Our 2nd Cabinet meeting and Hall of Fame Ceremony was GREAT; we welcomed 114 Lions and guests from 32 clubs. 1st VDG Lion Anne Mundy and GLT Lion Pete Stamsen started the morning bright and early with Certified Guiding Lions Training and CEP Training. As we entered into our 2nd Cabinet meeting for the year, we heard from a lot of Lions. We heard from our four initiatives, PDG Lion Ed

Hashbarger updated us on LCIF, PDG Lion June Phillips gave us some service numbers from the Georgia Lions Lighthouse, Lion Bill Graham shared with us on Leader Dogs and had material that he shared with the Zone Chairs and CC Lion Olin Newby updated us on the Camp and the Executive Director position. PDG Lion Dick Smith gave us insight as to what is going on with our membership in District 18-I. I am proud to say that we started the Lions year in July with 1422 members in District 18-I and now we have 1438 members. We also have a new Lions Club in District 18-I, the Georgia Gwinnett College Campus club, which chartered with 26 members. Their 1st Vice President, Marcelo Clavarino spoke about their club during the Cabinet meeting. It is so good to hear what all they have going on for service projects and activities. They are planning their Charter night on Friday, November 14 at the college, the cost is \$15. Our famous Mr. Lion Tail Twister for District 18-I Lion Bill Mundy was having loads of fun with the Lions. He brought gifts for our International Director Kembra Smith that she actually used and enjoyed at the head table. He also had a member from each zone and the head tables participate in a balloon busting contest, with Zone Chair Wayne White being the winner.

The Cabinet meeting was followed by a FANTASTIC lunch and then onto our Hall of Fame Ceremony. We had 14 Lions inducted into the District 18-I Hal of Fame all pictured on pages 4 and 5. PID Beverly Roberts was our Guest Speaker for the HOF ceremony and she did a fantastic job. I would like to personally thank her for joining us in District I and sharing with us. I would also like to personally give a BIG THANK YOU to the Oconee Lions Club. They were responsible for the venue and the food and as always they did a great job and it all came out perfectly!!!

So where has the District Governor been and where am I going next? In October I made six official visits and visited the Gainesville Lion Club for their 80th anniversary dinner. I made official visits to Dawsonville, Dahlonega, Loganville Legacy (twice), Athens, Conyers and Lawrenceville. Whew, a total of 585 miles!! The Dawsonville club is very active in their community; they planned a special meeting night at the Chestatee Golf Club and had a very good group of Lions for the meeting that night. The Dahlonega club is a busy club. I was thrilled to hear of all the activities that they participate in throughout their community. The Loganville Legacy club was busy preparing for a booth at their local Fall Festival and also participating in a "Trunk or Treat" for Halloween. The Athens club is partnering with a book program and their local Schools. The Conyers club is staying busy with participating in a Fall Festival, planting a fall garden, and partnering with the local Boys and Girls club with the Peace Poster program. The Lawrenceville club is the sponsor of the new Georgia Gwinnett College Lions club and their own Lion Pete is one of the Certified Guiding Lions. As we move into November and December, I will be attending the Council meeting in Warner Robins and also the Joint Meeting of the GA Lions Lighthouse and the Georgia Lions Camp on Nov 7 & 8. I will also be at the Charter night for the Monsignor Donovan Leo Club in Athens on Nov 13th and the Charter night for the GGC Lions club in Lawrenceville on Nov 14th. I will also be making an official visit to the Decatur Lions Club on Nov 18th.

Our Service activities for District 18-I are outstanding so far for the 2014-2015 Lion's year. The numbers reported are (355) activities, with (13,535) Lions Hours and (27,385) people served. For our Centennial Service challenge the numbers are as follows: we have had 16 participating clubs Engaging Our Youth with 44 activities, 974 Lion Hours and 3415 people served. We have had 16 participating clubs Sharing the Vision, with 68 activities, 1650 Lion Hours and 5195 people served. We have had 13 participating clubs Relieving the Hunger, with 34 activities, 585 Lion Hours and 3897people served. and we have had 8 participating clubs Protecting Our Environment, with 21 activities, 242 Lion Hours and 1189 people served.

