Dear Lion,

Judy and I recently returned from visiting our <u>disaster relief</u> projects in Joplin, Missouri, USA. I can tell you that the disaster is unlike anything I've ever seen. More than 7,500 homes were destroyed, and 50,000 people remain displaced. Seven Lions were among those who lost everything. In the middle of this disaster, the local Lions' commitment to helping their



friends and neighbors rebuild is truly inspiring.

With your generous support, Lions Clubs International Foundation, local Lions, and Lions from surrounding States are mobilizing more than US\$150,000. Lions are traveling from near and far to provide first-hand assistance.

We are able to be more effective by leveraging these funds through working with other relief organizations. Working with First Response Team of America, a non-profit organization, the Lions have helped clear debris from 23



home sites. Judy and I helped clear one home site during our visit, and I must tell you this is hard, hot, but rewarding work!

We also took part in a shopping trip at a local grocery store.

The Lions bought needed food supplies for Lafayette House, a home for battered women and children, which has seen a 66 percent increase in needed services since the storm. To ensure the school year will begin on time on August 17, the local Lions are providing funds for needed school materials.

These projects are just a few examples of how we are helping Joplin rebuild. Because Lions live in the affected communities, we are committed to helping for as long as it takes, even though we know this will take several years. Other organizations come in, make an impact and then leave, but Lions are still there every day giving their hearts and hands to bring hope to so many in need. You've heard me say

that Lions stands for "Loving Individuals Offering Needed Services." I witnessed this in Joplin!

Joplin is not the only place where our disaster relief efforts remain ongoing. Later this month, Judy and I will travel to Haiti to meet with Lions and other relief organizations. Wherever there is a need, you can be sure Lions will be there!

Lions, we are changing the world at our fingertips. By serving in our communities, we are having an impact around the entire globe.

Opening Eyes in Greece

The Special Olympics World Summer Games in Athens, Greece, 2,566 athletes benefited from the Opening Eyes program. More than 100 Lions volunteers helped to screen the athletes and 607 prescription eyeglasses were distributed on site and 152 referrals were made to ophthalmologists and optometrists in the respective home countries. The program is a partnership of Lions and Special Olympics to improve



eye care for Special Olympics athletes. Funded by LCIF, this year the partnership enters its 11th year of changing lives.

LIONS PLANTING TREES 2011-2012

Planting <u>1,000.000</u> trees is a goal that Lions International President Tam has set for clubs worldwide. Since there are about 1.3 million Lions, every Lion would have to plant only a single tree to more than meet the goal. Planting trees provides many benefits including environmental, health, economical and social.

There are a number of varieties of trees available including pines, oaks, other hardwoods, fruit and ornamental trees. Planning a project for your community can be fun as well as rewarding for your club and community. Depending on the nature and size of your project help is available from the state, arbor organizations and the private sector. Planting trees in parks, greenways and around public building and schools are potential areas to consider. Working with city, county and state governments is essential for getting approval for planning and completing the project.

The main web site for the GA Forestry Commission (www.gfc.state.ga.us/Seedlings/OrderingInfo.cfm) gives excellent links to many helpful sites. If every club would plant at least 50 trees we would more than meet a district goal. Clubs could also split up bundles of seedlings among its members and the trees could be plant in various locations if a particular project was not undertaken. Clubs or zones could also combine for large projects or to save money. (i.e. A bundle of 50 trees is \$55 but a bundle of 250 is \$160.)

The bigger the group the greater joy in fellowship. And sharing the task, with larger numbers, lightens the workload!

Let us shift our perspective making an honest assessment of the circumstances around us and how to use them effectively. Then we must seek to open new possibilities that can emerge during Lions year 2011-2012. Revisiting – Redefining – Assessing Circumstances – and Remaining Open to New Possibilities.

Never done it before?

Who knows – IT MIGHT WORK!

Clubs that participate will look at their community needs, review their membership experience, use existing resources and develop action plans. Through this process - taking a look at your club's past, present and future - you will be able to enhance the motivation and focus of your current members, and identify and attract the attention of potential members who share in the club's vision and mission.

If you are unable to arrange a CEP workshop prior to the end of your year, please work with next year's president and your club's board of directors to have one early in the 2011-2012 year. Hey There Y'all Club Membership Chairperson.



Certified Guiding Lions

Lions,

This is one program that the district will be hearing much about from me as the 18-D District GLT Coordinator. There is new program material available now for this program.

Since there is new material, everyone on the current list will need to be recertified, including me. This is an important job in our district, because we must have knowledgeable Lions to guide new clubs that are formed and, in some cases, guide existing clubs. There will be some sessions in the future that will include Certified Guiding Lion training. In the meantime, because Certified Guiding Lions are needed immediately, you may go onto the LCI website and complete the course there for your recertification.

If you wish to take the course online, you can go to the LCI website, www.lionsclubs.org and enter Certified Guiding Lion
Training in the SEARCH box in the upper right-hand corner of the first screen. On the next screen, choose Certified Guiding Lion
Program. This will give you the course. You will need to study the course, and upon completion, complete the test and the
completion verification form. After completing both forms, mail the test and the verification form to me. I will send it to LCI,
and your name will be placed on the list of Certified Guiding Lions. Once you are currently certified, you will need to be
recertified every 3 years.

If you have any questions about this process, please let me know. Also, please encourage other Lions in your clubs and around the district to get involved and become Certified Guiding Lions. Thanks for all you do for Lions.


CERTIFIED GUIDING LION TRAINING



These outstanding doctors are found to perform a most thorough examination, followed by their staff preparing the patient for glasses and submitting the prescription order for glasses to the Georgia Light House (Eye Clinic Program), with the patient subject to receive their glasses in a relatively timely fashion, at approximately 2 weeks. Moreover, the same gratitude goes out to the dedicated Toccoa Lions who participate in the annual fundraiser (Pancake Breakfast) with proceeds going to the Sight Conservation program. Note: For the benefit of new board and/or Lions club members, Sight Conservation pays for glasses for both Lions Club and Open Arms (the free clinic) referrals. Lions Club referrals usually consist of patients who have been seen previously by one of our participating doctors or new patients who qualify for services. Such individuals are usually on Medicaid or Medicare (sometimes both), but determined to be experiencing extreme financial difficulties or meet poverty guidelines. Open Arms referrals are commonly individuals who have been screened through the Open Arms staff for medicals which includes eye examinations depending on the medical assessment and then referred to one of our beloved doctors for eye exams. Once a month each doctor donates their time and staff to serve such individuals in determining one's need for glasses or if there may be other areas of concern as a result of the eye exam.

Incidentally, as it was mentioned above about the pancake fund raiser for Sight Conservation, there is also a second fund raiser of the same with proceeds going to Open Arms, with our dedicated Lions participating in this fund raiser the same as noted above. However, not enough thanks and gratitude can go out to Lion Russ Paxton who chairs both fund raisers, while having a relatively successful outcome through his diligent organizing of this committee.





Guide Dogs and GPS Make Perfect Pairing

The Kapten PLUS With an emphasis on the PLUS





With the combination of his Leader Dog and his GPS, Carroll can easily find the restaurant where he and his wife Susan planned to meet for lunch. Things move fast in the technology world. Just a few years ago people were learning what the letters "GPS" stood for. Now we're hearing new terms like "location technology" to describe the technology used to let us know where we are and "personal navigational device" to describe the equipment we use to access the location technology (of which GPS is just one type). It can be hard to stay on top of the changes.

Every day Leader Dog is working to identify technological advances that may prove beneficial to our clients. When the Kapten*, built by Kapsys of France, popped onto our radar in December of 2009, we knew that with a few modifications, the device would be an improvement over the current GPS we were supplying to our clients.

Carroll Jackson laughs when he recalls receiving his first GPS from Leader Dog in 2007. The Trekker Maestro had 36 buttons. It was so large and cumbersome that it had to be worn on a strap across his chest. "It was a very intimidating unit," he said. "Of course at the time we thought it was wonderful, even if it did make us all look like crossing guards."

A Seasoned GPS User—Carroll Jackson

When he received the Trekker Breeze two years later, he was happy that it was smaller and only had nine buttons, but there was still room for improvement.

