### Atlanta Metro Lions Club

Atlanta Metro Lions Club has been serving Southwest Atlanta for 18 (soon to be 19) years. The club was chartered on January 30, 1993 with 62 charter members. Atlanta Metro has been a driving force in our community every since we were chartered.

Since our charter, our club has worked to support Lions charities; as well as several local, state and national charities. A "Fabulous Food Tasting Extravaganza", the club's major fundraiser, supports all of these charities and club projects. The Extravaganza is a feast of "tasty delights" serving patrons with a variety of foods. It is held every 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday in October. Lion members serve as chefs along with celebrity and guest chefs filled with great food, fun and fellowship.

Some of the charities that our club supports are the Georgia Lions Lighthouse for the Blind, Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind, LCIF, Diabetes Association of Georgia, National Diabetes Association, Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic, G.A. Towns Elementary School, Fire Station #16 & #19 5-K Fun Run, National Adoption Day, Leader Dogs for the Blind, Southeastern Guide Dogs and more. The club donates to local and international relief efforts. We hosted our first Liberty Day Celebration at G.A. Towns elementary school last year which was a lot of fun sharing with the students. We buy eyeglasses and pay for eye exams for those in our community. We concentrate most of our efforts on supplying eyeglasses for children. We also participate in the Send a Kid to Camp program by sending a visually impaired person to Summer Camp and Christmas Camp. We are serious about serving the needs of our community by volunteering on many projects and health fairs. We constantly do visual and hearing screenings throughout the community. Our club hosted our first Blood Drive and Health Fair this past August and hopes to improve on it by making it bigger and better next year. Each year our club receives used Christmas trees at the Cascade Home Depot and gets them ready for chipping in the Keep South Fulton Beautiful Program. Another of our yearly efforts is to collect monies in front of local grocery stores every 1st and 2nd Saturday in April for White Cane Days by way of the Bucket Brigade. Another Atlanta Metro project is our annual Public Safety Awards Banquet where our club recognizes officers in our Public Safety Community who volunteer in their communities away from their jobs. We are a very busy club serving our community however we can.

One particular project that we are proud of is the Annual Fire Station #16 Christmas Party that is held each year to give toys to over 60 needy families in the community. Our club hosts an annual toy drive to collect toys for the children that attend the party. The club helps clean and decorate the fire station to get ready for the party. We also volunteer to receive the families (over 250 people, in all), serve food and help Santa bag the toys. It is a feel good day because you're providing a much needed service; but, it also makes you sad to see all of the need. This is a seriously depressed community that needs a lot of help.

Atlanta Metro is proud of our club's only Past District Governor Vanessa Stanley who serves throughout the district and the state. We have five District18-A Hall of Fame members. They are: Lions Herb Eber, Moses Johnson, William Marshall, Preston McCoy and Vanessa Stanley. We have several Melvin Jones Fellows and Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows. At the end of each president's term, the club thanks them for their service by donating \$1000 in their names to LCIF as Melvin Jones Fellows. We have had members serve the district, the state and international in several capacities over the years. We have members currently serving in district positions.

We take our motto, We Serve, very seriously and try to uphold that motto every day. When we see or are made aware of a need, we try and fulfill it. ### Gainesville Lions Club

Gainesville Lions Raise Funds through Children's Theater. On a crisp fall Saturday morning, the Riverbend Baptist Church began to fill with children, parents, Lions Club members and the puppet Guy. With kids everywhere on a Saturday out of school, there was plenty of excitement. The energy in the room reached a crescendo when the puppet Guy walked onto the stage. Soon, the young audience would be involved in the story of Jack and the Bean Stalk, told as only the puppet Guy could tell it. Once again, the Gainesville Lions Club Children's Theater was under way.

For over 20 years, the Gainesville Lions Club has brought the Children's Theater to Gainesville as a way to entertain area children and to raise funds for the club's service projects. Twice a year, in the spring and again in the fall, the club holds this entertaining event, offering two show times for each production. The show rotates between a puppet show and a magic show. It is this event that provides the majority of the club's project funds.