Congratulations are in store for the Atlanta Chinese American Lions Club (3), the Covington Lions Club (2), The Georgia Gwinnett College Campus Lions Club (26), the Lawrenceville Lions Club (2), the Washington Lions Club (1) and the Winder Noon Club (1) for each having new members for the month of October. 



CAMP OBJECTIVES:

- to foster the desire for participation in all camp activities
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- to develop in campers, a sense of responsibility and respect for others
- to provide the opportunity to develop a more positive attitude toward their disability
- to enable the camper to learn to accept ways of competing and cooperating with others

One vendor came to the event to find out more about our "residential school for the blind." This was a recurring misnomer repeated by several guests for the day as well. We were able to provide accurate information about our camp sessions.

Two Lions who had never been to the Camp came as car exhibitors. Both shared that they are now hooked and love Camp just as much as the rest of us do.

We have several volunteers who were not Lions by membership put in a lot of long, hard hours. Lions who were there stepped up and did the same; we had over 35 Lions and LEOs working at one time or the other during the weekend for the event. This show of unity and common good was uplifting. The Moultrie Lions Club will have two new members as a result. Another, non-Lion from the Tri-City Clubs said the same. "I'm ready to join now."

We were on a talk show on Friday morning, and I received numerous phone calls Friday evening and Saturday through lunch time from potential vendors and exhibitors.

Several blind Lions were in attendance with spectators, vendors, and exhibitors getting to talk with them about Lionism and the Camp. Several times throughout the day, I heard tidbits of conversations that included President Scott Eisenheart's mantra of "Camp is for the Camper."

We grossed approximately \$1,800.00 between the gate fee, vendor fee, and meal sales. Final details will follow on November 8th with a report to the Camp Fundraising Committee.

Words are inadequate to express how much I appreciate all of the planning, help, and collaborating that was generously provided by Lions. I would love to give some examples, but would not do the persons involved justice. Just know, "I thank you, and you, and you..."





A Day at Leader Dogs for the Blind

Did you ever wonder what happens at Leader Dog on a daily basis? The short answer is—a lot! Just look at a few of the things that happened around campus on Friday, May 30.



Residential Custodian Angela passes the emergency phone and pager to Residential Assistant Kim in the morning along with updating her on any happenings with the clients in class.



Dog Care Supervisor Sue checks the pills and dosages for any dogs needing medication.



Carol in puppy care takes Murphy (a dog in training who had double elbow surgery) out to "park" and stretch his legs. Puppy care takes care of puppies, breeding stock dogs and other dogs (retired, career changed, etc.) who need special attention and care.

Jenny and other guide dog mobility instructors (GDMIs) load dogs in basic training on the truck to take them to downtown Rochester for training. Each dog must sit before entering the vehicle.

Relieving the Hunger

Lions Centennial Service Challenge

For nearly 100 years, Lions have served their communities with dedication and contributed to the development and wellbeing of millions of people around the world. As we look toward our centennial celebration, Lions are encouraged to serve 100 million people by December 2017 through participation in the Global Service Action Campaigns.

During December and January, we invite you and your club to join Lions around the world to help relieve

hunger. Organize projects that mobilize your club members to make a difference in your community...by helping those who don't have enough to eat. Visit links to The Global FoodBanking Network or Feeding America for volunteer opportunities near you. If your local food bank does not have volunteer opportunities available, you may wish to consider other service projects such as preparing and delivering food baskets to families in need or planting a community vegetable garden.

Getting Started:

The steps outlined below will help you complete a "Relieving the Hunger" Global Service Action Campaign project.

