Council received reports or comments as follows:

## PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT – LION JAMES E. "JIM" ERVIN:

PIP Ervin stated that the International President will be the guest for the Georgia Lions State Convention. Past President Ervin stated that LCI is beginning to focus more on the Centennial Celebration. They have hired a firm to promote this. He encouraged Georgia Lions to make plans as to how they want to celebrate and recognize the work done through the Lighthouse, the Camp, and all the things done here in Georgia. He encouraged Council to begin looking at funding for this celebration.

PIP Ervin thanked PID Haynes Townsend and his committee for their work to bring in qualified candidates for consideration by the Lighthouse for a new Executive Director. PIP Ervin thanked PCC Mark Miller as area leader for the Southeast GLT. PIP Ervin recognized and thanked PCC Kembra Smith for an outstanding job at the Lighthouse.

#### PAST INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR – LION HAYNES TOWNSEND:

PID Townsend stated that PIP Ervin remains as one of the most visible Lions at the International level, and thanked him for his service.

PID Townsend discussed his committee's work to locate a new Executive Director for the Lighthouse. Some 50 to 60 applications were received. The committee narrowed that number down to seven that were interviewed at the Lighthouse several weeks ago. Two candidates were chosen from the seven and a decision will be made in the next week or so by the Executive Board of the Lighthouse. He thanked the other members of his committee for their work on this: Grace Clower, Mark Miller, Jim Adams, Cheryl Reid and Jon Winters.

PID Townsend stated that he and Donna will be able to attend three of the four District Conventions. They will be in Tennessee the weekend of 18-O's convention.

## PAST INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR – LION MYERS BANISTER:

PID Banister thanked the Council for the work they have been doing and to keep up their hard work.

#### PAST INTERNTIONAL DIRECTOR – DR. JOHN PEARCE:

PID Pearce brought everyone up to date on Ina Mae, who had radical surgery on her shoulder last August. The Dr. says it may take up to a year to get over the injury, and Ina Mae is at six months now. She is present this weekend and will be at the Lighthouse Luncheon. He thanked everyone for keeping her in their prayers.

## PAST INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR – DR. BEVERLY A. ROBERTS:

PIP Ervin stated that he had a long conversation with PID Dr. Beverly Roberts yesterday. Dr. Roberts has changed her address. Her mother is 102 years old and resides in a special home. Dr. Roberts and her sister, Gail, spend a lot of their time taking care of their mother. Dr. Roberts states that she is looking forward to being able to become active in Lions once again and thanks all of the Lions for their thoughts and prayers.

#### **REPORT OF STATE CONVENTION and INTERNATIONAL** CONVENTION CHAIR – LION Ed Hashbarger, DG 18I:

DG Hashbarger discussed the Macon Convention. He stated that PDG Dave Forrest will get with PCC Kembra Smith to make sure he knows what training is to take place. PDG Forrest also needs to know if there are any other seminars or training that the Council wants to have. Lion Hashbarger pointed out that there will only be one Hospitality Room shared by all four Districts. He stated that the Macon clubs are trying to set up some type of shuttle so that Lions can visit the Mason's Children's home.

#### INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

DG Hashbarger stated that Tennessee will host the Southeastern Breakfast this year. He has not heard from them yet with any of those arrangements. He stated that he is trying to negotiate with the Hotel for the Georgia Jamboree on July 6th from 7:00 to 10:00 PM. He stated that he is working to see if Lions can take peanuts for giving away at the Jamboree. There are only 13 or 14 persons registered to attend the convention.

#### A. 2020 Atlanta International Convention Bid:

PDG Jane Price gave a report for PCC Richard Brown on the 2020 Atlanta International Convention. The convention bid is in process of submitting the bid by the November deadline. PDG Price stated that PCC Brown would like to increase the awareness of the Lions of Georgia about the convention. He asks if he can attend each District Convention. He is not asking for time on the agenda unless the Governor wants him to. He simply wants to make the Lions of Georgia aware that we are bidding on the International Convention. Lion Brown will be submitting an article for the State Magazine, and there will be a booth at the State Convention. PD G Price asked each Governor to coordinate PCC Brown's attendance at their District Convention. CC Winters asked each Governor to extend an invitation to PCC Brown to attend their convention. **REPORT OF MD 18 CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS CHAIR – LION KEMBRA SMITH, PCC:** On Saturday, December 7, 2013, the Council met with the Committee Chair to review the revisions that the Council wanted. Although those changes were subsequently made in a proposed draft for the committee, which the Chair believed had been sent. The Chair subsequently experienced computer problems and learned only recently that the draft was lost, and the dissemination to the committee was not made. The Chair will correct this matter as soon as possible, providing both the Council and the Committee with the proposed revisions, with the goal of having all corrections and suggestions finalized for the Council before the district conventions. Once the Council has accepted a proposed final version, the Committee will be working on the revision of the Policy Manual.

