
INTENT TO LEVY AND COLLECT ADDITIONAL PER CAPITA TAX OF\$3.00

MD 18 CONSTITUTION—Article VI - SECTION 2—DISTRICT ADMINISTRATIVE FUND— (b) In addition to the Multiple District Annual per capita tax levied upon each Member of the Lions Clubs in the State by Article VI, Section 1, the individual Districts of this State are authorized and empowered to levy and to collect an additional per capita tax, up to, but not to exceed, Three Dollars (\$3.00) upon each member of the Lions Clubs in their respective Districts, subject to the following terms and conditions: (1) Notice of intention to levy and collect said additional per capita tax and notice of the maximum amount to be levied and collected must be forwarded to the Secretary and President of each Club in said District at least ten days prior to the date of the first Cabinet Meeting is to be held for said year. (2) Levy and collection of said tax, the exact amount thereof and the date on which the same shall be levied and collected shall be approved by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the members of the District Governor's Cabinet present at the first meeting of said Cabinet for the year.

The Lighthouse was the dream of a blind man, Atlanta Lion Tom Bingham. In 1949, Atlanta Lions, led by Bingham, along with Moultrie and Albany Lions, each contributed \$1,000, and the Lighthouse was born. Now, more than 300 Lions Clubs provide financial and volunteer support for the Lighthouse.

- March 1949: Georgia Lighthouse for the Blind, Inc., was established, with Tom Bingham as the first Executive Director.
- Oct. 11, 1950. The first Lighthouse patient to have surgery was Max Parker of Moultrie Georgia, in 1949. He was 4 yrs old. He still lives in Moultrie.
- June 10, 1956: The name changed from "Georgia Lighthouse for the Blind, Inc." to the "Georgia Lions Lighthouse, Inc".
- July 25, 1961: The name changed once more to "Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation, Inc,".
- 1963: The Lions of GA established an endowment with an initial bequest of \$75,000.
- 2005: The Lighthouse helps over 100 victims of Hurricane Katrina receive eye exams and glasses.
- 2006: The Lighthouse has one mobile eye clinic, and we become the official charity of the Angels Over Atlanta Air Show.
- **2007:** A new hearing aid program begins, allowing the Lighthouse to distribute new digital hearing aids rather than refurbished analog aids. In two years, the number of hearing aids provided per year jumped from 730 to 1,624.
- **2007:** The Lighthouse grows from one eye clinic to seven.
- **2008:** Seven more eye clinics open, bringing the total to 14.
- 2011: The Lighthouse moves into a new building, the result of a successful \$2.75 million capital campaign. The campaign funds allow the Lighthouse to open a new on-site clinic and optical lab, which enables the Lighthouse to produce their own glasses and lower costs.
- 2012: The Lighthouse mobile vision clinic now partners with 23 free clinics throughout the state.



Leader Dogs and the Law

"Misguided Views On Guide Dogs Plague the Blind," reads the title of the article from a 1979 copy of the Memphis-Press Scimitar. The focus of the article is Mrs. Helen Hosse, who was learning to adjust to her life without sight with the help of her first Leader Dog, a slim German shepherd named Snoopy. Helen and Snoopy's biggest hurdle: the public's lack of awareness about access laws for guide dogs. "My main trouble is with these mall managers, store employees and security people telling me, 'You just can't bring your dog in here,'" Helen told the newspaper. "It's more frustrating than embarrassing. I get the impression they are more ignorant than insensitive."

Helen wasn't the only early graduate of Leader Dog to run into misunderstandings about public access. Sonja Wagner has had seven Leader Dogs over the course of her life, and she was paired with her first in 1959, when Sonja was in her early 20s. Sonja had a system for whenever someone questioned her Leader Dog's right to be with her in a public place. "Before anything else, I'd ask them to check their building code," she says. "It said in there that guide dogs were allowed. Today, of course, it says 'service dogs.' But back then it was just guide dogs."