Carroll agreed to test the newest GPS unit, the Kapten PLUS, for Leader Dog in November 2010 and describes it as much smaller and significantly less expensive (\$295) than earlier GPS devices. The Kapten PLUS also includes a voice recognition mode, which the retired educator said makes for "a very powerful device."

"It's about the size of a deck of cards," he said, "and so much easier to use."

After working with the two earlier GPS devices, Carroll was happy to see that the Kapten PLUS has a longer battery life, the ability to verbally enter new addresses and a feature for finding and navigating to restaurants, hotels and other locations. But perhaps his favorite feature is the voice recognition capability.

"Voice recognition is a beautiful thing," Carroll said. "If I want to know what time it is, I just ask the Kapten PLUS. If I want to know where I am, I just ask, 'Where am I?' I can't imagine not having a GPS now."

As a Leader Dog field representative, Carroll and his Leader Dog, Hunter, travel the country speaking at many Lions Club conventions. He enjoys demonstrating the GPS to a group of interested Lions but acknowledges that he contacts as many, or possibly more, people when he travels to and from conventions.

Carroll was waiting for a plane at O'Hare Airport in Chicago when he used his Kapten PLUS to check the time. The man seated next to him asked about it, so he started explaining how it works. Soon a group of about 20 people had gathered, which led to Carroll giving an impromptu Leader Dog presentation. When he stood up to go to his plane, the group applauded. When he got to the stairs of the small commuter plane on the tarmac, he asked the attendant if there was anyone standing at the window watching him board the plane. When he replied "Yes," Carroll turned and waved to the crowd watching from the window.

"Now that's what you call marketing," Carroll laughed.

A First-Time GPS User—James Ryan

James and Leader Dog Claire frequented a local Rochester coffee shop during training. James used his Kapten PLUS to find the location and Claire helped him locate the door. As an IT manager at a Seattle hospital, James Ryan spends his days working with technology. The self-proclaimed techie admits that his love of technology spills over into his home life as well. And now, with his recent introduction to the Kapten PLUS GPS, technology will also be included in his daily travels.

James traveled to Michigan recently to receive his third Leader Dog, a yellow Labrador named Claire. What he didn't know was that he would be receiving a free Kapten PLUS at the same time.

"I was not aware that I would be getting a Kapten PLUS prior to arriving at Leader Dog," James said. "It will be a great tool to use along with my dog."

The Kapten PLUS is James' first GPS, and he found it easy to use, for the techie and the non-techie alike. "Even if someone is not technical, it comes with great instructions," he said. "All you have to do is spend some time with the user guide. It is very easy to interact with."



After working with the Kapten PLUS, James believes it will have a broad appeal to both cane and dog users. "All different types of people can use it in different ways to fill in the gaps," he said. "To use it along with a dog is great, but if you use a cane, or have to go back to using a cane for some reason, it will be amazingly helpful."

James is looking forward to using it when he explores new cities with Claire. An avid traveler, he especially likes that the Kapten PLUS comes pre-loaded with a map of all 50 states and that it groups points of interest together by category (for example restaurants, shopping, etc). However, his favorite feature, whether he is in an unfamiliar city or his own hometown, is that he can easily determine where he is by using the "Where am I?" button on the unit, or by just saying "Where am I?" since the device has voice recognition.

"Before I would have had to ask someone what intersection I was at," he said. "But now the Kapten PLUS can tell me. It definitely will give me more independence."

* Kapten refers to the device built by Kapsys of France. Kapten PLUS is the modified device for use by people who are blind or visually impaired.

Learning Ally Version 2.0 Audiobook Player Brings Accessible Books to Apple Devices for People With Disabilities

Upgraded player expands accessibility and ease of use on iPad, iPhone and iPod touch



Learning Ally, a 63-year old nonprofit organization serving over 300,000 individuals across the U.S. with learning differences, visual impairment and reading disabilities, has released an upgrade of its popular iOS application, which enables the entire Learning Ally library of downloadable DAISY-

formatted audio books to be played on Apple devices, including the iPhone, iPad and iPod touch.

