Sharing the Vision World Sight Day 11 October 2012

World Sight Day is an annual day of awareness to focus global attention on blindness, visual impairment and rehabilitation of the visually impaired held on the second Thursday in October.

World Sight Day is observed around the world by all partners involved in preventing visual impairment or restoring sight. It is also the main advocacy event for the prevention of blindness and for "Vision 2020: The Right to Sight", a global effort to prevent blindness created by WHO and the International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness.

Lions World Sight Day – Focusing Attention on Preventing Blindness and Improving Sight

For more than 10 years, Lions World Sight Day, held annually in October, has focused attention on eliminating preventable blindness and improving sight. On World Sight Day, Lions clubs around the world conduct special sight-related projects including:

- Collecting eyeglasses.
- Conducting vision and diabetes screenings.
- Planning educational programs to inform their communities about the importance of eye health and diseases such as diabetes that can impair sight.

Decide who is going to organize and collect eyeglasses for your Sight Night activity. Consider partnering with your Leo Club, LensCrafters store or other organizations in the community (i.e. Boy or Girl Scouts, schools, etc.) Your club can partner with more than one group or organization. In celebration of International Literacy Day on September 8, the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) is holding a special event involving key discussions with world leaders to highlight the importance of literacy worldwide. Linda Madden will speak about the power of community in increasing literacy for children and adults, focusing on Lions clubs' efforts among the blind and visually impaired. There will also be an eyeglass recycling activity to show attendees how they can contribute in their community and help children around the world have better vision. The Reading Action Program is a call to action for every Lions club around the world to organize service projects and activities that underscore the importance of reading and address specific needs related to illiteracy within their own community.

Many clubs have already taken great strides to bridge the gaps in literacy and education. The following segment of the LQ - Lions Quarterly Video Magazine shows how Tucson Downtown Lions Club of Arizona, USA, introduces reading into one of its ongoing activities. The club promotes the importance of parents and children reading together, while addressing the need for healthy vision. They donate books along with free eye exams for parents and their children.

Lions and Leos will be recognized for their accomplishments through the World of Service Awards, including awards for Best Long-Term Reading Action Program and Best Reading Action Program Rap Video.

Dear Lion,

Right now all over the world, there are children who are sick with a fever, runny nose, swollen eyes and cough. Over time, a rash appears. This is no ordinary childhood sickness. This is measles, and it can be deadly. Parents throughout the world experience their child becoming sick with measles just because they do not have access to a simple preventative vaccine.



I've always believed that one person can make a difference, but that by acting together, we are able to do so much more. Last year, I challenged you to plant one million trees. You not only met that challenge, you exceeded it by planting 10 million trees. October will mark the anniversary of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's challenge to Lions - raise US\$10 million to help eliminate measles to be matched by the Gates Foundation with US\$5 million. I not only believe that we will meet their challenge in the coming months, I believe that we can exceed it. This year, we will help millions of children around the world and confirm why the Gates Foundation knows we are such valuable partners.

Thanks to many generous Lions, donations to the <u>One Shot</u>, <u>One Life: Lions Measles Initiative</u> have reached more than US\$5 million. But, Lions and LCIF are just halfway to our goal. There is still work to be done.

Measles kills hundreds of children each day. Many others suffer from severe complications, including blindness, brain damage and hearing loss. With an inexpensive vaccine made possible by the Measles Initiative, Lions have the power to ensure that children around the world have access to a healthier childhood through a simple vaccination.

When we believe, nothing is impossible. It's time to get involved.

As a parent, I know the importance of supporting children in every way possible. And, as a Lion, I know the influence and impact our association can have on youth. I experienced this last year in working with Leo clubs around the world. Each time I met a Leo, I was inspired by their enthusiasm and dedication to service. It is important to give our support to these young adults and others in our communities.



