to support people with a wide range of reading disabilities, including blindness, visual impairment, dyslexia, and other learning differences.
- Learning Ally provides an online library of 75,000 accessible audio textbooks and literature titles the largest of its kind in the world.

#### Who uses Learning Ally?

- K-12, college and graduate students, as well as veterans and lifelong learners.
- A documented disability like dyslexia, visual impairment or physical disability is required for membership.
- Approximately 80 percent of Learning Ally's members have dyslexia or a learning disability of some kind; the remainder have a physical disability or are blind or visually impaired.

#### How does it work?

- More than 5,000 trained volunteers work with Learning Ally staff to record and produce accessible audiobooks.
- Students can browse the library, order and download audiobooks, and listen/study on PCs and Mac computers, mainstream devices like iPad and iPhone, as well as on specialized assistive technology devices.

#### Who can volunteer?

- Volunteers are always welcome to fill out an online application form at LearningAlly.org to apply for volunteer opportunities.
- Specialty readers with subject-area expertise in math and science are especially needed.
- Volunteers can also help with various tasks such as fundraising, awareness, and other audiobook production needs.

### How do Learning Ally audiobooks differ from conventional audiobooks?

- Conventional audiobooks are not fully accessible for students with reading disabilities.
- Learning Ally audiobooks have built-in functionality enabling students to efficiently navigate through the material they can easily find a certain chapter or page, set multiple bookmarks, do their class reading and study effectively like any other student.
- Of critical importance for blind readers, Learning Ally audiobooks are read by human narrators who include teachers, doctors, mathematicians, scientists and specialists in every subject—people who can describe in correct language and detail every chart, graph, diagram and illustration.
- More than 65 percent of Learning Ally's library includes corecurriculum textbooks for K-12 and college – with extensive collections in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math.
- For blind students, one Braille textbook can fill an entire bookshelf. A Learning Ally audiobook can fit on a small device.

# Lions Club egg hunt caters to visually impaired

PARKERSBURG - Near-freezing temperatures and snow did not keep children from the second annual Easter Egg Hunt held by the Parkersburg Lions Club on Sunday for visually impaired children.

"I had a great time and so much fun being part of an Easter egg hunt," exclaimed Emily Emrich, 15, of Mineral Wells. "I hate being left out of things and this time I wasn't left out, it was for me."

Emrich has been blind since birth and with the help of her mother, Annette Emrich, was able to hunt her own Easter egg candy in the City Park horseshoe pitch Sunday afternoon in Parkersburg.

"I didn't realize exactly what they were doing, but I am so glad the Lions did this because Emily was able to feel like every other kid," Annette Emrich said.

Emily Emrich was one of about half a dozen children, both sight-impaired and sighted, who participated in the club's spring event. Children who do not have visual impairment participated by placing blindfolds over their eyes.

"A lot of us take for granted the fun an Easter egg hunt is and there is a whole group of people who have never gotten to Easter egg hunt and we want to give them that chance," said Kevin Clem, event organizer for the Parkersburg Lions Club.

The local Lions got the idea for the hunt last year from the Beckley Lions Club, members said. In order to help the children with sight issues with the egg hunt, Lions members stood around the horseshoe pitch in the park and set up stations. Each station had a Lion holding the beeping "egg" as well as candy-filled plastic eggs for the children.

Many of the children had a partner to help direct them as they followed the sound of the beeps and when they reached the origin, were handed the candy eggs.

"Lions is working to eradicate blindness, but, unfortunately, we aren't always able to," Clem said. "This Easter egg hunt is one of the ways we are finding to help kids still be kids and have a good time."

Parkersburg resident Lori Hanna brought her daughters Chey Willis, 5, and Lexi Willis, 8, to the hunt without knowing the blind nature of the event.

"I just saw this was an Easter egg hunt and am always looking for something for them to do," Hanna said. "I think blindfolding them and having them do one activity without their eyes will give them a better understanding of how the blind live, which I think is a good thing for them."

Lexi Willis said not being able to see was very weird.
"I didn't know where I was going or what I was doing," she said. "It was really hard to hear the beeping because everything sounded louder when I couldn't see."

At the end of the hunt, Clem announced the Parkersburg Lions Club will hold the hunt again next year.

"We will definitely do this next year and it will not snow," he stated. "I promise that it will not snow."
