

INTENT TO LEVY AND COLLECT ADDITIONAL PER CAPITA TAX OF \$3.00

MD 18 CONSTITUTION—Article VI - SECTION 2— DISTRICT ADMINISTRATIVE FUND— (b) In addition to the Multiple District Annual per capita tax levied upon each Member of the Lions Clubs in the State by Article VI, Section 1. the individual Districts of this State are authorized and empowered to levy and to collect an additional per capita tax, up to, but not to exceed, Three Dollars (\$3.00) upon each member of the Lions Clubs in their respective Districts, subject to the following terms and conditions: (1) Notice of intention to levy and collect said additional per capita tax and notice of the maximum amount to be levied and collected must be forwarded to the Secretary and President of each Club in said District at least ten days prior to the date of the first Cabinet Meeting is to be held for said year. (2) Levy and collection of said tax, the exact amount thereof and the date on which the same shall be levied and collected shall be approved by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members of the District Governor's Cabinet present at the first meeting of said Cabinet for the year.

Lions Providing Disaster Relief for Tornado Victims in U.S.



A recent tornado outbreak in the U.S. killed at least 280 people, left thousands homeless and caused millions of dollars in damage. As always, our members are bringing

As I write you this message, I am filled wi

sense of pride for all that we have accomplished together over the last 12 months. It is also bittersweet for me that this is my final message to you as Chairperson of our great Foundation.

Just last week I visited our Lions in <u>Haiti</u> and our disaster relief projects. Although



there have been challenges, they remain committed for as long as it takes. You can read more about all of our disaster relief efforts in this message.

We give hope with active, reliable and needed cooperation following disasters to people around the world. Every day presents a new challenge, yet every day Lions offer the start to a promising solution which is returned every day with a happy smile of gratitude from those in need.

To reach even more people, we established four main priorities for our Foundation this year. And I'm so happy to say we have achieved each of these.

To help with developing and implementing these goals, one of the priorities was the creation of a <u>Steering</u> <u>Committee</u>. The committee is comprised of Lions leaders from around the world, and Constitutional Area is represented.

Our first goal was improving our communications flow. Just last month we launched our <u>new Web site</u> in English, and it will launch in languages at our International Convention.

I am convinced you will agree this is a huge advance toward meeting this goal. This new site gives you more tools and resources to promote the good work we Lions are doing. It also offers you many opportunities to contact us at anytime. Your thoughts are important and help us to move forward. Please visit <u>www.lcif.org</u>, if you haven't already.



Lions Quest is a program that is particularly near and dear to my heart. More than 12 million children have benefited from this life skills program. And that's why reaching even more children was another priority. We held trainings and created a How-to-Kit to help Lions' expansion efforts. Just last month

Indonesia began this program. I'm happy to say it's now in six new countries, for a total of 66 countries. At this time, there are more than 20 countries ready to start this program-the only world program focused on social and emotional education.

Another priority was activating our volunteer coordinator structure. To strengthen Lions' engagement with LCIF, new fundraising goals were set, with district and multiple district coordinators helping lead these efforts. We created several <u>new resources</u> for our coordinators. I enjoyed hosting several Webinars to provide updates to our coordinators and to encourage them to work closely and effectively with our DG Teams. Most exciting is the fact that our efforts are paying off. Donations for this year are up by US\$10.5 million, or 33 percent! Thank you for your continued support and dedication to helping LCIF continue to be the #1 NGO worldwide.

We have set a solid platform with international structures to build upon next year! I can assure you I will remain committed to our Foundation for years to come, and I hope I can count on you to do the same.

SightFirst Awards Grants

US\$4.26 million was awarded during the May SightFirst Advisory Committee meeting. This includes grants to China to support elimination of blinding trachoma, a nationwide low vision services project and a blindness prevention program; a grant to India to construct and equip a Lions ophthalmology clinic; a grant to Kenya for refractive error services; and a grant to the Philippines for inclusive education for children with visual impairments. <u>View the full list</u> of recent grants

Rebuilding Lives Following Disasters

We Lions have a special dedication to providing relief and rebuilding lives in our communities for as long as it takes. In Haiti, we are rebuilding schools and a nurses training program, as well as houses. Most recently, we committed US\$410,000 to help the Southern United States. And we continue to receive donations for Japan, with more than US\$16 million being mobilized. Relief efforts elsewhere also remain ongoing. All of these projects would not be possible without the generous support of our international family of Lions. And other organizations are taking note of our relief efforts. Bausch +Lomb donated US\$100,000 for Japan and is encouraging their employees to also do so by matching donations. The Japan-America Society of Dallas/Fort Worth (Texas, USA) also contributed US\$100,000 for Japan.

Pediatric Cataract Initiative (PCI) Awards Grant

Bausch + Lomb and LCIF awarded the Tianjin Eye Hospital a <u>US\$150,000 grant</u> to finance a specialized, pediatric cataract training initiative. The grant is made possible through funding from Bausch + Lomb, and the grant will be used for training and education, equipment, and screenings. Earlier this year, PCI also issued two \$50,000 research grants.


RETENTION IS NOT GONE!

The MERL Team Retention Chair will disappear at the end of this month, along with the entire MERL Team. However, this does not mean that retention concern is going to disappear. If you have been reading your District Bulletin, then you know that I have written several articles about retention. However, my major focus has been on providing Lion club leaders with actions their clubs should take to retain their members. Last year we lost a total of 1,051 Lions, which was a total of 15.8% of the members we had at the start of the year. I don't know how many Lions we will lose by the end of this year. However, our April monthly retention statistical comparison results, although just slightly better, still shows that we are losing lots of Lions. To date we have lost 832 Lions (12.5%) vs. the 867 Lions (13%) we had lost by the end of April last year. For a number of reasons, the retention of members continues to be a major membership problem! Accordingly, retention will still be one of the challenges clubs will be faced with next year and beyond. Indeed, you will see changes arrive at the start of our new year as each district begins to hear from the District Coordinators of your District Global Membership Team (GMT) and your District Global Leadership Team (GLT). Under Lions Clubs International's revised membership approach there will be different efforts to improve club membership. Hopefully the upcoming changes will be far more helpful in handling club membership and leadership requirements.



Set in post civil war Alabama, this classic tells the story of Annie Sullivan and her student, blind and mute Helen Keller.

The Miracle Worker dramatizes the volatile relationship between the lonely teacher and her charge. Trapped in a secret, silent world, unable to communicate, Helen is violent, spoiled, almost sub-human and treated by her family as such. Only Annie realizes that there is a mind and spirit waiting to be rescued from the dark, tortured silence. With scenes of intense physical and emotional dynamism, Annie's success with Helen finally comes with the utterance of a single, glorious word: "water".

The Cumming Playhouse and Gypsy Theatre Company, presenters of "The Miracle Worker", are proud to partner with the Lions Club of Forsyth County in this endeavor to raise funds for the Lions Club's work with *sight conservation and the blind*. We echo the words of Helen Keller in her speech to the Lion's Club International in 1925, "Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no little deaf, blind child untaught; no blind man or woman unaided? 1 appeal to you ... you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind."

A MESSAGE FROM GREG

Malcolm Gladwell, a writer for The New Yorker magazine, coined the phrase "match strike" which refers to little ideas that take fire and bring about social change. Match strikes don't have a set formula or happen in a controlled way—they begin to burn quickly and hopefully spread far in a short period of time.

To accomplish this, the device must be affordable—\$99 or less. This is why the Kapten PLUS is our "match strike;" the price is \$295—68% less than the cost of the Breeze GPS we had been using. This gets us much closer to our \$99 goal. The next step is to get the right people—the key influencers—excited about GPS so they can fan the flame. In April we sent Kapten PLUS devices to over 50 key influencers to try for themselves. **The material introducing the Kapten PLUS is inserted in this newsletter.**

History of GPS at Leader Dogs for the Blind (LDB)

2005 LDB becomes first guide dog organization to provide Trekker GPS training to people using a cane or a guide dog.

2006 LDB introduces camp for teens and GPS course for orientation & mobility (O&M) professionals that provide free Trekker GPS devices and training.

2008 LDB begins testing a less expensive, more accessible GPS, the Trekker Breeze, with guide dog clients and works with manufacturer, HumanWare, to modify it for ease of use. Breeze is incorporated into all guide dog classes by November. LDB conducts first Master Trainer Course on Trekker Breeze GPS for O&M professionals at the Association for Education and Rehabilitation of the Blind and Visually Impaired (AER) International Conference.

2009 Guide dog clients begin receiving a free Trekker Breeze during training in April. Steven J. LaGrow, EdD and LDB team member Erica Ihrke, MA co-

author a research paper reporting that more than 90% of research participants felt more capable, confident and less anxious during travel when using GPS at a way-finding tool. Kapsys GPS device (designed for use in European cities for pedestrian vacationers) comes to our attention.

2010 January LDB and Kapsys begin discussing modifying the Kapten for people who are blind. **March** Kapsys executives visit LDB and Kapten PLUS modifications begin. Main areas revised: physical device to increase tactile accessibility and spoken interface, software intuitiveness for ease of use and location data provided to the user. **May** LDB clients begin testing each revised version of the Kapten PLUS. **November** Clients and staff begin testing Kapten PLUS device and usability of LDB-designed user guide.

2011 March Kapten PLUS used and distributed for free in guide dog and O&M classes. Moving Forward June Free Kapten PLUS devices distributed to LDB clients throughout the United States and Canada. Kapten PLUS devices available to everyone at LDB's online gift shop for \$295. **FUTURE** LDB continues to work with location technology innovators to develop a product that will retail for \$99.

If You Think You Want a Diabetic Alert Dog...



If you're just beginning your D.A.D. search, consider these things:

At present, there is very little (if any) regulation of this industry. Choose your trainer/breeder carefully. Read, read, read. <u>Good Search</u> everything you can find. Try these search phrases: Diabetic Alert Dog, Diabetic Service Dog, Training Diabetic Alert Dog, Alert Dog, D.A.D., etc. Use the links provided on our "Sites for more info" page.

We found <u>www.diabeticalertdog.com</u> to be particularly helpful! Don't be too shy to call! We found that while folks were hesitant initially, they were more than happy to chat once we had an opportunity to get past all the introductory stuff. Ask questions. Explain that you are trying to gather information and educate yourself. Push for more info than you got from the last call!

Pray.

Talk to some trainers. They are the ones who will actually be working with the dog. Ask: how do you select dogs that will be in your training program? How much hands on will you have with the dog? What is your experience? Can you refer me to some clients? (Ask for more than 5!) Will the dog be fully obedience trained? How many dogs do you train at one time? Have you ever had a dog returned to you?

Use what agencies there are! Check with Better Business Bureau, Attorney General's office of the state in which your particular trainer/breeder resides, even consumer advocacy groups. Check to ensure that the company is associated positively with SOME association organization.

Pray. Call or email us. Beware. There are some unscrupulous breeders and trainers out there.

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Life Without a D.A.D.

Friday, November 19, 2010 at 10:09AM

My Diabetic Alert Dog (D.A.D.) is still due to arrive in March 2011 and as we wait for this blessing, I have had the great opportunity to work with a few D.A.D.'s who are in their final stages of training. My work has been to live with and reinforce what they've been taught in a real-life setting.

The time spent with these trained dogs helps prepare them (and me) for their eventual full-time job as a D.A.D. Our day-to-day activities have included such things as: home life, yard work, grocery stores, business meetings, church, theaters, school functions, airplane rides, car trips, speaking engagements, etc.

I have come to really enjoy this process and am still continually amazed at how they work. I am amazed at how they love to work.

Over the past 6-weeks, I have not had a D.A.D. living with our family and the void has been felt. I have had some serious low and high blood sugar levels which have gone undetected until I needed help. The management of diabetes is a very tricky thing and I am keenly aware - now - that life without a D.A.D. stinks.

And in the words of our family favorite, Forrest Gump, "that's all I have to say about that."

Engaging our Youth YOUTH PROJECT IDEAS

 Organize a youth forum or town hall meeting to highlight topics that youth have identified as critical community issues.
 Offer a back-to-school health or community fair in conjunction with a local school district. Work with local healthcare providers to offer free screenings at the health fair, including physical, dental and hearing exams, in addition to free immunizations.

3. Provide safety identification for children and youth with serious chronic illnesses (medical bracelets or necklaces, etc.).

4. Organize a book or board game drive for a community center, children's after-school center, hospital facility or school library.

5. Supply Braille and large print books for children who are blind or visually impaired.

6. Sponsor an activity day for individuals with developmental disabilities.

7. Prepare and send care packages to military personnel.

8. Remodel a children's center or school room: paint, repair and landscape.

9. Assemble and provide care packages for homeless shelters or other facilities.

- 10. Make baby supply kits for newborns in need.
- 11. Assist at camps serving children with special needs.
- 12. Refurbish used bicycles for children.
- 13. Organize a highway or park clean-up.

14. Provide safe soft teddy bear toys (no small, removable parts) to local emergency service professionals for presentation to children during an emergency.

15. Donate supplies for orphanages, foster children or other children and youth in need.

- 16. Collect and donate supplies to a local school.
- 17. Tutor at an after school program.
- 18. Paint a playground.
- 19. Volunteer at a senior citizen's home.
- 20. Clean and repair a community center.

Aaron Rognstad- Seminole County LEO Club (18-C) 6 members present. Harley Hall- Colquitt County LEO Club (18-C) 2 members present. Chandler Sumner- Early County LEO Club (18-C) 4 members present. District Chairs present-Lion Reed Rognstad (18-C), Lion Steve Helwig (18-D & State LEO Chair)

_ State LEOs will form a committee for ways to increase Statewide membership and participation.

_ 5 Clubs in MD-18 applied for and received the LEO Club of Service Award: 18-C / Early County, Seminole County and Colquitt County.

_ Outstanding District Chair Award / Lion Reed Rognstad 18-C; Hank and Doy Barks Award for the Camp for the Blind / Colquitt County 18-C; Moultrie Lions / Colquitt County LEOs for funds donated and hours worked at the Camp.

_ The LEOs were addressed by International President Sid Scruggs along with International Director Haynes Townsend. President Scruggs said that he was excited to see LEOs involved and growing and told us about the history of the LEO program. He challenged the LEOs to get their parents involved with Lions and community service.