Ilene Goldman-Sawyer received her first Leader Dog in 1960, when she was just 17 years old. She recalls an incident that happened not long after she went to university, when she and a friend tried to go to a restaurant across the street from campus. When they entered, the manager stopped them and told Ilene that she and her dog needed to leave. Ilene showed him a copy of the law, and the manager backed down. "After that, he was so nice and he always gave us free food, because he was nervous."

Not every encounter ended that way. Ilene describes a time that she and her sister went out to eat. "We sat down at a table, and then we waited and waited," she says. "And they refused to serve us. I stood up for myself and told them it was the law." As it happened, there was an attorney sitting at the next table, and he backed her up, even threatening to sue the restaurant. In the end, Ilene walked out. "I was so angry. I didn't want to have anything to do with them anymore."

Over time, public awareness of service dogs and their right to go almost anywhere with their handlers has improved. There are still people who protest at the sight of a dog in a restaurant, taxi cab or boutique, but now the fans usually outnumber the opponents. Ilene and her current Leader Dog, a German shepherd named Daggs, have no trouble traveling around her hometown. "Everybody loves him!" she exclaims. "I call him my gentle giant." Sonja reports a similar situation when she is out and about with her latest Leader Dog, a young black Labrador named Lillian. "Everyone loves the dog. They don't worry about you, it's all about the dog. You play second fiddle to the dog!"

I want to thank Leader Dogs for the Blind for all they taught me and the confidence that I was given from the Orientation & Mobility program. Next week I will be graduating from the Illinois Business Enterprise Program for the Blind. As of next week I will be a blind entrepreneur, which will allow me to operate my own vending, retail or cafeteria.



[For] most of my training I had to travel around Chicago by myself walking up and down streets and riding city buses and the subway system to get from place to place to fill vending machines or to go to retail stores and work. Because of the training that I received from Leader Dogs for the Blind, I was able to travel by myself with confidence that I could do it.

I just want Leader Dogs for the Blind to know that they have been a big part in helping me get back to the workforce and to know that I can do anything I want to do as long as I put my mind into it.

Please know that I plan to be back to Leader Dogs for the Blind after I have been placed into a facility somewhere and am ready to make the next step toward getting my own Leader Dog. Again thanks for everything.

Providing Life Skills for Students

LCIF's **Lions Quest** program has impacted more than 13 million students around the world through social and emotional learning. As a renowned program for positive life skills for youth, our partners are taking notice NoVo Foundation recently provided a US\$300,000 grant to support Lions Quest.



Lions Quest is also revising

its printed curriculum. The resulting curriculum products will be more modern and relevant to issues facing today's youth, like bullying and career readiness. The revised program is scheduled to be ready in 2015.

Partnering to End Measles

At last year's convention, LCIF partnered with the GAVI Alliance and committed to raising US\$30 million for measles vaccinations by our 100th anniversary in 2017. During the month of April, Lions had some exciting measles activities.



World Immunization Week this year was a big success around the world. And in just April, Lions raised

Saving Sight and Preventing Blindness

Lions and LCIF are committed to saving sight and preventing blindness where needed most. In China, blinding trachoma has affected eye health for many people. Through LCIF SightFirst grants, our Foundation is supporting the effort towards elimination of trachoma as a public health concern by 2016.



The fight against trachoma and other eye diseases expands around the world. In May 2014, Lions Clubs International leadership and the Lions of Georgia

(USA) joined former U.S. President and Lion Jimmy Carter in a signing ceremony to commemorate an expansion of the Lions-Carter Center SightFirst Initiative addressing the major causes of preventable blindness in Ethiopia, Uganda, Mali and Niger. This partnership also helped celebrate the elimination of river blindness in Colombia last year, a major milestone.

Meeting Humanitarian Needs Globally

Numerous disaster relief grants have been awarded throughout the world to address flooding, wildfires, tornadoes, earthquakes, landslides and other natural disasters. One notable disaster was Typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines. LCIF quickly mobilized tents, water filtration units and millions in donations to support those affected. And, Lions remain on the ground assisting their communities by rebuilding homes.



In addition to disaster relief, LCIF

provided many grants for Lions' projects to support local communities. Projects that provided needed hospital equipment, built centers for blind and disabled community members, purchased mobile health units, constructed schools for children in developing countries and more changed the lives of approximately 6.73 million people in the past year!