**REPORT OF MD 18 GEORGIA LIONS ALL STATE BAND CHAIR – LION LESLIE MILLER:** Lion Miller reported that applications for the Scholarship Program will be going out soon. Some electronic copies have already been sent out.

### **REPORT MD 18 Long Range Planning Chair, PCC**

**MILLER:** PCC Miller stated that the Long Range Planning Committee was tasked by the Council to advise and make up some recommendations concerning the long term aspects of the Georgia Lions Camp for the Blind. The result was a resolution from the Council to the Camp. PCC Miller reported that the first two of the requests made have been fulfilled. The first was who was going to serve as president. The second being a balanced budget. The camp has made some effort on fund raising. There is a golf tournament that a Zone in 18-L is sponsoring: this will be a new source of revenue for the Camp. The other items have not met with quite as strong a response from Camp leadership. Particularly the desire to focus on program development that will make the camp a more viable outreach for Lionism and showing what we are doing for both visually impaired as well as other people with special needs. That strategic planning still has not taken place. The offer from the Long Range Planning Committee t o facilitate that Long Range Planning has not been accepted. The Camp is in transition still. They will be holding elections this weekend and have new Secretary, President and this will be yet another transition happening for them over the next few months. PCC Miller stated that he feels the Council still needs to be actively engaged in encouraging the Camp to look strategically at where it is now and where it is going. Just continuing to operate the way it has always operated is not going to produce a positive result. There are some significant opportunities and challenges which if addressed could preserve the Camp.

DG Hashbarger, 18-I, made a motion that Council establish a Task Force chaired by PID Haynes Townsend, along with three Second Vice District Governors from I, O, and N; and the First Vice District Governor from 18-L. Motion seconded by DG Mark Rice, 18-L, and motion carried.

#### **REPORT OF MD 18 LEO CHAIR – LION STEVE HELWIG:**

Lion Helwig reminded those present that the LEO Gathering at the Camp is scheduled for March 21-23. He stated that he has been asked by LCI to serve on the LEO Advisory committee. LCI is rolling out some training programs for LEOS, and they want him to test them on the LEOS at their gathering. PIP Ervin commended Lion Helwig for the fine job he has done. CC Winters pointed out that at the work session last evening Council discussed Lion Helwig's request for \$250.00 to support administrative expenses for the MD 18 LEO program. DG Walker, 18 -O, made a motion that Council provide \$250.00 for the MD 18 LEO Administrative expenses. DG Hashbarger, 18 -I, seconded the motion, and motion carried.

#### **REPORT OF MD 18 STATE MAGAZINE EDITOR AND** LCIF CHAIR – LION ED HASHBARGER, DGE, 18-I: DG

DG Hashbarger stated that he had asked each Governor and Vice Governor to seek individuals in their district who have 60 years or more of Lionistic service. Lion Hashbarger would like to have a paragraph or two with their thoughts into the next magazine. DG Hashbarger pointed out that funds to LCIF remain about the same as last year. There will be a listing going out to all clubs that have monies sitting on account. Make sure when a check from an individual goes into LCIF that the club is indicated on the check and put their member ID number on that check also. When a club submits a check, the club ID number should be on the check.

#### **REPORT OF MD 18 REPRESENTATIVE TO LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND – LION PAM SCHLOEMER:**

Lion Schloemer distributed flyers for this year's Lions Night with the Braves which will be at 7:00 PM on Saturday, August 16th. She pointed out that last year's game gained our organization 7 new members and four recipients of Leader Dogs. She stated that every LEO Club should be in attendance, and clubs should sponsor as many youth as possible to attend. Children should be over age 5 and groups of children are not limited to ball teams. Youth can be from a Church group or other organization. Lion Schloemer stated that since the game is at night this year, she has made arrangements with the Intercontinental Hotel for Lions to stay with them at the rate of \$119.00 per night. She asked Governors to help publicize the event and encourage clubs to sponsor a youth program.

### REPORT OF STATE LION TAMER AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY CHAIR – LION RICK MIZELL, PDG:

Lion Tamer Mizell stated that although he does not have a room for the store this weekend, he does have items for sale. He stated that he does have eyeglass collection boxes at \$8.35 a box. Lion Mizell stated that he has taken over the 18-O functionality on the state website and if you go to galions.org/18O you will find a listing of clubs. He is trying to keep club information up to date on the website.

