#### Tree Planting Challenge

Lions find it impossible to resist a challenge. The goal of planting one million trees in a single year was surpassed September 7<sup>th</sup>.

Of course, the challenge is not really the important part. It's furthering Lions mission to be good stewards of the environment that matters most. Planting trees helps prevent soil erosion, cool the environment and replenish the oxygen in the atmosphere.

In Sri Lanka, the Colombo Maitland Lions Club planted 200 banana trees which provide all these benefits and provide a source of income for the local people. In Zambia, the Lusaka Mulungushi Lions Club planted 60 fruit and shade trees at a new school for orphans and impoverished children. The trees will provide a nutritional supplement and create an appropriate learning environment for the school's 375 students.

#### Dear Lion,

This month we celebrate Lions World Sight Day and our commitment to saving sight around the world. This month I am also happy to share with you a new health initiative.

I am sure you have heard of the deadly disease measles. The terrible truth is that 450 children die each day from this



disease. You may not know that a devastating complication from this disease is blindness. This is just another reason that as Lions we join the fight to stop this disease to save lives and prevent childhood blindness.



Last year we joined the Measles Initiative, a collaborative effort of several leading organizations to eliminate measles. In less than 10 years, this August, the 1 billionth child was vaccinated through this initiative. While measles has been reduced by 78 percent since 2001, the World

Health Organization estimates that decreasing support could result in 500,000 more deaths each year if the present progress rolls back to pre-2000 levels.

Our pilot year was a great success! Lions and our partners vaccinated 41 million children in four countries. Now we must expand these efforts to reach even more children in more countries. In a survey of Lions members, 90 percent expressed the desire to continue this program.

This is now possible thanks to a commitment by our partner, the Gates Foundation. The Gates Foundation is awarding us US\$5 million for the program this year, the largest single donation in our history. The Gates Foundation will do this by matching every US\$2 that we raise with US\$1. We have set a combined goal of providing U\$15 million toward this initiative.

I ask that you encourage your club and district to get involved. Please help us to meet our goal of providing US\$15 million for the Lions' Measles program this year. #### SightFirst II Making an Impact in South Asia

Lions helped to raise more than US\$200 million during Campaign SightFirst II. These funds are already having a great impact around the world, including in South Asia. To date, in South Asia the program has helped to fund 112 projects totaling US\$16.9 million. Grant funds have been awarded to upgrade or expand 72 clinics and hospitals, provide 496,200 cataract surgeries, and train 96 midlevel ophthalmic personnel. In addition, one state-of-the-art comprehensive eye hospital will be constructed and equipped, and one comprehensive, multiple district diabetic retinopathy program, including equipment purchases and training for seven Lions eye hospitals, has been completed. In upcoming e-newsletters, each region of the world will be highlighted.

#### **LCIF Awards Grants**

At the recent International Board of Directors meeting in Hong Kong, China, 55 grants were awarded totaling US\$4.09 million, benefiting 915,778 individuals. This includes US\$1.19 million for the Lions Clubs International-Special



Olympics Opening Eyes program. These grants will enable Lions to have a great impact in their communities.

#### **River Blindness Eliminated in Colombia**

Since 2004, SightFirst has been a contributing partner in the Onchocerciasis Elimination Program of the Americas, which works to end the illness and transmission of onchocerciasis (or river blindness) in Latin America. As a result of health education and Mectizan® distribution, there has been no new blindness from onchocerciasis in these areas. The World Health Organization (WHO) will announce the elimination of onchocerciasis in Colombia at the Inter-American Conference of Onchocerciasis in November, making Colombia the first country to receive such certification.

#### **Lions Hold Seventh MalTra Week**

The 7th MalTra week will be held November 5-12 in Ethiopia. Aimed at preventing malaria and trachoma, MalTra week is held twice annually. During the 5th MALTRA week in November 2010 more than 10 million people in Amhara state were given the drug Zithromax®. Amhara is the most endemic area in the world for trachoma.

#### THE GATES CHALLENGE & THE MEASLES INITIATIVE

The following memo will provide you with some important facts and background information about the Gates Challenge and LCIF's deepening partnership with the Measles Initiative. Please use this information to inform Lions about the Gates Challenge, Lions' role in halting measles, and our partnership with the Measles Initiative. More information and materials will be forwarded to you in the weeks to come.