Until just a few years ago, the Children's Theater was run by a professional fund raiser who would come into town, arrange for the entertainment and find a location for the show. A group of employees would then be hired to make phone calls to local residents and businesses asking for a purchase of tickets or sponsorships for children. The caller would explain that the proceeds from the show would go to Lions sight and hearing projects.

When the fund raising group left Georgia, Gainesville Lions decided to take over running the show and hang on to this project that had become quite successful over the years. The club set up a corporation and asked Herman Jones and Jim Schwartz, club members who had business and financial backgrounds to oversee the business. The office manager, Joe Jennings who had been working for the fund raising group was retained to take care of the day to day operations.

It took a few years for the Children's Theater to build into the fund raiser that it is today. In fact, Lions members had some concerns when the show was first presented to them. The club needed to make sure that the fund raiser was above board and that our fellow citizens would not be offended by telephone calls asking for money. "The phone calls have always been low key with no pressure sales tactics, said Mike Hall, Gainesville Lions Club President. "The majority of the calls go to folks who have supported the previous show." Hall goes on to talk about how the project has become the club's major fund raiser. "I think there are a couple of reasons for the growing success of the Children's Theater. The show has been around for a long time and people know what it is. When people in our town hear the name Lions, they know what we do. They know that we give away eyeglasses and that we sell brooms. I think that's why that the show has been such a success, even without a lot of media attention."

While the Children's Theater has been a very good fund raiser for the Gainesville Lions Club, this program is now being affected by the nation's economic slump. At one time, the club could expect proceeds after expenses of around \$10,000.00 per show. The spring show this year netted just over \$7,000.00. Final figures for the most recent show of November 19<sup>th</sup> are not in, but it appears that this show will only provide the club with just over \$4,000.00. The Children's Theater committee is considering ways of shoring up the Children's Theater. Some options being talked about include running ads in the local newspaper and seeking corporate sponsors. It is hoped that with a little more face to face effort and a little more recognition for the things Lions do in service to the community, this fund raiser will remain strong.

## Villa Rica Golden City Lions Club

Chartered in August 2006, the Villa Rica Golden City Lions commemorated their 5<sup>th</sup> anniversary with a community celebration at the city's Pine Mountain Gold Museum. DG Tim Chisholm was the special guest speaker, and Lions and friends enjoyed a barbeque dinner in the museum's outdoor pavilion and visited the museum exhibits. The Golden City club is small but mighty, with a strong record of service in their community.

Working with the Georgia Lions Lighthouse, the club formed a partnership this year to provide free vision clinics. The Rapha Clinic, a free medical clinic in Temple, donates the use of its facility; the Lighthouse mobile clinic provides the equipment and coordinates the services; and local eye doctors donate their time to give eye exams. Volunteers from the Golden City, Carrollton, and Villa Rica Lions clubs assist with registration and eyeglass fitting. Since June 2011, our four vision clinics have served approximately 50 patients.

The Golden City Lions held their first Pet Parade and Games on November 5 as a benefit for White Cane and local vision services. Previously a city event, it was the club's most successful fundraiser, with about 80 dogs and their owners enjoying the parade and contests at the Mill Amphitheater in downtown Villa Rica. Local businesses supported the event as sponsors and vendors, and pet entry fees and raffle ticket sales generated additional funds. The club is already planning for next year's event.

The club also supports the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind and sponsors a local visually-impaired student to attend the camp. Both sighted and visually-impaired students participated in the club's peace poster and peace essay contests this year. In the spring, members volunteered in Villa Rica's Great American Cleanup, picking up litter along city waterways to protect the environment. In the coming year, Golden City members plan to live up to the Lions motto We Serve by sending care packages to Afghanistan, planting trees, mentoring students, and continuing our other service projects.

