Dear "Gold Standard" Lions of 18-D,

I hope that all of you have had a great Lions' August. The month has been extremely interesting to me, so I will go in reverse order.

On Sunday, 24 August, I attended an inspirational birthday celebration. Winder Lion Roy Rice, a Lion for 56 years, according to his wife, Lion Ruth, celebrated his 100th birthday at his lions club house. Lion Roy had a huge turn out of friends and family. What I find especially inspirational is that Lion Roy is a very active member of the Winder Lions Club! Not only is he serving as a club director this year, but every Friday night you can go play BINGO at the Winder Lions Club House and buy hot dogs to eat from Lion Roy. Using ID Al Brandel's motto, it is certain that the Winder Lions Club has a very special "every day hero" who is performing "miracles through service!"

Over the weekend of 15 – 17 August, I visited *Leader Dogs for the Blind* in Rochester, Michigan. For 70 years, Leader Dogs, founded by Lions, has been

providing dogs to blind adults that give them a new life of independence. In the past Lions' year 252 dogs were given to grateful blind adults and someone living in north Georgia is getting a Leader dog in the next few days. From seeing puppies being trained to being guided by a dog with my eyes covered, I was given an opportunity to see how the funds your clubs contribute to Leader Dogs providing sight services. In fact, I also saw two of Leader Dogs newest initiatives: GPS for blind adults and computer training that allows blind adults to qualify for office jobs and other positions. VDG Grace Clower and Leader Dogs Chair Diane Wall will also soon visit Leader Dogs, so adding Lion Diane to your club programs would be an excellent idea.

Camp Kudzu was in session just north of Cleveland the first week of August. Two hundred and fifty teen and pre-teen campers were present during this session; a 2nd session was held in June. A dance was on the schedule for the night I visited, but during the day the campers was doing everything any summer camp attendee can imagine doing! The only things different are the reminders that most of the campers suffer from Type I diabetes, so there is a lot of blood checking and the giving of insulin shots. Your financial support of Camp Kudzu is appreciated and several staff members especially thanked the Gainesville Lions Club for helping them handle the camper's luggage.

Other than the above events, I visited LCI, had a Council of Governor's meeting at the site of our state convention on Jekyll Island, attended three zone meetings, made four official visits to clubs, and met with our district MERL team. Not counting the miles I put on a rental car in Michigan and Illinois, I added approximately 1400 miles to my personal vehicles. As I said at the start, it was a very interesting month.



Three Ways to Strengthen Lions’ Service Mission

International President Brandel’s theme of Miracles Through Service and the role of Lions as Everyday Heroes will be emphasized on his visits to clubs and districts, in his written messages to Lions and through the materials and events coordinated by Lions Clubs International including THE LION Magazine, LCI’s Web site and seminars/ conferences. He also encourages every club to incorporate his theme in their newsletters, Web sites, press releases and even banners and posters. Feel free to appropriately borrow ideas and materials from LCI.

Renewing pride in being a Lion starts with a full awareness of Lions’ activities. And from pride will come greater retention and stronger, more heartfelt recruitment efforts.

To help spread the message of Miracles Through Service and Everyday Heroes and to simply strengthen Lions clubs, President Brandel also is emphasizing three objectives: teamwork, humanitarian services, and expanded advocacy/fundraising.

Humanitarian Service (Hands-on!)

Go ahead—pick a descriptive phrase. Lions are workers bees. We’re in the frontlines. We’re in the trenches. We roll up our sleeves. We’re not afraid to get our hands dirty. We do service, whether it’s running a vision testing machine, making sandwiches for disaster victims or driving an elderly person to a doctor’s appointment. Lions sincerely believe that no act of kindness is too small.

So in 2008-2009 Lions are urged to increase their hands-on service. They should especially focus on Lions Alert (emergency response planning – a great way to partner with local governments), Lions Quest (a schools-based life skills program), Leo clubs and other direct-impact programs. A Lion who gives his or her time and talent to others is a donor whose gift is priceless.