As Chairperson of our Foundation, I am also inspired by how LCIF supports youth. LCIF's Lions Quest program teaches students in all grades how to interact with others in a positive way, and how to understand one another. These skills are sometimes overlooked and yet, much needed. Lions Quest has been proven to improve test scores, change

attitudes about substance abuse and violence and lower the risk of dropping out of school.

Lions Quest has impacted over 12 million students around the world and trained over 500,000 teachers to teach these vital skills in the classroom. Now, Lions Quest not only reaches children in school, it also supports children outside of school through its new program, Out-of-School Time. This program can be used in community centers, Lions camps and any other place where students go outside of school. By giving students support both in and out of school, it enables them to make better choices and lead more positive lives.

As you work to "Engage our Youth" through this month's Global Service Action Campaign, I hope you remember that our Foundation not only supports youth through Lions Quest, but also through grant projects. Imagine the joy of a disabled child when a playground is built allowing them to finally participate in play. Imagine giving children a home off of the streets. Imagine saving the sight of a child through an eye screening. These projects are made a reality through LCIF.

Improving the health of young people is an important role of our Foundation. One way that you can do that through LCIF is by supporting the One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative. When you believe in One Shot, One Life, you are supporting Lions' efforts to be a leading force in measles prevention.

Last October, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation challenged Lions to raise US\$10 million for measles. We need to act today to help save 157 million children around the world from measles and to meet the challenge this year. We are at nearly seventy percent of our goal. Will you help us meet this challenge? Every dollar can make a difference in the life of a child.

Thank you for believing in and supporting our youth. Together, we can give the next generation skills to enjoy their childhood and grow into successful adults.

Measles Initiative

The Lions Measles Initiative will be continued into the 2012-2013 Lions' year. LCIF announced in October of 2011 the intention to raise US\$10 million for measles vaccinations and education to match the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's US\$5 million challenge grant. As of July, LCIF has raised US\$5.2 million. We will soon be approaching the one year anniversary of the Gates Challenge grant and we need your help to complete the second half of Lions commitment. There are vaccination campaigns taking place in the next few months that need our immediate assistance. Lions Quest Impacts Youth After School. Lions Quest Skills for Adolescence for Out-of-School Time (OST) program has moved out of the pilot stage and is now ready for use in community centers, after-school programs and



middle schools. Recently added OST training workshops provide traditional face-to-face professional development, and a newly developed webinar series provides on-demand support of program implementation. The OST program began in New York, USA, thanks to District 20-O Lions. And, Lions in Multiple District 27-A in Wisconsin, USA, used Core 4 Grant funds to begin OST in Milwaukee Public Schools' summer program. After-school care plays a vital role in the learning and development of youth, and Lions can do their part by helping to expand Lions Quest in their communities.

Pit Stop One

How well do you know the clubs in your district? To grow membership and strengthen clubs you need to know which clubs need the most help. Listen to club officers, stay flexible and keep in mind that some old ways of doing things may need to be revised or discarded. See <u>District Pit Stop Checklist</u> for a full list of things to do before the end of September.

Fast Start

The race to the 2012-2013 World of Service Fast Start Awards is a four month sprint and the first month is already past! District governors now have less than three months to charter two new clubs or achieve net membership growth to be recognized at the Cruising Speed level or to charter five new clubs AND achieve positive membership growth to be recognized at the Passing Speed level.

Nominations must be submitted to the current President of the Past District Governors Association, PCC Grace Clower, 2929 Sandra Drive, Snellville, GA, or graceclower@bellsouth.net. Please see the criteria below for nominating Lions for the Hall of Fame.