### **REPORT OF STATE HISTORIAN – LION CHIP NEDZA:**

The Lions of Georgia Museum project is pleased to announce that we have a building to house our collection of Lions related memorabilia. The Georgia Lions Lighthouse has offered us the third floor of their building in Chamblee to display our memorabilia. Each of the 500+ items have been photographed and cataloged. A power point copy of the items has been given to all current District Governors. We welcome any additional pieces to the Museum; contact me and I'll make arrangements for pick up if necessary. In February 2014, I will be setting up the memorabilia for display at the Lighthouse, am hoping to have a grand opening in May, 2014. I thank all the Lions for their generous contributions to the Museum and am grateful to be part of this significant project.

State Historian Nedza reported that he has received Lions memorabilia from President Jimmy Carter. All items will be displayed in the Museum. Opening of the Museum is scheduled for May, and if President Carter is available, it is hoped he can attend, along with PIP Jim Ervin. Lion Nedza pointed out that Jimmy Carter is the only President who was a Lion. Eisenhower and Nixon were both Honorary Lions. He also pointed out that President Carter is the only President who ever lived in subsidized housing.

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

### Georgia Lions Children's Eye Care Center

Because good vision in childhood is essential to the proper development of vision into adulthood, we created a dedicated center for pediatric patients, the Georgia Lions Children's Eye Care Center. This center cares for children through all phases of diagnosis and treatment. The goal of the physicians at the center is to diagnose and treat childhood eye diseases early before the affected individuals actually lose vision. Contributions from the Georgia Lions have helped fund several important aspects of care provided by the center, including the following initiatives.

**Genetic Research** = The center provides genetic evaluation, counseling, and genetic research for families with inherited eye diseases such as congenital glaucoma, cataracts, and retinoblastoma.

**Program to ensure careful follow-up for children with family or financial issues** = Emory helps arrange care for children with blinding eye diseases who have family and financial issues that prevent them from receiving adequate care. For example, children with retinopathy of prematurity, the most common blinding disease in premature infants, often need regular treatments by an ophthalmologist to protect their vision. Issues such as poverty, inadequate insurance, or lack of transportation, some of the same issues that contribute to prematurity, make it difficult for these children to receive adequate eye care. Since there is a small window of time during which these children can be treated successfully to prevent blindness, a coordinator at Emory monitors and assists their parents with transportation and other matters to get them to their follow-up appointments. Since this program was initiated and funded, in part, by the Lions of Georgia, the center has not had a single child lose vision because of neglected follow-up.

**Specialized treatment for pediatric glaucoma patients** = Since it can be tough to get kids to sit still, especially during sensitive medical procedures, specialists at Emory have developed a better way to treat pediatric glaucoma. Glaucoma causes the eye to build up fluid and pressure that can destroy the optic nerve—and vision. With adults, surgeons can open a drainage hole in the wall of the eye and control rapid draining by cutting the sutures one at a time over a period of several weeks with an in-office laser. Because children can't remain motionless during the removal procedures, Emory glaucoma specialists have developed better tools and modified the standard techniques to treat glaucoma. Their procedure is better than conventional methods because it requires only one surgery instead of three and significantly reduces the likelihood of later development of scar tissue and nearsightedness.

**Technology on the cutting edge** = Emory's pediatric ophthalmologists and other specialists utilize advanced treatments for disorders that affect primarily infants and young children. The accomplishments of these experts range from developing new and highly successful surgical treatments for pediatric glaucoma to performing laser treatments for retinopathy of prematurity, a blinding disease of the retina that affects premature babies. Pioneering laboratory research has resulted in the discovery of a gene defect that causes a certain kind of childhood blindness. A new camera at Emory has helped retina specialists better diagnose and treat retinoblastoma, a vision-threatening, life-threatening cancer that strikes infants and young children.

**Infant Aphakia Treatment Study (IATS)** = From birth to age two, the eyes grow very rapidly, and visual acuity stabilizes and sharpens as the child matures—a process that is critical to good vision later in childhood and adulthood. This process is disrupted in children whose vision is blocked by congenital cataract. The <u>Infant Aphakia Treatment Study (IATS)</u>, an important clinical study led by Emory researchers, was designed to determine which treatment works better in infants (four weeks to seven months) who have had a cataract surgically removed: the use of a contact lens or the surgical placement of a plastic lens in the baby's eye. **Clinical Care** - The Emory Eye Center's Pediatric Ophthalmology service provides comprehensive, compassionate care of children's vision ranging from general eye exams to treatment of the most complex childhood eye diseases and disorders. As part of the <u>healthcare network of Emory Healthcare</u>, <u>Winship Cancer Institute</u> and <u>Children's Healthcare</u> in Atlanta, Georgia, Emory Eye Center's pediatric ophthalmologists can offer the best possible integrated, holistic clinical care and treatment options.

**Research** - Emory Eye Center physicians are involved in ongoing clinical trials and studies for the treatment of eye disorders and diseases. Being part of a major medical center allows access to collaborative studies not otherwise possible. We will look a few eye conditions in the next few issues – first will be on:

### **Retinoblastoma (RB)**

**What is retinoblastoma?** - Retinoblastoma (RB) is a rare type of eye cancer that mainly affects young children and occurs in one in 20,000 live births. It is a malignant tumor of the retina, the back of the eye. Retinoblastoma can be hereditary or non-hereditary. When inherited, it can affect both eyes and sometimes other organs of the body, whereas the non-hereditary type will usually only affect one eye.

**Diagnosing retinoblastoma -** Emory Eye Center employs the most advanced technology available for detecting blinding retinal diseases in children. Our RetCam 120 camera provides a high-resolution, 120-degree view of the retina. Standard cameras, which provide 30- to 60-degree views, miss the periphery of the retina. This technology is particularly useful for

retinoblastoma, which can involve a large portion of the retina. Early detection and medical or surgical intervention can help these children keep their sight, and in the case of retinoblastoma, save their lives.

**Overview** - Emory Eye Center's ocular oncology (eye cancer) physicians provide comprehensive care for adult and pediatric patients with eye malignancies. Our caring physicians and affiliated professionals are committed to delivering the highest level of treatment and compassionate care while engaging in rigorous research for cures for certain types of eye cancers. As one of a few Ocular Oncology and Pathology specialties in the country, our services include diagnosis and clinical care, as well as surgery and radiation treatments, if necessary. We are a recognized center of excellence for rare and complex cancers.

**Clinical Care** - We offer compassionate, expert care for retinoblastoma by providing the combined expertise of the specialists in our <u>Ocular Oncology and Pathology</u> service, which includes a pediatric retina surgeon, pediatric oncologist, radiation oncologist, genetics counselor and a host of consultants. Although eye cancers are considered rare, they do happen. Our specialists evaluate and treat patients with eye, eyelid, and orbital tumors, including ocular melanoma, retinoblastoma, lymphoma, periocular (skin tumors around the eye) and other tumors of the eye and surrounding tissue. As part of the <u>Emory Healthcare</u> network in Atlanta, Ga., we are uniquely situated to provide the best possible integrated, holistic clinical care and treatment options for patients.

Members of our interdisciplinary ocular oncology and pathology team are retina, cornea and clinical eye pathology specialists who work in collaboration with radiation and medical oncologists, physicists, and other oncology specialists at Emory Healthcare, <u>Winship Cancer Institute</u> and the Cancer Center at <u>Children's Healthcare of Atlanta</u>.

This collaborative care gives patients the advantage of seamless coordination of medical, radiation, surgical, and laser treatments within the Emory Healthcare network, including dermatology, neurosurgery, and head and neck surgery. Retina specialists Chris Bergstrom, MD, OD, and G. Baker Hubbard, III, MD, treat all diseases of the retina and bring particular expertise to ocular tumors. Additionally, G. Baker Hubbard, MD, is a nationally recognized specialist in ocular tumors (retinoblastoma) of children.

**Ocular Pathology** | **Diagnosis -** Critical in the treatment of eye cancer is the integration of oncology with pathology services. Emory Eye Center provides on-site, world-class eye pathology services in the <u>L. F. Montgomery Laboratory</u>. This laboratory evaluates one of the highest volumes of ocular pathology specimens in the world. Under the direction of Emory Eye Center's internationally recognized ocular oncologist/pathologist, Hans E. Grossniklaus, MD, MBA, Montgomery Laboratory provides the expert analysis necessary for ocular oncology diagnosis and treatment.

Dr. Grossniklaus is board certified in both ophthalmology and anatomic pathology. He specializes in diagnostic ophthalmic pathology, ocular oncology and ophthalmic pathology research, including drug delivery. He regularly sees patients with ocular malignancies and other ophthalmic conditions.

Tumors are evaluated to determine the best possible treatment for each patient. Diagnostic options may include a thorough eye examination, ultrasound (echography), photography (fluorescein angiography and/or fundus photography, ocular coherent tomography (OCT), and/or the use of computerized tomography (CT) scan or MRI.

**Treatment options -** Depending on the type of cancer and location, options may include chemotherapy (topical for anterior surface tumors, injectable about the eye, or systemic administration), cryotherapy (use of low temperatures), external beam radiation, radiation plaque therapy (also called brachytherapy) and surgical excision of the tumor. Oculoplastics physicians or tumor surgeons offer reconstructive surgery and prosthetic devices, tailored to each individual patient's case.

### LCIF's Response to a Major Catastrophe

Over the past 10 years, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has provided more than US\$100 million for disasterrelief programs worldwide. When a major catastrophe happens, like the recent typhoon in the Philippines, Lions around the world are quick to support fellow Lions and their communities.

