INTENT TO LEVY AND COLLECT ADDITIONAL PER CAPITA TAX OF \$3.00

MD 18 CONSTITUTION—Article VI - SECTION 2— DISTRICT ADMINISTRATIVE FUND— (b) In addition to the Multiple District Annual per capita tax levied upon each Member of the Lions Clubs in the State by Article VI, Section 1, the individual Districts of this State are authorized and empowered to levy and to collect an additional per capita tax, up to, but not to exceed, Three Dollars (\$3.00) upon each member of the Lions Clubs in their respective Districts, subject to the following terms and conditions: (1) Notice of intention to levy and collect said additional per capita tax and notice of the maximum amount to be levied and collected must be forwarded to the Secretary and President of each Club in said District at least ten days prior to the date of the first Cabinet Meeting is to be held for said year. (2) Levy and collection of said tax, the exact amount thereof and the date on which the same shall be levied and collected shall be approved by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members of the District Governor's Cabinet present at the first meeting of said Cabinet for the year.

As I was preparing my monthly message, tragedy struck the city of Moore, Oklahoma and its surrounding communities. The pictures and stories that followed have left me both saddened and inspired. We sympathize with the grieving families, and pledge our support to those within the community seeking to rebuild. To the clubs



and Lions in the affected area – your Foundation is there for you. In the coming days, I will have the opportunity to visit Oklahoma Lions. There, I will offer my support, and the continued support of LCIF.

The <u>response to the disaster</u> was immediate – by Lions and their neighbors. I was moved to see those who lost everything, lending a hand to help their friends, their neighbors, or even complete strangers. Lions members are part of that effort, and LCIF is there to support their relief and rebuilding efforts. International President Madden and I immediately approved a US\$100,000 Major Catastrophe Grant, made possible through the generosity of Lions financial support to the Disaster Relief fund. This will be a start, but certainly not an end.

The disaster in Oklahoma and outpouring of support from our worldwide Lions' family, reminds me why I first began to support LCIF more than 32 years ago. LCIF & Lions Responding To Oklahoma Destruction



As many of you are aware, a deadly tornado touched down near Oklahoma City yesterday afternoon killing more than 20 people, including 7 children, and injuring hundreds. The storm ravaged the suburb of Moore, Oklahoma with 200 mph winds destroying the Plaza Towers Elementary School, a hospital and many homes. The storm system has impacted towns and cities not only in Oklahoma but also in Iowa and Kansas, trapping people in shelters and rubble.

Without delay, Lions Clubs International Foundation responded, helping local Lions with a major catastrophe grant of US\$100,000 from the disaster relief fund to assist with recovery and long term reconstruction. As always, local Lions are assisting their family, friends and neighbors with immediate care and attention, but they need your help.

Dear Lion,

Throughout the year I've drawn analogies to sports in my speeches and messages. Consider this – many baseball games are won with 2 outs in the 9th inning, there have been a number of World Cup soccer matches decided in extra time, and yes – many auto races are decided during the last lap of the race.

We are quickly approaching the end of the year, our "last lap" of the race. By now you have held all of your pit stops, you have hopefully done your community needs assessments, participated in the Reading Action Program and Global Service Action Campaigns, attended or soon will attend your district and multiple district conventions, and completed your qualifications for the Club Excellence Award or District Governor Team Excellence Award. In short, you have completed the necessary steps that should ensure a successful year.

But if history is an indication, we know that much can happen in the last two months of the year. June is particularly significant with regard to adding new members and new clubs as well as keeping members. Here is the reason:

23% of new clubs are chartered in May/June 18% of total adds occur in May/June BUT – 30% of drops occur in May/June

The above statistics are an average over the past three years of comparative data. But clearly, the percentages cited paint a clear picture that the months of May and June are crucial to whether or not we have a strong finish to our year-long race.

With that in mind, and considering the above quote from Yogi Berra, we still have work to do.

Club presidents – have you surveyed your members? Have you engaged your new members? Member satisfaction is all-important to the overall health of a club. It determines whether a member stays, or a member leaves. The new Membership Satisfaction Guide is a valuable resource all clubs should consult on a regular basis.

Take another look at the requirements for the <u>Club Excellence Award</u>— specifically the membership requirement club achieved a net growth in membership (including branch club members when applicable) or sponsored a new club..." Remember — you must achieve all requirements. Have you fulfilled the service requirement? There is still time to engage in a community project, like the Reading Action Program.

