If you were one of the ones that had the opportunity to go I know that you all saw a lot and learned a lot. If you didn't get to go this year, hopefully you can begin to make plans to go to Honolulu, Hawaii next year for the 98th International Convention. International President Joe Preston gave us the message to "STRENGTHEN THE PRIDE." During 2014-2015, we can "Strengthen the Pride" by bringing the 1.36 million members of our Lion's family closer together, working in a spirit of cooperation and understanding. This is not the pride of being boastful; it is pride of accomplishment in building communities,

providing meaningful service, and helping foundation of our commitment to serving others, and has made us the global leader in humanitarian service. This is the platform for success in the coming year, through our centennial, and well into the next hundred years of our association.

Strengthen the Pride through Service - Centennial Service Challenge: This celebration of service will begin in July 2014 and will conclude in December 2017. There will be four elements to the Centennial Service Challenge, with special recognition available to clubs that report their participation in the Global Service Action Campaign projects that align with the program.

Strengthen the Pride through Membership Development - We can promote membership growth and development in the following ways: Ask One: Every Lion should invite at least one new member during the 2014-2015 Lions year, and focus on pursuing those who demonstrate a desire to serve others. Tools, such as the "Just Ask" brochure, are available to support this effort.

Strengthen the Pride by Strengthening Your Club - It is time that we got back to the basics of strengthening our association from the "Club Up." Every club will be encouraged to examine what they are doing and consider implementing new management strategies and techniques to energize their club. Participate in the Community Needs Assessment to determine how best to serve their respective communities. Participate in the Club Excellence Process (CEP) to improve club effectiveness and enhance the membership experience. Ensure that all members are actively involved in club activities and operations

Strengthen the Pride through Leadership - We can strengthen our clubs by developing strong club leaders. Ensure club officers are trained to fulfill the responsibilities of their position. Establish a leadership development plan that includes goals for member orientation, mentoring, zone meeting participation and other leadership training.

Strengthen the Pride through Partnerships - We can do more and accomplish more when we work together with like-minded people, companies and organizations. Clubs are encouraged to partner with others when it is mutually advantageous, strengthens their communities, and helps the club better serve others.

Strengthen the Pride through Rededication - Our founder, Melvin Jones, instilled the pride of service in our first members, and nurtured pride in membership as Lions Clubs International began to grow. As we prepare for our centennial, schedule a celebration of Melvin Jones' birthday on January 13th as a tribute to our founder, and rededicate yourself to the community and humanitarian codes, objects and principles of our association.

Strengthen the Pride through Giving - The more you give, the more you have to give. This year, all clubs are invited to make a contribution to LCIF, the charitable arm of our association.

Strengthen the Pride through Creativity - The ability to adapt and take on new challenges has been an important part of our past success, and has helped us thrive in an ever-changing world. To ensure our future growth, we need to creatively embrace technology and use it to our advantage. Engage in social media platforms on Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, the LCI blog and other sites. Use and promote tools like Service Activity Reporting and MyLCI, which make it easy for clubs to report activities, find information, and share their pride

Strengthen the Pride through Courage and Conviction - Lions members have both courage and conviction. As Lions, we need to roar. We need to tell the whole world who we are, that we will never stop trying, because we have service to perform, and we are going to provide it, no matter what the challenges are.

This is a great message from our International President, Joe Preston. We can all follow this "Pride Strengthening" advice for ALL of our clubs.

I hope that many of you were able to make it to the Cabinet meeting that was held on Saturday, July 26th. We had a day full of fun and exciting things: New Officer Training, Cabinet Meeting, Tail-twister session and the installation of Cabinet Officers (with their cool PINK shirts). This is the time for change; we have to start thinking "outside of the box". We have to build our membership, by chartering new clubs and rebuilding struggling clubs. 

A Day at Leader Dogs for the Blind

Did you ever wonder what happens at Leader Dog on a daily basis? The short answer is—a lot! Just look at a few of the things that happened around campus on Friday, May 30.



Residential Custodian Angela passes the emergency phone and pager to Residential Assistant Kim in the morning along with updating her on any happenings with the clients in class.

Parent Problem: Does a Child Need to Fail Before They Can Succeed?

When it comes to learning disabilities and education, the jargon that comes with the territory can be daunting and, understandably, frustrating.

Parents of newly diagnosed children and veterans of the space alike can find themselves wondering what exactly a particular model, plan or policy entails. One mother of a child with dyslexia wrote to us with the following question about the discrepancy model and how it affects the diagnosis of a learning disability:

What is the "discrepancy model" and how is it applied in determining a learning disability? If a student is two grade levels or more behind, how can that information be used to demonstrate that the child is actually in need of remedial services? Many school districts in our region of NY are telling parents that they do not need to remediate the student. But if the student is two years or more behind, why would they *not* be required to remediate the student? Especially if the student is in high school and is more than two years behind by achievement testing in all areas (reading, writing, math). We were told that as long as the student passes the state tests with a 65% that is all they are required to provide to the student. Is this accurate? Are high schools allowed to say that students are proficient if they are just barely passing their state course end-of-year test assessments? How is that educating to proficiency? I am so frustrated and confused about this stuff!