When you give a donation to LCIF's Disaster Relief fund, your contribution may be used for many different types of needs. Not every disaster is the same but typically there are three different phases of a major catastrophe.

### **Immediate Needs**

Donations from Lions and friends around the world provide immediate basic needs such as water, food, clothing, and medicine to the affected area. Lions Clubs in the local area begin applying for Emergency Grant assistance to fund immediate needs projects such as food distribution at a community center. Many times Lions will work alongside religious institutions and fire stations to deliver these basic needs.

### **Mid-Term Needs**

Once recovery planning begins, a local committee of Lions is established to begin the process of evaluating the mid-term needs and identifying appropriate relief projects to implement. Following SuperStorm Sandy that hit the East Coast of the United States in 2012, the Lions of New Jersey received funding from LCIF to make basic home repairs for low income individuals who did not have insurance and did not receive any Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) funds to make homes habitable again. Donations may go to fund a mid-term need project such as this when you give to support Disaster Relief.

### Long-Term Needs/Rebuilding

Once a clear plan for recovery has been put in place by the government, local communities, and other community organizations, Lions begin participating in the rebuilding process. Lions have been very instrumental in the rebuilding process in Haiti following the earthquake in 2010. LCIF provided US\$1.4 million to construct new homes for 600 Haitian families who were initially housed in Lions tent cities following the earthquake. Donations may fund rebuilding projects like this significant project in Haiti. Other examples of long-term needs are rebuilding of schools and construction of hospitals and health centers.

Financial support provided by Lions and friends around the world is disbursed to the affected area incrementally. Funds go directly to the Lions Relief Committee to support their disaster related projects. Financial reporting is required with each grant and must be submitted to LCIF following a project.

Support following disasters and major catastrophes around the world are funded through LCIF's Disaster Relief area of giving. This month, consider making a donation to Disaster Relief to help support Lions and LCIF respond to disasters throughout the world. Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation Providing vision and hearing services to Georgians in financial need

#### **Dear Georgia Lions!**

The Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation is doing well, but is—as has been consistent for the past year—continued to experience some issues with staff and budget. Our final numbers for calendar year 2013, however, show that the Georgia Lions Lighthouse delivered more services to indigent Georgians than ever!

Services and costs From July 1-December 31, 2013, the Lighthouse provided 2,672 patients with vision services (eye examinations and eyewear) at a cost of \$38,721. [From July 1, 2012-December 31, 2012, the Lighthouse provided 2,585 patients with vision services at a cost of \$47,395]. Our numbers, therefore, show that the Lighthouse has increased its vision services with a significant decrease in costs. This increase in services is even more exciting when viewed in the past six year history.

The Lighthouse provided 299 surgeries at the actual cost of \$288,104.64, as a result of medical discounts of \$1,210,349.09. From July 1-December 31, 2012, the Lighthouse provided 236 surgeries at an actual cost of \$225,844.96. The Lighthouse has thus also increased its surgery services!

The hearing aid program served 648 with hearing aids, for a cost of \$388,238.79 for hearing aids, ear molds, and providers, and administrative fees of \$26,339.00, a total of \$414,577.79. From July 1, 2012-September 30, 2012, the Lighthouse provided 276 people with hearing aids. The hearing aid program was funded by the Georgia Public Service Commission (\$297,000.00) and clientco- pays (\$128,679.00). This funding may also be increased later this year with grants from DeKalb and Fulton Counties and salvage aids.

The service numbers, when viewed for the calendar year, are even more exciting. While in 2007, the Lighthouse served 2,313 patients at 8 clinics, in 2013, the Lighthouse served over 7,042 patients at 26 clinics!

The Advisory Committee has submitted their proposed revision of the Lighthouse's Constitution and Bylaws to the Governance Committee for its review and recommendations to the Board of Directors. The Governance Committee and staff are also revising the Personnel and Policy Manuals within the next year. The Search Committee accepted applications for the ED through November, and interviewed seven candidates in January. Their report to the Board of Directors will be provided to the Board of Directors at its meeting on February 1, 2014. In the meantime, the finalists visited with the staff and the staff's recommendations will be provided to the Board of Directors, when they interview the ED finalists in early February. The Board of Directors hopes to have the ED position filled by early March 2014. Although the Lighthouse has operated with unfilled positions for the past few months, two of those positions are now filled (or will be filled shortly). Lion Kembra K. Landry was named as the Development Director in December. In this position, she is now in charge of the Night of Spectacles' event. Further, Americorps member Pen Finch has accepted the position of volunteer coordinator, and will be assisting in the optical laboratory. The Lighthouse also soon hopes to have two VISTA positions filled.