Reading Action Program

For nearly 100 years, Lions have greatly contributed to preventing blindness, restoring eyesight, and improving eye care for hundreds of millions of people worldwide. The Reading Action Program allows Lions to provide additional assistance to individuals with visual impairments, particularly by focusing on **Braille literacy** and access to assistive technology. Quick Ideas to Increase Motivation

Increase Involvement

Share your Enthusiasm - Attitude is infectious. How you feel about making positive changes to –your club will affect how members respond. Be upbeat and enthusiastic your members will be motivated to support your efforts.

Have an Informal Gathering - Invite ne\\-members to meet with club officers in a casual, non-club setting. This will help them become acquainted informally' with the leadership team where they can ask questions..

Share Praise Freely – Important to all members and especially new members, is positive reinforcement for a job done well. Often, simple acknowledgement are best- a special thank you during a club or committee meeting, a personal note of thanks, a word of-encouragement. Consider creating a "Kudos" column in your newsletter or Web site to list those members who have done their jobs well, made great suggestion, or gone above and beyond the call of duty.

Emphasize Social Involvement - You want to involve members in your club socially as well as through activities. Socialize with members during and outside of meetings. Share happy occasions – birthdays, anniversaries, a special achievement or the achievement of a spouse or child. The club newsletter and Web site are great places to list these special occasions.

Communicate Constantly - Open communication is vitally important to the success of your club. It creates a comfortable, productive environment that will motivate members to do their best. It creates a comfortable, productive environment that will motivate members to do their best. Encouraging input from members and using your club meetings, newsletter and Web site to communicate club happenings will help you with this task.

Club Dynamics

Attendance Cues - Paying careful attention to attendance trends can help uncover retention problems. .Not attending meetings is one of the first signs of lack of member interest. Confer with your secretary and get a list of members who are "slipping." If they have missed three meetings or more in a row, call them to find out why. Personally calling them will show that you care about them.

Retention is for All Member - While making sure new members feel welcomed, involved and comfortable, it is important to remember long-term members. As people belong to an organization for a longer period of time, their goals and needs may change. Let long-time members know that their continued membership is important by periodically asking them if they are still satisfied with the club.

Scramble Seating Arrangements - Changes eating arrangements at meetings from time to time to allow all members to become better acquainted.

New Members Make Great Greeters - Have new members serve as greeters for club functions for the first several weeks of their membership. It's a great way for them to meet all club members.

Make it Fun - Have some fun while encouraging embers to mix with their fellow members. Before a club meeting begins, select a member to be the "Secret Lion." In a clique-free club everyone mingles freely and will eventually meet the Secret Lion. As the meeting nears a close, you ask the Secret Lion to identify those members who never made contact, and encourage the Tail Twister to humorously levy a fine. Done with a light touch the Secret Lion method gets the "nocliques" message across.

Think Positively - When considering any changes to your club, keep a positive attitude. Your club might be steeped in tradition and used to doing things a certain way, but that doesn't mean you shouldn't try something new. Today's "experiment" could be tomorrow's" new tradition.

Mix it Up - Keep yow club meetings fresh by trying something new every once in awhile. Consider having people change where they sit every few meetings to encourage camaraderie with new people add a new quick agenda item to boost morale (such as suggestion of the month or recognizing a member who went beyond the call of duty) or change the order of your agenda items (make sure everyone involved knows if you do this so they will be prepared!)

Change Meeting Places- By changing locations you will also give a new perspective to the meeting. Possible venues include different restaurants, parks, hotels etc.

Give Ownership - Allow members to lead the activities. This will make the members feel needed and increase their motivation to do more in the club.

Our guest speaker was Mr. Frank Riley, Jr., Executive Director with the Chestatee/Chattahoochee RC&D (Resource Conservation & Development) in Demorest, Georgia. Riley's topic for the night was the Fire Adaptive Communities (FAC) Pilot Project. According to Riley, our RC&D is one of only eight locations selected to participate in this pilot program. Riley also stated that the Fire Wise program the RC&D has developed in Towns County is the leading Fire Wise Communities program in the state with six certified communities and "earned for us the opportunity to be a part of this elite eight pilot program." FAC encompasses Fire Wise, Ready-Set-Go and other fire education programs.

"Fire Adapted Communities are communities with people, structures and landscaping that are prepared to withstand the effects of wildfires," Riley said. "A Fire Adapted Community is one where the population understands the threat posed by wildfires and takes the personal actions necessary to help minimize the risk. Ideally, a Fire Adaptive Community is one that can stand on its own, with no intervention from the fire service, against a wildfire. Achieving Fire Adapted Communities is an approach that concentrates on plans and activities that reduce risk before a wildfire occurs."