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) FAQs

Q: Where does funding for LCIF projects come from?

A: The Foundation relies on contributions from Lions clubs and individual members to provide the millions of dollars of support for Lions projects throughout the world each year. LCIF does not receive support through annual club dues.

Q: How many grants did LCIF award in 2012-2013?

A: LCIF awarded 489 grants in 2012-2013, totaling over US\$39 million,to Lions for a variety of projects ranging from disaster relief to youth development to eye-care services. Each year, millions of people around the world benefit from projects funded by LCIF grants. Grant examples include US\$9,900 to purchase computer equipment for a vocational training center in Paraguay and US\$75,000 to replace the pool at Camp Echoing Hills a special needs camp in the United States.

Q: How do you apply for a grant from LCIF?

A: The foundation is designed to provide financial support for larger-scale Lions service projects initiated by groups of Lions clubs at the zone, region, or district level. All LCIF grant applications must have the appropriate endorsement by the area's leadership before the application is submitted. Each grant application is reviewed by the LCIF Board of Trustees. LCIF provides support in four areas of service: preserving sight, serving youth, disaster relief, and humanitarian efforts. The deadlines for grant submissions are listed on the LCIF website.

Q: What are examples of typical projects for which Lions submit grants applications?

A: Typical projects include equipment for mobile health units, expansion of blind and low vision schools, improving clinics, and vision screening equipment.

The \$1 Billion Reason to Vaccinate

A new study shows the rotavirus vaccine has saved 100,000 hospital visits and nearly \$1 billion in medical costs. When will anti-vaxxers wake up and smell the science?



It is no fun to vomit for a week.

Unfortunately, for some young patients who get infected with rotavirus—a viral illness that's <u>easily passed from child to child</u> and can be transmitted by contaminated toys or food—that's what they have to look forward to. Protracted vomiting is one of the <u>primary symptoms of the illness</u>, along with diarrhea, abdominal pain, and fever.

For years, during peak seasons, I could rely on at least a few infected patients getting admitted to the hospital with

dehydration, sometimes for many days of IV fluids before they recovered.

Happily, it's been several years since the last time I had to take care of a patient hospitalized for a rotavirus infection, and the reason is simple—we have an effective vaccine against it. Having never seen a case of diphtheria, tetanus, or measles (though I fear it's <u>only a matter of time</u> with that last one), the drop in rotavirus rates within my own practice is my first chance to witness the impact of vaccination play out in real time during my career.

My experience is hardly unique. According to a new study published in the journal *Pediatrics* (<u>PDF</u>), vaccination against the virus has led to a 94 percent reduction in the rate of hospitalization for the illness. The authors estimate that <u>1.5</u> <u>million health-care visits</u> have been avoided in the past eight years, for a savings of over \$900 million.

One look at those numbers is all it takes to realize how absurd the decision not to vaccinate is. Doctors who argue that parents should avoid the vaccine because the illness probably won't kill you are essentially saying that it's worth hundreds of millions of dollars to care for millions of miserable children whose sickness was otherwise preventable. Death isn't the only health-care outcome we try to prevent in medicine, and I have little but contempt for any medical provider who doesn't seem to understand that.

But the history of vaccination against rotavirus infection isn't merely the story of preventing illness. It also offers an illustration about vaccine safety in general. In the late 1990s a vaccine called RotaShield was licensed in the United States. Unfortunately, it was discovered that this vaccine increased the risk of intussusception, a rare but serious condition where one part of the intestine telescopes into another section. The increased risk was estimated to cause an additional one or two cases per 10,000 immunized infants. This small rise in cases was detected quickly and the vaccine was pulled after a little more than a year. (There may be a very slight increased risk with the newer rotavirus vaccines, on the order of one to five additional cases per 100,000 immunized children—a relative risk that is vastly outweighed by the benefits.)