Step 1: Create a Planning Committee

The "*Relieving the Hunger*" Global Service Action Campaign is an opportunity for Lions to bring together communities and connect through a common goal... to provide food and nourishment ... to hungry children and adults. Creating a planning committee will help drive the success of your campaign project. Together, the committee can share the work and help motivate your members to participate. You might want to consider asking food pantries, schools, hospitals and supermarkets to get involved, and designate a chair to lead the committee's efforts.

Step 2: Pick Your Project

Choose a service project that helps meet a community need and reflects the interests of club members. When developing your project, make sure it is a hands-on, highly visible activity that Lions can easily get involved with. Perhaps your club already has a hunger project that could be expanded to increase public awareness and engage other community members. Or, choose from this list of ideas:

- Sponsor a community food drive to replenish a local food pantry.
- Volunteer to deliver prepared meals to elderly citizens.
- Prepare and deliver food baskets to families in need.
- Serve meals at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.
- Help plant a community garden.

To ensure the success of your project, be sure to set specific goals that you would like to accomplish by the project's conclusion. Some examples include:

- Prepare and distribute 200 food baskets for families in need.
- Identify three families in need and deliver weekly food provisions during the month of December.
- Partner with a local soup kitchen to prepare and serve meals for homeless people one day in January.

Step 3: Publicize Your Project

Give your club the recognition it deserves! Tell the local community about upcoming club events to promote your service project. Consider:

- Posting flyers
- Contacting local radio or public access television stations
- Sending press releases to community newspapers
- Posting project information on your club or district's Web site or other social networking sites such as Facebook
- Inviting local media

Step 4: Implement Your Project

Involve your club members! Invite family members, friends co-workers to help which can also generate new and membership interest. On the day of the project, make sure someone is ready to answer questions from volunteers elected officials, special guests, local media and other members of the

community. Because your project reflects awareness of hunger in your community, consider choosing members of your planning committee to serve as a spokespersons for highlighting the project and its importance to the community.







Step 5: Report Your Activity

Report your service activities through MyLCI's Online Service Activity Report. For more information, visit MyLCI at http://mylci.lionsclubs.org and review frequently asked questions about service activity reporting.

Step 6: Celebrate Your Success

Remember to share your project's accomplishments with the people who helped make the project a success. Distribute a news release to local media and send a newsletter to community members who supported your project. Be sure to send thank you letters to those who participated. You may also want to present certificates of appreciation. Hosting a volunteer and partner awards ceremony is also a nice way to recognize everyone's contributions. And, don't forget to share your success with your Lions family – post photos on the Lions Facebook Fan Page.

KidSight USA to Protect Children's Vision



Community Eye Screening For Children

I'd like to invite you to be part of a new national initiative by U.S. Lions clubs to protect the vision of America's children. If you could save a child's sight with the press of a button, wouldn't you?

That's the idea behind <u>Lions KidSight USA</u>, a new national initiative announced by Lions in the United States. Lions KidSight USA was launched to help ensure that children between the ages of six months and six years receive vision screening and professional follow-up care when needed.

To accomplish this, KidSight USA will work with new and existing screening programs to get more handheld screening devices into the hands of Lions—and more kids in front of them.

"KidSight USA is an important national initiative that will help families protect the eye health of their children," said International President Joe Preston. "It builds on our proud history of saving sight and our belief that all children deserve to see the world clearly. With the help of Lions, we hope they will."

Lions KidSight USA wants to reach kids early because some vision problems can become permanent by age seven. But vision issues can be easily detected with hand-held screening devices that even generate the results on-site. With only a few minutes of training, Lions and volunteers can learn to screen the vision of a child.



Lions in the U.S. currently screen more than 500,000 kids per year through state and local programs often known as "KidSight." Lions KidSight USA wants to expand the number of screening programs so Lions can change the lives of even more children around the country.

Fellow Lions

Lions Clubs International recently announced the **KidSight USA Program**. The details of how the program will be implemented have not been worked out yet. This is not a project of the GA Lions Lighthouse. MD-18 Lions will be responsible for the program, and the Lighthouse will be working with the Council of Governors to implement the program.

