First Ever Lions Club Museum to Open at Leading Atlanta Non-Profit The Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation celebrates 65 years by honoring founders

ATLANTA, GA, April 3- On May 10, 2014, the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation, Georgia's only statewide provider of vision and hearing care for uninsured Georgians, will open the first ever Lions Club Museum. A ribbon cutting ceremony open to Lions Club members and press will take place at 1:00pm at the Lighthouse Foundation. (5582 Peachtree Rd. Chamblee, GA 30341).

Items to be on display in the 1,000 square foot exhibit hall include a 65 year old Braille Bible on limited display from the Statesboro Lions Club, comprised of 15 volumes. The Carter Center has contributed numerous items from President Carter's rich history as a Lion. Items include letters of correspondence between Carter and Lions Club Historian Chip Nedza, photographs taken during his presidency, and documents on Lionism dating back to 1948.

The Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation was founded by three Lions Clubs in 1949 in order to provide a sight-saving surgery for 4 year old Max Parker in Moultrie, Georgia. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) remains the largest service organization in the world, with 1.35 million members in 208 countries (241 clubs in Georgia alone). As the cornerstone of the foundation, Lions Clubs throughout the state have guided the organization in its mission and service for the past 65 years.

Today, the Lighthouse Foundation serves more than 6,500 of Georgia's 1.9 million uninsured by providing eye exams, eyeglasses, sight-saving surgeries, and digital hearing aids to Georgians on all ages each year. Through collaborative partnerships with over 500 hearing and surgical providers and 26 mobile clinics throughout the state, the Lighthouse Foundation is able to touch all 159 counties in Georgia.

Ever since Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) established the One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative, I often reflect on how thankful I am that my children and grandchildren can receive immunizations for life-threatening

diseases like measles. But not all kids are so lucky. Did you know that more than 300 people die every day from measles, mostly children, and even more are impacted by resulting health complications such as blindness? Measles is a highly contagious disease that can be prevented by a



simple vaccination that costs less than a dollar. Thanks to you, more children are getting vaccinations and more lives are being saved.

Today marks the first day of this year's <u>World Immunization</u> <u>Week</u>. This annual event presents an opportunity to raise awareness of measles and the importance of vaccinations. Lions around the world are hosting events throughout this special week to show their commitment to the One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative.

As you read the <u>LCIF blog</u> this week, you will find inspiring stories from <u>Lions about their work during World</u> <u>Immunization Week</u>. Keep in mind that no matter where you are in the world, you can make a difference by supporting LCIF. Lions are providing education in more than 200 countries, actively supporting vaccination campaigns in countries impacted by measles, and fundraising to make sure that more children have access to immunizations and a better life.

We are almost at the end of our <u>30-day challenge</u> to raise US\$1 million for measles and it is exciting to see our progress towards this goal. Have you made your contribution yet? World Immunization Week

Immunization prevents between 2 and 3 million deaths every year, according to the World Health Organization (WHO).

This year, <u>World</u> <u>Immunization Week</u> runs from April 24-30 and Lions are supporting this event through a focus on measles. Diseases like measles aren't just a threat in developing nations; in fact, a number of countries around the world experienced measles outbreaks in 2013.



For just US\$1, you can vaccinate a child against lifethreatening measles and <u>support the One Shot</u>, <u>One Life: Lions</u> <u>Measles Initiative</u>. And, measles vaccination campaigns often include additional life-saving interventions and vaccinations,

Lions Fight Measles in Botswana

During November 2013, Lions in Botswana assisted the country's Ministry of Health with a five-day measles

vaccination campaign. LCIF helped fund the Lions' measles activities, which included social mobilization – getting the word out about the campaign to residents, handing out flyers and answering questions. Close to 200.000 children



received vaccinations through this campaign.



Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is excited to share with you a new Disaster Relief Grant pilot program that is now available in Constitutional Areas I, III and V through March 2015.

Because Lions worldwide continue to prioritize disaster relief as one of their most important local service activities, LCIF is now piloting a wider variety of funding options to help enhance and expand these efforts. The LCIF Disaster Relief Grant program can support Lions' participation in different phases of emergency management based on the needs of their community and the skills, interests, and



availability of their local membership.

This pilot project will determine the effectiveness of new grants that are designed to:

- Strengthen local disaster relief project coordination
- Encourage and support advance planning for disasters
- Leverage Lions' strengths in the community

Five Facts about Measles

1. Measles is caused by a virus.

The measles virus is a member of the paramyxovirus family, which causes respiratory illnesses. The measles virus typically grows in the cells that line the back of the throat and lungs.

2. Measles is highly contagious.

When a person has measles, 90 percent of the people he or she comes into close contact with will become infected, if those people are not already immune because they have either been vaccinated or had measles previously. The measles virus spreads easily by coughing and sneezing, and remains active and contagious in the air or on infected surfaces for up to two hours.

3. Measles is deadly.

Measles remains one of the leading causes of death among young children globally. An estimated 139,300 people died from measles in 2010 — mostly children under the age of five. That equals nearly 380 deaths a day, or 15 deaths each hour.

More than 95 percent of measles deaths happen in lowincome countries with weak health infrastructures.

4. Measles can cause serious complications.

About 30 percent of reported measles cases have one or more complications. The most serious complications are blindness, encephalitis (an infection that causes brain swelling), severe diarrhea and dehydration, and severe respiratory infections like pneumonia.

Severe measles is more likely among poorly nourished young children, especially those with insufficient vitamin A, or whose immune systems have been weakened by other diseases.

5. Measles is entirely preventable.

A save, effective and inexpensive measles vaccine has been in use for over 40 years.



To bring community awareness and raise money, the nonprofit hosted Breakfast with the Easter Bunny at Fowler Park on April 12. The event saw over 300 local residents come to support the organization. Nancy Hutcheon, who has volunteered with Lions Club for three years, emphasized the importance of these services for the local community. "We see great involvement from the local doctors who donate their time and services to this cause, and I volunteer because I get to act locally and see the direct impact of being involved with the group," she said. Volunteers, like Hutch-eon, can get involved in various ways to continue spreading the work of Forsyth County Lions Club. "People can help us with events, if there are local doctors offices that can provide their services, or donate — all of that helps," said Williams. People can also donate their used eyeglasses, used hearing aids and even old cellphones to the organization. The breakfast aimed to raise over \$1,000, which will help over 100 people in the community. 

As Chairman of the Fundraising Committee for the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind, I would like to inform you of the Committee's decision to encourage each District to hold a District wide Fundraiser to benefit the Camp. Because it was already in place, Lion Brian Donegan, & I chose to continue the Gwinnett Braves/Lions Baseball Fundraiser. This will be the 4th year for this event and I am happy to report that each year it has grown. In the three previous years, we have sold an average of 206 tickets. The cost of the tickets is \$8ea and for each ticket sold over 200, \$3 stays with the Club that sold the tickets, to be sent to the Camp after the Game. That comes out to about \$619 for each of those three years. Every Club that sold tickets would send the revenue from the game to the Camp as per their share.

That's not bad, but it is not where we feel it should be, or where we can be. We now have a much larger District with 57 Lions Clubs. Our goal is to have every Lions Club in District I be a part of this fundraiser. Our goal is to also sell 500 tickets, and if we can, the Camp will realize an additional \$1,500. It is a great time to be a Lion and a great time to come together in support of the Camp. The kicker is that tickets don't have to be sold just to Lions. Wouldn't it be great for each Lion to sell tickets to not only their members, their families, but to friends and co workers as well? Kennel Redesign Project Update

As you probably already know, we are planning an extensive renovation of our kennels! Soon the dogs will have as nice a place to stay during their training as our clients do! (smile) The plans for the renovation are moving along nicely. We've submitted the site plan to the city and the operations team is refining the kennel set up and cage configuration. A solid set of prints to begin the scope review and budget is almost complete and are required for bid and permit submittals in April.

Construction will be in three phases and we are working on a transition plan that allows kennel operations to continue throughout each phase. Soon there will be a temporary lobby entrance and a new IT closet to ensure seamless technology and infrastructure support throughout the project.



The fundraising campaign is underway and will be conducted in phases throughout 2014-2015. We continue to work with CCS, our campaign counsel, and the entire philanthropy department is involved because the campaign will help us grow overall giving.

Stories of Longevity



Doris Henderson in 1955

When Doris Henderson started volunteering for Leader Dogs for the Blind, Dwight D. Eisenhower was president of the United States and a gallon of gas cost a whopping 21 cents.

"Back in 1955 they only had a staff of 12 people, and they really didn't believe in volunteers, so when they needed help with something the instructors' wives would come in and help out. There were five of us and I guess you could say we were the first volunteers," she recalled. "We sent out the bulk mailings, went out in the field with our husbands to help clients with problems, and we went to the ladies' meetings at the Lions Club." Doris' husband, Jim, was the fifth instructor employed by Leader Dog.

