

Our dogs travel a long and challenging path to become Leader Dogs. This is only fitting because Leader Dogs are entrusted to guide our clients on their own journeys through life. At work, crossing a busy street or maneuvering a college campus, our Leader Dogs have the immense responsibility of being the eyes of their human companions.

We know that a dog's environment has a huge impact on its ability to develop the skills and characteristics necessary to handle this responsibility. Stress and anxiety, which can be common in the kennel atmosphere, interfere with a dog's ability to learn and develop a calm disposition.

It is with the importance of the environment in mind that we developed the plans for the Canine Development Center. Every aspect of the redesign will positively impact the health, well-being and training of all future Leader Dogs. Our goal is to develop the ideal environment for our dogs—one that reduces stress, maximizes human interaction and best prepares every dog for its remarkable work.

Our kennel facility is at the heart of everything we do at Leader Dog. This project is essential to our mission, our capacity to develop quality Leader Dogs and our ability to serve our clients. In celebration of Leader Dogs for the Blind's 75th anniversary and in support of our \$14.5M Canine Development Center project, we are undertaking a historic campaign. Through this campaign we seek to engage our leaders, supporters and closest friends in securing the funds needed to upgrade the facility that is at the heart of our mission. It is because of our supporters' belief in our mission that we have been able to help change the lives of thousands of people who live in darkness. Our Canine Development Center will create the ideal learning and living environment for our dogs, which means that we can better serve our clients by providing the best-trained and highest quality guide dogs possible.

- A renovated training and kennel area with spacious and open housing villages. Enrichment areas throughout the facility will ensure that our dogs get ample stimulation and human interaction.
- A centralized veterinary clinic to streamline circulation, increase staff effectiveness and help us deliver the best care.
- An expanded puppy area that is better suited for the health and socialization of puppies. Due to their capacity for learning and developing skills, it is important to provide the right environment for the puppies during this critical time.
- Space for our dedicated campus volunteers to interact with our dogs throughout the kennel to ensure that our dogs receive adequate enrichment time.

Just a few weeks ago, <u>China was hit with a terrible</u> <u>earthquake</u>. More than 600 people died because of the disaster and a large number of people were injured. What made the situation even worse was that more than 40,000 homes were damaged or destroyed! That means more than 40,000 families are in need of help. I am proud that Lions are there to help them.

LCIF immediately issued a US\$250,000 Major Catastrophe Grant through the <u>Disaster Relief Fund</u>, allowing Lions to provide food, water, blankets, medicine and other necessities to people in need. With clubs in more than 200 countries, LCIF is ready to help whenever Lions or their communities are in need, regardless of their location. The road to recovery can be a long one, but Lions will be there for as long as needed while homes are rebuilt and communities are put back together in China.

Lions Quest and SightFirst Grants Awarded

During the August 2014 <u>Lions Quest</u> Advisory Committee meeting, 22 grants were awarded, totaling US\$1,216,054. Through these grants, Lions Quest programs will provide students with positive life skills in countries like India, Japan, Madagascar, the United States, Turkey and more.



The SightFirst Advisory Committee

also met earlier this month and awarded 26 grants totaling US\$8,063,304. As part of the grants

awarded, <u>SightFirst</u> will continue working with The Carter Center to control trachoma and river blindness in Ethiopia, Mali, Niger and northern Uganda; provide cataract surgeries in Nepal and Sri Lanka; conduct further blindness prevention research; support a diabetic retinopathy program in the United States and more.

1. Measles is caused by a virus.

The measles virus is a member of the paramyxovirus family, which causes respiratory illnesses. The measles virus



typically grows in the cells that line the back of the throat and lungs.

2. Measles is highly contagious.

When a person has measles, 90 percent of the people he or she comes into close contact with will become infected, if those people are not already immune because they have either been vaccinated or had measles previously. The measles virus spreads easily by coughing and sneezing, and remains active and contagious in the air or on infected surfaces for up to two hours.

3. Measles is deadly.

Measles remains one of the leading causes of death among young children globally. An estimated 139,300 people died from measles in 2010 — mostly children under the age of five. That equals nearly 380 deaths a day, or 15 deaths each hour. More than 95 percent of measles deaths happen in low-income countries with weak health infrastructures.

4. Measles can cause serious complications.

About 30 percent of reported measles cases have one or more complications. The most serious complications are blindness, encephalitis (an infection that causes brain swelling), severe diarrhea and dehydration, and severe respiratory infections like pneumonia. Severe measles is more likely among poorly nourished young children, especially those with insufficient vitamin A, or whose immune systems have been weakened by other diseases.

5. Measles is entirely preventable.

A save, effective and inexpensive measles vaccine has been in use for over 40 years. <u>It costs less than \$1 to immunize a</u> <u>child against measles</u>.

