Lions Providing Disaster Relief for Tornado Victims in U.S.



A recent tornado outbreak in the U.S. killed at least 280 people, left thousands homeless and caused millions of dollars in damage. As always, our members are bringing aid to the people affected by this disaster. LCIF is mobilizing US\$250,000 to fund Lions' relief efforts in Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. LCIF also awarded US\$160,000 in emergency grants to affected districts. Local Lions will use these funds to provide immediate relief supplies, including food and water.

The last few months have seen great destruction

globe. But, like me, I am sure you are proud of and our global Foundation have been quick to respond. Now, in the case of the Southern United States disasters, we are giving a hand and giving hope to those in greatest need. The Foundation has already provided US\$160,000 in emergency grants for immediate relief across eight states since mid-April. We are mobilizing an additional US\$250,000 for continued relief efforts.

The destruction and death tolls continue to rise from the deadly tornados and storms throughout the U.S. during the month of April. I continue to be shocked and saddened by this news. It is the largest tornado outbreak in the history of the U.S., with at least 178 tornados killing more than 300 people. Thousands of people across several states have been left homeless.



Lions have also been greatly impacted. But they are committed to meeting the urgent needs in their communities. In hardhit Birmingham, Alabama, Lions have set up a warehouse staging area to collect and distribute donated goods, including emergency supplies


such as water and food. Twenty-seven Lions clubs in District 12- O, Tennessee are providing 200 families with prepared food boxes, needed medical supplies and eyeglasses.

"Lions from around the world have called me to hear how the local Lions are doing," said Lions International Director Yamandu Acosta, of Alabama. He has received calls from Australia, Spain and Peru, as well as others.



Lions, you know well that Lions Clubs greatest asset is our volunteers-you and 1.35 million Lions around the world. Wherever there is a need, there is a Lions club nearby, ready to respond with their hearts and hands. Your generosity in the case of disasters allows us to be the first to offer help.

Lions, I ask for your help in making the hope for a brighter tomorrow a reality for the people in these devastated areas. The most effective and immediate way to help is through a <u>designated donation to LCIF</u> for Southern United States relief.



I have seen some of the recent destruction first-hand in New Zealand, and next month Margit and I will be in Japan and Haiti to visit with Lions and view our relief efforts there. Lions, we can take great pride in our long history of providing relief for as long as it takes.

I hope I can count on you to once again give your full support to give help and hope in the Southern United States.

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Southern U.S. States Hit by Destructive Tornados

The southern half of the United States has experienced devastating tornado storms impacting thousands of people

and causing millions of dollars in damage. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is mobilizing US\$250,000 to assist Lions efforts in Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. The Foundation has also awarded US\$160,000 in 16 emergency grants to affected districts.

On April 27, more than 300 people were killed across 8 states in the deadliest tornado outbreak in United States history. The hardest hit state was Alabama with the worst damage occurring in the cities of Tuscaloosa, where the University of Alabama is located, and northern Birmingham. Tornado winds reached speeds of 200 mph and some of the tornados were a mile wide. Through this destruction, Lions have been there to help out community members and their fellow Lions with emergency relief assistance.

Local Lions have been active in responding to their communities' urgent needs. Past International Director Howard Jenkins and District Governor Ronald Kitchens from 30-M in Mississippi have driven the path of the tornado's destruction to survey the damage and have stated that power and electricity are down as well as most phone lines. "Lions from around the world have called me to hear how the local Lions are doing," said Lions International Director Yamandu Acosta, of Alabama. He has received calls from Australia, Spain and Peru as well as others.

Twenty-seven Lions clubs in District 12-O, Tennessee are providing 200 families with prepared food boxes. They hope to also provide needed medical supplies and eyeglasses. In Birmingham, Alabama, Lions have set up a warehouse staging area to collect and distribute donated goods. District governors, club presidents and Lions members will continue to be involved in the coming days and weeks helping communities with the recovery effort.

LCIF has established a designated fund for donations called the *Southern U.S. Storms Fund.* Donations can be sent to LCIF by check, wire or credit card. <u>Please visit the Donation</u> <u>page on the LCIF Web site for more information</u>.

