"Lions Built Matteo's Dream" Phoenix Decorating Company

In 2011, Lions Club International helped build a playground in Concord, California, called "Matteo's Dream." It is a playground for kids of all abilities, the first of its kind in the Bay Area. Matteo passed away on March 16, 2010; he was blind and could move around only by wheelchair. Matteo dreamed of a playground where children who cannot walk, see, or hear, can play safely alongside children who can. Lions Clubs International provided a foundation grant towards the cost of building the "Matteo's Dream Playground," and this year's float is dedicated in his honor. "Lions Built Matteo's Dream" reflects the height and features of the actual playground. In front are two platform tree house areas. In the middle another platform area leads to an elevated clearing area. The rear of the float features two tree houses and a slide.

### State News



Council received reports or comments as follows:

### PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT – LION JAMES E. "JIM" ERVIN:

PIP Ervin stated that the opportunity to host an International Convention is exciting and will promote Lionism in Georgia. He thanked PCC Richard Brown and PDG Jane Price for their work on this proposal. PIP Ervin discussed a letter he received from Leader Dogs about the gift of \$3,090.00 raised from the Atlanta Braves and the Georgia Lions for that special event. He thanked Lion Pam Schloemer for her hard work and efforts on the project. He presented the letter to Lion Schloemer and thanked her for a job well done. Lion Pam stated that the actual dollar amount is \$5,846.00.

Past President Ervin stated that Dr. Yamada wanted to look at Charleston and Savannah as a possible site for a Board Meeting in early March 2016. The Hyatt and the Westin in Savannah submitted bids. PDG Chris Barbieri worked with him in hosting Dr. Yamada and LCI staff. PIP Ervin felt that Savannah has a good chance of being chosen. He stated that if chosen, there would be a host night, with Lions of Georgia invited. Lions in the state would also be asked to volunteer to work during the Board Meeting. PIP Ervin stated that he had asked PDG Barbieri to get some type of book on Savannah to give each staff member and Dr. Yamada. He asked Council to approve reimbursement to PDG Barbieri in the amount of \$50.93. DG Hashbarger, 18-I made a motion to approve payment to PDG Chris Barbieri in the amount of \$50.93; motion seconded by DG Threatt, 18 -N, and motion carried.

PIP Ervin discussed the fact that PCC Mark Miller is on the USA/Canada Forum Planning Committee and will be Chair of the Forum. Savannah has asked for the opportunity to bid on the USA/Canada Forum in 2018.

PIP Ervin gave special recognition to State Historian Chip Nedza for his work in getting a Lions of Georgia Museum and compiling some very good historical facts on all the clubs.

Lion Ervin stated that he had sent a letter out to all area GMT leaders including the goals that have been set by the District Governors at last year's District Governor Elect School. The letter also included results to date of how many clubs had been extended and the goal for each area. He pointed out that this group is there to help the Governors to achieve their goals.

### PAST INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR – LION HAYNES TOWNSEND:

PID Townsend stated it is always a pleasure to be present at the Council Meeting.

PID Townsend stated that the Rome Lions Club helps to sponsor a mission in Honduras. They are continuing to do this and will have a

trip in March. A team of 20 to 25 Ophthalmologists have come together and take alternating weeks (up to two weeks at a time) going to Honduras and they do cataract surgeries, corneal transplants, etc. for patients that can afford to pay for the surgery; then they utilize that money to do the surgery for folks who cannot afford to pay. A special is being produced for PBS on the history of eyeglasses and how they have impacted vision of people around the world. This special will involve Lions Clubs and LCI. This will give the Lions more publicity.

### REPORT OF STATE CONVENTION and INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION CHAIR – LION Ed Hashbarger, DG 18I:

DG Hashbarger asked the Governors to think about and decide what they want to do at the Convention this year. What type and how many seminars will there be at the Convention; what type of activity for Friday and Saturday. He stated that attendance is down at State Conventions and Governors will need to push for attendance and registration at the Macon Convention.

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### INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

DG Hashbarger stated that Tennessee will host the Southeastern Breakfast this year. He stated that paperwork for the Georgia Jamboree has been submitted to LCI. He pointed out that there is \$2,500.00 set aside for the Jamboree. This will be held at the Sheraton, where the DGEs are housed. Time, date and place have not been confirmed.

2020 Atlanta International Convention Bid: PCC Richard Brown introduced Kimberly Klytta, Atlanta Convention and Visitors Bureau (Chicago Office), who gave a presentation on the effort to bid on the LCI International Convention in 2020. PCC Brown asked Council for direction on presenting a bid for the 2020 International Convention in Atlanta. He stated that he and his committee would be happy to do a presentation at District Conventions. Volunteers would come from Georgia and some could come from surrounding states. CC Winters stated that Council should be able to give PCC Brown some kind of definitive answer by April whether or not all Districts adopt a resolution to support an International Convention in 2020. DG Hashbarger asked that the 2020 Committee be at each District Convention. DG Hashbarger, 18 -I made a motion to endorse and move forward on the process of bidding on the International Convention in Atlanta in 2020. DG Rice, 18-L, seconded the motion and motion carried.