Eligibility Criteria:

- 1. All nominees living or deceased must have served Lionism for at least ten (10) years. In addition, the Lion/Lioness must have served honorably, faithfully, and with due diligence. All living nominees must be current members in good standing.
- 2. In order to nominate a candidate, the Club must agree in writing to provide the necessary funds to purchase the plaque(s) for its nominees.
- 3. The nomination letter, of not more than two (2) typewritten pages (double spaced), must be signed by the Hall of Fame Chairperson of the club, must name the Lion (address and telephone) must list his/her accomplishments in Lionism and in his/her community, must list with dates any awards or recognition in Lionism, must list with dates any leadership positions in Lionism, must include a statement of endorsement by his/her Lions Club and the date, and must include a statement of intention to be present at the annual 18-D Hall of Fame celebration, if possible (illness). The nomination of any candidate not selected may be updated and resubmitted in subsequent years.
- 4. The applications must be postmarked no later than September 15 and sent to the current President of the Past District Governors' Association, District 18-D. A selection committee composed of the three (3) most recent active Past District Governors (the most recent active PDG is chair), will submit selected candidates to the District Governor for recognition and presentation of a plaque at the annual 18-D Hall of Fame celebration.
- 5. The selection committee must complete the selection process by October 1st. At that time, the home clubs will be billed for the total cost of the plaque and must pay by October 15th to allow PDG President sufficient time to order the plaques for presentation.

Nomination Categories:

- A. All 18-D Past International Directors living and deceased may be automatically selected, provided their club nominates and agrees to purchase the plaque.
- B. Past District Governors who have served District 18-D may be nominated by the home club regardless of that club's current district designation.
- C. Each Lions Club having served in District 18-D may submit two (2) nominees, living or deceased, annually for possible induction into the Lions Hall of Fame.

Taylor is a graduate of Young Harris College and North Georgia College and a retired Towns County Georgia History and U.S. History teacher. Having developed a keen interest in local history, he was appointed Towns County historian by past Commissioner Jack Dayton. He is also the editor of "Hearthstones of Home", the Towns County heritage book published in 1983.

Taylor shared some interesting history on how some places in the county were named. Hog Creek was so named because in the old days hogs were not fenced in but fenced out of gardens and other places. For some reason the mostly congregated near this particular creek and in the fall, their owners would come to the creek to round up the hogs they owned that where identified by a registered mark on each hog. Airline Road in Young Harris was so named not because there was any airport nearby but it marked the dividing line among "heirs" of the property at the time.

Many other examples were given of how streets and places where named. Taylor shared many humorous facts too. For example, in Young Harris, Coke was illegal from 1902 until 1929. It was considered sinful and known as "dope". Crane Creek was named for Andrew Jackson Crane, who moved here from South Carolina in 1864. He refused to fight for either side during the Civil War and refused to give help or refuge to either side. Taylor's presentation was enjoyed by all.

To close the meeting President Julie Payne reminded members that our next meeting will be on August 28, 2012, and we will have guest speaker Lion Steve Helwig from Athens our District Coordinator for LEO Clubs. In addition, we will be inducting the officers of our newly created Towns County LEO Club.

Regarding Lighthouse Services

What are the qualifications for receiving services through the Lighthouse?

The qualifications depend on the program.

For our eye clinics and glasses:

- Patients must have been a legal Georgia resident for at least one year.
- Patients may not have insurance that covers the service we provide. (E.g., Medicare covers eye exams, but not glasses. So patients covered by Medicare are instructed to get their exam and a prescription through their doctor, but we will help with the glasses.)
- Patients must have a household income below 200% of the federal poverty guideline. (Click here for the 2011 Federal Poverty Thresholds)

For our eye surgery program:

- Patients must have been a legal Georgia resident for at least one year.
- Patients may not have insurance that already covers the surgery.
- Patients must have a household income below 100% of the federal poverty guideline. (Click here for the 2011 Federal Poverty Thresholds)

For our digital hearing aid program:

- Patients must have been a legal Georgia resident for at least one year.
- Patients must not have insurance that covers hearing aids (many insurance companies consider hearing aids "cosmetic" and do not cover them. Therefore, simply having health insurance is not enough to preclude someone from receiving assistance with hearing aids through the Lighthouse).
- Patients must have a household income below 200% of the federal poverty guideline. (Click here for the 2011 Federal Poverty Thresholds)

WHITE CANE

White Cane had its beginning in Georgia in 1980 as White Cane Day. We no longer limit White Cane to just a day in the year. White Cane donations equal about 1/3 of the Georgia Lions contributions to the Lighthouse. The goal for White Cane 2013 has been set for \$125,000. Over the last 4 years White Cane donations have averaged over \$118 thousand dollars per year.