Expanded Advocacy/Fundraising

Last year Lions Clubs International Foundation was named as the best non-governmental organization worldwide, according to London-based Financial Times. LCIF came in first for its execution of programs, accountability and other factors. Lions enjoy highly productive relationships with many highly regarded partners: The Carter Center, Habitat for Humanity, Lenscrafters, Special Olympics, Eli Lilly, Johnson and Johnson, the National Eye Institute, the U.S. State Department and others. LCI does not go it alone. It leverages its reputation and resources to form partnerships in order to further its service goals.

Under the leadership of International President Brandel in 2008-2009, and the assistance and dedication of Lions around the world, LCI will deepen its ties with current partners and form new relationships. Lions will be able to utilize the expertise, funds and resources of our partners, and thereby expand the scope and reach of our service.

World Sight Day 2008 to be held in Arizona, USA

The 2008 international event will be held in Arizona October 15-17, 2008. Albert Brandel and Maureen Murphy will preside over the events. Lions in Arizona and New Mexico will hold vision screenings in the town of Window Rock on the Navajo reservation to test for glaucoma, diabetic eye diseases and other eye diseases, and provide glasses to those who need them. Lions are also planning a diabetes screening and screenings at the Lions Vision Center, both to be held in the Phoenix area, the capital of Arizona. Local and state dignitaries are expected to participate in the events.

- **Distributing Lions Eye Health Program material at a health fair, library or community center**
- **Launching or expanding a community-wide eyeglass recycling program**

2008-2009 District Goals for the Vision & Hearing Screening Committee

As District Chairman for the Vision & Hearing Screening Committee, my goal in 2007-2008 was to have 100% of the Clubs in District 18D to provide a Vision Screening in their Communities. I would have liked to have had District 18D, Director Bill Mundy report at the State Convention in May that all the Clubs held a Vision Screening. At the State Convention he reported 34 Clubs out of 36 Clubs or 93% of the Clubs had a Vision Screening in their Communities. I want to thank you, and congratulate all the Clubs for holding a Vision Screening program last year.

As Lions, we all know the best keep secret is – Who are the Lions, and what do they do? Many citizens in our Communities know us as a group of men and women asking them to support our Raffles, Dinners, etc. The time has come that we need to give back to our Community. What better way than to have a Vision & Hearing Screening at a Health Fair or Dinners your Club is having.

The goals are as follows:

1. 100% of the Clubs in District 18D have a Vision Screening and Hearing Screening.
2. District 18D as a whole will screen at least 2000 individuals for Vision.
3. District 18D as a whole will screen at least 1200 individuals for Hearing.
4. Clubs will have at least 6 members trained for a Vision Screening.
5. Clubs will have at least 2 members trained for a Hearing Screening.

These goals are high, but are attainable if every Club in District 18D joins the bandwagon, and becomes involved.




June 2008 Activities



I would have liked to have had District 18D, Director Bill Mundy report at the State Convention in May that all the Clubs held a Vision Screening. At the State Convention he reported 34 Clubs out of 36 Clubs or 93% of the Clubs had a Vision Screening in their Communities. I want to thank you, and congratulate all the Clubs for holding a Vision Screening program last year.

As Lions, we all know the best keep secret is – Who are the Lions, and what do they do? Many citizens in our Communities know us as a group of men and women asking them to support our Raffles, Dinners, etc. The time has come that we need to give back to our Community. What better way than to have a Vision & Hearing Screening at a Health Fair or Dinners your Club is having.

The goals are as follows:

- 1 100% of the Clubs in District 18D have a Vision Screening and Hearing Screening.
- 2 District 18D as a whole will screen at least 2000 individuals for Vision.
- 3 District 18D as a whole will screen at least 1200 individuals for Hearing.
- 4 Clubs will have at least 6 members trained for a Vision Screening.
- 5 Clubs will have at least 2 members trained for a Hearing Screening.