### REPORT OF MD 18 CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CHAIR – LION KEMBRA SMITH. PCC:

PCC Smith, presented a proposed revised Constitution and By-Laws including changes requested by the Council. She asked that the Council study this proposed revision and decide whether or not they want to take this before the Lions of Georgia for a vote. The biggest change was removing the section on Committees and putting it into the Policy Manual. DG Hashbarger, 18-I, encouraged Governors to study the Constitution and By-Laws, discuss needed changes and/or approval via email, and be ready to take action at the February Council Meeting. PCC Smith asked that Council try to give her thirty days to take any changes back to the Committee for their approval.

### REPORT OF MD 18 GEORGIA LIONS ALL STATE BAND CHAIR – LION LESLIE MILLER:

Lion Miller discussed the proposed music scholarship program for the state.

Proposal:

So that the money our Lions work so hard to raise can benefit someone in a more direct way, my proposal is to create a Lions music competition and award the winner with a scholarship to the school of their choice. The amount of the scholarship would be \$2500, paid directly to the college.

Here's how it would work:

- Applications sent to band directors to distribute to high school seniors apps also sent to organizers of JanFest at IJGA and All State Band auditions
- Students return application with a recording of audition material
- Recordings would be reviewed by panel, and narrowed down to top
- Top 3 would perform live at State Convention in Macon, and winner would be announced at banquet on Saturday night Needed at State Convention:
- Room in which to have the performances
- Piano available

DG Hashbarger made a motion to accept the program with a \$2,500.00 scholarship which would be named "PID Buddy Ouzts Scholarship Fund". DG Threatt, 18-N, seconded the motion. Program would begin in January of 2014. Lion Miller asked if the Lion Tamer could sell pins, shirts, etc. in the LT store in order to generate some revenue for the project. Vote taken. Motion carried.

### REPORT MD 18 Long Range Planning Chair, PCC

*MILLER:* On September 14, 2013 the Council of Governors adopted a Long Range Planning Committee recommended resolution in regards to the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind. This brief report follows up on the developments in response to the Resolution.

**Resolution of Issue of Leadership:** The Camp Board has resolved the issue relating to the office of President. This goal has been achieved.

**Balanced Budget:** On October 5, 2013, the Camp's executive committee met for the express purpose of creating a revised operating budget. They met that goal.

**Strategic Partnering:** The Camp's executive committee has put in place a small task-force to focus on developing short term partnership and marketing issue.

### REPORT OF MD 18 STATE MAGAZINE EDITOR AND LCIF CHAIR – LION ED HASHBARGER, DGE, 18-I: DG

Hashbarger reported that the LCIF has given a grant for \$75,000.00 (matching grant) for Covington and Oxford for Newton County on a Miracle Field. DG Hashbarger asked PIP Jim if he and maybe PIP

Wayne Madden would be available to present the check when received.

DG Hashbarger stated that the next issue of the State Magazine will be coming out on the 2nd of January. He asked Governors to submit any information they would like to have included in the magazine. DG Hashbarger stated that he wanted to make a few presentations at the Council Meeting. He pointed out that training is very important. He congratulated PCC Kembra Smith on becoming a Certified Guiding Lion and made a presentation to her. He made a presentation to PCC Grace Clower as a Certified Guiding Lion.

REPORT OF MD 18 REPRESENTATIVE TO LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND - LION PAM SCHLOEMER: Lion Schloemer reported that \$5849.00 was raised at last year's Braves game. With this event, Georgia became one of four states that became compliant with 100% donations from all clubs. She stated that she took the t shirt money, the tailgate money and divided it equally among the clubs. She challenged every club to make a \$100.00 donation between now and March 1. Georgia will be the only state to reach what is known as dog bone level, which is \$100.00 minimum per club. Lion Schloemer reported that the road show in 18-L is up and running. Districts I, O, and N, she needs the co-chairs so that they can get started. She reported that from the Braves Game last year, the state gained six new members and three leader dog recipients. The date reserved with the Braves for next year's game is August 16, 2014. This is as late as she could get, because there are no Saturday games after that date. They will be doing the tailgate party and she is seeking a bank's sponsorship of that event. She is trying to get permission to play a beep ball game prior to the Braves game. This will be a 7:00 PM game and Lion Schloemer is working with the Intercontinental Hotel to come up with a package. She asked Governors to help publicize the event and encourage clubs to sponsor a youth program.

### REPORT OF STATE LION TAMER AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY CHAIR – LION

RICK MIZELL, PDG: Lion Tamer Mizell stated that he has received two invitations to attend the I and N District Conventions. He will attend the other two District Conventions if they want him to attend and set up the store. Please give him information on when and where their Convention is to be held. He has been working on software that will allow him to update club information from the myLCI website directly without having to type the information in. Lion Tamer Mizell was asked about the possibility of archiving past issues of the State Directories, State Magazines, etc. He stated that State Historian Chip Nedza has provided a listing on the website of all past Lions Club officers from 1920 forward, along with club meeting place.