#### The Gates Challenge

On October 21st, Chairperson Scruggs' monthly e-blast announced LCIF's commitment to raise US\$10 million to help halt the needless deaths and the crippling health effects of measles. Furthermore, LCIF is proud that the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation will match every US\$2 that Lions raise this year with US\$1, for a total gift of US\$5 million. All together, LCIF will provide US\$15 million to the Measles Initiative in 2011-12. The US\$5 million gift from the Gates foundation is the single largest donation in LCIF history and it marks a deepening of the relationship first started with last year's initial grant of US\$400,000. All donations made to LCIF to help meet the Gates Challenge are eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) credit.

#### The Measles Initiative

The World Health Organization, the United Nations Foundation, UNICEF, American Red Cross, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention created the Measles Initiative in 2001 as a partnership of leaders in public health committed to achieving the United Nations' goal of reducing measles deaths. While measles does not pose a significant health risk in the developed world, 450 children still die each day from measles-related complications. Measles is a major cause of childhood blindness and is the leading cause of vaccine-preventable deaths among children, worldwide. As recently as 1999, nearly 900,000 measles-related deaths occurred annually. In the last 10 years, however, the Measles Initiative has supported the vaccinations of more than one billion children. These efforts have reduced measles deaths by 78%. It is estimated that more than 5 million deaths have been prevented because of the work of this remarkable Initiative. Much more remains to be done to continue these successes and save the lives of even more children.

#### The Measles Initiative - Lions Clubs International Pilots

The Measles Initiative recognizes that there are many important advantages inherent in a partnership with Lions Clubs International.

The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation considers the improvement of global health systems to be one of its highest priorities. It awarded Lions Clubs International Foundation a matching grant of US\$400,000 to conduct four Lions-Measles Initiative pilot projects in Ethiopia, Madagascar, Nigeria and Mali in 2010-11. The LCIF share of the matching grant added an additional US\$300,000 to support measles campaigns in

these four countries. Lion members in recipient areas strengthen campaigns through a combination of social mobilization, advocacy and monitoring activities.

The first campaigns of the Lions-Measles Initiative pilot program were in October 2010 in Ethiopia and Madagascar. where more than 13 million children were treated. Vaccination campaigns took place in Nigeria and Mali in January and February 2011; 4.5 million children in Mali received vaccinations. With the help of Ministries of Health and other Measles Initiative partners, Lions' leadership teams in these four pilot countries assisted with coordinating the program implementation and documentation.

It is hoped that the involvement of Lions in these four countries will not only add value to the measles campaigns themselves, but will result in more robust health systems in Africa, as well.

#### **Measles Initiative and Gates Challenge Fast Facts**

# Global Membership Team and Global Leadership Team

Since July, the Global Membership Team (GMT) and the newly created Global Leadership Team (GLT) have been working side-by-side for club success. Each has a separate but parallel structure at the global, multiple district and district levels.

District GMT and GLT coordinators have been appointed by the district governor teams.

GMT coordinators help identify district and club community service opportunities, assist in setting membership goals, identify and aid struggling clubs.

GLT coordinators identify future leaders, and provide training to club officers and members.

The GMT coordinators and zone chairpersons identify candidates (clubs) for the <u>Club Excellence Process (CEP)</u>. This program helps clubs examine community needs, analyze membership experiences, identify and train future leaders and develop action plans. Once a club is willing to participate the GLT D coordinator will assign a facilitator/"coach."

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
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
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

#### **New State District Map is Approved**


We have received notification from the International Board of Directors that our Redistricting plan was approved as submitted. As of July 1, 2013, Multiple District 18 will reform all District lines becoming 4 districts. District 18-D will become District 18-I. At that time we will welcome clubs from the former District 18-F from the south.

During this Lions year, this district will continue with its convention as previously scheduled along with the District Breakfasts at the state convention next year. In the Lions year 2012-2013, the district will continue to hold regular District Cabinet Meetings and District Breakfasts at the State convention. But there will not be a 18-D Convention. There will be an organizing convention of District 18-I that will be held sometime in the winter of 2013. At that time, elections for District Officers of the new District will take place.

At our final 18-D Convention in Dahlonega, we will elect the following officers for the Lions Year 2012-2013 = District Governor, 1<sup>st</sup> Vice District Governor, 2nd Vice District Governor, District Director for the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation. All nominations must be submitted by the club of the nominee by February 15, 2012 to the District Governor and the Nominations Chair Lion Ray Chastain.