These goals are high, but are attainable if every Club in District 18D joins the bandwagon, and becomes involved.

My first month as President of our Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind, Inc. has been fast paced, a learning exercise, heart wrenching, and a joy. Following is the status of our Camp:

- We completed the Camping Season on 7/25/08 with a total of 94 Campers. This number is low as compared to 2006 but this is always the case when we transition Directors. My number one goal was to have a successful camping season and we achieved that goal. An outstanding effort on the part of Lion Ed Ressler and Kim to pull the season off.
- Lions Day was a great success this year and it was our pleasure to host the Council at our Camp. We have been getting nothing but positive comments from Lions throughout the State. What a fun day that was!
- On 7/23/08 Kimberly Miller and I set through 11.5 hours of audit by the American Camp Association and we did outstanding. The outcome is that we are re-certified for another 3 years by ACA.
- My number two goal was to get us a new, highly qualified Director for the Camp on board as soon as we could. I asked Lion Ed Ressler (then President) to appoint a committee for this process. That committee was Chaired by Lion Stan Bazemore with Lions Mel Redman, Doy Barks, Jim Lapham and I serving. The outcome of a very intense process is that we have a unanimous vote of the Executive Committee to hire Kristen Picus as our new Executive Director of our Camp. I am so excited, and proud of our Hiring Committee and Executive Committee for putting forth a great effort. I will meet with Ms. Picus at the camp on 8/16/08 to start her on-boarding process. Goal #2 MET!

Just one week ago our Camp and indeed the Lions of Georgia lost a dear friend. With Lion Mel's passing we lost an advocate for service to our Camp and a great deal of knowledge. The transition of Treasurer from Lion Mel to Lion Debbie was not as clean as we would have liked and there were gaps. Lion Debbie, Lion Mel and I met on Sunday 7/27/08 and closed many gaps but still there are a few items to work out. The good news is that Lion Debbie is outstanding at her job and we are catching up.

When I met with the Council on the 20th the Camp, we discussed our financial situation. We were \$140,000 short on income for Lions Year 2007-2008. We had at that time \$39,000 in our checking account. When I met with Debbie today we have just \$8,000 in our account. We are in a financial lull as we expected we would be and are going to need to borrow from the Trust Fund to pay bills for this past Camping Season. I have asked Lion Debbie to contact Lion Ed Ressler and start the process of borrowing the funds to cover those costs and for payroll for the month of August. We are going to have to borrow \$35,000 from the Trust Fund to cover this. It is our hope that funds start rolling in to help us out of this situation.

A couple notes of interest that came out of the Council's Orientation at the Camp:

- I have sent an e-mail to Lion Haynes Townsend requesting a slot in his training program for the Vice District Governors. Per your request this would be a good opportunity to brief them on what our Camp is all about.
- I have contacted CC Kembra and PCC Mark Miller via e-mail to start the dialog on having a joint meeting of the Lighthouse and Camp. I would love to take a proposal to our Board of Directors for vote at the November 1st Meeting. I look forward to working with Lions Kembra and Mark to make this happen.

I look forward to seeing you all once again in Warner Robins when we get to host the Council once again.

A Recent Expedition to Where? Camp Kudzu!

Sitting in a wooded area beyond Cleveland, Georgia you will find Camp Kudzu taking root on the grounds of Camp Barney Medintz, a resident summer camp of the Marcus Jewish Community Center of Atlanta. An amazing adventure awaits every child from 8 to 18 with Type 1 diabetes who bravely ventures beyond its gate and explores it more than 100 acres. The camp is full of fresh air and laughter, forest and starry skies, and a feeling of refuge for the children and teens. Families of first-time campers often feel trepidation upon leaving their child "alone" but come to view the experience of Camp Kudzu as a blessing for them and their child. The camp offers a wide array of activities including mountain biking, water skiing, horseback riding, canoeing, arts and crafts, sailing, kayaking, hiking, swimming, sports, vertical challenge course, soccer, tennis and much, much more! Besides summer camp there are family week-ends and teen retreats.