### REPORT OF STATE HISTORIAN – LION CHIP

**NEDZA:** PIP Ervin commended Lion Chip on his work on the museum. He stated that everything will be in the museum probably by May of next year. PDG Ray Moore will be donating a large amount of Lions memorabilia that he has collected; the Carter museum will also be donating. Each Governor will receive a flash drive with pictures of 250 items which have been photographed to date. He thanked all PIDs and PIP Ervin for their contributions to the museum. Lion Nedza stated that according to LCI, no other Multiple District has a museum, and Georgia would be the first. Lion Nedza was asked to plan for an open house with media coverage once the museum is ready.

### **Alpharetta Lions Club**





### **Athens Classic City Lions Club**

Making reading accessible for all. (Formally Recording for the Blind and Dyslectic (RFB&D))

Several members volunteer at the Athens, Georgia Branch of Learning Ally serving as recorders of text books and other reading materials. They average about 18 man-hours per month converting the printed page to digital audio format.

Recording "The Lion" Magazine Classic City Lions record The Lion, the monthly magazine of Lions Clubs International, at Learning Ally in Athens, GA from July through December each year. This activity consists of reading the magazine which is recorded to a computer disk, labeling CD's, copying disks and preparing them for mailing to those who need audio copies of The Lion. This activity requires about 34 man-hours each month.

**Eyeglass Recycling** Members of the Classic City Lions Club place collection boxes for used eyeglasses in eyeglass clinics and other offices around town. These boxes are checked periodically and the thousands of eyeglasses collected are transferred to the Georgia Lions Lighthouse for processing and distribution. During the first four months of 2012 over 3,000 pair were donated.



The Classic City Lions participate in various other charitable activities. Some participated in the building of a room for a hot tub for a blind and paralyzed child who needs warm-water physical therapy

### **Our Daily Bread**

The Club provided Breakfast at Our Daily Bread on the first Tuesday of each month.

Our Daily Bread serves lunch to more than 125 people a day Monday-Friday, as well as breakfast on weekdays and a sack meal on Saturdays and Sundays. Our Daily Bread also distributes food, health, and hygiene items to guests, and provides space for guests to receive legal assistance, nursing care, and VA assistance, as well as offering free GED classes and computer skills training.



### **Food Bank of Northeast Georgia**

Mercy Health Center The Georgia Lions Lighthouse operates vision clinics across Georgia for eye exams and to

eyeglasses for the financially needy and uninsured. They depend on resources provided by Lions Clubs and other sources, as well as, the volunteer services of eye physicians. Vision clinics are held at the Mercy Health Center, 700 Oglethorpe Ave. Suite C7, Athens, GA 30606, once each month. The Classic City Lions Club provides volunteers in alternate months to help with initial steps of eye exams, record keeping, and selection of eyeglass styles and fit.





The club has also participated in building for Habitat for Humanity.

<u>Pancake Breakfasts</u> Two pancake breakfasts are scheduled each year, one in fall and one in spring, to raise funds for various projects. Pancakes and sausage are cooked and served by Classic City Lions at a local church which supplies the kitchen and dining room. Tickets are sold in advance by club members. Over the last three years we have had an income of \$7,713.00.

<u>Ushering at University of Georgia Athletic Events</u> Classic City Lions serve as ushers at University of Georgia men's and women's basketball games, baseball games, and gymnastics meets. The UGA Athletic Association pays the club for hours worked by club members.

You cannot bring your own ammo and the shells are carefully guarded to insure a safe environment. If you need to, you can use one of the loaner guns on hand.

The money raised goes to support sight conservation charities that the Club is involved in such as the Georgia Camp for the Blind in Waycross. ### Welcome: Zone and Region Chairpersons to the Global **Leadership Team**

It's official! The Lions Clubs International Board has added all zone and region chairpersons to the

Global Leadership Team (GLT) at the district level (GLT-D). Effective leadership is crucial to the continued ability of our organization to provide needed community service.

It is especially crucial at the club level. Zone and region chairpersons provide a valuable link between districts and assigned clubs. By including the zone and region chairpersons as active members of the GLT-D, the GLT can maximize their leadership development efforts while enabling the zone and region chairs to better support their clubs.

As an active member of the GLT-D, the primary responsibilities of the zone and region chairpersons include:

- Identifying potential leaders at the club/zone level
- Communicating availability and promoting participation in training and leadership development opportunities
  - Encouraging new leaders in their leadership responsibilities
- Collaborating with the GLT-D to ensure that club officer/zone chairperson training is effectively conducted
- Communicating training and development needs to their GLT-D members

We encourage the zone and region chairpersons to visit the Leadership Resource Center to learn more about the GLT, current training and development programs, as well as leadership resources. Zone and region chairpersons can contact the Global Leadership Team should you have questions related to the GLT or leadership development opportunities.