Besides all of his other work on behalf of the Lighthouse, ED Jim has coordinated the efforts of the clinic staff in the development of a new clinic procedures manual, which will provide a unified procedure for the staff and volunteers at the 26 clinics in Georgia. The Board of Directors has encouraged each program at the Lighthouse (surgery, hearing, recycling) to create similar manuals for the use by the staff and volunteers.

As always, it is my pleasure to serve as the Chair of your Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation. Please support our work in your communities and our Night of Spectacles fundraising event on Saturday, May 10, 2014 in Atlanta. I hope to see you there!

#### **Biographical Sketch of Jim L. Gillis, Jr.**



James Lester Gillis, Jr., known as Jim L. by most people, was born October 2, 1916. He is the eldest of two sons of Jim L. Gillis, Sr., and Annie Lois Walker Gillis. He has lived in Treutlen County all his life. He attended high school in Soperton where he was Valedictorian and he graduated from the University of Georgia in 1937 with a BS degree in Forestry. He has been a member of First Baptist Church of Soperton since 1927 and is a member of the Men's Bible Class.

A banker, timber man, cattleman, and farmer, he has been very active in conservation work most of his life. He manages approximately 15,000 acres of timberland, and foresters from all over the Southeast respect his timber management program. He is President of Soperton Naval Stores, Inc., a family corporation, and has managed the Naval Stores and timberland operations since 1938. He has served as past Director and is President of the American Turpentine Farmers Association. He served as President of Georgia Forestry Association and also served as a member on the Board of Directors. The Georgia Forestry Association awarded him the 2007 WISE OWL AWARD. He was appointed to the Georgia Forestry Commission on February 14, 1977, and has been reappointed by each Governor since. On January 24, 2005, he was reappointed by Governor Sonny Perdue. Until 2007, he had served continuously as Chairman of the Georgia Forestry Commission since January 1981. Today he continues to serve as a Georgia Forestry Commission Board Member. He is an Honorary Member of the Society of American Foresters and has been awarded their Golden Membership Award. In 2002, he was inducted into the Georgia Forestry Hall of Fame. The University of Georgia Warnell School of Forestry and Natural Resources Alumni Association awarded Jim L. the Distinguished Alumnus Award on Friday, October 17, 2008 in recognition of exceptional service to the Warnell School of Forestry and Natural Resources.

In business affairs, Jim L. was elected Director of the Bank of Soperton, on January 4<sup>th</sup>, 1940, following the death of M. B. Gillis, August 26<sup>th</sup>, 1939. He became Vice President of the Bank of Soperton, on January 8<sup>th</sup>, 1952. On June 10<sup>th</sup>, 1960, he was elected President of the Bank of Soperton and served in that position until 1981. He has served as Chairman on the Board of Directors of the Bank of Soperton since October 29, 1974. He has been past President of the Georgia Bankers Association and served as Chairman of the Agriculture Committee for two years.

Jim L. was elected District Supervisor in the Ohoopee River Soil Conservation District in 1939. On May 4, 2010, he was given a 70 year plaque for extraordinary contributions and achievement in serving 70 years as a Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisor from 1939-2009. He is the only person in our nation that has achieved that award and he is still presently serving today. He was elected 2<sup>nd</sup> President of the Georgia Association of Soil Conservation Districts in 1945. He served as Chairman of the State Soil Conservation Committee for almost 24 years. In 1960, he was chosen "Outstanding Conservationist of Georgia" at the annual Governor's Awards Banquet, sponsored by Sears Roebuck Co. and Georgia Sportsman Federation. On August 16, 1967 he was recognized as an Honorary Member of the Soil Conservation Society of America. In January 2001, he was inducted into the GACDS Hall of Fame.

In 1969, Jim L. was elected president of the Georgia Association of County Commissioners. He also served on the Board of Managers for a number of years. In March 1961, Jim L. was named as the Georgian to receive the coveted "Citizen of the Year Award" which is presented annually by the Georgia Association of County Commissioners. He was elected county commissioner of Treutlen County in 1961 and served for 40 years. He served as Chairman of the Treutlen County Commissioners from 1973 to 2001.

In civic affairs, Jim L. has been a member of the Lions Club for over 75 years – serving as past president and Zone Chairman. He was active in Boy Scouts work and served for two years as finance chairman for the Pine Forest District of Boy Scouts and was on the National Council of Boy Scouts. He is a member of the President's Club of the University of Georgia.

With all his other activities, Jim L. has had neither the time nor the inclination to pursue a political career. However, he has served one term in the State Senate from 1945-46. In 1959, Governor Ernest Vandiver appointed Mr. Gillis to the State Democratic Executive Committee. He served as Co-Manager for the Lyndon B. Johnson campaign for President for the State of Georgia. He has also served as Chairman of the Treutlen County Democratic Executive Committee. Jim L. has served on the City Council of Soperton and was elected Mayor of Soperton without opposition for five years.

