




Fellow Lions,










Dear Lion,

LCIF and Carter Center Continue Partnership Fighting Trachoma and River Blindness



"For 20 years, the partnership with Lions Clubs International Foundation has been instrumental in supporting the Carter Center's leadership in the fight against neglected diseases," said President Carter. "The Lions' continued financial support will help The Carter Center, local Lions clubs, and other national partners defeat preventable blindness in some of the worst affected communities in the world."



As a part of this expanded partnership, local Lions clubs will help mobilize impacted communities to participate in mass drug administration, eyelid surgery campaigns, health education, and latrine construction. Lions will also serve as community advocates by working with local leaders to increase participation in activities related to river blindness and trachoma in their communities. Since 1994, Lions Clubs International Foundation has awarded US\$42 million in grants to The Carter Center.

The past few weeks have been very exciting for LCIF! We achieved several milestones through our partnerships in vision and health that will help millions of people.

Just last week, I had the opportunity to meet with former United States President and Lion Jimmy Carter at The Carter Center's headquarters. And, I am happy to announce the <u>expansion of the Lions-Carter Center SightFirst Initiative</u> to prevent blindness and save sight. LCIF expressed its intent to provide more than US\$8 million over a three-year period to continue focusing on blinding trachoma and onchocerciasis where the needs are greatest. Lions are also making great strides against another disease – measles – thanks to you. We challenged Lions to raise US\$1 million as part of our 30-day challenge in April for measles, and you surpassed it! Donations totaled US\$870,000 and will be matched with \$500,000 from Abhey and Past District Governor Aruna Oswal. I was so pleased to inform the Oswal family that LCIF has surpassed the goal and that with their support, US\$1.3 million will be given to secure life-saving vaccinations. Now, many more parents will not have to worry about losing a child to measles, like so many others have.



These contributions will be able to help even more people through our partnership with the GAVI Alliance. When we pledged to raise US\$30 million for measles through the GAVI Alliance by 2017, GAVI agreed to double LCIF's donations through its matching fund. That means that the US\$1.3 million raised in April through LCIF for measles will be doubled to total more than US\$2.6 million! What a great accomplishment in such a short period of time.

It is through Lions like you and partners like The Carter Center and the GAVI Alliance that our service efforts are enhanced around the world. When we work together, we can help more people than ever before.

Helping Students Succeed with Sight for Kids

In India, Dr. K. S. Chandrakanth is making a difference for students, and it's not just because he is a Lion. He has been saving children's sight for six years through <u>Sight for Kids</u> in Lions District 318-E.



As Chairman and Chief Consultant at Malabar Eye Hospital in Calicut,

Dr. Chandrakanth knows that vision is important for students; "Sight for Kids helps students in their education, studies, and future professions, allowing for good future employment," said Dr. Chandrakanth. "Sight for Kids is a great service and I feel proud to be part of it as a Lions doctor."

LCIF and Johnson & Johnson Vision Care's Sight for Kids program provides much needed eye-health education and school-based vision screenings for underserved children across Asia. The program also provides referrals to eye care professionals for eyeglasses and surgery. More than 19 million students have received vision screenings throughout Asia through Sight for Kids.

INTENT TO LEVY AND COLLECT ADDITIONAL PER CAPITA TAX OF \$3.00

MD 18 CONSTITUTION—Article VI -SECTION 2—DISTRICT ADMINISTRATIVE FUND— (b) In addition to the Multiple District Annual per capita tax

levied upon each Member of the Lions Clubs in the State by Article VI, Section 1, the individual Districts of this State are authorized and empowered to levy and to collect an additional per capita tax, up to, but not to exceed, Three Dollars (\$3.00) upon each member of the Lions Clubs in their respective Districts, subject to the following terms and conditions: (1) Notice of intention to levy and collect said additional per capita tax and notice of the maximum amount to be levied and collected must be forwarded to the Secretary and President of each Club in said District at least ten days prior to the date of the first Cabinet Meeting is to be held for said year. (2) Levy and collection of said tax, the exact amount thereof and the date on which the same shall be levied and collected shall be approved by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members of the District Governor's Cabinet present at the first meeting of said Cabinet for the year

Pass the Baton – Create Your Lions Leadership Legacy

As we near the end of another Lions year, our tendency may be to think "short term". Our focus is on achieving this year's goals by the end of June, making this term of office a success, earning awards by the established deadlines – all critically important to our future as the leading organization providing needed humanitarian service around the world. But as a leader, while we continue to pursue our 2013-2014 goals, we must not lose sight of the "long term".