### Membership Committee Plan for a Lions Club during Lions Year 2013-2014

- ➤ Perform Community Needs Survey in partnership with Lions Club/County Chamber of Commerce and other local community service organizations.
- ➤ Gather a list of Business Contacts from our members and publish them on our web site and Facebook page. This is recommended to encourage business networking.
- ➤ Develop a "Lions Branding program to make people aware of the Lions Clubs International and the Lions Club. I have done an informal survey and found that the younger a person is, starting about 65, the less likely they are to know about the Lions.
  - Articles in Newspaper, Radio & Cable
  - Presentations to school groups and to Church Groups Meet with Chamber, City & County to discuss Lions
  - Campaigns such as a QR Code Treasure Hunt
  - Use of Lion Costume and/or stuffed Lions with YELLOW vests on all TLC events.
  - Develop an up to date Lions Club Brochure to hand out
  - Encourage members to wear Lion paraphernalia whenever they go out. It should be highly visible and YELLOW if possible.

- ➤ Budget Needs \$500.00 rough estimate would be spent primarily on printing of business cards and brochures.

### The Eighteenth District H. E. Allen Americus, Georgia

I HEREWITH submit my report of the work accomplished during my term of office as District Governor for Georgia, Florida and Alabama, dating from January 1<sup>st</sup> 1922 to June 10<sup>th</sup>, 1922.

LIONISM in the south, as you know, was unheard of until 1921: during this year three clubs were organized by Mr. Thos. Marriott, Field Director, in the following cities, Atlanta, Americus, and Macon, Georgia.

At a meeting in Macon, on December 28<sup>th</sup>, 1921, called by Mr. M. J. Witman, President of the LIONS CLUB of this city, representatives were present from Macon and Americus clubs, with the aim of building of the clubs and offering to the citizenship of our territory LIONISM in its broad sense. I was elected to act as District Governor for Georgia, which election was confirmed by your Honorable President, and the States of Florida and Alabama were added to my district. I immediately began correspondence with Mr. Melvin Jones, your esteemed and very capable secretary, for assistance in the way of field directors. On March, 1922, Mr. H. S. Newman came to Georgia and after considerable time, secured the services of three or four young men as field directors. All of these men were without experience, and of course considerable time was spent explaining and educating them for this work. The following work was then accomplished;

*Georgia:* Mr. J. A. Davenport, Jr., was the first of the men employed to organize a club, this being in Cordele. They have 36 members and a good club and have rendered valuable services to their community. This club on charter night had as its Honored Guest, your Secretary, Mr. Melvin Jones.

- Mr. J. B. Pickard organized the second club in Moultrie. They have a fine club of nearly 40 members and are receiving the hearty support of the Rotary Club which had just been organized.
- Mr. Pickard also organized the third club, Waycross, and it is composed of men proud to welcome the LIONS, as they wanted a club that would render service for their city.
- Mr. C. M. Hall organized the fourth club in Savannah, and I presented the charter on Saturday night, June 10<sup>th</sup>. This club has 61 members and all were present on charter night, together with several LIONS from other cities, Macon, sending 15 members in a special car headed by their President, M. J. Witman. His Excellency, Thos. W. Hardwick, Governor of Georgia was one of the principal speakers.
- Mr. C. M. Hall had reported to me that he has a fine club started in Augusta, having something over 25 applications in hand and would organize in the next week or ten days.

This will give Georgia 8 clubs, the five last named being organized in the last 90 days. I have visited each of these clubs except Waycross, and my visit there has been deferred for their charter night which will be soon. All the clubs are in good condition and doing good work, and I attach reports from their secretaries showing the activities.

*Alabama:* Montgomery organized a club on Monday, June 12<sup>th</sup>,1922, having over 50 members, and being the capital of this state, which the representative business men at their head, this club should be the cause of spreading Lionism throughout Alabama. Field Director T. E. Castleberry organized the club.

*Florida:* Orlando is the only city that has a Lions Club, and reports from this club show that they had not done much, because of co-operation needed in field men to organize other clubs. Their secretary writes that they have reorganized and are now doing something for the community.

### **Melvin Jones Fellowship** (NOTE: This is <u>NOT</u> an Award)

This is the highest individual recognition that an individual Lion or Club can name an individual Lion who gives a \$1,000 to become a Melvin Jones Fellow. They will get a Melvin Jones Fellow - will receive a lapel pin and a personalized wall plaque. A diamond is added to the lapel pin if an individual or club gives another \$1,000 and this is considered a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow. Their names are displayed on a monitor in the LCIF Recognition Room at International Headquarters.

The Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) recognizes donations of US\$1,000. It is the backbone of LCIF, providing 75 percent of the foundation's revenue. As recognition of humanitarian work, an MJF is an honor presented to those who donate US\$1,000 to LCIF or to people for whom a donation was made by others.

Contributions can be made by individuals (including non-Lions), clubs or districts. Donations may be in one sum, or in installments of a minimum of US\$100 over a five-year period. Melvin Jones Fellows receive an attractive lapel pin, a plaque and a congratulatory letter.

It is possible to make a donation and choose the MJF recipient later. Write "Melvin Jones Fellow to be named later" on the check or bank draft. When an individual's or group's personal donation(s) are accumulated for a club's or district's use to select a Melvin Jones Fellowship recipient, LCIF needs the signed consent. Please include such documentation with the completed MJF application that is sent to LCIF Donor Services.

### **Dear Georgia Lions!**

Again, it is my pleasure to announce that the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation is doing well. Our service through vision clinics and eyeglasses, surgeries, and hearing aids to indigent Georgians has grown and those services are being delivered in less time and for less cost. #### Services and costs

From July 1, 2013-September 30, 2013, the Lighthouse has provided vision services (eye examinations and eyewear) to 1,440 people at a cost of \$17,728.36. Our numbers show that the Lighthouse has increased its vision services of 14.97%, with a significant decrease in costs! This increase in services is consistent with the Lighthouse's past six year history as, during the same three month period, the Lighthouse provided vision services to 347 people in 2008-09, 739 people in 2009-10, 723 people in 2010-11, 1,110 people in 201-12, 1,179 in 2012-13. The Chamblee clinic alone seeing about 500 people per month for vision screening, and the optical lab is producing about 500 pairs of eyeglasses per month. We have provided 128 surgeries at the actual cost of \$122,497.33, as a result of medical discounts of \$559,395.19. The Lighthouse has thus also increased its surgery services!

From July 1, 2013-September 30, 2013, the hearing aid program has served 374 people with hearing aids, for a cost of \$224,160.00 for hearing aids, ear molds, and providers, and administrative fees of \$15,312.00, a total of \$239,472.00. The hearing program is, therefore, also reflecting an increase in services of 17.32%! During this three-month period, the hearing aid program was funded by the Georgia Public Service Commission (\$148,500.00) and client-co-pays (\$73,795.00). This funding may also be increased later this year with grants from DeKalb and Fulton Counties and salvage aids.

#### Finances

The 2013-14 budget set income and expenses at \$2,130,000.00. This budget was set \$100,000 less than in 2012-13, based on a reduction in grants as funding and a reduction in evewear costs as expenses. Of this, the income was to be generated from public support (such as from Lions Clubs, grants, and other collections) for 61% of the total budget and from revenue generated from the Lighthouse (such as client co-pays, salvage, rental income, the optical shop, special events, and the set-aside maintenance fund) for 39% of the total budget. As of September 30, 2013, the Lighthouse had collected \$364,289.00 from public support and \$150,809.00 from revenue for a total of \$515,098.00. Although income from private gifts, rent, and recycling has declined slightly, income has increased from Lions Clubs (from \$22,762 in 2012-13 to \$28,986 in 2013-14), foundation gifts and grants, revenue from our optical shop and hearing program, and special events. On September 28, 2013, the Lighthouse's fall fundraiser, Taste of Chamblee, provided net proceeds of \$25,000. The increase in Lions' funding is a credit to each of you, as each district shows an increase in donations, including those to White Cane' The budget this year was set with the goal of increasing Lions' donations from 10.44% to 11.9% of the total Lighthouse budget, and that goal is being met. Thanks to each of you and your districts for your support!

Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind Treasurer's Comments:

The Camp ended the first six months with a very strong contributions during December; thank you, the Lions of Georgia. Last fall the Finance Committee and Executive Committee approved a revised, reduced budget that was the same as the actual contributions for the previous year, \$266,000. The Camp personnel have "tightened their belts" and so far the Camp has a positive cash flow of \$11,000. In addition \$15,000 has been returned to the Investment Fund and we hope to return some more in the next month. However, we cannot just sit back operate on what we have. We have to be building our funds for the heavy expenditures that will be coming with the summer camping season. The average receipts needed each month is just over \$22,000; so far we have averaged \$21,000. We need the support of all the clubs throughout the year.

I would like to thank all the Clubs that have supported the Camp so far this year and hope that they will continue to support the Camp in the same way for the last half of the year. Below is a list of the number of clubs and total amounts by district that have been given through December:

### Adults need vaccines, too

### The shots are just as important for grownups as they are for kids

Many people assume that vaccines become less important as they age. That's wrong. In fact, adults need some shots—such as those against shingles and pneumonia—that children don't. And grownups need booster shots against some common diseases, such as the vaccine for diptheria, tetanus, and pertusis (whooping cough). All the vaccines listed below can cause mild side effects, including redness, soreness, or rashes around the injection site. Occasionally, more serious side effects might occur, especially in those who experience an allergic reaction. But the recommended vaccinations have very good safety records, and all offer benefits that far outweigh any risks. For more detailed advice and periodic updates, see the Centers for Disease Control's vaccine information.

### How to prevent the pain of shingles

# This adult form of chicken pox affects more than 1 million people age 60 and up each year

Childhood chicken pox has a way of making a comeback—in almost one out of three adults who have had it—in the form of shingles, a painful rash and illness. The varicella zoster virus that causes the disease does not disappear after recovery from chicken pox but lies dormant in the nerve roots of the spine. Medical science does not know what causes the virus to be reactivated, but doctors are seeing more patients with this condition.



Shingles, also called herpes zoster, should not be confused with the sexually transmitted herpes simplex virus that causes genital herpes or the very common herpes labialis blisters that recur around the lips and mouth. Shingles may begin with tingling and itching and surface as a painful rash of small blisters or vesicles on one side of the face, body, or legs. The most common and dreaded complication is persistent and recurrent pain in the nerve and muscles of the affected area, a condition known as post-herpetic neuralgia, which can occur for weeks to months after the rash dries up and disappears. The symptoms can be quite debilitating, especially in the elderly, and require chronic pain management.

The majority of the more than 1 million annual cases of shingles occur in people age 60 and up, but it can also appear at any age, especially in people with immune-deficient conditions, HIV, and certain cancers (such as leukemia and lymphoma), and among steroid users and organ transplant recipients.

Fortunately there are both preventative and treatment options for shingles. A single-dose vaccine, Zostavax, was approved by the Food and Drug Administration for people over age 60 in 2006. In March 2011 the FDA also approved the vaccine for people over 50. Vaccination prevents shingles in the majority of recipients and greatly reduces the risk of post-herpetic neuralgia in others. Pregnant woman, people with immune-deficient conditions and certain cancers, and those allergic to neomycin, gelatin, or other vaccine components should not get the vaccine.

People who get shingles are treated first with a prescription anti-viral oral medication, which, especially at the onset of the rash, can help speed healing and reduce complications. For patients suffering with post-herpetic neuralgia, there are several effective medications and pain-management strategies that can assist in recovery.

It's important to recognize the signs and symptoms of the uncomfortable rash and see your doctor immediately so that early treatment can improve your outcome. <u>If you are over 60, consider the vaccine option</u>, and find out from your doctor whether you are eligible to receive it.



### WHEN YOU MEET A LEADER DOG

**A Leader Dog is a Working Dog:** Leader Dogs are friendly animals that like attention. However, it is important that most of this attention comes from their human partners.

### When you encounter a Leader Dog -

Do not pet a dog in harness

Ask the owner's permission before touching the dog or making eye contact. Eye contact can distract the dog, so always interact with the person – not the animal.

**A Person Using a Leader Dog is Independent -** Often, if a visually impaired person needs assistance, they will ask for it. If it appears the person needs help, ASK FIRST, then:

Approach the person on their right side as the Leader Dog is usually on the left.

Never startle them be grabbing there are Do not take hold of the Leader Dog or its harness

**Assisting With Verbal Directions -** When delivering directions to a person who is blind or visually impaired:

Speak to the person – not the dog.

Do not use hand signals such as pointing or broad statements like "it's over there."

Use detailed easy-to-follow indicators like "Go north two blocks then east" or Turn left and go two blocks."

**Never Offer Food to a Leader Dog** – Leader Dog owners follow a veterinarian-prescribed diet for their animals. Treats should only be given to a Leader Dog by their human partner.

**Acting as a Human (Sighted) Guide** – At times it is safer or easier to serve as a human guide instead of giving verbal directions. To act as a human guide:

Initiate contact by offering your elbow by brushing it against the person's arm.

The person will hold your arm above the elbow and drop the harness, signaling to the dog that it is temporarily "offduty"

### An alternate method is that the Leader Dog user will instruct their dog to "Follow" you –

Walk ahead of the person at normal speed, inform them when they are approaching turns, doorways, stairs and drop-offs.

At street crossings, walk with them across the street and onto the opposite curb. The Leader Dog will resume its duties once on the sidewalk.



### **Service Dog Garrison Saves the Day**



Bill sustained his life-changing injuries while serving our country in the US Coast Guard.

"After seeing my doctor through the VA for so many years, I think he knew the extent to which an assistance dog would be able to help me," Bill explains.

Now Bill is a successful businessman and an active community member. He served on school boards, planning commissions and as treasurer for The Paralyzed Veteran Association.

Garrison greets Bill every morning wagging his tail, holding his food bowl in his mouth and is by Bill's side every minute of the day.

"Being in a chair, people think your ability to think and speak is different. Garrison changes that, he acts as an ice breaker and people treat me normally," Bill continues.

"People always ask me about Garrison, and I tell them how he helps me. But really I want them to know about what an amazing organization Canine Companions is. I've worked a great deal in volunteer leadership and fundraising, and I've never seen a more giving organization in my life."

### Canine Companions Service Dog Caspin helps Wallis live independently.



"He can retrieve my phone and other dropped items, pull my wheelchair and open doors for me," she continues.

Wallis has a condition known as dystonia, a disease that causes her muscles to spasm spontaneously. She was at the

pharmacy when a "dystonic attack" came on and she could not move. Caspin helped her pay the cashier, get the bag from the cashier and gracefully exit the store.

Wallis wanted to learn more about a career in the assistance dog world, and is currently participating in an internship at Canine Companions headquarters in Santa Rosa, CA.

### IDA's Knowledge and Practice Standards for Teachers of Reading



The National Assessment of Educational Progress consistently finds that approximately one third of all 4<sup>th</sup> graders read at the "below basic" level. Some of these students struggle due to dyslexia, another

another learning disability, a second language, or other environmental factors. While some of these students may be eligible for special education services, most are not.

A report published by the National Council on Learning Disabilities found that most students with learning disabilities attend public schools and spend 80 percent of their time in general education classes, an increase of 23 percent since 2009. These statistics support the need for general education teachers, not just the reading specialist or literacy coach, to be well-trained in language and reading science and appropriate differentiated instruction for all learners.

The IDA Knowledge and Practice Standards for Teachers of Reading fill a much-needed gap in the



Promoting literacy through research, education, and advocacy."

teaching profession by providing the most thorough, research-supported documentation of what every teacher ought to know and be able to demonstrate, whether they are teaching students with dyslexia, other struggling readers, or all students.

One of the goals in publishing the IDA Standards was to provide a framework for course content in university and other teacher training programs, and a blueprint for the development of effective instructional reading programs. The long-term goal of the IDA Standards initiative is to promote consistent and high-quality teacher preparation that will improve the educational outcomes for all students, especially those who struggle with written language. Students accepted into the program spend approximately four weeks bonding and training with their new guide dog under the watchful eye of our certified instructors at a student-to-trainer ratio of 3 to 1. A bond of love, trust and devotion forms between the blind master and the dog as they become a team.

We provide the guide dog, equipment, single-room lodging, all meals, outings, instruction and post-graduation support completely free of charge, thanks to the generosity of our important contributors.

The average working life of a guide dog is eight years, and the majority of our graduates obtain multiple guide dogs from Southeastern Guide Dogs.

The process of developing and serving a successful guide dog team takes an average of ten years (two years of training and eight years of post-graduation services) and approximately \$60,000.

Our World, Our Future

**Seeing an Equal Future** – by McClain Hermes – 7<sup>th</sup> grade of Frank N. Osborne Middle School (Dacula) District 18-I

Before October 23, 2009 my world was the same as every little girl: bright colors, lights, soccer and swimming. At eight, life was great. I dreamed of being an Olympic athlete, or maybe even President. But, I had never had the best vision and year after year my vision was getting worse. For no known reason, my retinas detached one after another just weeks apart in 2009. I went through a few surgeries and was left with no vision in my right eye and limited sight in my left. The world through my eyes suddenly changed. I was told no more soccer or anything involving contact. With limited sight and no depth perception, swimming was difficult.

By the time I was nine, my family and I were starting to get use to these drastic changes. I began to swim again, started using a cane, and have accommodations made at school. I was having to adjust to "seeing" everyday things differently. At a swim competition, I ran into the wall and came out of the pool sobbing. Right away my mom was ready to pull me out of the pool. My coach asked my mom to give her a week to come up with a solution. She did! We thought she was crazy when the next day she walked in holding a stick with a tennis ball on the end of it. Turns out, Paralympic swimmers use this device to tell them when they get to the wall to flip or stop. After building up the trust to have my mom and coach hit me on the head with a stick, I went to my very first Paralympic meet in October 2012, three years to the day after my first surgery! Suddenly the whole world of Paralympic swimming was opened up to me.

In the Paralympics, there are several different disabilities. There are athletes missing limbs, paralyzed, dwarfs and intellectually challenged. I realized that disabled people have to not only overcome their disability, but also the discrimination of those who don't understand us. My best friend's dwarf and everywhere she goes she gets stares and snickers. Daily, people stop and stare at my cane and ask why I have a stick. I know that they don't do it to be mean, they just don't know what to do and are curious or rude. It is not just in stores and restaurants, my Paralympic friends and I also have struggles at school.

Since 2011, my vision's decreased at a very fast rate. I may be completely blind someday, but I "see" many things to come. I hope that everyone from one to 100 will be understanding of anyone that is different. No more staring or pointing. In the future I see myself maybe not as an Olympic athlete but as a Paralympic athlete, and you never know, I may be the first blind President! So I hope that our future world will have equality no matter our size, shape or sight.

### **Masonic Home of Georgia**



### **Our Mission**

To provide an environment for youth to develop themselves physically, mentally and spiritually.

"If only one pure sweet girl be saved from degradation, If only one boy be rescued from a life of crime, If only one soul be saved for Humanity and God, If but one tear dried, one sorrow comforted, Will not even this be sufficient to reward us all for all toils and struggles."



It was Grand Master Max Meyerhardt who said these words as the cornerstone to the Masonic Home was laid on October 27, 1903. Along with other individuals, Max Meyerhardt played an important role in the Masonic Home of Georgia becoming a reality. Senator Augustus O. Bacon donated 100 acres for the Home's location on the East side of the Ocmulgee River. The site included a beautiful knoll, which enabled the future building to have a panoramic view of the property as well as the river.

On June 14, 1905; Superintendent A.S. Harris and the Home staff welcomed the first 14 guests to the Masonic Home. Initially the Home provided care for the elderly as well as children. However The Grand Lodge of Georgia made the decision in 1912 to admit thereafter only children. The elderly already at the Home continued to live there and the last adult "Aunt Molly" passed away in 1945.

The State of Georgia is made up of 12 Masonic districts, each having a trustee representing the district. The <u>Board of Trustees</u> serves as the governing body of the Masonic Home and is responsible for the overall operation of the Home. The main thrust of the Board over the years has been to operate a home and not an institution.

### The Heart of Georgia Masonry

Since June 14, 1905 the Masonic Home of Georgia has served over 2100 children in need from the State of Georgia. The Home is located on 650 acres in Macon, "the Heart of Georgia." The ideal location makes it easily accessible to all of Georgia. The Home is non-profit organization that is funded by the Masons of Georgia. Presently in Georgia there are 433 lodges with over 47,000 members.

The Home is a residential child care facility that provides basic care to children in need. Residential child care is defined as the appropriate placement of children whose care cannot be provided in their own home or for whom group care is a positive alternative.

Love, Security, Personal Growth and Achievement are the guiding principles at the Masonic Home of Georgia. Our Primary goal is to prepare children and families for reunification whenever possible. In other cases our aim is prepare children for independent living by providing a structured living environment where the children can learn responsibility for their actions and become resourceful so they can function in today's society.

### **Application Process**

- \* Children must be between the ages of 6 16. (A 5 year old may be accepted in a sibling group.)
  - \* The legal guardian will be the main contact person.
- \* Each child, before admission, will be sponsored by a Masonic Lodge which the Director of Social Services will obtain.
- \* Emotional and Academic needs must be serviceable in a basic setting, these needs are evaluated on an individual basis by the Director of Social Services.

Alumni of the Home are still an important part of the Home. Many of them feel that the Masonic Home of Georgia is their Home. Every year, the third Sunday in May marks Alumni Day at the Home. Our Alumni will come back to share stories, rekindle old friendships and reminisce about their time at the Home. During this day our Alumni Association meets and presents a gift to the Home. They will also decide a weekend in September to spend at our Camp in Shellman Bluff. If you are an Alumni, we invite you to come visit anytime, regardless of how long you lived here or how old you are now.

The following is a perspective written, in his own words, by Noah Hughes. As you can see, Noah has presided at the Home for over 6 years and is on his way to becoming the productive citizen that he refers to:

Noah Hughes Masonic Home of Georgia "The Masonic Home of Georgia is a place for any child with varying domestic problems to be. The purpose of the Home is to take in children ages 5 to 16 and provide them with the basic, essentials necessary like a roof over their heads, food in their stomachs, clothes on their bodies, etc. In addition to the basics, the employees supervising and maintaining the children's daily activities and needs make sure that the children also receive some of their wants like extra-curricular activities in school and minor desires like going to the movies or hanging out an amusement park.

The Masonic Home has been around over a hundred years, beginning in 1904 exactly. The Home has proven to be a safe haven for children who come from dissatisfactory family backgrounds. Children living at the Home have very different reasons why they were placed there by their guardians. Despite the differences however, all of the children share a very similar thing; all of them have problems and all of them needed a different setting in their lives to make something better of their situations. The Home was just the place for such a setting.

Many of the children at the Home are ordinary, normal kids like any other kid who can be called ordinary and normal. Numerous times in a year Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Georgia travel from their homes to the Masonic Home to take care of the Homes' affairs. Whether the affairs consist of maintenance work, embroidery, accounting, managing, etc., the Free Masons everywhere come to the Home with a noble purpose to make sure the Home stays intact and worthy of a child's residence.

I am one of the children living at the Masonic Home. You can't really consider me to be a child since I am 21 years old attending college in my third year. I have been living at the Home since I was 16 to be exact and I was placed here partly because I was unruly and also because I couldn't maintain a loving relationship with my mother. At the time some 5 years ago from this year 2013, it was absolutely necessary that I be placed elsewhere to calm down, come to better positive senses, and just find a way to succeed academically and mentally. Since I've been here at the Home I have steadily progressed in those endeavors and have become a more appropriate young man.

Indeed, sometimes, perhaps more than that it can be just plain ol' stressful and agitating to live at the Home primarily because I am not living with blood relatives and am surrounded by strangers who I don't know all too well. But those stresses are outweighed by the benefits of living there. For example, since I live at the Home I get to go to college payment-free. That's right, I get to go to virtually any college or university I want to attend for free as long as I keep my grades, behavior, and looks upright. Maybe the looks aren't really that significant, but it may help in some small way or another.

In addition, since I am a Masonic Home 'kid,' I can live there for free, eat for free, watch cable television for free, think for free, and do lots of other things...for...free. No the Home isn't a part of the Federal Government, but it is a good place that I would rather stay at as long as I can go to school, stay away from negative people, live without financial losses, and really just take advantage of what the place has to offer. I think I am being wise quite frankly by staying here and taking advantage unless anyone should tell me otherwise.

Another point I think I should clarify is that I am aware that the title of FreeMason is just that, a title. The other children and I are fully aware that the so-called 'FreeMasons' are ordinary people who have their own families, financial crossroads, issues, aka, their own lives. Because of this fact, many of the children feel humbled and so do I whenever anyone considers donating anything to the Home so that we could be benefitted. Just our thanks is all we have possible to express our gratitude towards the Free Masons purpose and their intentions in helping people get on their feet and survive in this life.

Thanks to the FreeMasons, the possibility of a good education, a better setting, more opportunities and perhaps a better attitude towards life is made realistic. Hundreds of young people have walked through the doors of the Home buildings for years, some staying a significant amount of time, some staying only a few days. In any case though, anyone who has passed through has benefitted from the Home's services. I hope to stay long enough to obtain a degree and enter the workforce and be a decent, productive citizen. Thank you to every FreeMason in the State of Georgia. God Bless."