### WARNER ROBINS HOUSTON PEACHES



The Warner Robins Houston Peaches Lions Club was originally the Warner Robins Lioness Club. Chartered in 1980 with Doy Barks as Charter President, the club instantly became very active in the Warner Robins Community. Members gave sight and hearing screenings on preschool students at the Houston County Health Department as one of their first projects that was on a weekly basis.

The club held an annual Little Miss Lioness Pageant for preteens to have something to do in the summer for several years. They also coordinated a 'Lunch With Santa' project with the Warner Robins Noon Lions each year, constructing a Santa's Village to walk through and serving lunch. It was a huge project. Members sponsored a Bed Race in the Warner Robins City Festival, decorated a float in the city Christmas Parade, held Bingo Parties at a local nursing home, and provided scholarships for the counselors at the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind. Members were very proud to sponsor contestants in the Peach Bowl Princess Pageants several years, twice having the winner for District E. The club began cooking Knockwurst & Bratwurst in 1983 at the Mossy Creek Arts & Crafts Festival, a project the club continues to the present.

In 1992, members voted to convert to a Lions Club. The new charter was presented to President Millie Falkner on September 12, 1992. Besides the Mossy Creek booth twice a year, members continue to support all Lions Activities on the local, district, state, and national level. Members are all Melvin Jones Fellows. Several members have served as Cabinet Chairpersons.

The club supports a local school with school supplies and a local food bank with food. Money from the sale of poinsettias in December for the past 14 years has been donated to "Send A Kid to Camp" project at our Lions Camp for the Blind. Since becoming a Lions Club, members work with the local school nurses providing eye exams and glasses for students in the city schools. The club annually supports the Senior Health Fair, both financially and with workers, and supports the hospital's "Safe Kids" project, which provides car seats and bike helmets in the city. Liberty Day is a project each year in a school, as well as Red Ribbon Day in the school drug program. Money is sent for Disaster Relief when needed, such as Albany Floods, tsunami areas, and tornados victims, such as Ringgold. The club sponsored the winning Lions Outstanding Deaf winner, Robin Craig, in 2001. Members contribute annually to St. Jude's Cancer Hospital in memory of little Sarah Parker, the granddaughter of member Eileen Parker. Members adopted a park to keep clean in the city and participated in the Georgia National Fair Parade in Perry, Ga. This club is a very small club with 7 members currently but they provide much in their community that would otherwise be missing. They are a group of close friends that does a lot of good work (as they grow old together).

As of now, I'd be inclined to keep the sessions pretty general: something like (1) "Beyond Your Club: opportunities in the districts, multiple district, and at international; (2) public speaking/presentations session; (3) history of Lions & Georgia Lions; (4) Goal-setting.



## MY CLUB My Family

These packs are available through ARC and contain many essentials for most emergencies, but it is designed to be customized for each individual. A less expensive back pack kit can be completely customized for an individual by purchasing a regular back pack, adding supplies you might use in various circumstances. And remember, each person in the family needs their own kit.

Every family needs to have a plan of action in the event of an emergency — from storm warnings to house fires, from stay at home in a safe room or shelter to evacuation of your home with or without your vehicle.

As a rule of thumb, you should have stockpiled in your "safe room" or shelter, one gallon of water for each person in the family per day for at least three days, more if you live in a remote area where you might be without power and/or water for longer periods.

Be sure to have emergency rations, toilet articles, flash lights, candles, matches or lighter, first aid kits, radio and especially about two weeks supply of your prescription medications!!'

There are many emergency supply lists. Here are some other basics, and as mentioned earlier, customize for each person!!

- Emergency blanket
- Non prescription drugs

Aspirin or other pain reliever Anti-diarrhea medicine Antacid

- Clothing
- Bedding
- Rain gear
- Tools—basic
- Sewing kit
- Matches in waterproof container
- Butane lighter
- Extra batteries
- Toilet paper
- Personal hygiene items
- Important family documents

One of the most important items you can have is a hand crank operated battery charger that can recharge your cell phone!! These are available through the Red Cross or some of the Mall Specialty Shops. Be sure to include your phone charger cable! This is also a weather ban radio as well as am/fm radio.