Jim L. was married to the late Katherine Hudmon of Screven County on March 20, 1936. Mrs. Katherine Gillis died on March 7, 1997. On January 14, 2001, Jim L. married Augusta Smith Woodcock of Haddock, Georgia. Mrs. Augusta Woodcock Gillis died on September 3, 2006.



### Lion Jim L. Gillis Jr.

Mr. Gillis joined the Soperton Lions Club June 1, 1938, sponsored by his father Jim L. Gillis Sr. During his tenure he served as Club President and two terms as District Zone Chairman. He has received numerous Club awards and citations.

Presently Lion Jim has over 75 years of serve as a Lion, with 70 years of perfect attendance.

Lions International has 1.4 million Lion members in the world. In 2013-14 only 4 in the world have received the prestigious 75 year serve Chevron from Lions International. Lion Jim is one of them. He is the Oldest Lion in Georgia with 75+ years of service. There are presently 236 Clubs in Georgia with 6000 members.

#### **Fun Facts**

1936: Worked summer for \$.40 an hour at UGA nursery, carrying water for trees. As a Georgia State football player I manned the pump, which required a strong arm. That year I caught a ride to work with anyone who had a car.

1937: After College (Forestry School), worked for Georgia Forestry Commission in Baxley, salary; \$125 per month.

This time I had to provide my own ride so I used an old car to get to work.

1938: I took over operations of Soperton Naval Stores, my father's business.

#### Q&A

#### What is your favorite part about being involved with the Lion's Club?

Helping people. There was a time we were out with buckets collecting donations and some guy came up and said, "When I was a kid the Lion's Club gave me my first pair of glasses, or I wouldn't have had glasses. I'd needed glasses for a long time." He was probably 85 or so. And every once in a while a parent will come up and say, "The Lion's helped me with a cochlear implant." It's a good feeling knowing that you're part of that.



#### Why is the Lion's Club important?

Most people would say "Oh, the Lions do vision." Lions do a lot more than that. We're known for vision and we do a great job is saving vision and helping people with vision and hearing. We also help with disaster relief. We do a lot of work for the elderly. We build ramps to help people get into their homes if they have a disability. Our motto is "We serve," but just as good of a motto would be "We save lives."

#### Learning Ally Teams with Wounded Warrior Project to Empower Veterans with Print Disabilities

Audiobooks and supporting services will enable soldiers with visual impairments or traumatic brain injuries to continue their education and succeed in transitioning to civilian life.



"The extent of injuries these veterans endured makes reading textbooks challenging or outright impossible. With this kind of technology, we're opening up a world of opportunities for their future success."

<u>Learning Ally</u>, a nonprofit organization serving individuals across the U.S. with visual and learning disabilities, is teaming up with Wounded Warrior Project to help this generation's injured service members achieve their educational and professional goals.

Through this collaboration, wounded veterans who are registered with WWP will now have access to Learning Ally's library of 80,000 human-narrated audiobooks, including thousands of texts for college and post-secondary learning. "This agreement empowers warriors who have a difficult time reading due to the extent of their injuries, and provides an alternative education method for those who excel through auditory learning," says Randy Plunkett, director of education initiatives at Wounded Warrior Project.

Background: More than 50,000 servicemen and women have been physically injured in recent military conflicts. In addition to the physical wounds, it is estimated as many as 400,000 service members live with the invisible wounds of war including combat-related stress, major depression, and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). Another 320,000 are believed to have experienced a traumatic brain injury while on deployment.

Nearly one third of registered WWP Alumni are pursing educational goals. While many are participating in WWP's economic programs – including Transition Training Academy and <u>Warriors to Work</u> – many more are attending universities across the country.

Learning Ally's services will be available to all warriors who have a difficult time reading printed text, and is also being integrated into WWP's <u>TRACK</u> program. Based in Jacksonville, FL and San Antonio, TX, TRACK is a one-year community college and internship program geared primarily toward service members with no prior exposure to higher education.

### **Communicating with Your Child**



There is a fine line between caring and nagging – between showing concern and hovering. How do you achieve the balance? The following are some ways for talking with your child about diabetes.

#### • Use words and tones that aren't angry or

**judgmental.** Certain words or ways of asking questions can send scary or hurtful vibes to your children. Think about the words you use. For example, use "high" instead of "bad" blood glucose (blood sugar). Take care not to blame or nag your child as you help him manage his diabetes.

• Engage in Active Listening. It's sometimes hard to do, but it's important to listen closely to your child's comments and questions. Repeat back to them what they said or asked about to be sure you understand, and be sure to make eye contact.

• **React calmly.** Kids remember your responses and often try to avoid a negative reaction in the future. When your child has a high blood glucose reading or forgets to bolus, stay calm. Focus on the solution and move on.