As everyone knows, prices have been on the rise and the services offered by the Lighthouse are no exception. The present economy is creating additional needs at the Lighthouse to help those who have lost their jobs and subsequently, their health insurance. The money collected through White Cane is instrumental in changing people's lives. While it is usually no problem for a local club to purchase a pair of eyeglasses for a needy person, it would be literally impossible for a club to provide eye surgery needed to restore someone's sight. The money raised throughout the state for White Cane can be combined to offer services to people who, without the Lions of Georgia, might have no hope.

The Georgia Lions Lighthouse is depending on us to help them help others. All money collected for White Cane is sent to the Lighthouse to work toward accomplishing this task. One hundred percent of all money collected for White Cane goes directly to sight services. We need to make every effort to make White Cane 2012 the best ever. Lions get an excellent return on their investment in the Lighthouse. The Lighthouse is now able to get \$5 in services for every dollar.

Not only is this a time to raise funds for the Lighthouse, it also gives us an opportunity to be out in our communities and to educate people about the services that we, as Lions of Georgia, can offer. A chance to put hands and feet to our motto, "We Serve".

Since then, the Lighthouse has taken steps to create a program focused solely on giving Georgia's youth access to vision services.

In recent months, the Lighthouse has hosted youth clinics in Fulton, DeKalb and Fayette counties, while also serving young people at our traditional clinics.

Since May, we have provided 95 children with eye exams and/or eyeglasses. The Lighthouse is continuing to build relationships with schools and youth programs in hopes that these efforts will contribute to our mission of fostering greater independence for our youth; giving them better vision so they may go on to build a better Georgia.

The grand prize will be a Gator or \$5,000.00. We have added 1 drawing for \$500.00 and 3 \$100.00 drawings. So you have many chances for \$1.00. The drawings will be at the February Camp meeting. We hope this will be a successful fundraiser for the Camp.

September is "Keep The Campfires Burning" month. We ask that clubs have a project with the proceeds going to the Camp to "Keep the Campfires Burning" at the Camp. We would appreciate your help in promoting this project.

We continue to work with the Center for Non Profits in Atlanta for ways to improve the Camp.

At the fall meeting on September 29 in Warner Robins, we will be voting on an Amendment to allow us to approve a new Constitution & Bylaws also at that meeting. This is in conjunction with the redistricting. It will allow us to have elections at the Winter meeting in February and at the District Conventions.

Even though Kristen is expecting a baby in October, she says we will have a Christmas Camp the weekend of November 30-December 2. This is always a very full Camping weekend with Campers of all ages. Volunteers will be needed to help cook and do various other jobs. It is a weekend full of the fun and love of the Christmas kind.

I am honored to serve as President of this great Camp. I do know how important it is to those we serve in so many ways. I hope you will feel this too.

Lion Thois began the program by stating that although the Camp for the Blind was doing well, there is a need for more clubs to become involved. He said that last year's report showed that the Clayton Lions Club, which is one of the smaller clubs, gave 8.9% of the total contributions to the Camp. He encouraged the Jefferson Lions Club to also be a major contributor. Additionally, he asked for names of any Jefferson Lions who would like to serve on the Committee for the Camp for the Blind.

The Board of Directors for the Camp are looking at restructuring the Camp and hoping to be able to seek corporate sponsors to assist in this project. The Camp had a bumper year with 194 campers this year. The Camp has increased about 40% each year for the first two years that the new director has been there.