There are dozens of other handy items—many that are important to just you. Remember the more prepared you are for an emergency, the more tolerable the situation can be. Get everything you think you might need and store it in a handy place. Also, rotate your water and drugs periodically to keep items fresh.

Every few months you might have a "practice session". Select one evening and prepare your emergency meal. Use nothing but the materials in your emergency pack and prepare a simple meal. Did you have everything you needed? How could you improve it with supplementary items for your kit? Be sure to replace the items you used so you are ready! Hope you never need any of your supplies but suppose you do, remember better safe than sorry!

Lions, encourage your program chairman to get your club a program on Emergency Preparedness. Often programs are available though the American Red Cross, or your county's Emergency Preparedness Unit.

### JANUARY IS GLAUCOMA AWARENESS MONTH

Glaucoma is a specific pattern of optic nerve damage and visual field loss caused by a number of different eye diseases. Most are characterized by increased pressure in the eye that destroys the optic nerve. Without the optic nerve, tunnel vision and then blindness occur. Glaucoma is one of the most common causes of preventable blindness.

Symptoms of glaucoma are usually not noticed until optic nerve damage has occurred.

Please check with you local healthcare facilities to see if glaucoma screenings are available in your area. If there is one, why not see if they could use additional volunteers to help with this community outreach? If there is not a screening available in your community, maybe the local Lions Clubs can organize one. ## We sometimes forget who we are and what we are supposed to do.....

## What is the relationship between the sponsor Lions club and a Leo club?

The sponsor Lions club is responsible for guiding and counseling its Leo club. By working closely with Leos, Lions ensure that their sponsored club operates within the policies of Lions Clubs International. Lions work with Leos in an open, constructive manner. What is a Leo club advisor?

In consultation with the Leo club, a Lion is appointed to serve as an advisor for the Leo club. This individual should be someone who enjoys working with youth. The leadership provided by an advisor often affects the success of a Leo club. The advisor, along with two other appointed Lions, forms the Leo club advisory committee.

Often, school-based Leo clubs are required to have a faculty member as an advisor. If the faculty member is not a Lion, a Lion co-advisor should be selected to maintain close rapport with the Lions club.

Patients who have worked with Scully often experience more self-confidence and the motivation to participate in daily life activities, explains Elizabeth.

### Mike's Journey Through Dyslexia

"Before we started with the accommodation of Learning Ally, Mike's homework would just take hours; it was a labor of love every night and involved the whole family. Mike has a younger brother who is quite bright, and we had to consider his meltdowns because all the attention was constantly going to Mike, and he needed it too.



"My husband and I would take shifts – 'Who's going to read what book tonight to him?' Bob and I were Mike's readers and it's very time consuming. We love the kid to death and we'd do anything to make his life easier. We certainly went through the gamut of many arguments. Like 'Please try harder' ... and you know that whole thing – you'd feel like if he would just somehow work harder, we could get through this. But he was doing the very best that he could the whole time. It's hard not to be a hovering helicopter mom when you have a kid with a learning difference.

"And so once Mike started with the accommodations offered by Learning Ally, it made a huge difference. His comprehension went up. And not only did it cut down on the number of hours he was spending on homework, but his independence and his self-esteem and self-confidence just blossomed because now he could do it on his own. He could feel like he was an independent learner. And by the time you're seventh, eighth, ninth grade, you want to be independent. You want to be able to grow and feel like you're doing it on your own.

"Mike has worked really hard in the last four years and once his independence and self-esteem improved and grew, it was so much easier to pull away. And in the last two years he really has been on his own. At this point, you know, we wouldn't be sending him to college three thousand miles away, had he not achieved this level of independence.

"And it's fun for *me* now, too. I mean, I finally joined a book club myself about a year ago and I'm reading as an adult, you know, and enjoying this process tremendously! But I have no regrets for all the time I spent with Mike getting him to the point where he is as a student."