Every time spurious claims about the dangers of vaccines are raised, it's always implied or asserted that medical providers and public health officials turn a blind eye to the harms they cause. This is demonstrably false. When the anti-vaccine movement claims that immunizations cause autism, they not only <u>ignore medical studies</u>, they also ignore the history of vaccine safety surveillance in the United States.

Because of the rotavirus vaccine, millions of children have been spared a really lousy illness, and our country has saved hundreds of millions of health-care dollars. This new study joins the growing body of evidence that shows how overwhelmingly beneficial vaccinations have been to our country and the world. In the case of rotavirus, it's a benefit I've been lucky enough to see with my own two eyes.

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

Toccoa Lions Club "Rookie of Year" Shows What LIONISM is Why Every Lion Leader Says Membership is Important!



The Toccoa Lions Club had a Membership Plan for Lion Year 2013/2014. The plan culminated with a March Membership meeting. As a result of that meeting, the Toccoa Lions added six new members. Let me tell you the story of one new member, Lion Jack McLaughlin. Lion Jack had been in discussion with Zone Chair Bill Graham for over a year about joining the Toccoa Lions. He & his son, Tim, made the decision to join at the March Membership Meeting. Both Lions Jack & Tim worked the Toccoa Lions White Cane Campaign in April, which raised over \$1,000.00 for the GA Lions Lighthouse Foundation. About a week after the White Cane Campaign, TLC President, Bryan Gordon got a phone call from a person who was scheduled to get a free eye surgery from the GA Lions Lighthouse. The person who was supposed to take this person to the Lighthouse for surgery was sick and could not take the patient to the Lighthouse. After some consultation with other Lions, Lion Bryan called Lion Jack to see if he could help. As background, Lion Jack is affiliated with the Toccoa Taxi Service. Lion Jack reacted immediately. He rescheduled all of his activities and volunteered to take the patient and his wife to Emory for the eye surgery. Lion Jack waited the entire day to make sure the patient and his wife were ok and brought them back to Toccoa. But this is only half the story. The patient could not have the surgery on the day scheduled because of a medical condition. Lion Jack, on his own, agreed to take the couple back down to Emory on the rescheduled surgery date. Lion Jack did this without telling anyone until pressed for information. Each round trip was 150 miles.

So to summarize, the TLC focused on getting new members. This provided additional people to help with the club's service activities such as the White Cane Campaign. In addition, it gained a member who was able to use his unique capabilities to help a person in need. This is why membership is so important!

The rest of the story. It turns out that the patient was not able to get the eye surgery on the second visit. The patient has diabetes and the surgeon was unwilling to operate unless they were at a hospital. In spite of all this, Lion Jack remains enthusiastic and says he would do it all again. All of this happened in Lion Jack's first three months of membership.

A Young Artist with Dyslexia: The Story of Double D

A long-time Learning Ally member, Angelina received her BFA in Art from the University of Mississippi in 2013.

The Story of Double D

I'm Double D, but it's not what you might think. The D's stand for dyslexic and diabetic. My mom came up with it to lighten the mood at the hospital in 2006.

I've been creating art for as long as I can remember. You could say my mom was my first art teacher and the motivating force behind the artist I have become. She was very crafty always encouraging me to try my very best.

When I was six years old, I was diagnosed with my first "D" dyslexia. Every day and every subject in school has been a constant struggle for me. Art helps me release myself. It was never a struggle, but rather a challenge, which allowed me to explore and understand my disability and made living with it more bearable.

During high school, I was diagnosed with my second "D" diabetic. After I was released from the hospital with type 1 diabetes, my vision remained blurry for several weeks. My other senses heightened. My outlook on life and world around me changed. I saw my art through a new light. Photography became my new passion.

College has probably played the most important part in me being an artist. I loved capturing photos in black and white using Photoshop and aperture to edit my photos. Then, I discovered the world of sculpture. It was a way to create, shape, and visually expresses what it feels like to be dyslexic in three-dimensional objects. Once again, art as a main subject



gave me a lot relief from the other subjects that dealt with pure memorization and arithmetic.