Normally the term of office for Camp VP and Lighthouse Director is 2 years. For this election it may be for 1 year as our charities adjust to 4 districts instead of 6. More information will be published as it becomes available.



# Man's best friend helps at local school

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (WLFI) - Each morning she takes the bus to work. Every afternoon, he lives close enough to walk to his volunteer job. Both make the daily commute to Glen Acres Elementary in Lafayette. But they are not alone. Debbie Morgan spends her mornings working as a Teacher's Assistant, helping children in two first-grade classrooms at Glen Acres Elementary. "I help them with their reading. I help them with their spelling words, with their math," said Morgan.

Bob Hardy spends afternoons as a volunteer at Glen Acres. Since retiring from Alcoa, he's spent the last couple years at the school his children once attended. Answering phones, letting people in the front door, and has taken on the role of web master, keeping the school's website up to date. "It makes you feel like you're wanted and I feel like I can make a difference. I'm able to help some kids maybe learn one thing one day or if I can help the teachers do their job and help our kids learn," said Bob Hardy.

Both Hardy and Morgan can do their jobs, because their guide dogs are doing their jobs. Hardy and Morgan are blind, and rely on Ada and Alex for assistance. Morgan's yellow lab, Ada, is four-years-old. Morgan has been blind her whole life and has two artificial eyes. She depends on Ada to get around, and is right at Morgan's side all day. "She's a good, calm, gentle dog. She loves the children. Oh my goodness, sometimes when they've been really well-behaved, we take the harness off and they get to pet Ada and they love it. And Ada loves it. And sometimes they can even sit on the floor and read with her and she really likes that," said Morgan.

Hardy lost night vision when he was 14. He has a genetic eye disease, and his eyes have slowly gotten worse. He decided he would need a guide dog to get around safely. "If you closed your right eye and with your left eye looked through a straw, that's kind of what I see," said Bob Hardy. Hardy said he hopes he and Alex can teach students a little more about people with disabilities. Morgan said helping the children is the best job she's ever had. "The Lafayette School Corporation has given me more opportunities for employment than any place else and I'm very, very thankful for that," said Morgan.

"It's a great source of freedom for visually handicapped people, the dogs, and the chance to come up here and help and work. It's been a great experience. And like I said before, I just feel like I'm part of the family. It feels like a family up here," said Hardy.

Both Ada and Alex were trained at Leader Dogs for the Blind in Michigan.

# FOX-5 Atlanta: Group Helps Blind, Dyslexic

**Students** ATHENS, Ga. - According to the National Center for Learning Disabilities, 15 million Americans struggle to succeed in school, work and in some cases, life. But a studio in Athens is doing more than its part to help get Georgians on a level playing field. Imagine wanting to do your best in school, but something keeps holding you back? Well a national organization has found a way to help students live their dreams.

Kimberly Winsett says she's always known she learns a little differently than other students. "It was a constant battle all the way through school especially learning new stuff. I was always a couple reading levels behind everybody else," said Kimberly Winsett.

Faced with a reading writing and comprehension disability, it was her mother that discovered a little known place that seemed to turn everything around. For more than 60 years, an Athens studio is where Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic takes place.

"We are about recording textbooks for those students who need them. They are blind or visually impaired, dyslexic or have any other learning differences. With our services they are able to succeed in school," said Lenora Dyer of RFB&D.

"It worked wonders because I was able to set the pace of the reading. I could pause it, go to a certain page and let it read to me. I could stop it and take my notes," said Winsett.

Volunteers come from all walks of life -- some professors, many retirees. Former math teacher Ellen Hanna has been on the mic for more than 40 years and logged over 4,000 hours. "You rarely have time to look over the material unless it's a science book and I read primarily math books so I flip through to see graphs and charts and check them out. But you have to be able to just to read at sight," said volunteer Ellen Hanna. The people who volunteer their time spend about an hour a week in this booth reading page after page. But say that doesn't compare to the possible benefit to the people who may be listening.

To take advantage of RFB&D's services, you don't have to live in the Athens area. They can mail you your needed audio textbooks. You also don't have to go to the Athens studio to be a volunteer reader, they have a home reader program. For more information, visit www.recordathon.org/georgiastudio .