The start of Lions year 2014-2015 marks the beginning of a new term of office for the GLT and GMT new district governor teams will be in place, and new club officers assume responsibility for leading our clubs. The challenge for Lions leaders is embrace the opportunities presented by this leadership transition. Passing the baton of Lions leadership takes careful thought, effort and focused action. Succession planning is too important to leave to chance. Consider the following:

1. Focus on competency, not commonality - Often, there is a tendency to seek a successor who is *just like them*. While this might be a very natural thing to do, there is an inherent danger in doing so. It can result in leadership cultures that are closed and resistant to change. The diversity of our association is one of the many aspects of our association that makes it so great. Take care not to overlook potential leaders because they are dissimilar to what has gone before. Instead, embrace their fresh perspectives and encourage their new ideas.

2. Pass on the 'how', but also, the 'why' - Research has found the key difference between organizations that thrive long term and those that don't has little to do with charismatic leadership, strategic plans or an inspiring vision statement. Rather, the most significant factor in determining vitality in organizations is a consistent commitment to core values and purpose coupled with an active willingness to change approaches as needed. Many succession plans tend to focus almost exclusively on *how* things have been done in the past and *what* needs to happen to ensure the success of yesterday is repeated tomorrow. If a leader is to successfully transition to the next generation of leadership, the focus must be on the *why* more than the *how*. It is critically important to preserve the values and objectives that have led to success in the past but then empower your successors to change the 'how' as circumstances, needs and opportunities evolve.

3. Start NOW (if you haven't already started)! - Planning for leadership succession is something you cannot set in motion too early, but take care not to start too late! The most significant things to pass on

during the succession process are the intangibles. In addition to the nuts and bolts of the leadership position, it is often the mentoring, modeling and networking that the successor is exposed to as the baton is passed that is the most valuable. These lessons and insights happen over time – consider this a long term investment in Lions leadership.

4. Embrace your new role – don't be reluctant to let go - Passing the leadership baton can be a difficult process for many leaders. A reluctance to let go can be a natural thing for an outgoing leader, but it can also be damaging to the organization. As an experienced Lions leader, you are extremely valuable to our organization – don't let your skills and passion for leadership go to waste. Choose how you will continue to use your knowledge, skills and energy to enhance our service, to build our association, to encourage new leaders and to contribute to a bright future for LCI.

Remember, your real impact as a Lions leader will be measured not only by what you did during your tenure in a specific leadership position, but rather by what you enabled and empowered the next generation of Lions leaders to do. Passing the leadership baton can be challenging, but it can also represent the greatest opportunity to create your legacy as a Lions leader.

Dear Lion,



Our servicemen and women sacrifice so much for our country. On Memorial Day, we come togetner as a nation to remember and honor those who lost their lives while serving.

U.S. veterans serve our country with pride and distinction, and their contributions continue long after their military service ends. The *Involve a U.S. Veteran* program recognizes the contributions of veterans and their value to our communities and local Lions clubs. The program waives the charter or entrance fee for any qualifying veteran who joins a new or existing Lions club between July 1st, 2013 and June 30th, 2015. This special pilot program is offered only in the United States.

Eligible veterans include retired U.S. military personnel or honorably-discharged members of the Air Force, Army, Coast Guard Services, Marines, National Guard, Navy or Reserves. Those currently serving in the National Guard or Reserves are also eligible. Lions Clubs International will provide an entrance fee waiver of \$25 (\$30 for charter members) to the first 5,000 qualified U.S. veterans that join a local Lions club.

Hundreds of U.S. veterans have taken advantage of this special program, including Robert Aguilar, Jr., a former marine who recently became a Lion in California. <u>Read more about Robert's story</u>.

Like many other young men and women, Robert Aguilar, Jr. became a U.S. Marine because he wanted to serve his country. "I've always had a sense of duty and a desire to serve," said Aguilar.

Now that Robert has left the military, he's found a new way to serve – as a Lion. When Robert was invited to join the Seal Beach Lions Club in Seal Beach, California, he saw it as an opportunity to do some good in the community. "What I really appreciate about Lions is being around so many people who are active in the community and who like to have a good time," said Aguilar. "When there's a sign-up sheet, everyone raises their hands. Everyone is eager to help. I've been in situations where you have to beg people to help, but not here."



Robert has seen the can-do attitude of his fellow Lions. Recently, the Seal Beach Lions Club was hosting a car-show fundraiser when strong winds knocked down their booth in the middle of the night, but Lions quickly responded by rebuilding it before dawn to make sure the event was a success.



Although Robert hasn't been a Lion for long, he has seen enough to know that he's found the right place for himself, and for other veterans who want to get involved in their community.

"I think Lions is a great fit for veterans who have a sense of duty and a desire to serve. It's not only a humanitarian group, it's a social group," said Aguilar. "I would recommend Lions clubs to any veterans who want to be part of something special when they return home."

In January I got a chance to visit my home in the Philippines. One of my must sees was the Lions Head that leads to Baguio City. This is probably most memorable attraction that I went to since the Lions Club is so very dear to my heart. The **Lion's Head** is a famous attraction along Kennon Road, a major highway in Luzon, Philippines that leads to Baguio City. Located in Camp 6, the Lion's Head measures 40 feet in height. It was conceptualized by the Lions Club members of Baguio City, during the term of Luis Lardizabal as mayor of Baguio City from 1969 to 1970 and as the club's president, to become the club's symbol or imprint in the area. Prior to the artistic sculpting, the limestone was prepared by a group of engineers and miners, then the "actual artistic carving of the façade" was rendered by Reynaldo Lopez Nanyac, an Ifugao artist and woodcarver from the Cordillera Administrative Region. The construction project began in 1968 but was interrupted. The project was continued in 1971 by another Lions Club president, Robert Webber, and was unveiled in 1972.

Also, kudos were given to new member Linda Scofield for bringing a new member to the club.



As Chairman of the Fundraising Committee for the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind, I would like to inform you of the Committee's decision to encourage each District to hold a District wide Fundraiser to benefit the Camp. Because it was already in place, Lion Brian Donegan, & I chose to continue the Gwinnett Braves/Lions Baseball Fundraiser. This will be the 4th year for this event and I am happy to report that each year it has grown. In the three previous years, we have sold an average of 206 tickets. The cost of the tickets is \$8 ea and for each ticket sold over 200, \$3 stays with the Club that sold the tickets, to be sent to the Camp after the Game. That comes out to about \$619 for each of those three years. Every Club that sold tickets would send the revenue from the game to the Camp as per their share.

That's not bad, but it is not where we feel it should be, or where we can be. We now have a much larger District with 57 Lions Clubs. Our goal is to have every Lions Club in District I be a part of this fundraiser. Our goal is to also sell 500 tickets, and if we can, the Camp will realize an additional \$1,500. It is a great time to be a Lion and a great time to come together in support of the Camp. The kicker is that tickets don't have to be sold just to Lions. Wouldn't it be great for each Lion to sell tickets to not only their members, their families, but to friends and co workers as well? Canine Development Center Project Campaign Update

Leader Dogs for the Blind is celebrating 75 years of empowering more than 14,500 individuals who are blind or visually impaired with the tools and skills needed to live, work and travel safely and independently. It was the vision and support of Lions that began and continues to support this service and we thank you.

The current kennel environment has served us well for many years, but as we look toward the future, we are now creating an environment that optimizes our dogs' experience at all stages of our training program through a needed building redesign project to create a modern Canine Development Center. With continued work on the plans and with final approvals soon in place, we look forward to a ground breaking ceremony on August 4. Transition plans are in place to ensure that our work continues as seamlessly as possible during the renovation/construction phase.

The overall cost of this project is estimated to be \$14.5 million and fundraising is already underway toward this goal. Leader Dogs for the Blind will approach many friends to help to ensure the success of this campaign. Lions have long been champions and long-time friends of Leader Dog. Thank You. You make our work possible. Your involvement and support of the campaign for the Canine Development Center is important to making it a reality.



Frequently Asked Questions

What breeds are used as Leader Dogs?

Leader Dogs are Labrador retrievers, golden retrievers, German shepherds or Labrador/golden crosses.

Where does Leader Dog get their dogs?

A majority of dogs are from our own breeding colony. On occasion, we receive dogs from other service dog organizations.

How are the dogs trained?

Leader Dogs are educated in the same way as many pets—with lots of repetition and positive reinforcement. For the first year, they grow up in homes with <u>volunteer puppy raisers</u>. The raisers teach them basic obedience and expose them to the world. Leader Dogs then participate in four months of formal harness training with a professional guide dog mobility instructor (GDMI). During this time, they learn guide dog skills such as stopping at curbs, avoiding obstacles and finding doors.

Do you use clicker training with your dogs?

Yes. Clicker training is a form of operant conditioning using positive reinforcement. Using a small handheld clicker device, a GDMI "marks" with a "click" when the dog performs a desired behavior and follows with a reinforcer (such as a treat). Over time the use of the reinforcer (treat) is reduced and the "click" becomes the reinforcer.

Who can get a Leader Dog?

Leader Dog recipients must be at least 16 years old, legally blind, physically and emotionally capable of caring for a dog and must agree to use the dog in the intended manner. Leader Dog recipients must have demonstrated safe traveling skills.

How does someone get a Leader Dog?

Prospective clients complete an application, submit medical and physical exam forms, and supply personal references. They also send us a 10–15 minute video of themselves walking in their home area, demonstrating independent travel and the ability to safely navigate lighted intersections and street crossings. This video is important not only because it lets us know if a prospective client's orientation and mobility skills are advanced enough to work successfully with a guide dog, but also because it allows our instructors to begin the matching process of selecting a dog with the right size, gait, experiences and temperament for each client.

Do you only train dogs for people who are blind?

Yes. Leader Dog recipients must be legally blind to be considered to receive a dog. We also have <u>a program</u> for people who are deaf and blind.

Is there a charge for the services?

There is no charge for any of our programs and services, including the guide dog, equipment, training, transportation to and from our school, and room and board for 26 days.

How does a dog know when to cross the street?

Leader Dogs don't know when to cross the street. They wait until their handler gives them the command to go forward. Then the dog decides whether or not it is truly safe to cross. If the Leader Dog doesn't see any approaching traffic, it will cross the street and stop at the curb. Then the dog's handler will tell it again which way to proceed.

How does a dog know where to go?

Leader Dogs rely on their handlers to know how to get to destinations. Sometimes when a team has frequently walked to a certain destination, the dog will remember the route.

What happens when a Leader Dog gets too old to continue working?

When a Leader Dog is no longer able to work in a safe and responsible fashion, it is time to for it to "retire." Some people will choose to keep the dog in their home as a pet, while others will place their dog with family or friends.

Can people take their Leader Dogs anywhere?

Any public place is accessible by a guide dog team. There are federal access laws that protect a guide dog handler and his or her canine partner from discrimination.

How do you become a Leader Dog instructor?

A three-year apprentice program at Leader Dogs for the Blind is required to become a guide dog mobility instructor (GDMI). During this time, apprentices attend in-class lectures and receive hands-on training alongside a seasoned GDMI. Learn more about <u>how to become an instructor</u> at Leader Dog.

To the person who grows up without hearing a thing, From an alarm clock, to a fire drill, to a telephone ring, A dog can alert them to all of these sounds, And a dog can hear better than anyone around.

And to the child who grew up in a chair, Dependent on parents who won't always be there. A dog is a chance to strike out on their own, Without the fear that they will ever be alone.

So when people ask how we can give our dog away, After we love and bond with them day after day. I just smile and tell them after much thought, The question is not how can we, but how can we not?



Eye Complications

You may have heard that diabetes causes eye problems and may lead to blindness. People with diabetes do have a higher risk of blindness than people without diabetes. But most people who have diabetes have nothing more than minor eye disorders.

With regular checkups, you can keep minor problems minor (see our Eye Care page). And if you do develop a major problem, there are treatments that often work well if you begin them right away.

Eye Insight

To understand what happens in eye disorders, it helps to understand how the eye works. The eye is a ball covered with a tough outer membrane. The covering in front is clear and curved. This curved area is the cornea, which focuses light while protecting the eye.

After light passes through the cornea, it travels through a space called the anterior chamber (which is filled with a protective fluid called the aqueous humor), through the pupil (which is a hole in the iris, the colored part of the eye), and then through a lens that performs more focusing. Finally, light passes through another fluid-filled chamber in the center of the eye (the vitreous) and strikes the back of the eye, the retina.

The retina records the images focused on it and converts those images into electrical signals, which the brain receives and decodes.

One part of the retina is specialized for seeing fine detail. This tiny area of extra-sharp vision is called the macula. Blood vessels in and behind the retina nourish the macula.

Glaucoma

People with diabetes are 40% more likely to suffer from glaucoma than people without diabetes. The longer someone has had diabetes, the more common glaucoma is. Risk also increases with age.

Glaucoma occurs when pressure builds up in the eye. In most cases, the pressure causes drainage of the aqueous humor to slow down so that it builds up in the anterior chamber. The pressure pinches the blood vessels that carry blood to the retina and optic nerve. Vision is gradually lost because the retina and nerve are damaged. There are several treatments for glaucoma. Some use drugs to reduce pressure in the eye, while others involve surgery.

Cataracts

Many people without diabetes get cataracts, but people with diabetes are 60% more likely to develop this eye condition. People with diabetes also tend to get cataracts at a younger age and have them progress faster. With cataracts, the eye's clear lens clouds, blocking light.

To help deal with mild cataracts, you may need to wear sunglasses more often and use glare-control lenses in your glasses. For cataracts that interfere greatly with vision, doctors usually remove the lens of the eye. Sometimes the patient gets a new transplanted lens. In people with diabetes, retinopathy can get worse after removal of the lens, and glaucoma may start to develop.

Retinopathy

Diabetic retinopathy is a general term for all disorders of the retina caused by diabetes. There are two major types of retinopathy: nonproliferative and proliferative.

Nonproliferative retinopathy

In nonproliferative retinopathy, the most common form of retinopathy, capillaries in the back of the eye balloon and form pouches. Nonproliferative retinopathy can move through three stages (mild, moderate, and severe), as more and more blood vessels become blocked.

Macular edema

Although retinopathy does not usually cause vision loss at this stage, the capillary walls may lose their ability to control the passage of substances between the blood and the retina. Fluid can leak into the part of the eye where focusing occurs, the macula. When the macula swells with fluid, a condition called macula edema, vision blurs and can be lost entirely. Although nonproliferative retinopathy usually does not require treatment, macular edema must be treated, but fortunately treatment is usually effective at stopping and sometimes reversing vision loss.

Proliferative retinopathy

In some people, retinopathy progresses after several years to a more serious form called proliferative retinopathy. In this form, the blood vessels are so damaged they close off. In response, new blood vessels start growing in the retina. These new vessels are weak and can leak blood, blocking vision, which is a condition called vitreous hemorrhage. The new blood vessels can also cause scar tissue to grow. After the scar tissue shrinks, it can distort the retina or pull it out of place, a condition called retinal detachment.

How is it Treated?

Huge strides have been made in the treatment of diabetic retinopathy. Treatments such as scatter photocoagulation, focal photocoagulation, and vitrectomy prevent blindness in most people. The sooner retinopathy is diagnosed, the more likely these treatments will be successful. The best results occur when sight is still normal. In **photocoagulation**, the eye care professional makes tiny burns on the retina with a special laser. These burns seal the blood vessels and stop them from growing and leaking.

In scatter photocoagulation (also called panretinal photocoagulation), the eye care professional makes hundreds of burns in a polka-dot pattern on two or more occasions. Scatter photocoagulation reduces the risk of blindness from vitreous hemorrhage or detachment of the retina, but it only works before bleeding or detachment has progressed very far. This treatment is also used for some kinds of glaucoma.

Side effects of scatter photocoagulation are usually minor. They include several days of blurred vision after each treatment and possible loss of side (peripheral) vision.

In focal photocoagulation, the eye care professional aims the laser precisely at leaking blood vessels in the macula. This procedure does not cure blurry vision caused by macular edema. But it does keep it from getting worse.

When the retina has already detached or a lot of blood has leaked into the eye, photocoagulation is no longer useful. The next option is vitrectomy, which is surgery to remove scar tissue and cloudy fluid from inside the eye. The earlier the operation occurs, the more likely it is to be successful. When the goal of the operation is to remove blood from the eye, it usually works. Reattaching a retina to the eye is much harder and works in only about half the cases.

There are two types of treatment for macular edema: focal laser therapy that slows the leakage of fluid, and medications that can be injected into the eye that slow the growth of new blood vessels and reduce the leakage of fluid into the macula.

Am I at Risk for Retinopathy?

Several factors influence whether you get retinopathy:

- blood sugar control
- blood pressure levels
- how long you have had diabetes
- genes

The longer you've had diabetes, the more likely you are to have retinopathy. Almost everyone with type 1 diabetes will eventually have nonproliferative retinopathy. And most people with type 2 diabetes will also get it. But the retinopathy that destroys vision, proliferative retinopathy, is far less common.

People who keep their blood sugar levels closer to normal are less likely to have retinopathy or to have milder forms.

Your retina can be badly damaged before you notice any change in vision. Most people with nonproliferative retinopathy have no symptoms. Even with proliferative retinopathy, the more dangerous form, people sometimes have no symptoms until it is too late to treat them. For this reason, you should have your eyes examined regularly by an eye care professional.