One of our Parent Support Specialists, <u>Norma Francullo</u>, herself the mother of two children with dyslexia and a special education attorney, responded with the following explanation:

The discrepancy model assesses whether there is a significant difference between a student's scores on a test of general intelligence (i.e. a <u>WISC</u>) and scores obtained on an achievement test (i.e. <u>Woodcock Johnson Achievement Test</u>). This model is used to identify children with learning disabilities. If there is a discrepancy between the child's IQ and scores on their achievement test, then there is reason to believe that there is a learning disability. Depending on the state that you live in, if the child's score on the IQ test is at least 1.5-2 standard deviations higher than their scores on an achievement test, then that child may have a learning disability.

If your son is having difficulty in school, the school *does not* have to wait until he fails to evaluate him for special services. Have you put your request in writing and has the school denied your request in writing? If not, put your request in writing to the special education department director. If you have proof that your son is two years behind, include that information in your letter to your school district when requesting that the child study team evaluate him for services. Within 20 days from the date of the letter, the school is *required* to schedule a meeting to discuss your request.

Tips for Traveling With Diabetes

Summer is officially here! Whether your family will be taking a road trip, flying across the country, or setting sail on a cruise, the key to a healthy and hasslefree trip is planning



ahead. Here are tips to help you plan your trip from beginning to end!

- **Take a letter**. It's getting easier to make it through airport security with your diabetes supplies and devices, but it's still a smart idea to bring a letter from your physician.
- Wear medical ID. People with diabetes should wear a medical ID at all times. In case of severe hypoglycemia, a car accident, or other emergency, the ID provides critical information about your child's health.

Overpack. A good rule of thumb is to pack twice

- as much insulin and supplies as you think you'll need. Keep them all in your carry-on bag so they're with you at all times.

WAYS TO ENCOURAGE CHILDREN & YOUTH TO HAVE A LOVE FOR LEARNING

- 1. Discuss things you read and hear, especially the things you find interesting.
- 2. Ask how they feel about various issues including current events, relationships, and values. Allow them to have opinions without passing judgment. Ask them to help you understand why they feel the way they do.
- 3. Pursue your own with others. Remeinot match yours.



4. Encourage children & youth to have interests of their own. If they show curiosity about a hobby, area of study, sport, or instrument, encourage and support them in any way you can.

Engaging our Youth

25 Youth Project Ideas

- 1. Organize a youth forum or town hall meeting to highlight topics that youth have identified as critical community issues.
- 2. Offer a back-to-school health or community fair in conjunction with a local school district. Work with local healthcare providers to offer free screenings at the health fair, including physical, dental and hearing exams, in addition to free immunizations.



- 3. Provide safety identification for children and youth with serious chronic illnesses (medical bracelets or necklaces, etc.).
- 4. Organize a book or board game drive for a community center, children's after-school center, hospital facility or school library.
- 5. Supply Braille and large print books for children who are blind or visually impaired.
- 6. Sponsor an activity day for individuals with developmental disabilities.
- 7. Prepare and send care packages to military personnel.
- 8. Remodel a children's center or school room: paint, repair and landscape.
- 9. Assemble and provide care packages for homeless shelters or other facilities.



- 10. Make baby supply kits for newborns in need.
- 11. Assist at camps serving children with special needs.
- 12. Refurbish used bicycles for children.
- 13. Organize a highway or park clean-up.



- 14. Provide safe soft teddy bear toys (no small, removable parts) to local emergency service professionals for presentation to children during an emergency.
- 15. Donate supplies for orphanages, foster children or other children and youth in need.
- 16. Collect and donate supplies to a local school.
- 17. Tutor at an after school program.

Childhood vaccines are safe. Seriously.

Children should get vaccinated against preventable and potentially deadly diseases. Period.

That's what a project that screened more than 20,000 scientific titles and 67 papers on vaccine safety concludes this week. The review appears in the latest edition of the medical journal Pediatrics.

The evidence strongly suggests that side effects from vaccines are incredibly rare, the study authors said. They found no ties between vaccines and the rising number of children with autism, as a small but vocal group of anti-vaccine activists, including actors Jenny McCarthy and Jim Carey, have said.

The review also found no link between vaccines and childhood leukemia, something that was suggested in earlier studies. The researchers found that some vaccines did cause a few adverse effects but it was only for a tiny fraction of the population.

There was evidence that the meningococcal vaccine can lead to anaphylaxis -- a severe, whole-body allergic reaction -- in children allergic to ingredients in the vaccine. Other studies found the MMR vaccine was linked to seizures.

"Vaccines, like any other medication, aren't 100% risk free," said Dr. Ari Brown an Austin, Texas-based pediatrician and author of the popular book "Baby 411," who was not involved with the study. "You have a sore arm, redness at the injection site. Those are the things we see commonly. Fortunately the serious adverse effects is extremely rare."

Brown said parents ask her how safe vaccines are all the time. Some patients also ask if they should delay or stagger the vaccinations. She counsels against that practice. She said the younger the child, the more danger these diseases present. "By delaying the vaccines you're putting your child at risk," Brown said. The positive effects of vaccines dramatically outweigh the bad, experts said.