Lion members are always present to serve their communities, even following disasters that have impacted their personal lives. Through the generosity of Lions from around the world, LCIF is there to support them during these challenging times. "I know that our district and the surrounding area has the support of 1.35 million Lion members through the work of our Foundation," said **District 18-E Governor Charles Smith from the state of Georgia.**

Additional updates will be provided as appropriate activities are coordinated by Lions within these affected communities.

INTENT TO LEVY AND COLLECT ADDITIONAL PER CAPITA TAX OF \$3.00

MD 18 CONSTITUTION—Article VI - SECTION 2— DISTRICT ADMINISTRATIVE FUND— (b) In addition to the Multiple District Annual per capita tax levied upon each Member of the Lions Clubs in the State by Article VI, Section 1, the individual Districts of this State are authorized and empowered to levy and to collect an additional per capita tax, up to, but not to exceed, Three Dollars (\$3.00) upon each member of the Lions Clubs in their respective Districts, subject to the following terms and conditions: (1) Notice of intention to levy and collect said additional per capita tax and notice of the maximum amount to be levied and collected must be forwarded to the Secretary and President of each Club in said District at least ten days prior to the date of the first Cabinet Meeting is to be held for said year. (2) Levy and collection of said tax, the exact amount thereof and the date on which the same shall be levied and collected shall be approved by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members of the District Governor's Cabinet present at the first meeting of said Cabinet for the year

We in our Lions Clubs begin a new year. Several clubs do not have the members they once enjoyed working with. Several have less than half. Many of us see our Clubs as <u>half-empty</u> and our remaining members nursing the dread that "we are about to fold."

The other option is available at the same time: The Club is <u>half-full</u>! Now we need to press on in encouraging current members to: *revisit* our objectives; *redefine* our purpose for being Lions; then we need a *revisioning* of serving opportunities and to *invite, with enthusiasm,* new persons to join with us to fill our Club with overflowing numbers. The bigger the task, with larger numbers, lightens the workload!

Let us shift our perspective making an honest assessment of the circumstances around us and how to use them effectively. Then we must seek to open new possibilities that can emerge during Lions year 2011-2012.

Protecting Our Environment

In April, Lions Clubs around the world took up the challenge of protecting our environment by organizing community-wide clean-ups, recycling, raising awareness about threats to the environment, and educating members of their communities on what they can do to make a difference.

In the fourth and final of this year's Global Service Action Campaigns, clubs in more than 60 countries have dedicated nearly 100,000 Lions service hours to more than 1,000 environmental projects. The campaign was scheduled in April to coincide with the worldwide observance of

Earth Day. In one Protecting the Environment project, the Meercedes Lions club in Texas, USA, refurbished and painted 10 trash containers and worked with city officials to place them in the Little League and Pony League parks in the City of Mercedes.

RETENTION IS NOT GONE!


The MERL Team Retention Chair will disappear at the end of this month, along with the entire MERL Team. However, this does not mean that retention concern is going to disappear. If you have been reading your District Bulletin, then you know that I have written several articles about retention. However, my major focus has been on providing Lion club leaders with actions their clubs should take to retain their members. Last year we lost a total of 1,051 Lions, which was a total of 15.8% of the members we had at the start of the year. I don't know how many Lions we will lose by the end of this year. However, our April monthly retention statistical comparison results, although just slightly better, still shows that we are losing lots of Lions. To date we have lost 832 Lions (12.5%) vs. the 867 Lions (13%) we had lost by the end of April last year. For a number of reasons, the retention of members continues to be a major membership problem! Accordingly, retention will still be one of the challenges clubs will be faced with next year and beyond. Indeed, you will see changes arrive at the start of our new year as each district begins to hear from the District Coordinators of your District Global Membership Team (GMT) and your District Global Leadership Team (GLT). Under Lions Clubs International's revised membership approach there will be different efforts to improve club membership. Hopefully the upcoming changes will be far more helpful in handling club membership and leadership requirements.



Funds collected for White Can Day totaled \$2,500.00 and was sent to the Georgia Lions Lighthouse. The club is helping **Relay for Life** by filling water bottles with silver coins. This project will be ongoing until August. Eve exams and eveglass purchases: The club voted to allocate another \$900.00 from unbudgeted funds for the purchase of new eyeglasses for people in Jackson County. Collection of used eveglasses: Collection during May totaled 17 eyeglasses 2 sunglasses and 7 cell phones. MEETINGS: Regular meeting May 9 with 26 members present plus 1 guest. Pete Black, from Habersham County, and with the Georgia Forestry Commission talked about wild-land fires (unplanned and free to respond to its environment) and prescribed fires (planned under specific weather conditions, confined to a predetermined area, and accomplishes the planned land management objectives). Wild-land fires have burned 50,500 acres in the last five years. Since 2004, 924 structures were lost to wild-land fires. Georgia has more state land than any other state, and 1.6 million acres are burned annually in prescribed fires. South Georgia and North Florida are the most fire active in the U.S. Prescribed fires reduce hazardous fuel buildup and improve wildlife habitat. Mr. Black showed several slides which illustrated good ways to protect a home from wild fires, such as using a rock wall or other firebreak, clearing out flammable brush and leaves, etc., using fireproof materials such as brick home and slate tile roof. He asked that Lions spread the word about ways a homeowner can safeguard his home from fire. 
As any grade schooler can tell you, reading, writing, and arithmetic are tough enough without having to squint at the chalkboard. As a single mother of three, April Jordan works hard to ensure that her children succeed in school—sitting them down every night to make sure that Jeremyah (8), Richard (9), and Joia (11) get their homework completed and checked.

All three children were doing well in school until 2010, when Jeremyah broke his glasses in gym class and Richard lost his pair. Unable to afford new glasses, April was forced to send her boys to class without proper eyewear. Try as he might, however, Jeremyah found it challenging to see the board and do work while trying to hold up his glasses. Richard, without any glasses at all, was having an even worse time making sense of his schoolwork. Though both boys were used to getting As in school, without glasses, their grades started to drop.

With Richard's Criterion Referenced Competency Tests (a standardized test for students throughout Georgia) on the way, April began to despair. She was finally referred to the Lighthouse through a Fulton County School counselor.

The entire Jordan family attended the Lighthouse's Chamblee clinic on February 24, 2011 to receive eye exams. Now that they are wearing their new glasses, the boys have been able to throw themselves back into schoolwork. After taking his CRCT exams last March, Richard passed with flying colors, scoring in the 98th percentile for his grade.

"The Lighthouse helped us just in time," says April. "Your organization really saved us. I want to give my boys the best as much as I can, and the Lighthouse made it possible for me to keep doing that. Thank you from the bottom of my heart."

About the Kapten PLUS

Leader Dogs for the Blind believes that everyone has the right to travel independently—to go here, there, everywhere they desire. But without the benefit of street signs or printed maps [*admit it; you still use them*] to help get them where they want to go, people who are blind often rely on others to help with directions.

The game changed when GPS became accessible to people without sight. Leader Dog jumped on the location technology bandwagon [*heck, we pushed the bandwagon*] by providing pedestrian GPS devices and training to our clients. But with big price tags of \$2,040 for 1st generation technology and \$925 for 2nd, these devices were out of reach for many people and the cost limited how many we could give to our clients for free. Smart phone GPS applications weren't an option for us due to limited accessibility and service fees that could easily run \$1,000 a year.

In our relentless pursuit of putting GPS in the hands of people who are blind, we're changing the game again with the Kapten PLUS. This device is 74% smaller than previous devices, is more user friendly, has voice recognition and comes with a smaller price tag of only \$295. It's the next step in the evolution of location technology.

The Kapten PLUS is changing lives

The Kapten PLUS is a powerful tool in the hands of a person who is blind. Following are just a few stories of how this GPS device is helping to change lives by enhancing travel independence.



Mytchiko (**Mi-chi-ko**) is a 20-year-old college sophomore who will receive her first Leader Dog in May 2011. She currently lives with her adoptive parents and several beloved pets in McComb, Miss. Maintaining a busy, productive lifestyle is important to Mytchiko. Not only is she a member of her college's marching band, she also participates in local beauty pageants and events sponsored by the McComb Lions Club. A Kapten Plus GPS unit will assist Mytchiko in her future goals of obtaining a dual PhD in social work and religious studies by helping her navigate college campuses and cityscapes. A Kapten Plus will also help Mytchiko provide rehabilitation training to wounded combat soldiers as an ordained military chaplain.

Jack is returning to Leader Dog's campus this May for his second guide dog. He received his first Leader Dog, Wheaties, in 2001. Since their graduation, Jack and Wheaties have traveled to 44 countries, 38 of the United States and logged over 300 airplane flights and 149 sea days. Jack is also a Lion and oversees Lions Club activities as Leader Dog Chair for District 35-I in Florida. A Kapten Plus GPS unit will ensure Jack reaches his goal of visiting all 50 United States and several more countries during future travel adventures. It will also keep him on track when attending Lions Club meetings and events.





Ruth Smith: "I can see me using the Kapten a lot because I travel a lot. I like to ask people for directions, but it's not always feasible. There are times when I've been dropped off at a Greyhound bus station and there is no one there to ask for directions. This is where a GPS can really help me. Also, everyone doesn't give good directions, which can make it especially hard to get around a new city. Most people in the South where I'm from are pointers when they give directions—the Kapten will save me from the pointers. By comparison, blind people give excellent directions like, 'Go five streets and in the middle of the block you'll find what you're looking for,' because we are used to having to count streets when we are going somewhere. However, there are times when I'm walking and talking with someone or when I am thinking about something that makes me lose count of the number of streets I have walked. The GPS will certainly help in that situation also."

If You Think You Want a Diabetic Alert Dog...



there are lots of things to consider! Wildrose Kennels believes that it is critical to take your D.A.D. with you everywhere. This means:

you will have to allow for more travel time everywhere you go. Your D.A.D. will need you to account for his/her time to load and unload, potty and get comfortable in your ever changing environment.

You will have extra bags to carry since your D.A.D. will have a harness, leash, food and/or water bowls as needed, "place" mats, etc. In addition, you need to consider a towel or blanket to dry your D.A.D. when it rains, wipes to clean off muddy paws, bags to collect any D.A.D. solid waste left behind, etc.

You will have to consider weather elements and accommodate your D.A.D.s tolerance for heat, cold, snow, ice, etc.

D.A.D.s alert as a result of their intrinsic desire to be working and rewarded. This means:

you can never stop recognizing the work they are doing. Every time your D.A.D. alerts, it is crucial that you reward and praise your D.A.D... whether you are in the middle of church, dinner, a baseball game, the swimming pool, a family reunion, work, facebook posting, phone call, sleep, etc.

No matter how tired you may be of going through the alert/reward routine, you can never miss an opportunity to reinforce everything your D.A.D. has learned!

In order for the D.A.D.-Handler relationship to really be established, you must learn to trust your D.A.D. This means:

more glucose testing... not less! You must remember that D.A.D.s tend to be predictive. For example, there are often times when Trevor is alerted and finds that his blood sugar is "normal." Yet, because he trusts his D.A.D., he knows to re-check in a certain time frame. 90% of the time, usually about 15-minutes later, his blood sugar will have dropped or risen significantly... as predicted by his D.A.D.

Don't think that having a D.A.D. will relieve you of your own responsibility to your own health.

Your D.A.D. is a service dog. You have to treat him as such -- and be prepared to help others who question you.

The majority of people find service dogs fascinating.

You will receive precious inquiries from those who truly seek to understand more about your D.A.D. While we think this is wonderful, it's not always convenient.

You will also receive curious stares, untimely questions, blunt rudeness and true ignorance (meaning a total lack of understanding). You will have to decide what the parameters of your response will be. You will also have to be prepared to defend your rights.

Your D.A.D. is a service dog. When you walk into a public place, you represent every service dog/handler team. You have to take that seriously. That means:

You cannot haul your stinky, dirty dog into a restaurant and insist that the manager seat you closest to the kitchen. Come on! Your D.A.D. has to be regularly bathed, brushed, trimmed, and presentable in every public setting.

Be prepared to be as flexible as you can and pick your battles! For example, when we are asked to sit on the patio - and it works for us - we agree! When a place is overly crowded and bringing our D.A.D. causes more stress for the staff - and our D.A.D. - we elect to go elsewhere.

Remember, your behavior, your dog and your attitude leave an impression. Do you want to cause pain and aggravation for the next family to walk into that store or restaurant with their service dog?

There is lots more to consider and hopefully these things will get you started with a list of questions to ask your trainer, breeder, or us!