### Diabetes in Focus

- Daily exercise for less than a minute may curb diabetes Study participants who performed two 20-second cycle sprints thrice weekly for six weeks attained a 28% improvement in insulin function, British researchers found. The findings in the European Journal of Applied Physiology suggest that incorporating less than one minute of exercise daily may help stave off and even treat type 2 diabetes, the researchers said. Google/The Press Association (U.K.) (12/8)
- Hypoglycemia protocol bolsters patient care in diabetes rehab

The use of a hypoglycemia protocol in rehabilitation hospitals resulted in a 48% decrease in rapid response team codes and an 84% reduction in acute care hospital transfers among insulin-dependent patients with diabetes, experts reported at the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists meeting. Researchers also noted significant improvements in patient care and declines in insulin-related events and health care costs. MedPage Today (free registration) (12/8)

- N-3 fatty acids may cut heart risks in diabetes patients Diabetes patients who used an n-3 fatty-acid-fortified margarine had an 84% decrease in ventricular arrhythmiarelated events, compared with those who took a placebo, according to an analysis in Diabetes Care. Researchers said n-3 fatty acid supplementation also appeared to have protective properties against cardiac arrest and sudden death. MedPage Today (free registration) (12/8)
- Dapagliflozin-sulfonylurea combo improves HbA1C
  Patients with type 2 diabetes who took a combination of dapagliflozin and sulfonylurea achieved better HbA1C levels at 24 weeks compared with those who had a placebosulfonylurea treatment, according to a study presented at the World Diabetes Congress. Researchers also noted significant improvements in fasting plasma glucose, postprandial glucose and total body weight in those who received the dapagliflozin-sulfonylurea treatment. ### Intermittent diet holds promise for weight loss

Women who did not eat carbs for two days and had normal food intake for the rest of the week lost an average of nine pounds, compared with only five pounds in those who cut back to 1,500 calories daily, researchers reported at the CTRC-AACR San Antonio Breast Cancer Symposium. Researchers said those in the intermittent-dieting group also had better levels of the hormones insulin and appetite-regulating leptin. MSNBC (12/8)

### Heart risks can show up by age 3 in overweight children

Significantly high cholesterol levels and artery inflammation, which leads to heart problems, may start as early as age 3 in overweight children, a study in Obesity revealed. The results underscore the importance of open communication between providers and parents about the adverse affects associated with excess weight even in young children, experts said. The Miami Herald (free registration) (12/8)

### Study looks at gastric bypass benefits in teens

Obese adolescents who underwent gastric bypass surgery had decreases in hemoglobin A1C, fasting glucose, blood pressure levels, LDL cholesterol, triglycerides and C-reactive proteins despite continued obesity two years after the surgery, a study presented at the World Diabetes Congress showed. Weight regain between one and two years after surgery did not appear to reverse the cardiometabolic benefits of gastric bypass in patients, researchers said. Medscape (free registration) (12/8)

### Southeast states have longest office wait times, data show

Physician office wait times are the longest in Southeast states at an average 23.5 minutes, according to data from the physician rating website Vitals. The national average wait time is 21 minutes and states in the West and Midwest came in under that time. Mississippi had the longest wait at 25.06 minutes and Wisconsin had the shortest, at 15.43 minutes. Medscape (free registration) (12/7)

## **Survey: More children adopt healthy behaviors in Maine city**

A telephone survey of about 800 parents in Portland, Maine, this year found that 31% of children had adopted at least three of the 5-2-1-0 behaviors from the "Let's Go!" program, compared with 22% in 2007. Researchers found that 26% of the respondents said their children consumed the recommended servings of fruits and vegetables, compared with 16% in 2007. This year's Statewide Leo Gathering and Conference will be held at the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind in Waycross March 16-18, 2012. ALL Leos are invited and encouraged to attend. Leos interested in running for an office to serve on the MD18 Leo Council for 2012-2013 are especially encouraged to attend (Note: Leo club must be in good standing). I have listed the offices currently approved under the By-Laws so the Leos can determine for which office they would like to run.

At a subsequent Lions Council meeting the Governors approved a levy of \$1.25 per Leo member of each club. A levy is required under the Standard Leo Multiple District Constitution. This amount is billed annually based on the membership of the club on October 31st of that Leo fiscal year. Each Leo club (and/or their sponsoring Lions club) is asked to provide their membership information no later than November 15th of each year. The monies collected are put in an Administrative Account to be used for the expenses of the Leo Multiple District, but only with the approval of the Leo AND Lions Councils. The Leo Multiple District Treasurer and I, as MD18 Leo Chair, are responsible for the accounting and reporting of both the Administrative and Projects accounts to the Leo and Lions Councils. As of October 2010 there were 39 Leo clubs in Georgia. Out of these 39 Leo clubs only 4 paid the levy. It has been brought to my attention that perhaps this is because Georgia's Leos and Lions do not completely understand the purpose and use of the levy and, more importantly, the purposes, goals, and aims of MD18 Leo.

My primary goals as MD18 Leo Chair are to work with our Lions clubs to charter new Leo clubs, develop the leadership skills in these service-minded youth and prepare them for a life of service (hopefully as a Lion!). Those that we have been working with have benefitted from our program. My big regret is that I have not been able to have Leos from across Georgia involved with what we're doing. That's where we as Lions need to step up and reach out to our Leos, invite them to get involved (and get involved yourselves!) and "buy in" to what we're trying to accomplish!

#### **Important Points:**

- The President (or designated representative) of every Georgia Leo club in good standing (all past and current levies paid) is eligible to serve as a voting member of the MD18 Leo Council. Each club should be represented at each meeting of the MD18 Leo Council. (Note: Next meeting will be held Saturday, December 10 at the Georgia Lions Lighthouse in Chamblee beginning at noon.)
- Every Leo from a Leo club in good standing is eligible to, and encouraged to, run for any MD18 Leo office

- (pursuant to MD18 Leo Constitutional requirements).
- One of the long-term goals is to form Leo districts so that Leos and Lions in their areas can work with each other as well as on a statewide basis. In order to accomplish this we need to get involvement from Leos in ALL the districts.
- The Statewide Leo Gathering and Conference annually brings Leos and Lions from across Georgia to the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind. The 2012 event (March 16-18, 2911) will be the sixth year in a row we've gathered to assist the Camp, learn leadership skills, elect MD18 Leo Officers, and have great food, fun, and fellowship! The committee is working on a theme and schedule currently and will report progress at the 12/10 MD18 Leo Council meeting. Once details are finalized we will be sending invitations and forms. ALL Leos, Lions, and adults are invited! If your Leos have not been to a Gathering, I STRONGLY stress that you encourage them to go - they'll have a WONDERFUL time! I even invite them to contact Leos that have been to a Gathering and ask them if they enjoyed themselves and were better for the experience!
- MD18 Leo is an official project of the Georgia Lions and under the direct control of the Lions Council of Governors. Any action or decision must first be approved by the Lions Council and, in some cases, the Lions International Board of Directors. As MD18 Leo Chair I submit a report of MD18 Leo activities and financial position to the Council for each of their meetings.
- The Leo-72 form should be completed each year after club elections are held in April and sent to LCI with copies to the District Chair and me. This report will provide the contact information we need.
- Each Leo club should hold a Membership Recruitment event in October (see LCI Leo calendar), then report results to respective District Chair and me no later than November 15th of the same year. As stated earlier the number of members as of October 31st is what is used to send the MD18 Leo levy statement. If membership number is not provided the Leo club is billed for 20 members.

Georgia's Lions should be justifiably proud of their young people who have taken up the challenge of service as Leos. MD18 Leo is the next level of dedication and service and is here to benefit ALL of Georgia's Leos. I want to once again encourage all Lions and Lions clubs - ESPECIALLY those that sponsor a Leo club - to take an active role in getting their Leos involved on the state level. As always, my fellow Leo Program Committee members and I are available to answer any questions and/or assist the Leos and Lions to make their clubs as strong and active as possible.