Yes, it's unfortunate to have two major disabilities. My life is not without hardship and struggle. It's my job to use my disabilities and what it brings to my life in a positive way. My diabetes has taught me to be more responsible, while my dyslexia helps me to see pictures and not words. My art reflects my imagination, the effort I put into a piece and the potential in creating beautiful pieces.

So, now I can add a new "D" to my nick name. It stands for determined. I am determined to succeed in life! With success, creates more motivation. My artist journey has just begun!

Bridging the Gap to Independence

"Marco has brought Barbara so much happiness. I've seen her desire to be independent grow because of him," says Barbara's mom, Gloria. Marco is Barbara's Canine

Companions assistance dog.



"I knew an assistance dog would help bridge the gap between Barbara and the rest of the world, but I didn't know if we'd qualify since Barbara cannot give traditional commands to a dog," says Gloria.

Barbara has cerebral palsy. She has limited verbal communication and is quadriplegic.

But Barbara did qualify! And now, over 2 years after receiving Marco from Canine Companions, Gloria can't imagine Barbara's life without him.

"Barbara and Marco have developed a special way of communicating. Their bond is incredible. Barbara will call Marco with clicks of her tongue and he knows that she is calling him. He will come to her and push his head under her arm so she can pet him. He knows how to position himself so Barbara can reach him," explains Gloria.

People used to talk to Gloria, ignoring Barbara. But when Barbara holds Marco's leash, people talk to her directly. "Marco has improved Barbara's self-esteem so much. She loves the attention and has so much pride when she takes him on walks," says Gloria. Before Marco, Barbara used to be self conscious about using her natural voice in public. But with Marco, Barbara will firmly tell people "no" if they ask to pet him while he is busy working. Marco has given her a sense of ownership and responsibility.

"Barbara will tell Marco to 'sit down,' and she says it with such authority. As a mother, it has been amazing to see her confidence grow," states Gloria.





Statistics About Diabetes

Data from the *National Diabetes Statistics Report*, 2014 (released June 10, 2014)

Overall Numbers, Diabetes and Prediabetes




- **Prevalence**: In 2012, 29.1 million Americans, or 9.3% of the population, had diabetes.
 - In 2010 the figures were 25.8 million and 8.3%. The prevalence rate for adults age 20 and older in 2012 was 12.3%, compared to 11.3% in 2010.
- **Undiagnosed**: Of the 29.1 million, 21.0 million were diagnosed, and 8.1 million were undiagnosed.
 - o In 2010 the figures were 18.8 million and 7.0 million.
- **Prevalence in Seniors**: The percentage of Americans age 65 and older remains high, at 25.9%, or 11.8 million seniors (diagnosed and undiagnosed).
 - o The rate was 26.9% in 2010.
- New Cases: The incidence of diabetes in 2012 was 1.7 million new diagnoses/year; in 2010 it was 1.9 million.
- **Prediabetes**: In 2012, 86 million Americans age 20 and older had prediabetes; this is up from 79 million in 2010.
 - O The percentage is up slightly, from 35% in 2010 to 37% in 2012—and is now at 51% among those age 65 and older.
- **Deaths**: Diabetes remains the 7th leading cause of death in the United States in 2010, with 69,071 death certificates listing it as the underlying cause of death, and a total of 234,051 death certificates listing

diabetes as an underlying or contributing cause of death.

Diabetes in Youth

- About 208,000 Americans under age 20 are estimated to have diagnosed diabetes, approximately 0.25% of that population The figure is essentially unchanged from 2010, when it was estimated at 215,000/0.26%.
- In 2008—2009, the annual incidence of diagnosed diabetes in youth was estimated at 18,436 with type 1 diabetes, 5,089 with type 2 diabetes. This represents a modest increase in the percentage of youth being diagnosed with type 2, from 19% in 2002—2005 as reported in the previous Fact Sheet, to 22% in 2008—2009 reported now.