Looking back, Doris marvels at all the changes she has seen during her six decades with the organization. "I remember we only had eight clients come each month for training, and they were only from the United States; we hadn't even expanded into Mexico yet," she said. "I never would have imagined it would grow to be so big. There's not a building still here that was here when I started."

For Doris, Leader Dog has been a family affair. Her husband Jim went on to be the director of training and worked here for 42 years. Her dad and one of her sons worked here also, and her daughter, Karen Burmann, currently works as the programs & services coordinator. "All together, eight members of my family have worked for Leader Dog over the years, but I'm the only one who was never on the payroll."

Today, Doris puts her decades of involvement to good use by serving as Leader Dog's volunteer historian. "I was asked to do this back in 2000 because I was part of the history," Doris said. "I'm not a trained historian, but I do what I think needs to be done."

As the organization's "walking history book," Doris volunteers one day a week, sifting through old papers and photographs and setting up archival files that will preserve the information for decades to come.

"It's a really big job that will never end because we are making history every day," she said. "I'm 86 years old now and it's been a part of my life for 60 years, so why stop now?"

Learning Ally Teams with Wounded Warrior Project to Empower Veterans with Print Disabilities



Learning Ally is teaming up with Wounded Warrior Project to help this generation's injured service members achieve their educational and professional goals.

Through this collaboration, wounded veterans who are registered with WWP will now have access to Learning Ally's library of 80,000 human-narrated audiobooks, including thousands of texts for college and post-secondary learning. "This agreement empowers warriors who have a difficult time reading due to the extent of their injuries, and provides an alternative education method for those who excel through auditory learning," says Randy Plunkett, director of education initiatives at <u>Wounded</u> Warrior Project.

Background: More than 50,000 servicemen and women have been physically injured in recent military conflicts. In addition to the physical wounds, it is estimated as many as 400,000 service members live with the invisible wounds of war including combat-related stress, major depression, and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). Another 320,000 are believed to have experienced a traumatic brain injury while on deployment.

Nearly one third of registered WWP Alumni are pursing educational goals. While many are participating in WWP's economic programs – including Transition Training Academy and <u>Warriors to Work</u> – many more are attending universities across the country.

Learning Ally's services will be available to all warriors who have a difficult time reading printed text, and is also being integrated into WWP's <u>TRACK</u> program. Based in Jacksonville, FL and San Antonio, TX, TRACK is a one-year community college and internship program geared primarily toward service members with no prior exposure to higher education.

"We are so grateful for Learning Ally's support and their ability to supply us with a tool that will reach beyond the confines of our own programs," says Plunkett. "It truly is something that will further empower injured service members. The extent of injuries these veterans endured makes reading textbooks challenging or outright impossible. With this kind of technology, we're opening up a world of opportunities for their future success."

Ryan Reed



After being diagnosed with type 1 diabetes in Feb. 2011, during the highlight of his racing career, Ryan's approach in his life, career and goals in racing changed. After being told he would never race again and with a strong effort to

continue on, Ryan found Dr. Anne Peters, MD of USC Clinical Diabetes Program in California, who confirmed that with hard work, Ryan could still reach his dreams of becoming a top NASCAR driver.

Determined not to give up his lifelong dream of being a NASCAR driver, Reed eventually found a supportive endocrinologist who was able to help him manage his diabetes and stay on track – literally. He hired a personal trainer and works out for two-four hours each day. He installed an onboard drink system in his car, using a specially formulated protein/carbohydrate/sugar blend his doctor developed for him. He monitors his blood glucose levels continuously during a race, which can go on for several hours. And, he had a member of his pit crew trained to deliver insulin to him on an emergency basis, should the need arise.

Ryan has found himself in a unique situation and is driven to become a role model in the diabetes community. Ryan Reed formed his nonprofit organization, Ryan's Mission, to help build awareness, become a role model and positively touch the lives of so many that have already been affected by the disease.

Ryan and his Mission have joined forces with the American Diabetes Association. This unique collaboration with the Association to Drive to Stop DiabetesSM will use Ryan's story as the voice. The Drive to Stop Diabetes campaign will include awareness and educational efforts at select NASCAR Nationwide races this year, as well as at several off track health and wellness initiatives throughout 2013. The Drive to Stop Diabetes[™] mobile movement will focus attention to educating the community on all types of diabetes. The Drive to Stop Diabetes[™] campaign, through Ryan's Mission 501(c)3, will donate 100 percent of all net-proceeds to the Association.