Funding for the Camp remains a problem. There is a need for money to continue to support the Camp. One idea to raise money for the Camp is to have a Memorial Garden and sell memorial bricks. These bricks could be engraved in honor or memory of someone. Another suggestion to make money for the Camp is to have a raffle. An anonymous donor gave \$500,000 to be used only for Capital Improvements to the Camp. Construction is now completed. As of July 31, 2012, there is \$1,900 remaining, and it has been turned over to the General Fund with the donor's approval.

There will be a fall Camp meeting for the Board of Directors in September. This meeting will be voting on changes to the Camp's Constitution regarding: (1) changing the name of the Camp's Program from *Send-A-Kid To Camp* to *Keep the Camp Fire Burning*, (2) offsetting the cost of sending kids to the Camp, (3) having eight or nine Standing Committees, and (4) allowing Corporate Sponsors to be on the Camp's Board. Workers Compensation issues will also be discussed, as the cost has drastically increased because of the Climbing Wall and horses at the Camp.

Lion Ken Fuller, retired minister, past president of the Townes County Lion Club, and district representative to the Board of the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind in Waycross. Lion Ken explained that the Lions Camp is one of only two properties that the Georgia Lions own, the other being the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation in Chamblee.

This summer \$50,000 had to be borrowed to make necessary improvements to the camp. Therefore strong financial support is needed from the Lions clubs to repay that debt and to keep the camp functioning. It costs a little less than \$2,000 per camper due mainly to the cost of keeping a 2 to 1, camper to staff ratio. The campers range in age from age 4 to senior adults. A parent or adult sibling must accompany campers aged 4 to 6.

Lion Ken listed many goals that the Camp has for the campers include having a sense of accomplishment, lessening apprehension, encouraging others, taking initiative, socializing with others, knowing that there is a place in the world for them and that they can make a difference, encouraging them to try new things, helping them to realize that they are not defined by their disability, and, of course, having fun.

Lion Ken said that the Camp Board needed a representative from the club to serve on the Board. He encouraged pledges to the \$19.76 Society for a monthly pledge. He said that the annual raffle will be coming up in October and encouraged participation.

Location Technology Update What's Happening with GPS



Since 2005 we have provided free GPS devices and training to hundreds of our clients who used the technology to greatly increase their confidence while traveling with a cane or a Leader Dog. In March of 2011 we began distributing free Kapten PLUS GPS devices to all our U.S. and Canadian guide dog clients.

In December, Kapsys, the manufacturer of the Kapten PLUS, stopped production of the devices. We currently have enough Kapten PLUS units in stock to continue to distribute them for free to our guide dog clients through the middle of 2013. In addition, we will continue to provide tech support to our clients who have or will receive a Kapten PLUS from us.

Kapsys is currently testing a new version of the Kapten GPS. Early cost estimates are considerably higher than the Kapten PLUS price of \$295 so we are researching possible location technology options to use in the future. We will keep you updated as we move forward in this process.



Adults know many things. They certainly know what peace means. Although we are only children, we can still teach. We have a different perspective of peace. Our imaginations are as endless as the sea. We should be watched and listened to, because, after all, children really do know peace.

peace. I can hear the laughter of families floating across the borders of all countries.

Laughter and communication skills are universal languages. I can taste the various foods from across the globe, blending seamlessly together, making their way to the less fortunate. I can smell the clean air from everywhere knowing that everyone needs air to breath and would enjoy feasting on the various aromas weaved throughout the world. Most importantly, I can feel the sense and feel the power of peace when I meet a stranger and offer a peaceful greeting without being judgmental.

People are different. People have much to offer, whether it be an act of kindness or discovering a cure for an illness. Joined together, different types of people are a powerful force and could inspire the world to function more successfully and peacefully. I may be blind, but I have the power to promote peacefulness on a daily basis.

All the things that I have mentioned should be practiced on a daily basis. If we all put our best foot forward, then the world would be a better place. So, as you can see, if we try to avoid wars, communicate more, and respect people's differences, we would have a more peaceful environment.