Developing a Fire Adaptive Community requires a coordinated effort by many entities and programs. It includes preventive education of the public, development of a community protection plan, creating fuel buffers, developing codes and ordinances, initiating cooperative fire agreements between fire officials and agencies, forest management, establishing an internal safety zone, implementing a Fire-Wise communities, using the Ready, Set, Go program, and accessing local capacity for these efforts. Riley said that all of the above would be looked at this coming year as part of this pilot project. The result will be safer communities for all of Towns County.

In closing, President Payne stated that our next meeting will be on June 11, 2013 and our guest speaker will be from the Leader Dog program.

We will be serving sausage biscuits, hotdogs, hamburgers, fried baloney sandwiches, and cheese straws. *Membership: Programs:* 9 May - Lion Paul Clark introduced our guest speaker – LaDale Trimble who presented the club with a \$100 donation. Ms. Trimble is with Bat Conservation International and presented a very interesting program on bats. She discussed and dispelled many myths about bats. There are 1200 bat species worldwide. Of the 1200, 900 are insect eaters. The remaining species are plant and nectar feeders. Of the 47 species in the US, all but 3 are insect eaters. A single bat can eat 600-1000 mosquito sized insects in an hour. Annually, bats provide 23 Billion dollars worth of insect reduction to agriculture. They also provide 1/3 of the pollination for plants like guavas, bananas, papayas, cacao, and cacti. Bats also are important seed dispersers. Ms. Trimble then discussed the many threats to bats. The most serious is white-nosed syndrome which is a fungus that was first discovered in NY in 2006. Since then it has killed 5-6 million bats. Another threat is windmills which kill 750,000 bats annually. Bats are also eaten for food in some parts of the world. 23 May - Lion Mildred Thompson introduced our guest speaker - Sandy Nicolette, the Chairman of the Community Council at The Georgia Mountain Research and Education Center. The Community Council serves Cherokee and Clay Counties, NC and Fannin, Towns, and Union County, Georgia. Activities include Children's Educational Programs, Adult Outreach Seminars and Tours, and Preservation Projects such as a native plant garden.

Improved the continuity of care for our dogs by changing our dog care team scheduling from location-based to dog-based so the dogs are cared for by the same people throughout the entire training process. We also enhanced our canine support program to allow our volunteers to have increased interaction with our dogs when they are being introduced to the kennel and throughout their formal training.

Established In-For-Training standards for all puppies in our puppy raising program. The standards help our puppy raisers raise their puppies to achieve behaviors expected when they return to Leader Dog for training. The data collected will also help us correlate the puppy's behavior upon return with graduation success.

Implemented a Voice of the Client program to track client satisfaction and provide feedback for continuous quality improvement. Also improved the follow-up services we provide to clients in their home environment by utilizing qualified guide dog mobility instructors who are contractors, allowing us to improve our response time when a client contacts us needing assistance.

Began using a new model for scheduling Accelerated Mobility Program clients that allows us to service more clients without adding staff.

Procured a donation of dog food from Purina to support the puppies being raised in our Iowa prison program. Purina even delivers the food for free!

Learning Ally in the Classroom: Audiobooks Help Students Succeed

Educators and Students describe the impact of Learning Ally.

Len Byron (Reading Teacher, Woodlynde School):

"Learning Ally helps a child who, in a room full of other students that are opening the book, and reading very quietly, helps them feel a part of a reading community. And then they learn to enjoy books! And then they start to make the imagery and the images in their minds and that's really what reading's all about. "

Jill Dougherty (Upper School Principal, Woodlynde School): "Learning Ally allows student access to information, access to books, access to the world around them, access to success."

Matt (student with learning differences): "Before Learning Ally I had a lot of trouble following along with the books in class, sometimes they might be going too fast, too slow, I might read ahead and get a little bit antsy. With Learning Ally I can control my pace, and how fast I want to read, how much I want to read; it really did make a big difference in my life."

Hannah (student with dyslexia): "I remember going home and crying for hours because I thought I was stupid because I couldn't read at the same level as everybody else, even though I was just as smart as they were. After I started using Learning Ally, it became so much easier. I could move up levels in reading. I went from being in the lowest reading group in 6th grade to being in honors English going into AP. That's a great feeling to be able to accomplish something like that, given the tools. And that's what Learning Ally has given me, is a chance to succeed."

Gretchen Schroeder (Librarian, Woodlynde School): "The kids are loving the fact that this can be in their back pocket, that it can be on their phone, it can be on their iPod Touch, that it can travel with them; that they can order it directly from their device. And so it's incredibly user friendly for them."

Jill Dougherty: "Learning Ally is one of those things that really honors what a kid is able to understand, what a child is able to learn, and when you honor that learning, you make it rewarding. And when you make learning rewarding, you motivate a child. And when a child is motivated, and a teacher will tell you, they can learn anything."

Trained Facility Dog Visits Victims Injured in Boston Bombings

Boston, MA - Last week, Laurie and Wena were invited by Boston Medical Center officials to visit the hospital's Trauma Unit, and meet patients and their families recovering from the recent Boston tragedy. Laurie Myers, head of a non-profit victims advocacy group was accompanied by her specially trained four-legged partner, Wena, a 3-year-old black lab and golden retriever cross. They've been a team since 2011 when Laurie applied for a facility dog from Canine Companions for Independence, the nation's largest non-profit providers of assistance dogs to children and adults with disabilities.

One of the first she met was a six-year-old boy who had just been removed from a life-saving ventilator the day before. The young boy told Laurie how much he missed his dog, and loved every minute he spent with Wena. Laurie also met with a husband and wife who both lost legs in the bombing. The couple had their own black lab, and said they were thrilled by the visit. Laurie met with 3 other victims and their families, leaving them literature about how to apply for their own assistance dog with Canine Companions once their medical condition allows it.

Since November of 2011, Wena's job had been to be at the side of an abused child or violent crime victim when they are giving recorded interviews that will be used in court.

Wena graduated from Canine Companions after completing Team Training, an extensive training session at Canine Companions' Northeast Regional



Center in Medford, NY. During Team Training, Laurie learned all of Wena's 40-plus commands and how to properly care for her. Team Training is an essential part of the program because it gives the recipient an opportunity to learn how to work with and benefit from an assistance dog. The process consists of daily lectures, exams, practice, and public outings.

Thanks to generous supporters, Canine Companions assistance dogs are provided free of charge to children, adults and military veterans with disabilities, creating life-changing transformation and independence.

Summer Time Changes Every Day Routine Wittmann, AZ

The summer is a fun and exciting time. Kids are on break from school and families are taking vacations together. I love this time of year, but it's also the time of year that makes me a little nervous.

My 5 year old son, Caleb, was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes when he was 3 years old. As a teacher, summer time means a change in our every day routine and this change can be dangerous for kids with diabetes. At my house, kids sleep later, eat meals later, have different activities and have a tendency to snack much of the day.

All these changes can affect Caleb's blood glucose levels.

During the summer, my husband and I become even more aware of Caleb's diabetes. I find myself being extra diligent about keeping track of his more frequent snacks and accounting for it with insulin



I also make sure he's drinking enough water and staying hydrated, especially when he's running around outside.

My husband and I are also more aware of potential lows after a full day of outdoor activities. I've noticed, especially with swimming, that Caleb doesn't seem to wear out until he gets out of the pool and that's when his blood glucose starts to drop. I make sure I have a snack ready for him as soon as he gets out of the pool to avoid any severe lows. We also keep tabs on his blood glucose later that day, in case it starts to drop as well.

We try to stick to a fairly well balanced diet but the hot months always seem to bring about more occasions for eating out and splurging. I am grateful for the different snacks that now contain sugar alternatives and give Caleb more options.

Traveling also seems to affect Caleb's blood glucose levels – probably from all the excitement. We always let our doctor know when we plan to travel so she can help us anticipate any changes in Caleb's diabetes management.

It seems that every season affects Caleb's blood glucose in some way. We need to stay more aware of how the day's activities affect blood glucose, but Caleb has so much fun during the summer and I just love this time of year.

Away from Home



Diabetes should not prevent your child from enjoying family vacations, slumber parties, or trips to Grandma's house. But there are important ways to prepare, especially if your child is not going to be in your care.

Diabetes should not prevent your child from enjoying family vacations, slumber parties, or trips to Grandma's house. But there are important ways to prepare, especially if your child is not going to be in your care.

Plan Ahead

If your child will be away from home for an extended trip, it's a good idea to go to your doctor to get a check-up and be sure to ask for:

- Written prescriptions for insulin and any medication. Then, if the travel supplies are lost or damaged you are only a pharmacy visit away from replacements.
- A doctor's letter describing everything needed for treatment, including medical devices. It should also note any food or medicine allergies or sensitivities.