• **Beware of negative facial expressions.** Try not to look disappointed or frightened when you see a blood glucose reading outside of the target range. Your child can read your facial expressions, and he may feel that you are disappointed in him or fearful when it is too low or high.

• **Share your feelings.** If your child understands how worried you get, then he might better understand why you ask so many questions.

• Set realistic expectations. Mistakes will happen and perfection is impossible in managing diabetes. If you believe this, your child will too, and you won't be so hard on each other. When you set unrealistic goals, your child may hide things from you. For example, expecting perfect blood glucose levels is not realistic. Blood glucose levels aren't always controllable but the goal is to keep them as close to the target range while adjusting for life as it happens.

• Ask for honesty – no matter what. Let your child know that you want to hear the truth. If he feels he did something he shouldn't have, telling you right away is the best option. Be curious about what happened. Work together to solve the problem.

• **Empathize.** Put yourself in your child's shoes. Try to imagine how your child is feeling. These feelings may range from fear, sadness, and anger to denial, burnout and even guilt for causing you so much worry.

• Keep an open-door policy. Tell your child that you're open to hearing ideas and complaints – any time, any place. Reassure him that if he has anything on his mind, he should come and talk with you. You want to listen and help when you can.



### A Gift from the Freemasons of Georgia

Georgia Masons provide the GACHIP program FREE of charge as a public service and as our gift to the citizens of our state.

## **GACHIP - the GeorgiA CHild Identification Program** is one of the most comprehensive Child Recovery,

Identification, and Abduction Awareness programs ever to be offered to parents in the state of Georgia. The packet provided to parents or guardians at a GACHIP event can assist law enforcement by providing vital information about a child at a time when time matters most. In 76 percent of child abduction homicides, the murder of the child occurs within the first three hours.

At a GACHIP event, Freemasons provide the equipment necessary to generate completed identification kits. Each person progresses through several stations taking about 10 to 15 minutes for the entire process. The recorded information is presented to the child's parent or guardian in a sealed GACHIP envelope to take home for safekeeping. There is no age limit!

GACHIP provides a valuable tool for the parents or guardians on a DVD that includes:

• Full color digital photographs showing various poses of the child: These color photographs can be circulated by the police to the media in the case of abduction and can be used in the AMBER Alert Program.

• A brief video interview of the child displaying unique speech patterns as well as mannerisms.

- A complete set of digital fingerprints
- DNA Swab

• Data about the child including distinguishing features such as hair and eye color, scars, etc...

• The DVD will also contain contact information

for parents or guardians.



All of the identifying information collected at the event about the child is given to the child's family. The GACHIP program retains only the permission slip that must be signed prior to

participation in the event. All other data is permanently erased after the child's document is prepared. Privacy is our number one criteria.

Uniformed law enforcement is present at all GACHIP events. We are proud to have received endorsements from several organizations including:

- Georgia Governor's Office
- Georgia Bureau of Investigation (GBI)
- Georgia Department of the Military (National Guard)
- Georgia Police Officer's Association
- Georgia Peace Officer's Group (POAG)
- Georgia Superintendent of Schools
- Georgia Sheriff's Association

GACHIP has proudly partnered with local organizations such as Lions Clubs, Rotary Clubs, American Legion Posts, Boys and Girls Scout Troup's, Pilot Clubs and many more in hosting events. Volunteers have found that there is a place for them at any GACHIP event, no matter their talents. Our events have taken place at schools, community festivals, church events, National Guard Troop Send-offs, as well as many other venues where the integrity of our system would not be compromised. We guard against the sharing of information very seriously and all efforts are made to protect that information and see that it goes no further than the packet provided to the parent or guardian of that child.

Although the Masons of Georgia have traditionally funded this program through the generosity of our members, we have received grants from various foundations and organizations that have enabled us to continue our growth by purchasing much needed supplies and equipment.

While there is no way for us to know how many parents or guardians have had to use their GACHIP packet or how many children have been found as a result of our GACHIP efforts. What we do know is, we can be extremely proud of the efforts of all who participated in this community service project. If only one child might have been, or might be saved from harm or even worse, we feel that we have done ourselves, our communities and our children the greatest of service. The vast majority of missing children are recovered quickly. When NCMEC receives word of a missing child through its Call Center, or from law enforcement agencies, it serves as a centralized clearinghouse to help families and law enforcement respond to child abductions. When a child is reported missing to NCMEC, the case is categorized as an endangered runaway; family abduction; lost, injured or otherwise missing; or nonfamily abduction. In 2012 NCMEC received information on 10,689 missing children cases.

The National Center for Missing & Exploited Children has played a role in the resolution of more than 183,000 missing children cases since the organization's inception.