There are two companies who have contributed large sums of money to LCI to help fund this program. They are Welch-Allyn and Plusoptix. Welch-Allyn has a product called the SPOT vision screener, and Plusoptix has a Plusoptix vision screener. We want all Lions Clubs to understand that neither MD-18 nor the Lighthouse endorse one of these products over the other.

In all probability, the Lighthouse will write a grant to obtain equipment to be used statewide. As we said earlier, this program is still in the planning stages. We want to implement the program as soon as possible, but we want to be sure we have all the pertinent information before we proceed. We would encourage all clubs to wait for further information on the implementation of the program before purchasing equipment and starting the new KidSight USA Program in your area.

It is our goal to screen as many children, ages 6 months to 6 years) as possible in MD-18. We want to fully support this new and exciting program. If you have questions, please contact Council Chair Olin Newby or Lighthouse Chair Grace Clower.



Death of a Lions Club by Ron Zeppieri, PCC, District N GMT Coordinator

It doesn't happen overnight. It happens slowly and somewhat imperceptibly, and if nothing is done in a timely manner, a once thriving Lions Club just fades away and is lost to their community.

It takes a minimum of 20 members to start a new Lions Club. That's what we're working on right now in St Marys. According to the August membership report, District N has 36 of our 67 Lions Clubs with membership below 20. (over 50%). Worse yet, 20% of our Clubs are below 10 members!! They are in the critical stage of dying clubs.

Let's assume for example that the Midcity Lions Club has been serving Midcity for over 50 years with a robust membership. For some reason, club members begin to ignore all Lions zone, district, state and international events. They restrict themselves just to their club. No Lions attend any training sessions and they begin to lose touch with the world of Lionism. They consider club visits by their zone chairman or governor as a bother rather than an opportunity. The members get complacent.

Members drop in all clubs, but Midcity makes no effort to bring in new members to replace those dropped members and their membership gradually dwindles. Their leadership becomes stagnant because no one will volunteer for office. Now with stagnant and untrained leadership, members become bored and dissatisfied and drop at an increasing rate. Before anyone realizes it, the 50 members are now down below 20. And the club notices but doesn't really think it's a serious problem.

Many of their traditional service and fund raising projects are discontinued because of a lack of willing workers. So more members drop. Now they find themselves not only with stagnant, untrained leaders, but with only 10 members or fewer. Now the club is in its final "death spiral." - They don't have enough members to do much of anything. And since they don't do anything, they can't attract any new members. The Midcity Lions Club is doomed and is soon lost not only to our Lions organization, but lost to those people in need in Midcity.

Everyone – put your head up and look around you. Does this scenario describe YOUR Lions Club? If so, it's time for you to take some drastic action. The District has experienced Lions who will help you help yourselves to rejuvenate your club. Save your club. Don't abandon needed service to your town.

Using Audiobooks for Learning

As a student progresses in school, keeping up with increasing amounts of reading can be a challenge. Audiobooks can help students who read slowly due to dyslexia or another learning disability by allowing them to focus on the meaning of what they're reading rather than decoding the letters.



Tip #1: When reading takes too long, use audiobooks to save time on homework.

"I use audiobooks from <u>Learning Ally's library</u> for all my reading in school. It saves me so much time. If I didn't use them, I'd have to spend hours more on homework every night. My advice is, make sure you stay on top of your reading assignments. Request your books ahead of time, make sure you have them downloaded when you need them, and take good notes while you're listening." — Keith Amundsen, 19, student



Tip #2: Help your child become comfortable learning through listening.

"I would sit my kids down while I was cooking dinner, but instead of having the television on, I'd have an audiobook on so they could listen together. This was a way to get them comfortable with the medium of using audiobooks when they were little." —**Shelley Dannenberg, Dyslexia and Reading Specialist**



Tip #3: Have audiobooks listed as an accommodation on your child's 504 plan or IEP.

"Once you have audiobooks listed as an approved accommodation, make sure your child's teachers are able to give advanced notice of reading assignments so you can have the books downloaded, and get everyone comfortable with your child having their listening device out during class."



Tip #4: Cover material multiple times to build fluency.

"Have your child listen to in-class reading the night before, and then read along again with the class the next day. Hearing material multiple times builds fluency, reinforces key concepts, and will allow your child to comprehend more of what they're reading."



Tip #5: Listen to audiobooks on a portable device so your kids can take them anywhere.

"I love that I can listen to my books on my iPhone. It used to be a little embarrassing having a huge CD player sitting out on my desk during class. People would ask why I had it, but nobody even notices when I have my iPhone out. Learning Ally audiobooks make me feel like a normal kid, and I can read all the same books as my friends." —Skye Malik, 16, student

In September, the American Diabetes Association published

a new position statement on <u>Care of Young Children with Diabetes</u> <u>in the Child Care Setting</u>. The statement primarily focuses on type 1 diabetes and covers the legal protections for young children with diabetes. To safely care for them, childcare providers need:



- Appropriate training
- Access to resources
- A system of communication between themselves, parents/guardians, and the child's diabetes provider

LionNet is a voluntary cooperation network of Internet services of the Lions Clubs International. A great number of Lions clubs, districts and multi-districts have opened their own services on the Internet using World Wide Web.

Without proper coordination and cooperation these would be just isolated islands on the Internet. LionNet is a voluntary network of these web services, bringing cross-linking, structure and hierarchy to the Lions net.

The goals of LionNet:

- to create a well cross-linked network of Lions services • throughout the world
- to save work and coordinate efforts of Lions webmasters through cooperation
- to create a well-defined structure to the Lions net, which helps users to navigate in it
- to create bridges between Lions members in different countries, to promote contacts, discussions and cooperation between clubs, districts and Lions countries
- to create a truly international, yet manageable infrastructure to the Lions Internet services

The LionNet structure is comprised of "nodes" beginning at the national level and branching out to the state or provincial area. The national nodes list and link to the state/provincial nodes for that country. The state/provincial nodes link to local and district Lions web pages. Nodes are managed by NodeMasters who are encouraged to add their own creativity and local flavor to their pages.

The LionNet NodeMasters also maintain active contact with local Lions district officers and promote the use of the Internet as a tool for Lionism by giving lectures, writing articles in local Lions magazines and visiting club and district meetings. All LionNet node masters keep frequent contact with each other with the help of electronic mail.

The slogan of the LionNet is "On the Net We Serve".





Bill also mentioned we may have some service opportunities doing vision screening in the schools in the future. Later in November we will be having the diabetes screening and vision screening at Wal-Mart.

Lion Bill made some announcements about upcoming events as listed on the meeting agenda. He asked Bryan to talk about the 2015 calendar project. Then he asked Dale Graham to talk about the Lions yard sale on October 11th. Then Bill asked Steve Spruill to talk about the Harvest Festival. Steve passed around a signup sheet. We need volunteers to do vision screening. Vision screener training will be held after the Tuesday evening meeting on October 21st and after the Thursday luncheon on October 23rd.

The Toccoa Lions Club presented Diann Spruill & Lion Steve Spruill with Certificates of Appreciation for their outstanding community service. TLC President, Lion Bill Graham, noted that some people say that behind every successful man is a good woman. I am here to tell you that Diann does not need to stand behind anyone. Her community service is tremendous on its own. Lion Steve was also presented a "Mortar & Pestle" appreciation gift for his tireless work with the Open Arms Clinic and with the Sweet Spot Diabetes Awareness Program. Lion Steve has worked over eight years on both projects. Open Arms Clinic Director, Sherrie Beavers, has frequently noted, "We have many doctors that help us but only one pharmacist. That person is Lion Steve and he does an outstanding job"

Bill mentions that we have three Christmas projects or events coming up. The Christmas party on Thursday, December 11th. The Christmas tree decorating contest and the Christmas parade on Saturday, December 6th.

Henry Fields, our Tail Twister, was missing in action. Lion Bill made an attempt at Tail Twisting and when it failed just fined everybody a dollar. The tail twister collected \$23.35.

Lion Bill introduced our guest speaker, Lion Steve Spruill, a local pharmacist who needs no introduction. Steve's topic is How to Recognize a Heart Attack. Steve had a heart attack last year and shared some firsthand experiences that he had. Lion Steve had a power point display showing how your heart vessels can be damaged by the build of plaque. Plaque can rupture and block the flow of blood causing heart damage. Heart damage cannot be repaired.

Most Common Symptoms = The most common warning symptoms of a heart attack for both men and women are:

- Chest pain or discomfort. Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center or left side of the chest. The discomfort usually lasts for more than a few minutes or goes away and comes back. It can feel like pressure, squeezing, fullness, or pain. It also can feel like heartburn or indigestion. The feeling can be mild or severe.
- Upper body discomfort. You may feel pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, shoulders, neck, jaw, or upper part of the stomach (above the belly button).
- Shortness of breath. This may be your only symptom, or it may occur before or along with chest pain or discomfort. It can occur when you are resting or doing a little bit of physical activity.

Other Common Symptoms

Pay attention to these other possible symptoms of a heart attack:

- Breaking out in a cold sweat
- Feeling unusually tired for no reason, sometimes for days (especially if you are a woman)
- Nausea (feeling sick to the stomach) and vomiting
- Light-headedness or sudden dizziness
- Any sudden, new symptoms or a change in the pattern of symptoms you already have (for example, if your symptoms become stronger or last longer than usual)

Not everyone having a heart attack has typical symptoms. If you've already had a heart attack, your symptoms may not be the same for another one. However, some people may have a pattern of symptoms that recur.

The more signs and symptoms you have, the more likely it is that you're having a heart attack.

Quick Action Can Save Your Life: Call 9–1–1

The signs and symptoms of a heart attack can develop suddenly. However, they also can develop slowly—sometimes within hours, days, or weeks of a heart attack. Any time you think you might be having heart attack symptoms or a heart attack, don't ignore it or feel embarrassed to call for help. Call 9–1–1 for emergency medical care, even if you are not sure whether you're having a heart attack. Here's why:

- Acting fast can save your life.
- An ambulance is the best and safest way to get to the hospital. Emergency medical services (EMS) personnel can check how you are doing and start life-saving medicines and other treatments right away. People who arrive by ambulance often receive faster treatment at the hospital.
- The 9–1–1 operator or EMS technician can give you advice. You might be told to crush or chew an aspirin if you're not allergic, unless there is a medical reason for you not to take one. Aspirin taken during a heart attack can limit the damage to your heart and save your life.

Every minute matters. Never delay calling 9-1-1 to take aspirin or do anything else you think might help Diann Spruill made sure that Lion Steve covered the special conditions or symptoms that women have.

Heart Attack Signs in Women

- 1. Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of your chest. It lasts more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back.
- 2. Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.
- 3. Shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort.
- 4. Other signs such as breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.
- 5. As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort. But women are somewhat more likely than men to experience some of the other common symptoms, particularly shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting and back or jaw pain.

If you have any of these signs, don't wait more than five minutes before calling for help. Call 9-1-1 and get to a hospital right away.

Lions Steve said the major cause of heart disease is your genetics inherited from your parents. But you can change your life style to help prevent having a heart attack. You can start with changing your diet and making exercise a part of your daily life. Quit smoking. Lose weight especially central mass weight. Make healthy food choices but eating a heart healthy diet that includes fiber and fruit. Avoid saturated fats and trans fats in your diet.