Diabetes by Race/Ethnicity



The new Statistics Report contains greater detail on diabetes in minority populations than has been available before, particularly for Asian Americans. The rates of diagnosed diabetes by race/ethnic background are:

- 7.6% of non-Hispanic whites
- 9.0% of <u>Asian Americans</u>
- 12.8% of Hispanics
- 13.2% of non-Hispanic blacks
- 15.9% of American Indians/Alaskan Natives

The breakdown among Asian Americans:

- 4.4% for Chinese
- 11.3% for Filipinos
- 13.0 for Asian Indians
- 8.8% for other Asian Americans.

The breakdown among Hispanic adults:

- 8.5% for Central and South Americans
- 9.3% for Cubans
- 13.9% for Mexican Americans
- 14.8% for Puerto Ricans.

Deaths

Diabetes was the seventh leading cause of death in the United States in 2010 based on the 69,071 death certificates in which diabetes was listed as the underlying cause of death. In 2010, diabetes was mentioned as a cause of death in a total of 234,051 certificates.

Diabetes may be underreported as a cause of death. Studies have found that only about 35% to 40% of people with diabetes who died had diabetes listed anywhere on the death certificate and about 10% to 15% had it listed as the underlying cause of death.

Complications/Co-Morbid Conditions

- **Hypoglycemia**: In 2011, about 282,000 emergency room visits for adults aged 18 years or older had hypoglycemia as the first-listed diagnosis and diabetes as another diagnosis. *This is new to the Statistics Report.*
- **Hyperglycemia:** In 2011, about 175,000 emergency room visits for people of all ages had hyperglycemic crisis as the first-listed diagnosis. *This is new to the Statistics Report.*
- **Hypertension:** In 2009–2012, of adults aged 18 years or older with diagnosed diabetes, 71% had blood pressure greater than or equal to 140/90 millimeters of mercury or used prescription medications to lower high blood pressure. *This is an increase from 67% in the previous Fact Sheet*.
- Dyslipidemia: In 2009–2012, of adults aged 18 years
 or older with diagnosed diabetes, 65% had blood <u>LDL</u>
 cholesterol greater than or equal to 100 mg/dl or used
 cholesterol-lowering medications. This is new to the
 Statistics Report.
- **CVD Death Rates**: In 2003–2006, after adjusting for population age differences, cardiovascular disease death rates were about 1.7 times higher among adults aged 18 years or older with diagnosed diabetes than among adults without diagnosed diabetes. This data is a change from the previous Fact Sheet, which cited heart disease death rates 2 to 4 times higher for people with vs. without diabetes.
- **Heart Attack Rates:** In 2010, after adjusting for population age differences, hospitalization rates for heart attack were 1.8 times higher among adults aged 20 years or older with diagnosed diabetes than among adults without diagnosed diabetes. *This is new to the Statistics Report.*
- **Stroke:** In 2010, after adjusting for population age differences, hospitalization rates for stroke were 1.5 times higher among adults with diagnosed diabetes aged 20 years or older compared to those without diagnosed diabetes. *This data is an update from the*

- previous Fact Sheet, which rates of stroke 2 to 4 times higher for people with vs. without diabetes.
- Blindness and Eye Problems: In 2005–2008, of adults with diabetes aged 40 years or older, 4.2 million (28.5%) people had diabetic retinopathy, damage to the small blood vessels in the retina that may result in loss of vision.
- **Kidney Disease**: Diabetes was listed as the primary cause of kidney failure in 44% of all new cases in 2011.
 - o In 2011, 49,677 people of all ages began treatment for kidney failure due to diabetes.
 - In 2011, a total of 228,924 people of all ages with kidney failure due to diabetes were living on chronic dialysis or with a kidney transplant.
- **Amputations**: In 2010, about 73,000 non-traumatic lower-limb amputations were performed in adults aged 20 years or older with diagnosed diabetes.
 - About 60% of non-traumatic lower-limb amputations among people aged 20 years or older occur in people with diagnosed diabetes.

Cost of Diabetes

Updated March 6, 2013

- \$245 billion: Total costs of diagnosed diabetes in the United States in 2012
- \$176 billion for direct medical costs
- \$69 billion in reduced productivity

After adjusting for population age and sex differences, average medical expenditures among people with diagnosed diabetes were 2.3 times higher than what expenditures would be in the absence of diabetes.