The upgraded app, renamed <u>Learning Ally Audio</u> following the organization's name change earlier this year, is available to Learning Ally members for \$19.99 via the Apple iTunes store. It offers advanced accessibility features for ease of learning, including page and chapter navigation, variable speed and pitch control, bookmarking capabilities, and Apple VoiceOver compatibility. Users will also enjoy significant new features, including:

- Play while locked. The new version can continue playback after the Apple device locks and turns off the screen to save battery life. This function can be turned on or off through the iOS "Settings" app.
- Open with last book played at last point played. The new version resumes reading where users left off the last time that they ran the app. This feature can be turned on or off through the iOS "Settings" app.
- Remember speed control and other settings. When these settings are changed, they will be remembered across all books and sessions.

"I used to wait for long periods of time for someone to come along to help me to pick up dropped items, open doors and get around campus," Lorinda explains. "Remy opens doors, helps me in the classroom, helps me with transactions at the campus food court and gives me a sense of independence that I've never had before," Lorinda continues. Now instead of meeting new people because she needs to ask them for help, Lorinda meets new people because they want to know more about her and her dog.

And Lorinda's life has been transformed. "I feel such an extreme amount of confidence as I go around campus with Remy; it's a sense of independence I've never felt before," concludes Lorinda.

Interesting Facts about Diabetes

Overview

Diabetes is nothing to take lightly. It's nothing to get all worked up about, either. Many people with diabetes live long, healthy lives. The secret is good self-care, proper diet, monitoring and exercise if you have Type 2. For some Type 2 diabetics and all Type 1's, you need to take insulin. But diabetes is not a death sentence, and insulin is nothing to fear.

Prevention

You can't prevent Type 1 diabetes. It just happens, and science isn't sure why. It usually starts in childhood, but can occur at any age. Basically, the pancreas quits working and no longer produces insulin. The only remedy is to inject insulin.

Type 2 diabetes is largely genetic, and your risks go up if you have a parent or sibling who has the disease. However, you can become a Type 2 diabetic even without the genetic predisposition if you are obese or have unhealthy eating habits. Type 2 diabetics make insulin, but can't metabolize it properly. Maintaining a normal weight, eating a healthy diet and getting plenty of exercise are the best defenses.

Unfortunately, many people don't practice good eating habits or exercise, and Type 2 diabetes is at epidemic levels among Americans. Sadly, many children are now being diagnosed with Type 2. In the past, it was primarily a disease of adults, hence the name: adult onset diabetes.

Monitoring

People with either type of diabetes need to monitor their blood sugar. Many monitors are available, from the strictly utilitarian to fashion colors. Because monitoring is so important, many insurance programs pay the full cost of monitors and test strips. New monitors also allow alternate site testing. This means you no longer have to prick your finger to draw a small drop of blood. Now many meters allow you to draw blood from your arm where there are few nerve cells.

Type 1 diabetics must take insulin for the rest of their lives. Type 2 diabetics may not require medication, may take pills only or may require a combination of pills and insulin.

Don't be afraid to take insulin. New delivery systems and tiny needles make it almost painless. Insulin pumps are painless to use. For those who choose injections, you can give the shot in several sites that have few nerve endings. The fewer the nerve endings, the lower your chances of hitting one.

Insulin comes in different strengths. The American standard is U-100. If you have to get insulin while traveling outside the United States, you may have to find out what the conversion rate is and buy different syringes.

Sugar and Diabetes

Many people believe that diabetics can't have sweets at all. That is a myth. As long as you count the sweets into your meal plan, and include protein with your sweets, there is no problem. The key is moderation.

History

Diabetes has been around for centuries. Ancient physicians used to diagnose it by sipping the patient's urine. The advent of blood tests and urine test strips, and then monitors, made diagnosis and control much easier. Even as late as the first half of the 20th century, diabetes was hard to control, and many people died or suffered serious complications.



For a student using insulin, diabetes must be managed 24/7, including the many hours spent at school, on field trips and in extracurricular activities.

Some families can send their cana with diabetes to senior in the morning and feel confident that the school will be prepared to provide the diabetes care that meets their child's needs. Other families worry that their child won't have access to good diabetes management, that their child will be excluded from activities or have to take an exam when blood glucose levels are plummeting.

Contest Guidelines

Each essay must be submitted with a completed entry form. Essays must be no longer than 500 words in length, submitted in English, type-written in black ink and double-spaced.

The grand prize winner will be notified on or before June 1.

Engage Youth Through Lions Quest