An editorial accompanying the study calls vaccines "one of the most successful public health achievements of the 20th century." Because of vaccines, many diseases that plagued children for centuries have all but been eliminated.

"There were good reasons that these diseases were targeted for vaccine development since they are so life-threatening," said Dr. Carrie Byington, vice-chair for research in the University of Utah's pediatrics department, and the new chair for the American Academy of Pediatrics committee on infectious diseases.

Millions of Americans live longer on average because of the protection vaccines provide. Life expectancy has gone up in the United States by more than 30 years. Infant mortality

decreased from 100 deaths per 1000 to 7 between the 1900s and 2000.

A vaccine for smallpox led the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to declare the disease eradicated in 1978. Prior to a vaccination for diphtheria, it was one of the most common causes of illness and death among children. Now it is rarely reported in the United States. Yet research shows there is still doubt among some medical residents about the effectiveness of vaccinations.

"That is particularly concerning for me," Byington said. "Young residents may be in the same position as young parents who have trained at a time, or lived at a time, when these diseases were extremely rare, and they may not have ever seen how serious a vaccine-preventable infection can be."

An increasing number of parents over the years have opted out of getting their children vaccinated. And that may be having a negative impact on the community's health.

A study found that large clusters of children who had not been vaccinated were close to the large clusters of whooping cough cases in the 2010 California epidemic. While California typically has higher vaccination rates than the rest of the country, that state is dealing with yet another whooping cough epidemic.

This spring also saw an 18-year high number of measles cases in the United States. The largest outbreak was in Ohio where the virus spread quickly among the Amish, who are mostly unvaccinated. This outbreak was a real surprise to health officials who thought that the infectious disease was thought to have been eliminated from the United States in 2000.

The editorial accompanying this latest study suggests doctors, who parents typically trust to tell the truth about medical information, need to use this study to speak with confidence about the importance of vaccinating children.

"Looking at all these mounds of data -- there is still no data that show an association that shows vaccine and autism," said Brown. "I would love it to close this chapter and move on. I don't think it will. But the more research, the more we learns about autism, the more we can reassure parents that there are no links here."

What are measles, mumps and rubella? Measles, mumps, and rubella are highly contagious viral diseases that have the potential to be very serious. They can be spread through contact with an infected person through the air.

The measles virus causes fever, cough, runny nose, pink eye, and rash. If the measles virus infects the lungs, it can cause pneumonia. Some older children infected with the virus will suffer from inflammation of the brain which can cause seizures and permanent brain damage.

The mumps virus usually causes fever, headache, and swollen glands. It can lead to deafness, meningitis, painful swelling of the testicles or ovaries and, rarely, death.

Rubella, also known as German measles, causes rash, low-grade fever, and arthritis. If a pregnant woman gets rubella she could have a miscarriage or her baby could be born with serious birth defects.

What is the MMR vaccine? The measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine is a recommended childhood vaccine. This three-in-one vaccine protects against measles, mumps, and rubella, and is required for children to enter school in most states. Children need two doses of the vaccine, while adults who need it should get at least one dose.

Who should get the MMR vaccine? Children should get the first dose of MMR vaccine at 12-15 months of age, and the second dose at 4-6 years of age. Children can actually get the second dose at any age, as long as it is at least 28 days after the first dose.

Adults who have not been vaccinated nor had the diseases, or don't know if they've been vaccinated or had the diseases, and who meet any of the following criteria, should get at least one dose:

- Adults born after 1957
- Work in a medical facility
- Women planning to or who may become pregnant, however women should avoid getting pregnant within 4 weeks of getting the MMR vaccin

Who should not get the MMR vaccine? Anyone who has ever had a life-threatening allergic reaction to gelatin, the antibiotic neomycin, or to a previous dose of MMR vaccine should not get this vaccine.

Anyone who is moderately or severely ill should probably wait until they recover before getting the vaccine.

Pregnant women should wait to get their MMR vaccine until after they have given birth. Women should avoid getting pregnant for four weeks after getting the MMR vaccine.

Anyone with the following characteristics should check with their healthcare provider about whether they should get the MMR vaccine:

- Has HIV/AIDS, or another disease that affects the immune system
- Being treated with drugs that affect the immune system, such as steroids, for two weeks or longer
- Has any kind of cancer
- Is taking cancer treatment with x-rays or drugs
- Has ever had a low platelet count (a blood disorder)

What are the side effects of the MMR vaccine? Mild-to-moderate problems:

- Fever, rash, and seizures
- Swollen glands in the cheeks or neck
- Temporary pain and stiffness in the joints
- Temporary low blood platelet count

Severe problems (rare):

- Deafness
- Permanent brain damage
- Serious allergic reactions, with symptoms including:
 - Difficulty breathing
 - Wheezing
 - Hives
 - o Pale skin
 - Fast heartbeat
 - Dizziness

Over-the-counter pain relievers such as acetaminophen or ibuprofen can help ease pain and reduce fever.

It's extremely rare for these vaccines to cause serious harm or death. If the person getting the vaccine has a serious reaction, seek immediate medical attention.

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
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Fellow Lions:


