Lions clubs and districts are required to file tax forms in accordance with the United States tax laws. Information and filing requirements and instructions are available on the Lions Clubs International website in the Tax Information section.

In this section you will find: detailed information concerning the requirements for filing Form 990, 990-N (E-Postcard), 990-EZ; a sample Form 990-EZ, with explanations; a blank Form 990-EZ; guidelines for disclosures regarding nondeductibility of contributions or gifts to Lions districts and clubs; and a summary of provisions concerning possible tax liability for Unrelated **Business Income Tax (UBIT). Additional information** concerning United States tax laws may be obtained from the **IRS** website. Please review this information at your earliest convenience. 

Dear Lion,

I once heard an African proverb that I will forever remember: the best way to help



Just last month, Margit and I were in Ethiopia and Madagascar to help launch our Lions-Measles Initiative pilot programs. In these countries Lions helped vaccinate nearly 10 million children. This is truly sensational!

Did you know that measles is the leading cause of vaccinepreventable deaths in children? Over the next three years, 1.7 million children will likely die from this disease, which also causes blindness. Lions, we can and we must stop this!

At a health center in Imersituska, a rural village in Madagascar, I met Marie Louise Razafindrazanana, who brought her nine-month old son, Patrick, to be vaccinated. She knew all too well the dangers of measles, as she lost her daughter to the disease. I truly felt I was wiping her tears, but she gave me something in return – a smile of hope and gratitude. Her story echoes those that I heard in Ethiopia. But these mothers know that we Lions are giving their children hope for a long, healthy life.

Lions have long been committed to improving quality of life for children. Another way we do this is by improving their education and providing them with vital life skills. In meeting with government officials in both countries, they pledged their full support to the measles program. But they were also very interested in starting Lions Quest in their country.

Like so many other leaders worldwide are realizing, Lions Quest can and should be a key component to improving the general well being of our youth. Government can't do this alone. It takes all of us working together to really make an impact.

Moments like these also make me realize the significance of what our Foundation does for people in need, but there is so much more we can do. Please, Lions, let's continue to give hope to our youth for a healthier and brighter tomorrow by wiping away tears through our foundation!

Mobilizing Communities to Eradicate Measles

LCIF has joined with the Measles Initiative to launch the Lions-Measles Initiative pilot program in four African countries. LCIF and local Lions are supporting a worldwide effort to protect children from measles and strengthen routine immunization services. View a video of the vaccination campaign in Madagascar and view photos from Madagascar and Ethiopia. Vaccination campaigns in Nigeria and Mali will take place in January and February, and help even more children. The program is jointly funded by LCIF and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Launched in 2001, the Measles Initiative is a partnership - led by the American Red Cross, United Nations Foundation, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, UNICEF and World Health Organization committed to reducing measles deaths worldwide. The Initiative is currently focused on supporting the United Nations' goal of reducing global measles mortality by 90 percent (2000-2010).

We Lions have the drive and responsibility to serve, both in our community and on a global scale. At 1.35 million members strong, we represent a powerful force for change. Lion Judy and I were honored to take part in the fifth MalTra (malaria and trachoma) Week, a combined treatment campaign supported by our partners and Lions that seeks to eradicate <u>trachoma</u>, while also preventing malaria, in Ethiopia and other countries by the year 2020.

Trachoma, a debilitating and contagious eye infection that causes blindness, can be treated easily with antibiotics. In Ethiopia's Amhara region, there are more cases of trachoma than any other place in the world. During this MalTra Week in early November, more than 15,000 community health workers targeted 10 million at-risk people with donated antibiotic treatment – a great example of what Lions and our partners can accomplish together. We also celebrated the delivery of the 225-millionth dose of the antibiotic Zithromax®. This drug, often referred to as "the little pink pill," is donated by

Lions' partner Pfizer Inc.

It's this kind of action and Lions role as a partner that makes me so proud to be a Lion. More than 85 years after Helen Keller challenged Lions to be "Knights of the Blind," we continue to reach out to preserve the sight of millions around the world.

In this footage, Lion Judy and I enjoyed the kick-off of the campaign in the village of Zeghie, in the northwest of Ethiopia. Young students sang about preventing malaria and trachoma and performed dances that are popular there.

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Q: Are the Lions Quest programs evidence based, quality programs?

A: Absolutely! Curricula are based on strong research and evidence that supports program components, processes and content. CASEL "Select SEL," SAMHSA "Model" (SFA), and OJJDP "Effective" program (SFA).

Q: How do Lions Quest programs build resilience?

A: Research shows that relationships with caring adults make young people resilient. Curricula facilitate positive relationships and help youth build protective factors while reducing risk factors.

Q: Do Lions Quest programs link with existing school programs and learning standards?

A: Definitely! Curricula provide tools for teachers to meet requirements in social and emotional learning (SEL), prevention, character education, service-learning, language arts and social sciences.

Q: How do we find time for these programs in our busy school day?

A: We can't afford not to! One lesson takes just 20-45 minutes per week and is easily integrated into language arts, social sciences, health, advisory period, or used as a standalone program.

ORGANIZE A FOOD DRIVE TO ALLEVIATE HUNGER

Hunger and poverty go hand in hand. Childhood hunger can cause irreversible damage. A lack of proper nutrition can harm a child's mental and physical development. Hungry children have difficulty concentrating and focusing on schoolwork. Impoverished children are more likely to be hospitalized during childhood. Your involvement with a food drive in a community center, office, school or place of worship can help feed the hungry and make a difference in the life of a child.

How Lions Clubs Can Help

Step 1: Select a food bank, food pantry or organization that accepts donations. Check to see if there are any specific requirements, such as the types of food to collect.

Step 2: Select a location for your food drive. Successful places to conduct food drives include schools, office buildings, and places of worship or community centers. Secure permission to hold your food drive in these locations.

Step 3: Begin planning your food drive. Enlist the aid of your nearby Leo club. Contact friends, co-workers, neighbors to help. Choose a name or theme for your food drive and set a goal for how many cans, or pounds of food you want to collect.

Step 4: Promote your food drive. This allows community residents time to choose food from their pantries or buy extra food when grocery shopping.

- Enlist the help of your Club Public Relations Chair to promote this event.
 - Decorate collection containers for the food donations.
 - Place flyers or posters in highly visible places.
- Use newspaper ads, phone calls and e-mails to promote your
- Announce your food drive on your club's Web site.
- Remember to send follow up reminders.

Step 5: Collect food for the hungry. You may wish to hold your food drive for a few consecutive days to get as much food as you can. Enlist the help of Leos and other volunteers. Make sure to clearly mark your donation boxes.

Step 6: Deliver your collected food; make arrangements to drop off the donated food to the food bank you selected. Your food can then be distributed to hungry families in need.

Step 7: Send "thank you" letters to individuals or organizations who participated and publicize your successful project in the community newspapers.

- Canned vegetables and fruit
- Chunky soups and beef stew
- Macaroni and cheese

- Powdered milk
- Rice / dry and canned beans
- Pasta and sauce
- "Sugar free," "low sodium" and "no salt" items
- Tuna and other canned meat

Basic Mentoring is for all members. Mentees will:

THE CLUB EXCELLENCE PROCESS AND MEMBERSHIP RETENTION

One of the reports I personally deliver is to our District Governors at their Council of Governor's meeting. The latest report I handed out was on Saturday, 20 November. Unfortunately, my report stated that as of the end of October 2010 Lions clubs in Georgia have begun to lose more members than we did last year. Hopefully this loss rate will reverse itself, but I did end my report by encouraging the District Governors to do something I am going to encourage **ALL** clubs to do: participate in the upcoming Club Excellence Process (CEP).

There are several forthcoming Lion changes that our International Leaders approved, but the one that all Lions Clubs are going to be encouraged to adopt is the Club Excellence Process. While I was in Milwaukee this fall, I managed to listen to an overview of this forthcoming CEP change and then during the afternoon, following the Council of Governor's meeting, I attended a CEP Training Session. The training was the initial CEP overview for the District Governors, but it also included a requirement for them to begin the Club Excellence Process this year.

Obviously, you are going to hear and learn more about the Club Excellence Process. As your MERL Team Retention Chair, my concern was whether membership retention is going to be a part of CEP? The main reason I raised this question is my belief that clubs have got to take specific actions to retain Lions for a longer period of time. What you are soon going to be offered are Club Excellence Process Workshops and high on the list of club members being encouraged to attend will be club leadership. Based on the CEP Workshop club attendees and my analysis of the items to be focused on in the Workshop, I believe club retention will be an important part of CEP.

The Club Excellence Process Workshops will give each of our clubs an excellent opportunity to discuss a wide range of things. As I earlier pointed out, initial CEP Workshops will begin to be available this year. You and your other club leaders will be given an opportunity to examine a wide range of things in the Workshop, but the four things I am going to pull out are the following: "Talk about the stumbling blocks that prevent us from excellence," 'Discuss how to improve your club effectiveness," AND THEN "Set goals" and "Create action plans."

I can assure you that "Retention of Members" is going to be one of key items you will be focused on as a part of the Club Excellence Process! As I said at the outset, I am going to encourage **ALL** clubs to participate. What I am going to also encourage you to do is take the list of club retention action items with you to the CEP Workshop to discuss them and add them to your club goals and action plans.

Our vision services include vision clinics, eye surgeries, vision screenings, and a worldwide eyeglass recycling program. When we initiated our hearing program in 1977 the Lighthouse only provided refurbished hearing aids; we now offer new digital hearing aids and follow-up care.

For every dollar you give to the Lighthouse, our volunteer doctors provide \$4 in medical services.

Vision Clinics

We conduct eye clinics at 13 sites throughout Georgia. The clinics are located in Albany, Athens, Atlanta (2), Augusta, Brunswick, Decatur, Fayetteville, Macon, Rome, Savannah, Tifton, and Waycross. The clinics are free for qualified patients; glasses and follow-up care are also available as needed.

Eye Surgeries

We partner with optometrists and ophthalmologists who volunteer their services to the Lighthouse and/or work at reduced rates. If a doctor discovers an uninsured patient who needs sight-saving surgery, the Lighthouse can often handle arrangements and expenses. The most common procedures include:

- Cataract removal
- Diabetic retinopathies
- Corneal tissue transplants
- Detached retina correction

We also have specialized services including prosthetic eyes and keratoconus lenses.

Eyeglass Recycling Program

Every year the Lions Lighthouse recycles over 100,000 pairs of donated eyeglasses. The usable glasses are shipped to developing countries with mission trips. Broken and scratched glasses are donated to fashion design schools in Georgia that craft them into wearable dresses for our annual Night of Spectacles fundraiser. Donations of individual lenses are given to optical schools where students learn to cut them. Glasses with gold in them are set aside, and the gold is melted and sold. All proceeds from the sales are used to help support our vision and hearing programs. We also accept donations of used cell phones and hearing aids.

Vision Screenings

Our vision screening program addresses the "prevention" portion of our mission. We have nine screening machines that can be checked out for community events. Anyone borrowing a screener must first complete a training session on how to use it. If we need to ship a screener to you, we request that you or your organization pay the return shipping.

Hearing Program

In 1977 our Board of Directors approved the addition of hearing conservation to our mission. Today the Lighthouse helps distribute new digital hearing aids and gives follow-up care to Georgians in need. Last year, more than 850 patients received hearing aids through our digital program.


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Clearing the Fog: Ronald McLaney's Story

Ronald McLaney of Trenton, Georgia is good with his hands—he's a construction man through and through—but when a cataract in his right eye began clouding his vision, he found his livelihood at stake.

"Everything was foggy. I had decent sight in my other eye, but it's very hard on you if even one eye goes bad," says Ronald. "I called the state [department] to see if there was anything they could do—I told them that I was going to end up on

disability if I went blind and asked, what was I supposed to do? Thank God the state referred me to you."



What he found most surprising, however, was the quality of care he received during his treatment. "Everyone treated me with respect," he says. "It's humbling to receive charity, but I was treated like a regular patient. The Lighthouse understands that bad things can happen to everyone, even the best people, and it helps you get through that. Thank you for all that you do."

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Dear Friends of the Camp,

Things are starting to pick up at our Camp and it is indeed an exciting time. I can't think of a better way to give you the data than to share my Report to the Council of Governors with you. So here goes...

Report of the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind, Inc. November 20, 2010

It is a quiet time at our Camp but that is getting ready to change. Here are a few things that have been going on in Waycross and beyond:



Bobby submitted his resignation just after the Fall Joint Meeting. We then started the process on finding his successor. We posted the position in the local media and the response was just what you would expect in our current economy. Kristen and Carolyn were flooded with applications. Kristen narrowed it down to the top five and on October 16th, Carey VanLandingham (Building and Grounds Committee Chair), Kristen and I interviewed those five. The outcome is what we believe will be a fine Building and Grounds Manager for years to come. His name is Mike, and Kristen will introduce him in depth in the upcoming newsletter.

On Friday following the interviews mentioned above, Carey went into surgery for a personal health issue. I am happy to say the surgery went well and that he is now home and recovering nicely. Please keep Lion Carey in your thoughts and prayers. I do know what the Lions Family and their support can do to help one get better.

I have been on the road giving presentations on our Camp, and the Lions Clubs I have been to are very excited about what we got going on at their Camp!

I think it is a good time to talk about the upcoming elections that will happen at our District Conventions. They are not that far away!

District C will need to elect a new Vice President to the Camp. Lion Carey is wrapping up his second term in that position. Per the Constitution the term limits are two terms of two years each.

District D will either need to re-elect Lion Thois Masters to another term or elect a new VP.

District F will either need to re-elect Lion Helen Troha to another term or elect a new VP.

These are very important positions and play a big role in whether your Camp is successful or not. Please get this process out in front of your respective Districts and ensure it gets the attention it deserves. The requirements for the position (from the Constitution) follow:

SECTION 4. A candidate for Vice-President shall be a Lion or Lioness in good standing and shall be elected from within each Sub-District in the same manner as the District Governor. Each Vice-President must have served at least one full term as a Regular Director/Officer or as a Region/Zone Chairman and Associate Director of the Corporation. Each Vice-President will be elected for a two-year term and will be eligible to succeed himself/herself for one additional consecutive term. Only three Vice Presidents shall be elected each year on a rotating basic.

DISTRICTS A, B, & E- 1st rotation C, D, & F- 2nd rotation

Also Districts C and D will need to either re-elect their current Trustees to the Camp or elect their replacements. District C's Trustee is currently Lion Jim Lapham and District D's Trustee is Lion Joe Hirsch. The requirements for the position (from the Constitution) follow:

SECTION 4. A Candidate for Trustee shall be a Lion or Lioness in good standing. Each Trustee must have shown an interest in, and actively supported the Camp. The Trustees shall be elected from within each Sub-District in the same manner as the District Governor. (*Rev. 6/9/6*) Each Trustee will be elected for a three-year term with two of the Trustees terms to expire each year. The Immediate Past President shall be Chairman unless unable to serve, then the Trustees shall elect a Chairman from their own members.

So we are starting to pick back up. It is exciting to get back into the mix with Camp activity.

For Leader Dog Dixie this word means enjoying long naps on the porch. For Annette Bateman, Dixie's retirement meant saying goodbye to a trusted companion of ten years—her first Leader Dog, her 24/7 best friend.

"Dixie changed my life," Annette says with fervor. As a matter of fact, Dixie saved her life.

The friendship began when Annette traveled from her Texas home to Leader Dogs for the Blind. She was a shy 19 year-old girl who relied on sighted friends and a cane to navigate, though she didn't find canes very trustworthy. "Canes don't tell you when there's a car coming your way," she says. But Leader Dogs do.

Once, a car backing down a driveway nearly struck Annette. "The driver didn't look. And Dixie took me back four gigantic steps. Had she not done that I probably would have been hurt, or maybe even worse."

Annette credits Dixie with increasing her independence and confidence. "I just had my little group of friends that I hung out with, but once Dixie came along, it changed my life. People approach you. They want to talk to you, to ask you questions about your dog," Annette says. "That broke me out of my shell."

Dixie was at Annette's side when she returned to college to work on a teaching degree, and soon after Annette realized that Dixie might be ready for a change. "She was starting to slow down a bit, but she'd still do her job," Annette says, thinking back. But an observant, dog-loving instructor noticed other things. "She asked me, 'Do you think the floors too hard for Dixie, 'cause I notice she moves a lot.' The next day when I went to class, there was a blanket by my chair for Dixie to sleep on."

Retiring Dixie, her best friend, was hard for Annette, especially knowing that her home was not big enough for both Dixie and a new Leader Dog. Luckily, she had two good friends who opened their hearts and their home to Dixie. Knowing that Dixie is well taken care of and has other dogs to play with helps to ease Annette's loss. Dixie's new family lives nearby so Annette can visit her and maintain the friendship that has been an important part of both their lives.

Annette will always treasure Dixie, as she treasures those whose donations helped give her the confidence she enjoys today.

"I really would like to thank everyone for their help and donations," she offers, "because without them, Leader Dog wouldn't be possible. Leader Dog wouldn't be here; these dogs wouldn't be able to be trained; and this helps not only me, but thousands of other individuals that come to get dogs for their independence."

at age ten, she didn't let it stop her from becoming a powerful little dynamo of a cheerleader. She turned down an offer from the Miami Dolphins to pursue another dream: starting a family. Three grown boys and three grandchildren later, she has no regrets. Pam recently shared a vivid memory of discrimination: Misinformed childhood teachers refused to teach her, simply because she was visually impaired. But today, Pam's face brightens as she shares her plans to visit schools with her new guide, Avery. She wants to educate children and help them get comfortable with people who have disabilities. She and Avery have already planned their first speaking engagement at her granddaughter's school back in Alabama.

"I remember being little and being afraid of someone in a wheelchair," she explains. "Parents don't seem to think about it or talk about it unless they are personally affected. My kids grew up with it and are better for it. They are helpful, understanding, and compassionate."

Pam also plans to volunteer at St. Jude's hospital in Memphis, taking Avery to cheer up children with serious illnesses. Longing to be able to travel independently, Pam is hoping to take a spring trip to Orange Beach, Alabama. "I can't wait to take Avery to the beach!" Go for it all, Pam. We're cheering you on!

NASA Internship Opportunities for Summer 2011

For Students Pursuing Science, Technology, Engineering and Math Careers



NASA is offering internships for college students (rising freshmen through doctoral) who are pursuing degrees in science, technology, engineering or mathematics (STEM).

Internships will run at NASA locations nationwide for ten weeks from May 31 through August 5, 2011. If you have a GPA of at least 2.8 and are working toward a degree in STEM fields, a NASA internship extends a great opportunity to enhance your education and potentially launch your career.

Apply now through **February 1, 2011**. Read the prerequisites and requirements and complete an online application.

Q: What are the prerequisites/requirements - age/grade limit, GPA, etc.?

A: Students must be accepted as freshmen at an accredited institution of higher learning, i.e., a college or university at the time of the internship. This is what we call a rising freshman. We have internships for rising freshmen through doctoral students in STEM fields. A minimum GPA of 2.8 is required to apply; however, applicants must understand that the competition for internships is keen. The age limits for interns are eighteen years and up.

Q: What is the location (demographic) of the internship?

A: Internships are available at all NASA centers nationwide. Students can select a particular center by applying for an opportunity or opportunities at said center. For example, an opportunity having to do with the Solar Dynamics Observatory (SDO) will be at Goddard in Maryland because SDO is here. If students simply apply without choosing any opportunity, their applications will be available for mentors to view at all NASA centers nationally. However, not applying to any opportunities may result in no mentors even looking at their applications because they will not have asked anyone to by not specifying specific internships.

Q: What is the time period of the internship?

A: Internships run for ten weeks from May 31, 2011, through August 5, 2011.






NATIONAL DIABETES EDUCATION PROGRAM

Tips to Help You Stay Healthy



There are many good reasons to take action to manage your diabetes.

- Each day you are likely to feel good and have more energy.
- In the future, you are likely to stay healthy and prevent or delay problems that can involve your heart, blood vessels, eyes, kidneys, and nerves.

Step 1:

LEARN ABOUT DIABETES

Follow this four-step action plan. It will help you live a long and healthy life.

Diabetes means that your blood glucose is too high. Glucose comes from the food we eat. An organ called the pancreas (PAN-kree-as) makes insulin (IN-suh-lin). Insulin helps glucose get from your blood into your cells. Cells take the glucose and turn it into energy.

In type 1 diabetes, the pancreas does not make any insulin. In type 2 diabetes, the body does not make enough insulin or use it very well. As a result, glucose builds up in your blood and cannot get into your cells. If the blood glucose stays too high, it can damage your body. Adults most often get type 2 diabetes. Gestational (jes-TAY-shon-al) diabetes occurs when a women is pregnant. Having it raises the mother's and her child's risk for getting diabetes, mostly type 2, for the rest of their lives.

Step 2:

KNOW YOUR DIABETES ABC's

- \bullet A1C measures your average blood glucose level over the past three months.
- High **B**lood pressure (BP) makes your heart work too hard.
- LDL, or bad Cholesterol, builds up and clogs your arteries. HDL, or good cholesterol, helps remove cholesterol from your blood vessels.

Test Goal*
A1C below 7
BP 130/80
Cholesterol LDL below 100
HDL above 40

Check How Often? Twice a year Each doctor's visit At least once a year

*For most people with diabetes

Step 3:

MANAGE YOUR DIABETES

- **Know your ABC's** and blood glucose targets. Learn how and when to test your blood glucose, and how to use the results to manage your diabetes.
- **Ask for a diabetes meal plan** to help you choose healthy foods.

Healthy food choices include:

- fruits, vegetables, fish, lean meats and poultry, dry peas or beans, and low-fat or skim milk and cheese.
- whole grain foods whole wheat bread and crackers, oatmeal, brown rice, and cereals.

Avoid foods that have a lot of sugar, salt, and fat.

Eat smaller portions of meat, fish and poultry, and larger portions of fruits and vegetables.

- Get 30 to 60 minutes of physical activity, such as brisk walking, on most days of the week.
- Seek help if you feel down. You may feel better if you talk with a mental health counselor, friend, or a support group, clergy, or family member.
- **Stop smoking** seek help to quit.
- **Take your medicines** even when you feel good. Ask if you need to take a low-dose aspirin to prevent a heart attack or stroke.
- Check your feet every day. Call your health care team if a cut, sore, blister, or bruise on your feet or toes does not begin to heal after one day.
- Brush your teeth and floss every day to avoid problems with your mouth, teeth, or gums.
- Report any changes in your eyesight to your doctor.

Step 4:

GET REGULAR CARE

Avoid problems by seeing your health care team at least twice a year to:

- Get your ABC tests, other exams, and yearly fl u shot.
- Have your blood pressure, weight, and feet checked.
- Review your record of blood glucose self tests, your ABC numbers, and your action plan.