If your child will be going away without you, always make sure an adult is around who knows how to help with daily management of diabetes (BG checks, insulin shots, etc.), as well as when high or low blood glucose (BG) levels occur. Spend some time with the adult helping them to understand your child's unique signs of a high or low BG. Then demonstrate how to:

- Check BGs
- Count carbs or stick with the food plan
- Measure and give insulin
- Treat highs and lows
- Respond to an emergency especially when it requires glucagon
- Help the adult caring for your child to know what your child can eat and how that relates to his diabetes care. If possible, create a menu with your child and the adult in charge so that you all can agree on meals, snacks and insulin doses ahead of time.

Start Packing

Be sure to pack twice the amount of diabetes supplies that you think your child will need. Your packing list should include:

- Insulin
- Syringes
- BG testing supplies
- Pump and/or continuous glucose monitor (CGM) supplies
- Ketone testing strips
- Glucagon
- Glucose tablets or fast-acting sugar to treat low BG
- A medical ID card (your child should always wear a medical ID bracelet)
- Day and night phone numbers for your D-team
- All your contact numbers
- Batteries
- Snacks like peanut butter and crackers
- First aid kit
- Anti-diarrhea pills
- Anti-nausea drug

The International Club Twinning Program is a voluntary and mutual agreement between clubs in different countries. Lions and Leos can participate; however, twinning must occur between like clubs (i.e., Lions with Lions, Leos with Leos). Twinning provides an opportunity to learn about another club and its culture. International Friendships

Members of international organizations often develop international friendships. This is certainly true of Lions and Leos who attend international forums or conventions. After an initial meeting, Lions or Leos often continue their friendship through long-distance correspondence. After many months or years, the two clubs may decide to formalize their friendship as international club twins. At this time, the two clubs may decide to sign the International Club Twinning Recognition Application and become club twins. Often, the clubs organize a formal signing ceremony to celebrate the official club twinning relationship.

- Include your club in the <u>club twinning list</u>

Club Twinning Guidelines

Twinning provides Lions and Leos the opportunity to learn about another club and its culture. Twinning is not to be initiated to persuade others to adopt one's ways nor is it to be entered into for financial or material assistance.

Selection of a Club Twin =

The selection of a club twin varies from club-to-club. Twinnings can occur:

- As a result of friendships that develop when club members from different countries meet at international forums or conventions
- As a result of searching the <u>Lions Clubs</u> or <u>Leo Clubs</u> twinning lists
- As a result of searching the <u>Club Locator</u>
- After assistance from a Lions international relations (or international understanding and cooperation) chairperson

In the last instance, a club international relations (IR) chairperson contacts the district IR chairperson for twinning suggestions. The district IR chairperson contacts the district governor to see if there is an active district twinning program.

If the district does not participate in a district twinning program, the club can search the twinning list, the Club Locator, or accept a suggestion from the IR chairperson. When selecting a club twin, consider similarities in history, culture, and language. Most club twins do not experience a serious language problem. If a translator is needed, request assistance from club members, their families and acquaintances or students/teachers of language. Or use a third language which is understood by members of both clubs.

Developing a Twinning Relationship =

Initial correspondence should include:

- Interest in becoming a twin
- Details about club members
- Club activities
- The community
- Local customs

Upon acceptance of the club twinning invitation, the local club IR chairperson notifies the district IR chairperson. The file is then closed at the district level. The two clubs continue their friendship through the exchange of:

- Club and district bulletins
- Pins and banners
- Magazines, periodicals, newspapers, books
- Photographs
- Music
- Other items that foster mutual friendship and understanding

Some clubs exchange membership rosters to enable members and their families to correspond. In some instances, school children correspond with school children in the area of the twin club. Another consideration is the organization of a joint service project possibly on behalf of a third country. This is a voluntary and mutual endeavor. Each club should contribute.

Twinning Recognition

After clubs have become friends (this usually takes at least a year), they can apply for an International Club Twinning Banner Patch Award. Clubs that enter into additional twinning relationships within the fiscal year receive a letter of congratulations. Clubs can only receive one twinning award per fiscal year.

- The Club Twinning Award indicates participation in the International Club Twinning Program. The club does not receive annual recognition for twinning. It is expected that the twinning will continue.
- A club is eligible to receive another International Club Twinning Recognition only if it enters into a new twinning during a different fiscal year.