25 Project Ideas

1. Work with local eye care professionals to organize an eye health and safety presentation.

2. Arrange sport and recreational activities for persons who are visually impaired such as bowling, fishing or swimming.

3. Sponsor a Braille exhibit at your local library.

4. Organize transportation service to medical and other appointments for persons who are blind or visually impaired.

5. Volunteer at a rehabilitation or vocational training center for the blind/visually impaired.

6. Volunteer at a recreational camp for children or adults who are blind or visually impaired. Provide campers with meals or transportation, or help with camp cleanup and repairs.

7. Conduct vision and diabetes screenings for elderly persons at local residential living facilities.

8. Encourage a parent of a blind child to enroll in free, distance education courses offered by LCI partner, The Hadley School for the Blind.



9. Contact the nearest Lions Eye Bank to obtain literature and donor cards.

12. Arrange for a person with a guide dog to be a guest presenter at your club's community event.

15. Help bring textbooks and literature to life. Volunteer to read books and periodicals for people who are blind.

Hello Lions,

The subject challenge has begun! As you complete and submit your <u>AUGUST SERVICE ACTIVITY REPORT</u>, please don't forget to identify each entry accordingly; i.e. Youth, Vision, Hunger and Environment. Your club will receive CREDIT towards the Centennial Service Challenge. It started in July 2014, but you still have the remainder of this year to receive your club patch. For each of the 4 categories accomplished at the end of the fiscal year, your patch will be reflected with 1, 2, 3 or 4 sapphires at the end of the year (see the picture below). And, accordingly, our District will receive a patch for 50% or more club participation—so what you do will help your District.

I want to share a few things about the Centennial Service Challenge:

• This is an initiative to celebrate Lions' 100 years of service and challenge clubs to participate in all four Global Service Action Campaigns to benefit 100 million people by December 2017.

• The campaigns are: **Engaging our Youth** – August, **Sharing the Vision** – October, **Relieving the Hunger** - December / January and **Protecting Our Environment** – April. These are flexible, you can do any campaign at any time of the year.

• A club can also qualify for the Centennial Service Challenge by making a donation to LCIF in any amount, and mark "donation to LCIF" when entering the activity on your Service Activity Report.

• Many of your clubs do tremendous volunteer work such as church, hospital, Meals on Wheels, libraries, Boys Scout, Girls Scouts, School Reading Programs, Homeless Shelter – kitchen cooking or meal deliveries, food distribution, etc. and these SAR entries must be noted as CSC activity. If you have any questions, please go to <u>CSC@lionsclubs.orgg</u>

• Any donation to LCIF that is earmarked for sight, youth, One Shot One Life Measles Initiative, or disaster relief will qualify for the CSC and club patch recognition.

• The time challenge began in July 2014 and concludes in December 2017. Clubs can still report activities related to this Centennial Service Campaign each fiscal year until July 15, 2018 to qualify for each year's Banner Patch.

• A club can earn one patch per fiscal year for a total of FOUR patches, representing all four years of the challenge.

• The District will be awarded a district banner patch annually based on the percentage of clubs in the district that participate. If 50% or more of the clubs participate in two or more Global Service Action Campaigns through your online Service Activity Report, the district will receive a Centennial Service Challenge patch for the District Banner; and again, one for each fiscal year for a total of four patches.

• Patches will be mailed to club presidents and district governors for the respective fiscal year.

Reporting deadlines are:

Fiscal Year – 2014 – 2015	July 15, 2015
Fiscal Year – 2015 – 2016	July 15, 2016
Fiscal Year – 2016 – 2017	July 15, 2017
Fiscal Year – 2017 – 2018	July 15, 2018

• At the end of the four years, clubs who receive FOUR patches will receive a special award; and, the same applies to District.

• There will be numerous tallies and progress reports every few months on the LCI websites and periodically in the LION Magazine. Also, clubs will be notified automatically via MyLCI to note what patch they have earned for the year.

• On "Protecting the Environment" campaign, clubs must quantify their service impact; e.g. road side cleanup, tree planting, recycling programs, upgrading playgrounds or parks, etc. by determining how many people pass-through or visit these areas.

• Leos are encouraged to participate as well; however, patches are only awarded to Lions Clubs and Lions District.

Remember, your Zone Chair is available with answers as well.

Just a reminder, besides the August Service Activity Report, your MMR (Monthly Membership Report is due before the last day of this month).

"Dee-Lexia is a little bit good."



Those are the words of 6 year old Elisabeth, who is recounting what she learned from her newest ally – NFL star and Vanderbilt graduate, Jovan Haye.

Decoding Dyslexia, Tennessee held a book signing for Haye last weekend. While they were looking forward to the event, they didn't realize how powerful this experience would be.