The Camp is a non-profit organization and is not affiliated with any other diabetes association. It is staffed by caring, dedicated trained volunteers, medical professionals, and a small administrative staff. Camp Kudzu was started in 1999 by parents, healthcare professionals, community leaders, and physicians who wished to provide for the special medical and emotional needs of children with insulin-dependent juvenile diabetes. Each year, volunteers arrive from as far away as Illinois, California, and Colorado. They are from such diverse professions as an officer from Forsythe County's Sheriff's Department, a Chemistry Professor, and a Photographer. There are three volunteer pediatric endocrinologists rotating staff duties, 190 adult volunteers, a clinician for every two cabins, and one paid staff person. Apparently word has gotten out that Camp Kudzu is the best medically equipped and professionally staffed diabetic camp in the United States. It has an over-night sick room with IV capabilities, 120 staff members carrying backpacks prepared with everything needed to assist a child in distress.

Many parents are so pleased with the camp that they often volunteer their services the following camping season and many teens return to be trained as counselors. 60% of the volunteers return year after year. 10% of the volunteers work both the Camp in Cleveland, GA as well as one located in Rutledge, GA. Many of the camp attendees return to train as counselors.

Camp Kudzu's goal is not only to make available to the children educational and recreational activities but also to offer networking with their peers and a place where they feel "normal". It is comforting to know that your new friends are experiencing the same day to day struggles and understand what you are going through. It is critical to the diabetic child's long-term health to learn and retain the self-management skills taught at Camp Kudzu. For many, it is the first time that they checked their own blood sugar levels, counted carbohydrates, changed a pump injection site, or gave themselves an insulin injection. "Golden Syringe" and "Golden Pump" awards and certificates are given to those who experienced "firsts"- the first time they took their blood sugar levels; the first time they moved a pump site, and so one. Encouragement around the camp abounds. Eager campers share their enthusiasm.

This summer at Camp Kudzu, 250 diabetic children and teens learned that they are not alone in their struggle with diabetes. Approximately 220 children attended the camp in Rutledge, GA. It is the hope of Camp Kudzu to be able to provide another camping experience in South Georgia by next season or to offer the camp for two weeks instead of one. This would increase the number of campers to more than 540. This is a huge increase from the original camping session that began in June, 2000 with 90 children.

As the number of children and families grow, and the number of volunteers increase, so does Camp Kudzu's needs. It is funded by contributions given through the generosity of corporations, foundations, friends and family. Pharmaceutical companies donate \$180,000 of goods and services each year. The camper fee for one child for summer camp is \$500. Scholarships are available to ensure that every child with juvenile diabetes can benefit from all that Camp Kudzu has to offer.

What role do Lions Clubs play in helping Camp Kudzu reach its goals? The Gainesville Lions Club volunteers its time and services at the start and finish of every camp season. They are available to transport the camper's luggage to and from the meeting area at White County High School to and from Camp Kudzu. This is a sizable task as there are three buses of parents and children bringing all their camp needs. That is a lot of

luggage to be conveyed!

Most of the Clubs in District 18-D contribute monetary funds to the Camp each year. The cost of sending one diabetic child for one week to Camp Kudzu is over \$1400. Various Lions Club donate \$500.00 per sponsored camper to be used as a scholarship fund for those who need the assistance. The Snellville Lions Club donates \$1000.00 each year. Camp Kudzu is requesting from Lions Clubs International Foundation a grant of \$150,000 in order to expand their facilities and volunteer base.

Last year 426 children attended Camps. That amounted to 30,000 finger pricks, 5,000 injections, and 1000 pump site changes. Remember those backpacks that 120 volunteers carry with them? Each one is fully equipped by hand. Volunteers are needed year round to help sort and bag these supplies. Jill Sax, who works in the Infirmary, needs help with this project.


- Food, shelter or clothing