### Lions Family Cub Program

The Cub Program helps support family-friendly clubs. Formulated special to encourage families to volunteer together, children under age 12 have the opportunity to build a lifelong dedication to helping others. Cubs are divided into three age categories:

Level 1: Under age 3 Level 2: Age 4-7 Level 3: Age 8-12

Lions clubs that implement a Cub Program are encouraged to shape Cub activities to fit the lifestyles and needs of the Cubs, Lion members and families involved. To help support the program, LCI offers the Lions Family Cub Program Activity Guide and Family Cub Program Activities, filled with age-appropriate activities and distinguishing Cub Patches by age level to help Cubs feel like part of the club and get them excited to participate.





### **Lions Quest**

### **Skills for Adolescence**

Skills for Adolescence (SFA) is based on highly targeted research of students in grades 6-8. Included are "Making Healthy Choices" units covering drug, alcohol and tobacco use; interactive, student-focused lessons; sessions on anger, conflict and stress management; and cross-curricular activities to encourage team-teaching. This extensive curriculum has been expanded to help students manage conflict and anger and to help teachers and administrators deal with the critical issue of bullying. Supplemental bullying prevention lessons, developed in 2009, can be found in the Curriculum Updates section of this Web site.

Our 40-session "Introduction to Skills" implementation model was proven effective by a rigorous evaluation study conducted by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA). However, we recommend the school-wide model as the optimum implementation model because the entire school community creates and sustains a shared vision for positive youth development. Similarly, we recommend the three-year models as our ideal models because they provide "booster lessons" and continuous practice that reinforce the skill-building potential throughout the middle school experience. When the three-year model is not possible, we have seen much success with the two-and one-year models as well.

All options, from one to three years, include one lesson per week taught as a 45-minute class or split into two 20-30 minutes classes. Three lessons per month are scheduled for a total of 30 lessons per school year. Unit coverage varies according to time frame. ### **Lions Quest Expansion Pilot**

Lions Quest continues to expand beyond typical school programs. LCIF is beginning to pilot our new Lions Quest Skills for Adolescence Out-of-School-*Time* (OST) program in six community schools in the Chicago Public School system, in partnership with the YMCA of Greater Chicago, Illinois, USA. This marks the first step in bringing Lions Quest to community centers, afterschool programs and other organizations -- the very places where Lions help youth every day. Lions Quest is eager to partner with Lions clubs everywhere to expand this new initiative. Lions continue to play a key role in expanding the program worldwide. A training was recently held for Lions leaders from South Asia. In January, meetings will be held in Europe and Africa. The meeting in Africa marks the formal launch of our US\$150,000 project with the U.S. State Department to expand the program in five countries.

## One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative Update

Everyday a quiet storm needlessly takes the lives of 450 children. Yet for less than US\$1, we can provide life-long immunity and the chance at life. Lions, we can save 157 million children through One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative, a partnership with the Measles Initiative.



The Gates Foundation is challenging Lions to mobilize US\$10 million with a matching grant of US\$1 for every US\$2 raised by Lions. Last month LCIF received two large donations to help meet this challenge: US\$250,000 from Multiple

District 300, Taiwan, and US\$10,000 from International Director Seiki Yamaura from Japan. All Lions are encouraged to support this program and help meet the challenge. Donations are eligible for MJF recognition. Many others around the world are also expressing their support. Last month International President Tam met with the President of Nepal and Vice President of Kenya, both of whom pledged their support to vaccination campaigns planned in their countries.

All donations to the Lions Measles Initiative are eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) credit.

### Melvin Jones Fellowship Eligibility

As explained previously, there will be four special areas of giving and one general funding area:

- Disaster
- · Sight
- Youth
- · Humanitarian Needs
- · Area of Greatest Need (general)

Donors can donate to each of these four special areas as well as a general area of funds called 'Area of Greatest Need' and receive MJF credit. Below is a chart with examples of donations that are eligible and are not eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowship credit.