Everyone in the room is affected by dyslexia, including Haye himself. Brothers, sisters, parents, friends, students and teachers all came here to listen. . .and learn.

He tells of a childhood filled with emotions – fun running around with his friends in Jamaica, but feelings of being "less than" as soon as he entered school. If it wasn't for a special teacher, Ms Patton, he's not sure that he would be where he is now. "She noticed that I did better when I was interested in a subject. She told me that I need to stop using dyslexia as an excuse, and she was right."

That was a turning point in his life. "That night, I lay on my back in bed staring at the ceiling, and I prayed. 'Lord, help me get through this.' Tears ran down my face. 'I promise I'll do better, Lord. Please help me.'" Jovan continues, "He must have heard, because suddenly, a light switched on. For the first time in my life, I believed in my heart that I could fight and defeat dyslexia. It wasn't easy.

Slowing the Progression of Huntington's



In October 2007, Bob learned why he had been struggling with reasoning, concentration, fatigue and uncontrollable muscle movements. He was diagnosed with Huntington's disease, a progressive disorder of the brain that inhibits patients physically, emotionally and socially.

Because of his disease, Bob learned he could no longer drive, work or participate in the

activities he did growing up in Colorado and Idaho. He was relegated to the sidelines watching his three sons do the things he loved to share with them, like downhill skiing and water sports.

A neurologist mentioned to Bob's wife, Nila that an assistance dog could help ease the physical and emotional pain of Bob's illness. And in 2010, Canine Companions for Independence made it possible for Bob to graduate with assistance dog Exeter, free of charge.

Exeter is always there for Bob as his disease progresses; picking up the many things that Bob drops, turning out the lights or helping Bob get a soda from the fridge.

Donations from people like you helped make it possible for Canine Companions to give Exeter to Bob free of charge.

Bob's disability often goes unseen or is misinterpreted. "Huntington's disease robs a person of their motor control and behavioral capabilities," says Nila. "Often, people would see Bob stumbling and assume he was intoxicated. They didn't understand that he was only under the influence of Huntington's."

After being matched with Exeter, that story has changed dramatically. "People see Exeter in his blue Canine Companions vest and instantly understand that Bob has a disability. Now instead of confronting him, they offer their assistance."

While Huntington's disease can cause a loss of interest in many activities, Exeter has captured Bob's heart. They spend hours together snuggling while Bob holds Exeter's paws. The physical and emotional benefits Exeter has provided Bob has even slowed the progression of Huntington's disease.

"Stress hastens the progression of Huntington's disease, but knowing that Exeter will get the phone if Bob falls and letting the public know that he has a disability has reduced stress for Bob," states Nila. "Both the doctors and I can agree that Bob is doing as well as he is because of the presence of Exeter in his life."

Going Back to School with Diabetes

All across the country, kids are groaning about the end of summer and parents are excitedly gathering school supplies in anticipation for the start of the new school year. As you prepare to send your child back to school, here are some tips to help



your child care for her diabetes while being safe at school.

- Develop or update your child's Diabetes Medical Management Plan (DMMP) and/or Section 504 Plan. It's important that every child with diabetes have a written care plan or DMMP that outlines how their diabetes should be cared for at school. Make sure you've included everything your child needs. Learn more.
- Work with your school nurse to coordinate care. Make an appointment with the school nurse before school starts to make sure everyone.
- Pack and send diabetes supplies for school. Don't forget your child's meter, strips, insulin and insulin supplies.
- **Pack and send a "low box"** that includes a snack, fast acting carb and glucagon. It may be good idea to send a few to keep in different parts of the school.

In our 57 clubs, several of you have not entered your MMR since 2013 and others since February, April or June of 2014. It's just a matter of new officers getting off to a good start. Please verify that your club secretary can log onto LCI; and after that, do this:

 Once you've logged onto LCI, go the BLUE banner and under "My Club", scroll down to Monthly Membership Report.
 If there are no changes (no new member, no loss member,

etc.), hit "No change", then hit "**submit**".

• If there are changes (name, address, telephone number or email address) – go to that member and "edit" – make the change and hit "**submit**".

• Then, you can either SAVE the document to your file or PRINT a copy for your binder; or if you prefer, it will be there for later reference / printing.

· You will note the emphasis on "SUBMIT" – only by hitting this, does it go to LCI.

If you have any questions, please call me, any other Cabinet Member or your Zone Chair for assistance. This is No. 6 of our District Goals – so it is imperative that every club submit their MMR (and actually, for the new Centennial Campaign, the SAR – Service Activity Report – also requires entry.



The board meeting of the Toccoa Lions Club was called to order on August 12, 2014 by President Lion Bill at 7:02 A.M. in Dr. Royal's office with the following board members in attendance:


